City Manager W. C. Barnett Honored As "Man Of The Year"

W. C. Barnett, city manager for the past 26 years, was honored as Goldthwaite "Man Of The Year" last Friday night. More than 200 friends and neighbors along with a number of relatives and friends from out of town attended the barbecue dinner and program held in Mills County Park. The City Council had earlier declared August 18, as W. C. Barnett Day to honor the city manager after the move was initiated by a group of individual citizens outside the council.

The park with the outdoor theatre was the proper setting for the occasion since Mr. Barnett, representing the city government and utilities, had played an important part with other civic and community groups in the development of the park project. Rev. Maurice Barnett, Waco, brother of W. C., gave the invocation before the barbecue dinner was served. After dinner Mayor Ray Duren spoke words of welcome to all who were present. He announced at that time that as far as the records show this was the first time to have a Goldthwaite Man Of The Year awards program to honor a local citizen. The mayor introduced Howard B. Campbell, former city councilman.

Committee Lays Plans For Local Ind. Foundation

A committee meeting was held Wednesday morning in the community room of Mills County State Bank to further discuss plans for organizing the Goldthwaite Industrial Foundation.

Harry W. Clark, Executive Director and James Heath, Industrial Development Consultant, of the Texas Industrial Commission met with a local group to review the application for charter and to discuss information to be presented at the public meeting next Tuesday night.

Those attending the meeting were: Ray Duren, Paul Henderson, Norman Duren, Hollis Wiggins, Lois Hudson, W. P. Duren, W. C. Barnett, Dr. M. A. Childress, Vic E. Koleber and LeRoy Beard.

It was pointed out at this meeting again that it is most important for all business and professional people of the city to be at the public meeting next Tuesday night in the American Legion Hall.

Everyone interested in the development of Goldthwaite and all of Mills County is invited to attend.

A community public meeting will be held Tuesday night, August 29, at 7 p. m., at the American Legion hall, for the purpose of discussing the organization of a non-profit Goldthwaite Industrial Foundation.

The meeting will be open to all interested parties of the community. All business and professional people of the city are especially invited to be on hand and take part in the discussion.

Several meetings of a representative group from the city have been held in answer to a request from the Texas Industrial Council for information about the City of Goldthwaite that would be helpful in telling the story of the city to some prospective industry.

Those present at a special meeting to discuss what was needed to supply the necessary information were: Paul Henderson, Engineer, Highway Department; W. C. Barnett, city manager; Ray Duren, Mayor; Max Shepherd, President Jaycees; W. P. Duren, President Mills County State Bank; Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa, Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital; Lee W. Tabor, President Lions Club; LeRoy Beard, Supt. Goldthwaite Public Schools; Vic E. Koleber, Editor & Publisher, The Goldthwaite Eagle; Glynn Collier, Vice President, Mills County State Bank and City Secretary; Hollis Wiggins, Santa Fe Railroad; and Dr. M. A. Childress, Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital.

Jim Heath, Texas Industrial Commission, Consultant, from Austin, met with the group and recommended that an Industrial Foundation be organized as the first step in preparing the city for some prospective industry.

The group named Ray Duren as temporary chairman. Three sub-committees were appointed as follows:

Legal Sub-Committee — E. B. Gilliam, Glynn Collier, Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa and Ray Duren. Finance Sub-Committee — W. P. Duren, Hollis Blackwell, W. C. Barnett, and Dr. T. C. Graves. Publicity Sub-Committee — Vic E. Koleber, Mrs. Lois Hudson, and Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa.

Other committees including one for industrial sites and one for buildings are to be made. These committees will serve until a permanent organization is formed.

All interested parties are urged to give the matter some consideration and attend the planning meeting to express their views.

Cen-Tex Angora Goat Show & Sale To Be Held Here Friday, Saturday

Members of the Central Texas Registered Angora Goat Breeders' Association will have their eleventh annual show and sale at the show barns in Goldthwaite Friday and Saturday, August 25 and 26.

Goats will be in their pens by 7:30 a. m., on Friday and sifting will get underway at 8:00 a. m. when 100 bucks and 25 does will be selected for the sale, from about 350 bucks and 100 does.

