Mr. and Mrs. A. K. Arnold, owners and operators of Heritage Home were informed of the approval by the Regional Representative of the Bureau Of Health Insurance of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, in Dallas.

The approval and agreement was effective beginning March 21, 1967.

A list of several dozen names of boys and girls who attended the party has been provided to officials. They stated that a number of them were high school students and others were college students who were home for Easter vacation, some of them visiting here from other points.

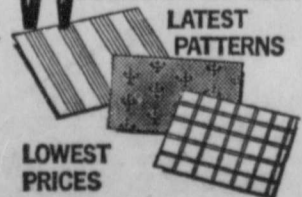

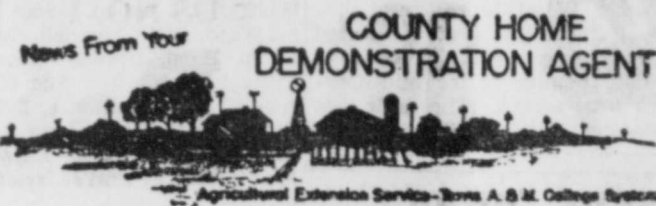

#### COOKING TIPS FOR CREATIVE COOKS

Are you a creative cook? One of those women who just can't resist substituting something for at least one ingredient in every recipe?

If you are, perhaps you could use a few pointers, especially in preparing doughs and batters.

Remember that each ingredient in a recipe serves a particular purpose. Your substitutions must be made accordingly. If you substitute almond extract for vanilla, you will change only the flavor of the product. But if you change the leavening agent in a recipe, the results may be drastic unless you know how to substitute and keep the same rising ability.

Most pastries are leavened by air, water vapor, carbon dioxide, or a combination of these. Beating egg whites and sifting flour are ways to put air in a product. Water vapor is used in making cream puffs, and carbon dioxide is used in most cakes and breads. Carbon dioxide is formed by using baking soda with an acid. The acid may be cream of tartar, sour milk, fruit juice, or molasses. Carbon dioxide is also formed when yeast ferments sugar. The sugar may be placed in the dough or formed by the breakdown of starch in the flour.

Tested recipes include the correct proportions of flour, liquid, and leavening agent to produce a good product if you follow the directions. An inexperienced cook will probably do well to follow them just as written. But if you have more ex-

#### Common Errors Delay Tax Refunds

Simple errors on Federal income tax returns delay refunds and cause taxpayers trouble according to Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas.

Mr. Campbell suggests this simple checklist:

1. Check arithmetic.
2. Attach W-2 from all employers.
3. Sign your return. Both husband and wife must sign a joint return.
4. Print or type name and address, including zip code.
5. Use correct tax table.
6. Total your deductions if you itemize them on page 2.
7. List your Social Security number correctly. Both husband's and wife's number should be reported on the joint return.

You can save the Internal Revenue Service and yourself valuable time by carefully checking your 1966 tax return before you mail it.

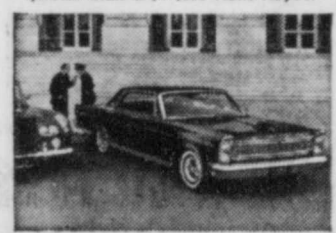

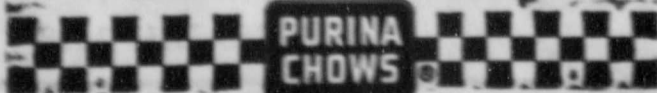

## Bond Sales For January - Fed.

W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee announced today that February sales of United States Savings Bonds in Mills County totaled \$22,785. During the first two months of 1967 sales in Mills County totaled \$27,448 which is 30 per cent of the 1967 goal of \$90,000.

During the first two months of 1967 Savings Bond sales in Texas totaled \$29,451,247 which is 16 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.3 million and a 15.2 per cent increase over sales during the same period of 1966.

Nationally, the sale of Savings Bonds during February totaled \$426 million and were 23 per cent higher than a year ago, and the highest for any February in 7 years. The January-February total was \$917 million, 12 per cent over sales for the first two months of 1966 and the highest January-February sales since 1963.

## Some Medicare Payments Delayed Due To Incomplete Information

Reports from Medicare, in Dallas, where claims are handled for Goldthwaite area residents, indicate that payment of some claims is being slowed up because of incomplete information on the claim. The most common omissions are: 1, failure to show the medicare claim number; 2, failure to sign the claim or show the address of the person making the claim; 3, failure to include itemized receipts.

Glen McNatt, social security manager in Brownwood, said that even though the medicare claim number may seem like a simple item, it very important in a claim. "The claim number is not merely a social security number—it is a number with a letter of the alphabet following it, such as A, B, D, T, etc., and if the correct alphabetical

## Draft Call Up For May

The state's 155 draft boards will be called upon to furnish 885 men for the armed forces in May, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Thursday.

This compares with quotas of 675 for April 1967 for March, 674 for February, and 1,110 for January.

There will be no quotas for the physical and mental pre-induction examination of men in April, Colonel Schwartz said. This continues a ban on examinations since early January because of the budgetary limitation of travel funds.

The state Selective Service director said no decision had been made as to whether or not examinations would be held in May.

He said Texas currently had sufficient examined and acceptable men to fill current needs.

Induction quotas for the Army by Texas Draft boards in the fall of 1966 reached as high as 2,700 monthly.
