Wilbur Fairman returned Monday from an auto trip to Leon Springs, San Antonio, Marlin and elsewhere.

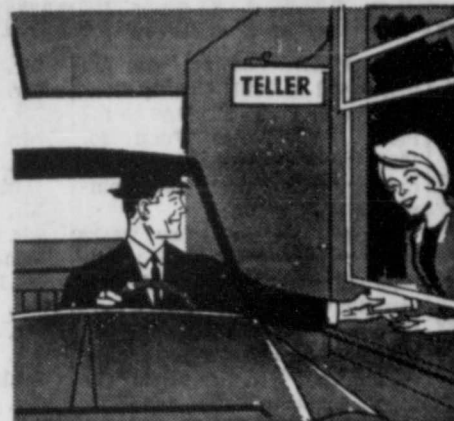
John Priddy, Jr. of Priddy left Tuesday for San Angelo to enlist in the Army and will go

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — WE ARE STILL TRYING TO BUY FRIENDS and influence people with the taxpayers' hard-earned money.

THE FOREIGN AID BILL IS SOON to come before the Congress, and it is pretty much the same old story of the past 15 years — keep the hand-outs going and everybody around the world will love us.

THE FACT IS, SOME OF THOSE WE HAVE HELPED MOST kick Uncle in the seat of his pants the hardest.

WE CONTINUE TO DIP OUR OAR INTO EVERYONE'S business — Rhodesia, the Congo, Greece — to play Santa Claus and the policeman at the same time.

NOW, IT IS PROPOSED THAT, FOR ALL INTENTS AND PURPOSES, we give away the Panama Canal, which has cost the American people more than \$5 billion since our Treaty with Panama in 1903. This magnanimity on the part of the United States is supposed to placate Panama's demands and to show all Latin America that we no longer claim sovereignty over that which we have bought and paid for in perpetuity.

SINCE THE BOLSHEVIK REVOLUTION OF 1917, the Russians have demanded and announced their intention to overthrow U. S. control of the Canal. They have never lost sight of that goal. After last month's Mid-East crisis, the Soviets repeat their demand that all strategic waterways be put under "international" control. Yet, that same crisis and the shut-down of the Suez Canal by Egypt, demonstrate how important it is to freedom that the Panama Canal remain in strong and responsible U. S. hands.

TO "INTERNATIONALIZE" THE CANAL OR TO SURRENDER our sovereignty over it, can have the effect of augmenting Soviet power in the Western world and to weaken our own capability to resist aggression everywhere.

THEODORE ROOSEVELT, QUOTED IN THE KANSAS CITY STAR on December 2, 1918, following the 1917 Bolshevik Revolution, had this to say: "THE PANAMA CANAL MUST NOT BE INTERNATIONALIZED. It is our canal; we built it; we fortified it; and we will protect it and we will not permit our enemies to use it in war. In time of peace all nations shall use it alike, but in time of war our interest at once becomes dominant."

THE DETAILS OF PROPOSALS TO ABROGATE EXISTING

Treaties over the Panama Canal and to change its status of sovereignty are not yet known in detail. Both Houses of Congress, however, have repeatedly reiterated their approval of the fundamental provisions of the Treaty of 1903. Should the Senate approve, a profound change will come over the operation of the Canal. The question to be seriously considered is the soundness and workability of any new and untested concept—the concept of whether the Canal can still serve U. S. interests if it is no longer operated under the direct control and sovereignty of our Nation.

THE AMERICAN PEOPLE HAVE THE RIGHT TO CLEAR ANSWERS to many questions involved in this proposed transaction. Paramount are these:

WOULD A NEW TREATY PROTECT the American soil of the Canal Zone, obtained by both Treaty with Panama and purchase of property from individual owners?

WILL ANY NEW TREATY ABROGATE THE BODY OF LAW in the Panama Canal Zone Code and the administration of justice based upon it?

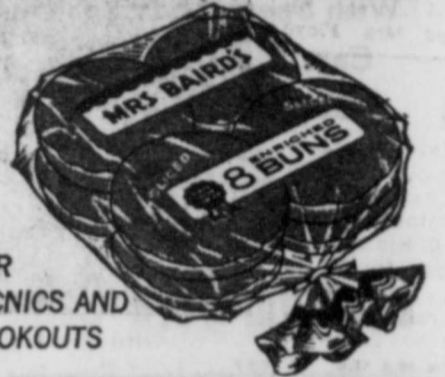

KNOW THIS MAN?