The top 25 bucks and 10 does will be placed starting at 1:00 p. m. Friday, from which the champion buck and doe will be selected.

The sale will begin promptly at 1:00 p. m. on Saturday. There will be a barbecue dinner served on the grounds.

The goals offered for sale have been assigned by 40 Angora goat breeders. The association has 75 members in Mills, Com-

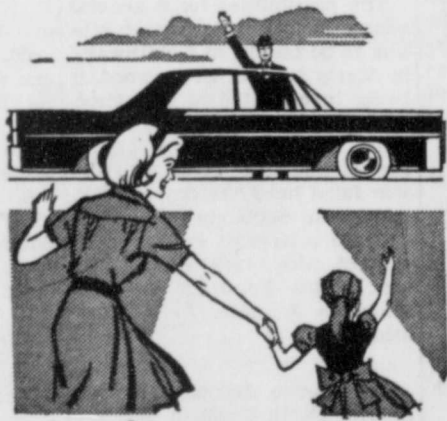

Pearl Hickman, Annette Leverett Attend Conference In San Antonio

Pearl Hickman, administrator, and Annette Leverett, assistant administrator and bookkeeper of the Hickman Nursing Home, in Goldthwaite, were among 333 nursing home staff members, welfare case workers, and health department employees who attended a conference in San Antonio on August 8, on the implementation of Title XIX, commonly referred to as Medicaid, of the Social Security Act in Texas.

The one-day meeting, sponsored by the Texas Nursing Home Association, State Department of Public Welfare, and Texas State Department of Health was based on the theme, "Meet The Challenge Of Change," and dealt with the responsibilities of the nursing home and state employees under this new program.

Title XIX, being implemented in Texas starting September 1st will replace the current Kerr-Mills welfare programs which

have been functioning in Texas since 1962. This new, joint federal-state program, will initially provide the following services to the certain categorical groups of the medically indigent welfare recipients: physician services, in-patient hospital services, out-patient hospital services, skilled nursing home services, and other laboratory and x-ray services. These services will be available to the eligible blind, aged, and totally and permanently disabled and families of dependent children.

Medicaid was the companion legislation to medicare passed by Congress in 1965 as a part of Public Law 89-97. Since Medicaid is a joint federal-state program, while medicare is strictly a federal program, each state legislature had to pass legislation enabling the state to participate in the program. Senate Bill 2, passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by Governor John Connally on May 11, 1967, was Texas' enabling legislation.

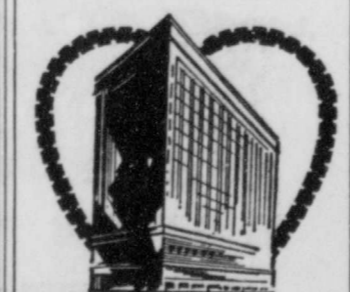

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the State of Texas, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

Three From Goldthwaite Attend Title XIX Conference in Lubbock

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public for schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents (35¢) on the one hundred dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of eighty cents (80¢) on the one hundred dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed eighty cents (80¢) on the one hundred dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations under the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Governor, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature."

All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of interest or principal on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same. "In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds. "Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund. "When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of said Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, as under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. "Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds. "All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a 'series of bonds' being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds heretofore issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

tirement of any bonds heretofore issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds heretofore issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein. "This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary. "Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature. "This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature under such restrictions and limitations as that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other office or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he or she receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold

