Sandra Arnold Lengefeld and Phillip Auldridge are two more Goldthwaite students that are attending institutions of higher learning. Both are attending Baylor University, Waco.  
Their names were not listed in the Eagle with the large group of those leaving for colleges and universities.

The GHS Eagles took over the lead in the District 9-A race here Friday night with a sound 34-6 victory over the Cross Plains Buffaloes. The victory placed the Eagles at 2-0 in district play ahead of Santa Anna with a 1-0 mark for the season.  
Eagle Quarterback Ted Roberts connected with Sam Campbell for two touchdown passes, and hit Danny Spradley on a screen pass for a third TD. Campbell scored again on a punt return, and Roberts claimed one tally for the Eagles.  
The Buffaloes received the ball on the kick-off and on the next play Sam Campbell recovered a fumble to give the Eagles possession of the ball. Halfway into the first quarter Campbell received a pass from Roberts and powered his way through the entire Buffalo line for a 75-yard touchdown. Warlick kicked the extra point putting the score at 7-0 for the remainder of the half.  
Three minutes into the third quarter, Campbell scored again on a 55-yard punt return. Warlick was good again for an extra point, making the score 14-0.  
The Buffaloes had the ball for one play when Lynn Berry intercepted a pass and put the Eagles in position for their third TD. On a second down with nine yards to go, Roberts passed 21 yards to Campbell in the end zone. The PAT failed leaving the Eagles still ahead 20-0.  
Early in the fourth period Mike Wright gained 40 yards on a punt return to make way for a fourth tally. Danny Spradley was on the receiving end of an aerial for a 46-yard sprint with excellent blocking from the whole Eagle squad. Warlick's kick was successful moving the score up to 27-0.  
A pass interception by Mike Wright put the Eagles on their own 40-yard line about halfway into the fourth quarter. Then on a fake pass, Roberts broke away for a 60-yard touchdown. The score was 34-0 when Warlick made a good kick.  
Jerry Strickland scored Cross Plains' lone touchdown on a one-yard blast in the final period. Sam Campbell blocked the pass for extra points, leaving the Buffaloes with 6 points to Goldthwaite's 34.  
In the final part of the game, the second string Eagles went in and showed some very fine potential.  
In commenting on the game Eagle Coach Les Johnson said: "We had a very good ball game this week. Our defensive effort and passing strategy was good, and we had some fine secondary action. Paul Kirkpatrick, Gaylon Jernigan, Charles McCasland, and Danny Spradley showed up good on defense, and Sam Campbell, Mike Wright, Gary Warlick, Lynn Berry, Ted Roberts and Kent Geeslin were good on supporting action. Mac Rowlett and Larry Pierce displayed the best blocking of the season."  
"Cross Plains had absolutely no yards rushing in the second half, so the Eagles were really playing ball," said Johnson. "We are anticipating a good game with Burnet this week. They've had a lot of boys hurt, but managed to give Coppersa Cove a real tussel last week."

