Eagles Downed By Bulldogs 21-13 For Bi-District Championship Title

The GHS Eagles were nosed out of a regional state play-off in a heartbreaker at Brownwood Saturday night. In the Class 9-A bi-district battle in Lion Stadium, the Ranger Bulldogs came out on top with a 21-13 decision over the Eagles, for their 11th win over no defeats.

The first Ranger touchdown followed a blocked punt at the Eagle 39-yard line. Rudy Mendoza charged in, batted Lynn Berry's kick and recovered at the Goldthwaite 31. After a drive to the Goldthwaite 4, Tom Fox went over for the score with only 26 seconds remaining in the first quarter. Charlie Orms booted the PAT for a 7-0 Bulldog lead.

Eagle Gary Warlick returned the ensuing kickoff to his own 31. Danny Spradley ran out the first quarter clock with a 16 yard carry to the 47. Quarterback Ted Roberts then hit on a 14 yard pass moving the ball deep into Ranger territory. The Eagles were forced to punt on a fourth down but held Ranger and took charge again at their own 38.

Ted Roberts then decided to take the matter into his own hands as he broke through the line over left tackle and raced down the sidelines to the Ranger three-yard line before being caught from behind by Mendoza.

Larry Pierce covered the remaining three yards on the next play and Gary Warlick added the point after with four minutes remaining in the second quarter, making the score an

even 7-7.

The Bulldogs moved from their own 36 to score on their next possession. Ricky Squyres scored the marker for the two-yard line on fourth down. Orms converted to bring the score to 14 for Ranger, Goldthwaite 7.

The Bulldogs came back after the half and controlled the ball for the entire quarter with the exception of eight plays for the Eagles. The determined Eagle squad held Ranger back forcing a 41-yard field goal attempt that fell short.

Hard luck was again on the Eagles' side as Squyres came in to block another punt, putting Ranger on the Goldthwaite 21. Ranger moved only six yards in three plays but then Coleman hit 213-pound end Charles Orms from 15 yards out for the third and final Bulldog tally. Orms also added the extra points. With three minutes left in the third quarter, Ranger was ahead 21-7.

Then came the fourth quarter and also the Eagles. Roberts took to the air and racked up three first downs before an interception killed the threat at the Ranger 23-yard line.

A short Ranger punt gave the Eagles possession on the Bulldog 31 but on the first play a pass to Spradley from Roberts was fumbled in the end zone. But the Eagles were not to be denied and stole the ball from Fox after a short two-yard gain.

Roberts ran a keeper to the Ranger 8 from the 22 and then hit Mike Conradt for the score with five minutes remaining in the game. An attempted two point conversion netted nothing and the score read 21-13, as it would remain to the end of the hard-fought game.

Goldthwaite To Be Site Of Mosquito Inspection Friday

A sample inspection program, looking for yellow fever and dengue-carrying mosquito, will get under way in Goldthwaite, Friday, November 24, conducted by the U. S. Health Service and Texas State Health Department, it was announced Tuesday by Dr. M. A. Childress, city health officer.

The mosquito type officially is known as Aedes segypti and a state and federal program now is seeking its eradication.

Charles A. Porter, foreman of Vector Control special with Texas State Health Department, said here this week that there is no epidemic of dengue or yellow fever in the state but the State Health Department knows that the Aedes aegypti is present in Texas.

The survey, now under way, they explained, is to determine how widespread the population is so necessary eradication steps may be taken.

Sample inspections will be made in Goldthwaite with about 10 per cent of the houses to be contacted, Porter said.

There is no charge for the service and the inspectors do not go inside the house, he added.

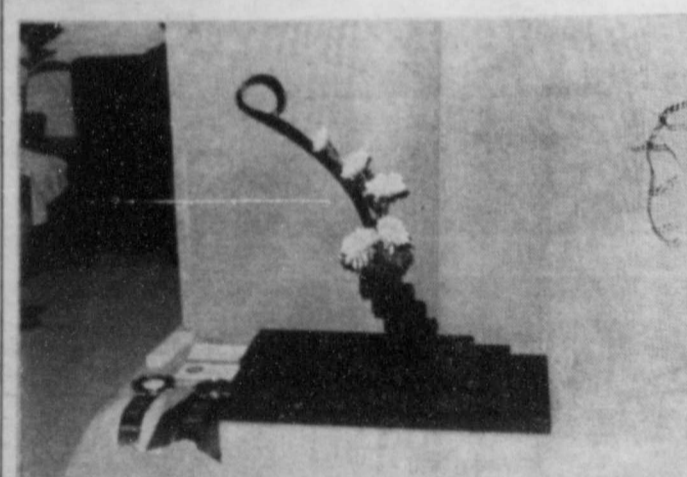
Regular season play will open Friday, September 13, and close on Friday, November 16. Following is the official schedule as announced by school officials.