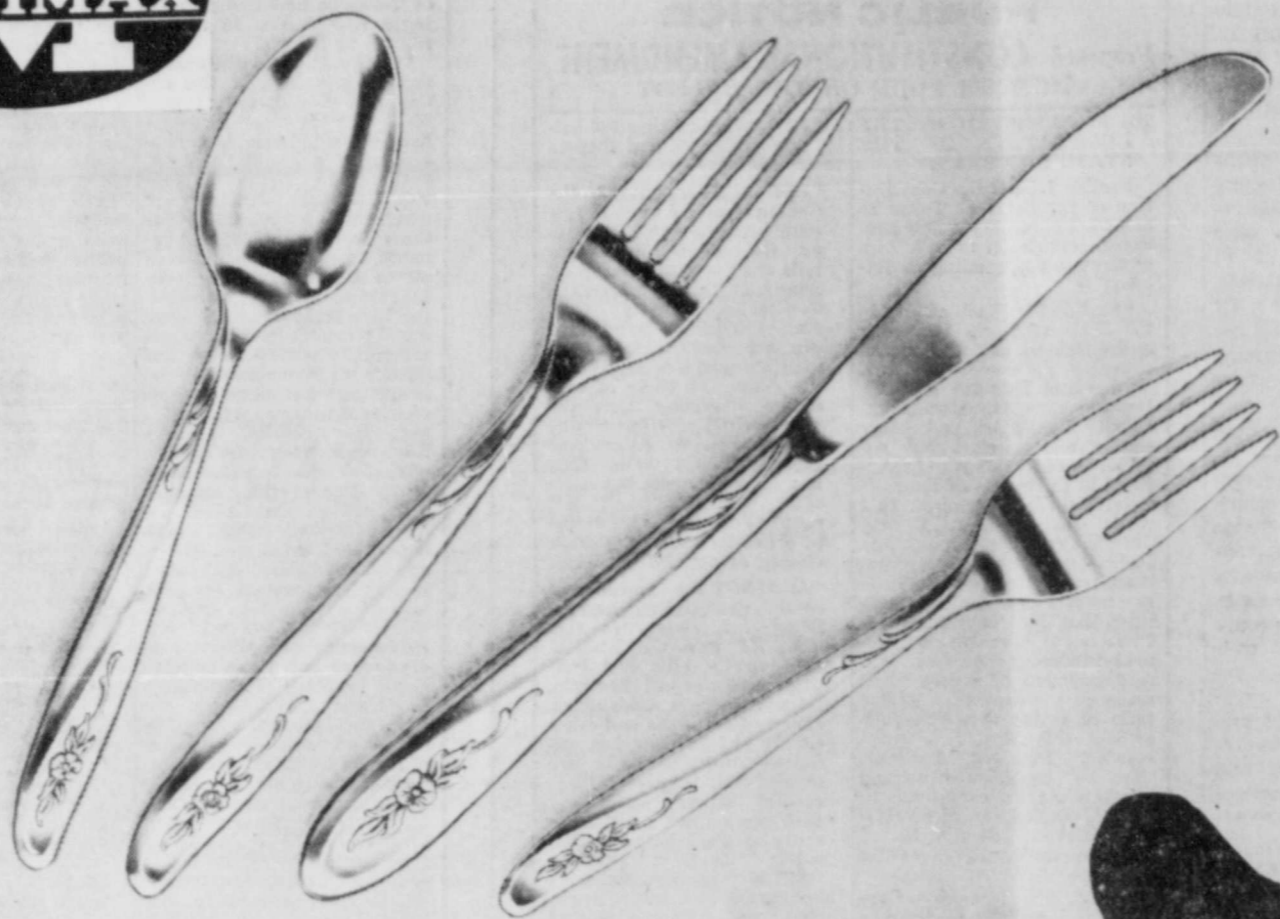
any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