At 9:48 a. m., August 8, 1966, an unidentified white male who was armed attempted to rob the Inwood National Bank of Dallas, Texas. A customer who attempted to intervene was shot and killed by the robber. An FBI artist's conception of this individual has been described by witnesses as an excellent likeness of this person. The man was described as approximately 27 years old, approximately 5' 8" or 5' 9" tall, and weighing about 160 pounds. His hair was very dark or black and well groomed. His eyes were dark and he possessed a muscular build with broad shoulders and a narrow waist. Witnesses stated this individual's speech accent indicated the possibility that he was from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas or Louisiana.

During the commission of this attempted robbery, the robber kept telling customers and employees in the bank not to look at him or he would kill them. One witness thought he had the initials "J. B." on his upper left arm. Another witness noted that when he walked he rose on his toes noticeably.

The FBI has requested that anyone having any information as to the possible identity of this individual please contact the nearest office of the FBI. Anyone having such information is cautioned not to attempt to apprehend this individual, inasmuch as he is considered armed and extremely dangerous.

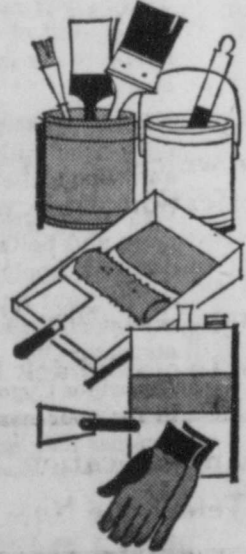

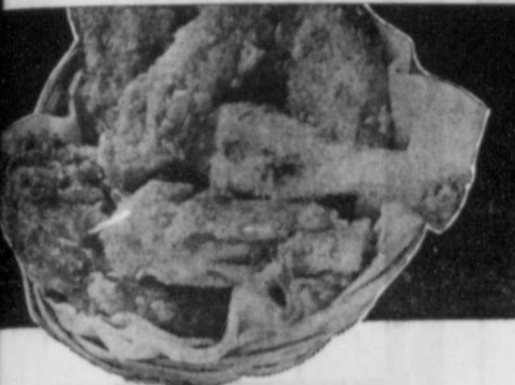

Highway Fund Apportionment Reported By AAA

The State of Texas has been apportioned a total of \$59,833,054 in Federal - aid highway funds effective July 1, 1967. Wm. M. Coffey, General Manager, Texas Division, American Automobile Association reported today.

The total includes \$2,603,054 in unobligated balances held up by President Johnson's "freeze" of last November, and \$57,230,000 representing the state's share of regular first-quarter apportionments for the fiscal year 1968.

"This restores to the state the entire amounts affected when the Administration ordered a cut-back of \$1 billion in Federal-aid highway funds last fall," Mr. Coffey said.

For the nation as a whole, the Federal Highway Administration of the Department of Transportation released \$1.6 billion in highway funds on July 1.

The released funds represent \$1.1 billion Federal-aid highway funds for the regular first-quarter apportionment of Fiscal Year 1968, and \$515 million in unobligated balances (of June 30, 1966) which had been deferred since November last year.

This \$515 million is the remainder of the \$1 billion in highway funds which were ordered deferred by President Johnson last November in a move to reduce inflationary pressures on the economy and in the highway industry. After the inflationary pressures eased, \$175 million in deferred funds were released February 28, and an additional \$350 on March 20.

Vivian Reid Is In Europe On Study Program

Miss Vivian Reid of Goldthwaite, a teacher at Amelia Barhart School, Wiesbaden, Germany, is among the 17 persons now in Europe studying on a University of Iowa comparative education program.

Robert E. Belding, professor of social foundations of education in the University of Iowa College of Education, is in charge of the course for the second summer. It includes four-week sessions at Cambridge University in England and the University of Oslo in Norway.

Participants in the course, which is given for advanced credit, visit schools and use the universities' facilities for their research. Belding said, "Instead of accumulating mileage and amassing an impressive number of countries visited, the students have a chance to unpack their bags and get to know two areas of Western Europe well."

Miss Reid is the daughter of Mrs. Elsie Reid of Goldthwaite and granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Egger, also of Goldthwaite.
