Lompoc, Calif. — U. S. Air Force Lieutenant Colonel Glen R. Dunlap, son of Mr. and Mrs. Amos O. Dunlap of Rt. 1, Mullin, has completed a four-day ballistic missile staff course at Vandenberg AFB, California.

Colonel Dunlap, an operations staff officer at Offutt AFB, Nebraska, is a member of the Strategic Air Command which keeps the free world's mightiest missile and jet bomber force ready to counter the enemy threat.

The colonel, who served in the European Theater of Operations during World War II, received his commission through the aviation cadet program.

A 1939 graduate of Priddy (Texas) High School, he received his B. G. E. degree in political science in 1966 from the Municipal University of Omaha.

Employment in Mills County, rose 5 per cent between March 1964 and March 1965 according to one of the nation's Economic Indicators, "County Business Patterns, 1965—Texas", issued recently by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census.

County business patterns, now published annually, uses payroll information gathered for the first quarter of each calendar year by the Social Security Administration covering employment in most kinds of business and industry but excluding notably agricultural and government workers and the self-employed.

Number of employees in the county, in businesses covered by the report, for March 1965 totaled 387 as against 370 for the same month a year earlier. First quarter payrolls for the two years were \$283,000 and \$254,000 respectively.

Retail trade, the largest group of employers in the county, reported a March 1965 total of 146 employees and 3-month payrolls of \$74,000. Service firms, the county's second largest group of employers, had a total of 96 employees and \$46,000 in quarterly payrolls.

The county ranked 212th among the 254 counties in the state in March 1965 in number of employees in businesses covered in the report. The leading counties in the state in this respect were:

Comparable figures for Texas as a whole show the state's employment rose some 5 per cent from 2,197,331 to 2,313,891 between March 1964 and March 1965. Total January-through-March 1965 payrolls amounted to \$2,607.2 million as against \$2,461.2 million for the previous year's first quarter. For the state, manufacturing led with 565,436 employees and a quarterly payroll of \$795.6 million.

W. P. Duren, President of Mills County State Bank, said Wednesday morning that beginning January 1, 1967 the bank will pay five per cent on one year certificates of deposit with a minimum certificate of \$2,000.00.

On regular savings accounts the bank will continue to pay the maximum allowed annual rate of four per cent which is compounded quarterly, Duren stated.

Each account is insured for \$15,000.00 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, of which Mills County State Bank is a member.