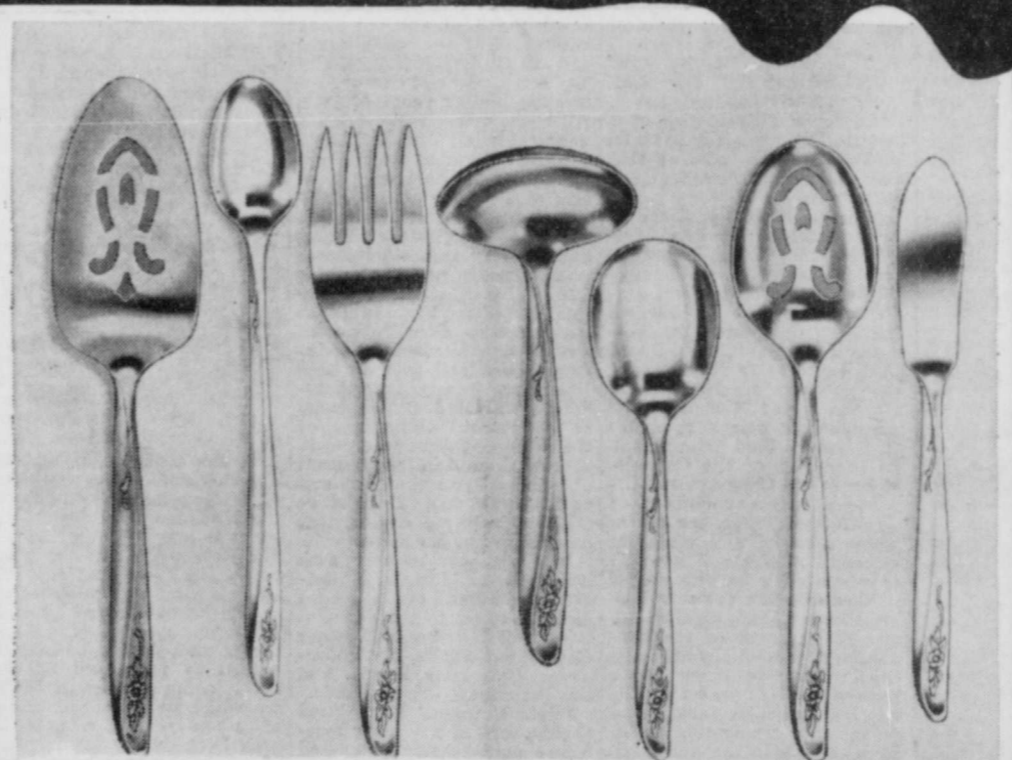

Drivers License Law Amendments Will Go Into Effect August 28

The Department of Public Safety reminded Texans today that August 28 marks the effective date of several amendments to the drivers license law which are designed to benefit Texas motorists from the standpoint of providing added protection.

The law sets new minimum age limits for acquiring a license, provides for issuing a provisional license to any person under the age of 21, and increases the penalties for driving without a license and violations calling for automatic suspension.

It also sets penalties for counterfeiting or forging a license, or for possessing such a license.

The age limits were raised to a minimum of 16 years for obtaining a license when a person has satisfactorily completed an approved driver education course, and to 18 years for persons who have not had such a course.

The minimum age for operating a five-brake horsepower motor scooter was raised to 15 years. A special examination will be required after January 1 for applicants desiring a license to operate a motorcycle which includes an "off-street phase" and an "on-street phase." The applicant must provide the motorcycle and a passenger vehicle and licensed driver to convey the License Examiner during the road test.

Licenses issued to persons un-

der 21 years of age will be stamped "Provisional" and may be suspended if the operator is convicted of two traffic law violations in a twelve month period. This becomes effective January 1.

Upon conviction of driving without a license, a motorist is subject to a fine of up to \$200 for the first offense and increasingly stiffer penalties for each successive conviction.

Persons convicted of driving while intoxicated (or a similar offense) are subject to a first suspension of twelve months. Any subsequent suspension on the basis of this type of conviction will be for a period of 18 months. In addition, any driver whose license has been suspended or revoked may be required to attend a program of rehabilitation for problem drivers.

Any person applying for an original license must furnish the Department with certified copy of the applicant's birth certificate or other documentary evidence deemed satisfactory by the Department for proof of age. The Department is also authorized to require any other information necessary to determine the applicant's identity, competency and eligibility for licensing. Thumb prints will be required on all original applications after August 28.

Among other provisions designed to ban unsafe drivers from the highways is the requirement that the Department of Public Welfare furnish the DPS with a list of the persons who apply for or receive assistance to the needy blind. The license of such persons must be revoked to comply with the law.

Also, any person who is convicted of driving while his license is suspended or revoked shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500, and shall be imprisoned not less than 72 hours nor more than six months.