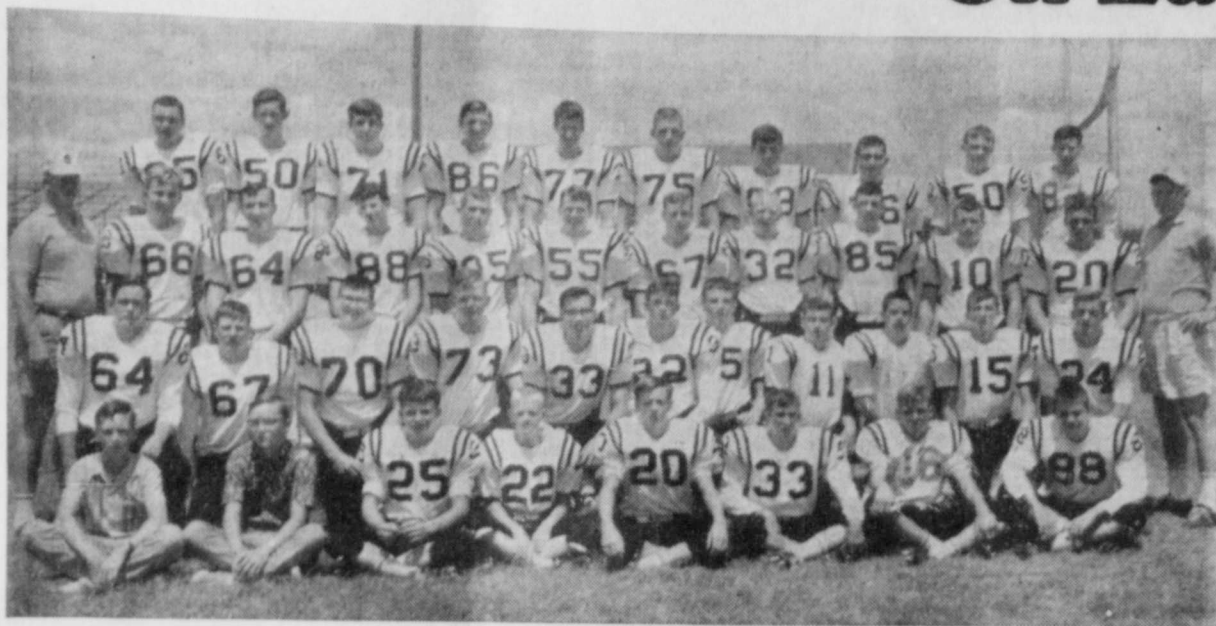

**As It Looks From Here**

Washington, D. C. — It would be a refreshing change if all of us at the Federal level, and particularly the President of the United States, would simply say, "We are in a mess and there are a lot of things which are going to have to be done to get out of it. Much of it we don't like,

and the people will not like, but is necessary in the interest of our Nation."

At 8:30 on Thursday morning of last week at a White House conference, the President layed before the Chairmen of Committees of the House of Representatives, including Members of the Appropriations and Ways and Means Committees, the fiscal situation now immediately facing us.

Unless certain things are done, it is estimated there will be a \$29 billion deficit in fiscal 1968. This is the period from June 30, 1967 to the same time next year.

To reduce the deficit, the President says there must be a 10 per cent surtax increase. This simply means that when corporations and individuals determine the amount of tax we now pay under present rates, 10 per cent will be added. Those with incomes under \$5,000 will not be affected. As an example, a family of four with a \$10,000 income would pay \$120 extra in taxes if this rate is enacted by the Congress.

This rate is calculated to raise \$7½ billion. In addition, the President says that Federal employees' salaries should not be raised beyond the 4½ per cent recommended in the Budget, and that to raise it to the extent now being proposed in the Congress would cost another billion.

He also recommends the sale of \$2 billion in securities held by those Federal Agencies such as the Farmers Home Administration, Small Business Administration, Veterans Administration, and so forth.

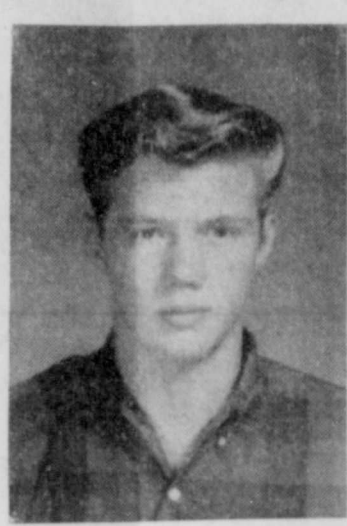
This reduces the total estimated deficit to \$18½ billion, and ways will be looked for to reduce this in actual spending, with the hope it may be brought down another \$4½ billion, coming up with a deficit of not more than \$14 billion. This would be the amount which would have to be borrowed to carry on the Government operation at the present level.

Non-Defense Expenditures in Government now run about \$61 billion. Approximately two-thirds of this sum are fixed expenses such as interest on the public debt (over \$14 billion); veterans compensation and insurance pensions (\$5 billion); public assistance (\$4 billion); farm price supports (\$2 billion); medical payments out of general revenues (over \$1 billion), and others.

