Bids Invited For Blanket Creek Floodwater Retarding Structure

Invitation for bids to install floodwater Retarding Structure No. 1741 in Blanket Creek Watershed are being circulated. The bid opening for this job

will be in the State S. C. S. Office in Temple at 2 p. m., February 21, 1968. The structure is located on the R. G. "Dick" Jones ranch about 2 miles southeast of Democrat. Construction is due to begin within 20 days after award is made and is to be completed in a 249 calendar day period.

Construction and inspection of the floodwater retarding structure will be under the supervision of M. W. McNeese, Project Construction Engineer with the S. C. S. in Brownwood, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist. Following completion of the job by the S. C. S. the structure will be turned over to local sponsors, the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District and Mills County for operation and maintenance.

Principal bid items for the job include approximately 285,000 cubic yards of compacted earth fill material, one principal spillway installation involving about 300 feet of 36 inch spun concrete pipe, 5,300 lbs. of reinforced steel, 125 cubic yards of concrete, one 12 inch gate valve and one trash guard for the inlet. The dam and emergency spillway, involving about 12 acres will be top soiled and fenced with about 8,000 feet of net wire for protection of grass.

Mohair Council OK's Budget With Increase For Product Development

Encouraged by signs that mohair demand is picking up, the Mohair Council of America has approved a \$295,000 budget for the coming fiscal year and added \$25,000 to the current year's \$235,000 budget to allow extra work in product development. Meeting in Sonora, Council members re-elected Dolph Briscoe, Jr. of Uvalde, as president. They named a new vice president, Gail Dudley of Comanche, succeeding Al Dishman of Uvalde.

All candidates will have until next Monday, February 5, at midnight, to file with the Chairman of the Executive Committee for a place on the official ballot in the Democratic primary election.

No announcement has been made regarding a Republican Primary Election in Mills County this year.

The new budget strengthens Council promotion and product development.

Progress was reported in the development of potential new mohair products. Harold P. Faris, President of Prodesco, Inc., Perkasie, Pennsylvania, showed examples of mohair fabrics his firm has developed for the Council in such fields as floor coverings and draperies. In conjunction with DuPont, the firm also has developed a new blend which can be spun on existing equipment to produce a lustrous, lofty yarn for knit goods, blankets and apparel.

"These three things, when they're launched, can pretty well take care of your mohair problem," he said.

Some of the current year's budget in certain categories is not being used, so the \$25,000 increase for product development does not necessarily mean that much more money spent, said Pfluger. The coming year's budget will allow \$130,000 for promotion, publicity and advertising and \$115,000 for product development. This is more for both categories than in 1967-68. A \$40,000 item spent this year for a mohair use survey will not have to be repeated, allowing more for other work.

An extra \$2,400 was added to the current year's survey budget to allow extension of the survey to England, where a large percentage of Texas mohair has gone in recent years.

A three-man delegation is to leave for South Africa February 1 to study that nation's mohair marketing system, promotion and product development work on the Council's behalf. They are Al Dishman of Uvalde, Armer Earwood of Sonora and James L. Powell of Fort McKavett. They will be gone 26 days.

His wife, Joy, and three sons, Steven, James, and Guy, will move to Brownfield the end of February.

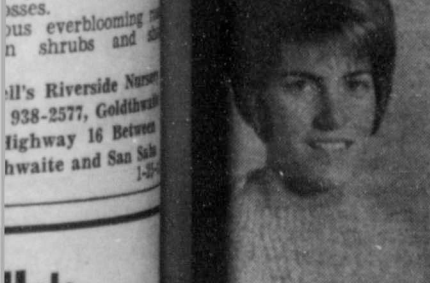

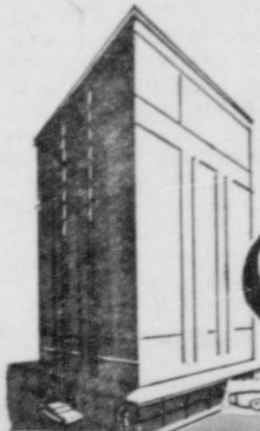

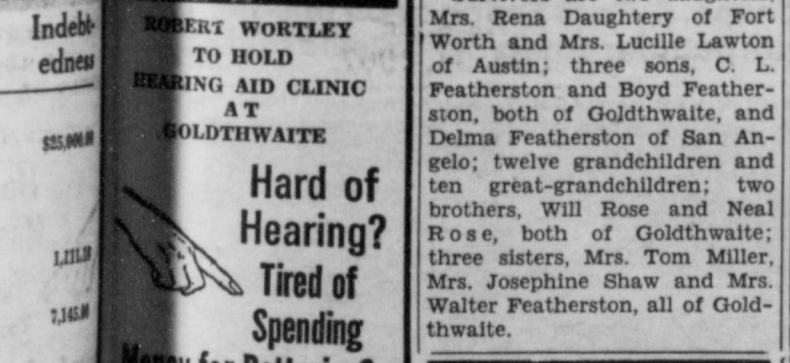
