South African Mohair Expert Will Address TSGRA Convention

A South African mohair expert will attend the 52nd annual convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association in San Angelo July 24 to 26. He will tell Texas growers what South African producers did to lift their mohair out of the doldrums and make it the

highest-selling in the world. Texas mohair has been moving sluggishly the last couple of years, dealing a severe blow to the agricultural economy in areas where Angora goat production is particularly important.

The speaker will be Dr. C. C. Kritzinger, manager of the Mohair Advisory Board in South Africa. He came to Texas once before, in 1964, to study the Texas mohair situation.

American mohair growers — 97 per cent of them in Texas — recently approved a deduction of 1½ cents a pound from mohair incentive payments to finance mohair promotion and product development program which could rejuvenate the industry. Now they are trying to decide how this money might best be spent. Dr. Kritzinger's experience with a similar situation in South Africa is expected to get strong attention.

You may be required to pay a service charge for collecting a check which cannot be processed electronically by the Federal Reserve banks.

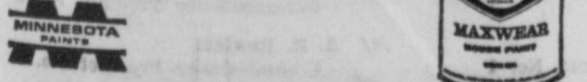



Water Rights Commission Director Will Address TSGRA Convention

Because water rights and pollution have been a major issue in recent months, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has arranged for the executive director of the Texas Water Rights Commission to speak at its annual convention in San Antonio July 24 to 26.

He is Frank R. Booth, one-time chief examiner for the Texas Board of Water Engineers, a former general counsel in the U. S. Study Commission for Texas, and from 1962 to 1965 deputy chief of the Natural Resources Division and assistant Attorney General of Texas.

The ranchman's organization successfully fought down an attempt in the Texas Legislature this year to give oil companies the right of eminent domain in disposal of salt water on privately owned lands. It was also instrumental in gaining a statewide no-pit order to halt pollution of Texas fresh water from oilfield salt-water disposal pits.

The stockmen's headquarters for the three-day session will be the El Tropicano Hotel. This will be TS&GRA's first summer convention in modern times. Annual conventions in the past have been conducted in December.
