29th Annual Mills County Stock Show To Be Held Here Friday And Saturday

Annual Event Will Highlight Prize 4-H, FFA And FHA Exhibits

The 29th annual Mills County Livestock Show will be held here this Friday and Saturday, January 13 and 14, at the Mills County Show Barns.
According to R. L. Steen, president of the Mills County Livestock Raisers' Association, who sponsors the event, plans have been completed and will be ready for opening Friday morning.

This year's show will have a record number of entries with 184 animals to be shown, according to Mr. Steen. This number includes 101 sheep, 15 goats, 17 cattle, 39 hogs, and 12 horses.
All livestock must be in the show barns by 8:30 a. m., Friday and must remain until 4:30 p. m. on Saturday, according to show officials.

Parcel Post Rates And Zone Changes Effective January 15

Use of the ZIP Code will make it easier to mail packages after January 15, the Post Office Ray Duren of the Goldthwaite Post Office said today.

New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones will go into effect on that date as provided in legislation signed into law by President Johnson on September 20, 1966.

The rate increases will average about 10¢ a parcel. Starting July 1, the law provides for a series of size and weight increases on packages mailed between first-class offices. Goldthwaite is a 2nd class office and will not be effected by the size and weight increases.

It was noted that all parcels mailed between post offices within the Brownwood sectional center will be charged at the first zone rate. There are 72 post offices within the Brownwood sectional center.

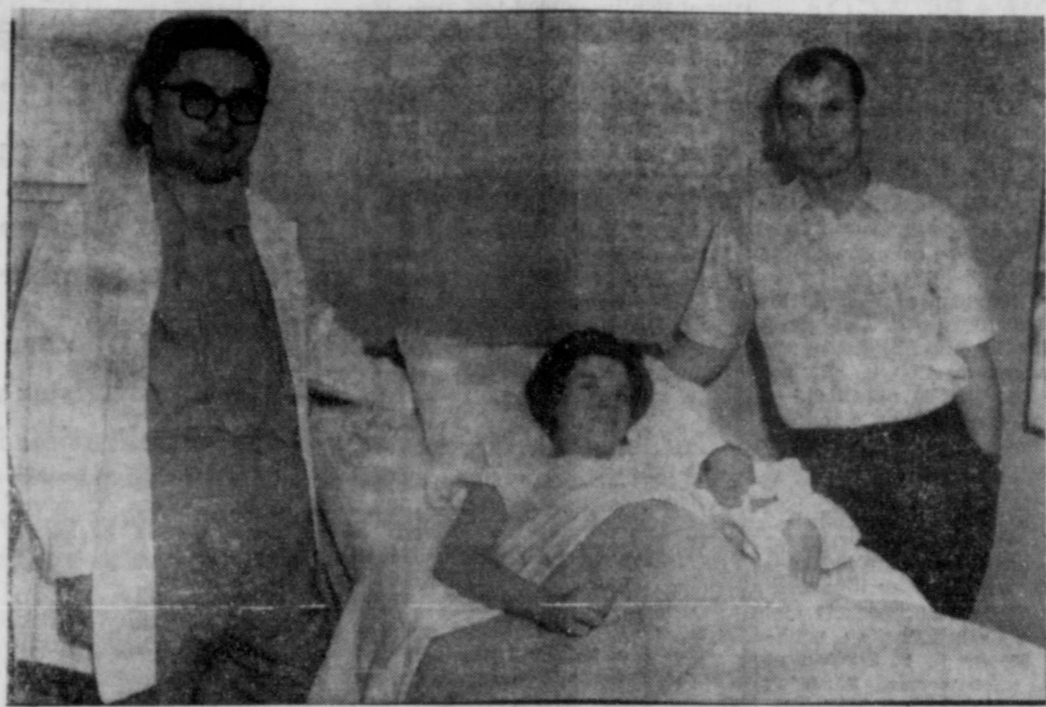
The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74 million a year for the Post Office Department. The later size and weight increases will add another \$32 million a year. The additional revenue is to help keep the Department within 4 per cent of costs on parcel post as the law requires.

Childress & Cruzcosa VN School To Start Third Class February 6

Mrs. Carol Cruzcosa, C. R. N.-A., School Director, has set February 6, 1967, as the opening date for her third class in Childress & Cruzcosa School of Vocational Nursing. The present class will finish the 6th of February with graduation exercises set for February 10.

Essential requirements for acceptance to the school have not changed and are as follows:

(1) Applicants must be residents of Mills County. Out of county applicants will only be considered if the full quota of nine students is not filled from within the county.

(2) Applicants should have at least finished second year of high school or its equivalent.

(3) Applicants should not be older than fifty years and younger applicants will be given preference.

(4) Applicants should have the full approval and cooperation of their families before applying.

All applicants are to be interviewed by Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa, Medical Adviser of the school, and Mrs. Carol Cruzcosa, Director, before final approval is given. The main purpose of such an interview, especially for those who have had no previous hospital experience, is to be informed as to what the school curriculum will consist of.

Mrs. Cruzcosa added that psychological nursing experience will be added to the present curriculum.

The school hopes to maintain its high scholastic record. All of the first seven graduates passed the State Board examination, ranking fourth in the State of Texas.

All applicants are required to have a complete physical examination with the required vaccinations. It is therefore important that anyone interested in the school apply as soon as possible, Mrs. Cruzcosa announced.

School Lunch Price To Increase Starting Monday

The price for meals served in the lunchrooms of Goldthwaite Public Schools will be increased by five cents starting next Monday, January 21. It was announced Tuesday by Supt. LeRoy Beard.

Changes for school lunches starting with the new semester will be as follows: Elementary, 35 cents; high school 35 cents and adults 40 cents.