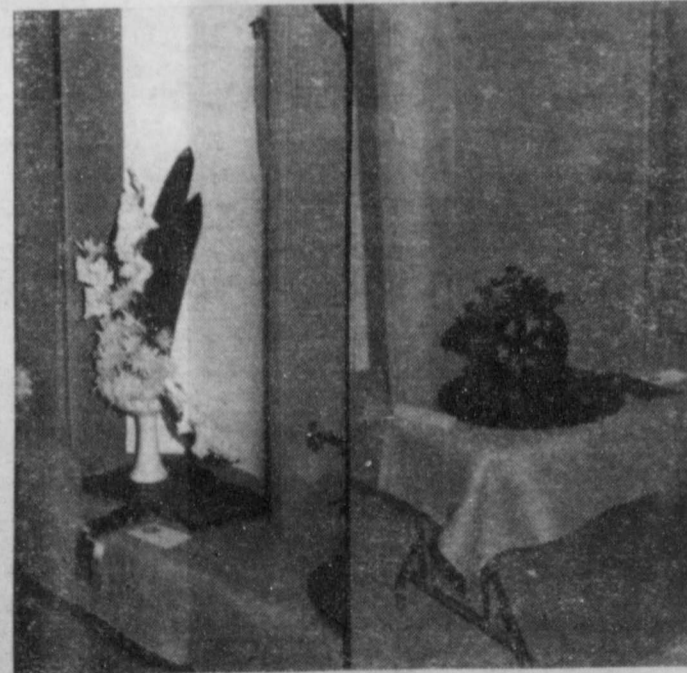

Postmaster Duren Urges Correct Addresses On Mail To Servicemen

Postmaster Norman Duren today urged the citizens of the Goldthwaite area to be sure to use the correct address on their letters and packages going to servicemen overseas to avoid serious delays in delivery.

Postmaster Duren reported that millions of letters and packages going overseas have been delayed because they were insufficiently addressed. One of the biggest problems has been the failure of persons to include the very important 5 digit APO or FPO number in the military address. Mail not containing this number is incorrectly addressed.

He said that last year more than 9 million pieces of mail were delayed in delivery. Of this number, 3½ million pieces failed to include the complete 5 digit APO or FPO number in the address. This improperly addressed mail had to be sent to a military locator directory where time-consuming searches were made to determine the proper address.

"As the Christmas mail volume going overseas is expected to increase up to 30 per cent or over 4 million pounds above last year, every precaution should be taken by friends and relatives of servicemen to address their letters and packages properly to

assure rapid delivery to its destination," Postmaster Duren said.

The four essential elements to an overseas military address are as follows:

1. The serviceman's identity—grade, full name, and service number.
2. His military unit—complete.
3. Gateway post office—New York, San Francisco or Seattle.
4. APO or FPO— a 5 digit number.

When any of these elements is missing, the letter or package will be delayed in delivery.

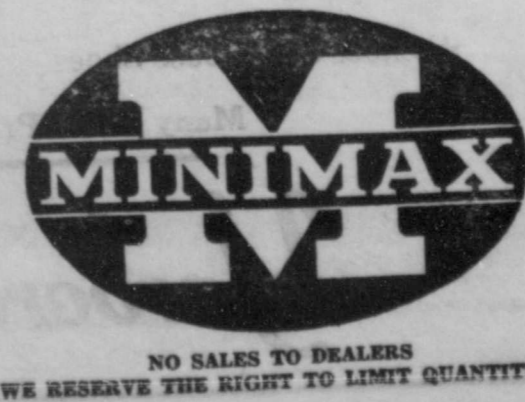
