## Increased Rates For Most Classes Of Mail Go Into Effect January 7

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect January 7, Postmaster Norman Duren reminded postal customers today.

The new rate for first class mail will be six cents and air mail will be 10 cents while the new rate for post cards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents.

Mr. Duren said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a 24 per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspapers and magazines and a 34 per cent hike for advertising circulars, "occupant" mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to 13 ounces and the new rate of 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to 7 ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over 13 ounces and all air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category.

These heavier pieces of first-class and air mail subject to the single rate schedule will be delivered by the fastest available means of transportation.

A flat rate of 80 cents will be charged for all mail in this category up to one pound. For all mail weighing more than one pound, the present air parcel post rates will continue to apply, except that the postage on matter weighing between one and five pounds will change at half-pound intervals rather than one pound intervals.

Postmaster Duren said that the new rate structure will mean a reduction of postage on some parcels.

Another rate change that will affect the general public is the increase from four to six cents for the first two ounces of individual pieces of third-class mail. Unsealed greeting cards may be sent at this rate, Postmaster Duren said.

He also noted that effective January 7 special handling will be available on third-class parcels weighing between eight and sixteen ounces. Special handling has not been available on these parcels since 1958, when packages weighing between eight and sixteen ounces were transferred from fourth to third-class mail.

There will be no changes in the charges for special delivery, special handling, registered mail, certified mail, cash on delivery or insurance.

"We have an ample supply of one-cent stamps on hand," Postmaster Duren said, "for those people who have five-cent stamps and need one-cent stamps to make up the postage required under the new rates."

Higher rates also will go into effect January 7 for all categories of second-class mail, bulk-rate third-class mail, controlled circulation mail, and the educational materials category of fourth-class mail. Mailers using these classes who need information on the new rates should contact the local Post Office, Postmaster Duren said.

## County Voter Registration Is Picking Up

Mills County voter registration is picking up steam and the outlook is encouraging, according to announcement by H. G. Brooks, Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector.

Through December 29, 1,350 Mills County citizens had registered to vote in the forthcoming elections during 1968, according to Brooks.

This reflects a little over one-half of the percentage of those who need to get registered in order to vote.

Everyone must register under the new laws. Even those who formerly were exempt must register under the new regulations.

There is no charge or fee involved. The Poll Tax has been eliminated and the registration has taken its place.

Deadline for registering is January 31.

Any member of the immediate family may register other members of the family. Those who can not come to the tax assessor's office in person may call or write that office for voter registration application form.

The possible voting strength in Mills County is estimated to be approximately 2200.

### Sen. Word Named On Economy Committee

A Very Happy and Prosperous New Year To All!



AUSTIN, Tex. — Voter registration for the big 1968 election year is getting into full swing. Secretary of State John L. Hill already is busy sending out detailed instructions for county tax assessors.

As chief election officer, Hill discussed current problems with an advisory committee of tax officials (who are local registrars) and reviewed suggested ground rules.

He remains firm in his agreement with an attorney general's opinion that voters must bring or mail in their own registration applications or submit them through authorized members of their immediate family.

Bloc or bulk registrations are outlawed by an October 11 opinion. It brought critical comment from former State Sen. Franklin Spears, head of a liberal-backed drive to register five million voters.

Hill encourages house-to-house registration drives and says there is no restriction on the manner or extent of distributing application forms. He is advising local registrars that:

- There is no limit on reproduction of sample registration forms by third parties or purchase of those ordered by official registrars.

- Solicitors may encourage individuals to register but must avoid inducing registration through false or misleading representation.

- Assistance to the applicant is all right (including filling out forms), but the voter must supply the necessary information himself and sign the form or place his mark on it.

- Drives may furnish envelopes and even stamps to voters, but the applicant or family members must mail the form.

- Local registrars should provide blank, sample forms to all who request them, but each registrar may fix his own policies as to furnishing forms in large quantities to solicitors.

Spears has called on registrars to ignore the attorney general's opinion, and accept applications delivered by third party solicitors in bulk, or a group of applications sent in the same envelope. Spears claims the opinion is the result of a "plot" to keep the registrations low.

### COURTS SPEAK

Texas Supreme Court heard Sun Oil Company arguments for the right to use fresh water from the Ogallala formation, for all well flooding purposes on their Hockley County lease. Lower courts have denied the Sun suit. A landowner and High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 contend that use of the water would dangerously deplete irrigation supplies.

Houston finance company seeks a ruling from the Austin district court as to its rights under the Texas Regulatory Loan Act to buy discounted home improvement notes from contractors. State Consumer Credit Commissioner Frank Miskell was named defendant.

Supreme Court knocked out contempt of court citations against three in a Denton County dispute over a 30-foot strip of land because the district judge failed to follow procedural rules limiting duration of temporary restraining orders.

State obtained a \$34,952 judgment against a Dallas man by consolidating five cases involving slant hole oilwell drilling in Gregg, Wood and Rusk counties. Court of Criminal Appeals

divided 3-2 in upholding a Harrison County death penalty murder conviction, with the majority finding the condemned man had adequate warning of his constitutional rights six days before he confessed to the crime.

### INJUNCTION ASKED

Texas Water Quality Board has asked Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin to seek an injunction to keep the Enchanted Oaks subdivision, just outside Houston, from making any more connections to new housing being constructed in the area until it complies with its permit.

A hearing revealed that the district had put in a temporary 19,000-gallon per day plant when its permit called for 60,000 gallons a day. Then it let contracts to build a 300,000-gallon per day plant without Board approval or a permit from the State Health Department.

Board wants construction on 18 new homes stopped along with the work on the unapproved treatment plant.

## Major Changes In Motor Vehicle Inspection Law

Some major changes in the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law have been announced which include a minimum fee of \$1.75 for each inspection.

New items to be inspected under the new regulations are:

1. Front Seat Belts — If seat belt anchorages are part of original equipment on the vehicle.
2. Steering Mechanisms will be checked on all vehicles:
  - A. Too much steering wheel lash — will reject
  - B. If steering wheel will not turn full right to left without jamming — will reject
  - C. If fluid in power steering is low — will reject
3. Wheels and rims will be inspected:
  - A. If wheel has defective or bent rim flanges, or missing bolts, nuts, lugs — will reject
  - B. If rims have defects and cracks that impair safe mounting and retention of tires — will reject

The above points in the new law are causing many questions by the motoring public, according to Harry Hutchison, Major, Commanding Region Area 6, Department of Public Safety, Waco, who advises vehicle owners to get their inspections early.