More than \$15 billion will be spent to complete contracts for

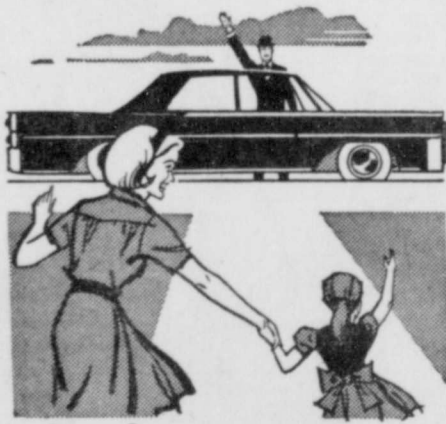

obligations entered into in prior years. An addition \$8 billion goes to pay Federal employees' salaries.  
If the steps recommended by the President are taken, and the other estimates are about as set out in his recommendations, this leaves only \$12 billion over which he can exercise much discretion in the year ahead.  
Congress needs to cut to the bone non-defense appropriations. It will have to do so if it sells the American people on a tax increase.  
For some reason there comes to mind Horatio Alger's boy in "Bound To Rise." You may remember that Harry wrote to his father about losing his job in the cobbler's shop. He joined Professor Henderson, the ventriloquist, as his helper. Professor Henderson could throw his voice into a trunk, and from inside came the shout, "Let me out, let me out, or I shall die."  
The Professor also sold a little tin gadget that you put in the mouth, which, with practice, enabled anyone to throw his voice. Some of you will remember these sold at the traveling show or ordered from an ad.  
One of these gadgets was tried out on Grandma one time, but all she said was, "Let you out of what, for Heaven's sake. Stop mumbling."  
Our Government is throwing a lot of money around in pretty empty places and it is coming back. We are around over these huge figures with everyone knowing much more could be done to give us a safe fiscal compass but the political ear is tuned on so many programs of a regular nature that expenditures continue to climb upward. The cost of the Viet Nam war is greater than expected, and continues to spiral.  
A huge deficit erodes pensions, annuities and all income except that purely speculative nature of us would like to be "rich" but the lesser of evils has to be faced.

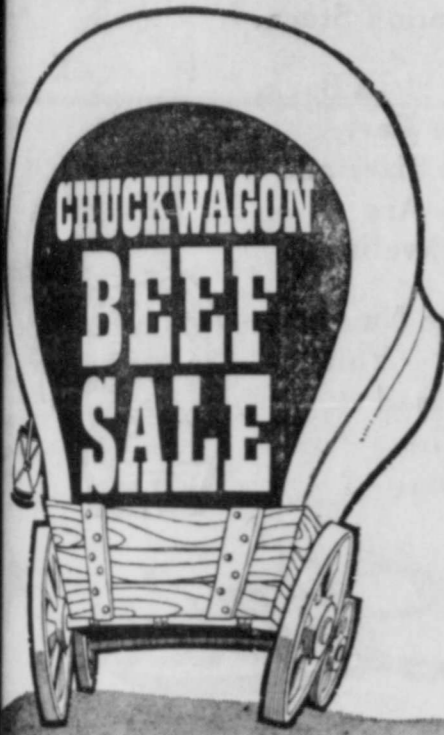

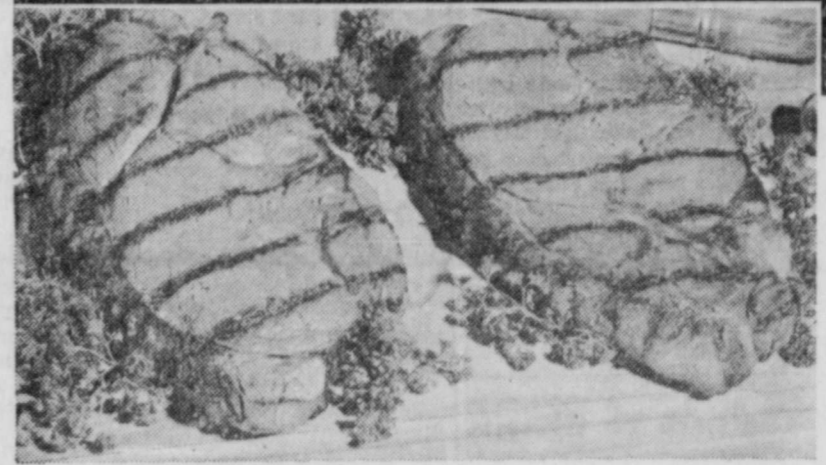

### Danger Cited Of Screwworm Cases Spread After Hurricane Beulah

A potentially dangerous spread of screwworm cases over Texas sheep and goat areas has followed Hurricane Beulah and extensive flooding.

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has endorsed the urgent call of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation for stockmen to watch herds and flocks closely and to spray livestock for protection, said Worth Durham of Sterling City, president.

"The snowballing infestation since the rains puts us in danger of losing much of the ground we have gained," he declared. "Being rid of the screwworm has saved stockmen hundreds of millions of dollars. But the sudden size of the problem

is straining the physical and financial resources of the eradication program to the limit. It could get away from us, especially if we have a mild winter and screwworm flies survive.

"No one is safe. Screwworm cases can leapfrog across the state in a hurry. Individual stockmen can help hold our ground by spraying all their livestock and watching them closely. This would be far cheaper than going back to doctoring screwworm cases the way we used to. Every case that goes untreated increases our danger."

A report on the current screwworm situation will be given at the quarterly Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association meeting in Del Rio Saturday, October 28.
