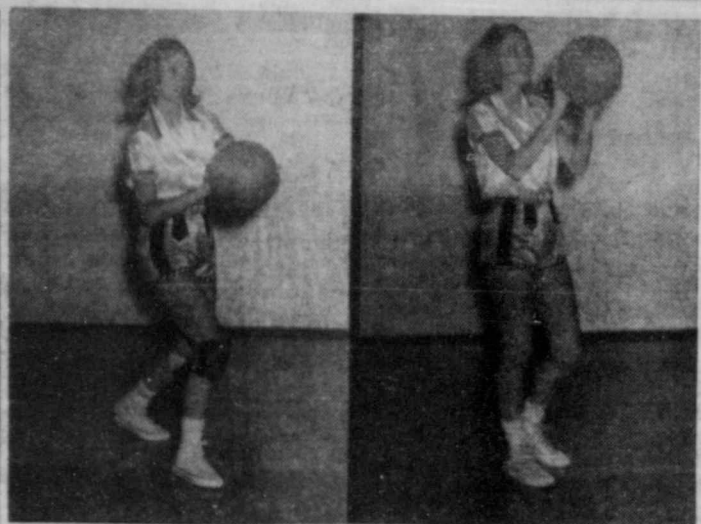

## Sale Of 1968 License Plates Moving Along

Sale of the new 1968 license plates for cars, trucks and trailers, is moving along a little ahead of the same period last year, according to announcement by H. G. Brooks, Mills County Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector.

Through Monday morning of this week 228 license had been issued while last year on the same date only 130 had been issued, according to Brooks.

Deadline for purchase of the new license plates without penalty is March 31. New tags must be on cars, trucks, and trailers by April 1.

## Over 2,600 Registered To Vote In County

Over 2,600 Mills County citizens are registered to vote in the forthcoming elections that are, or will be, scheduled for 1968, according to records of the Tax Collector here.

A check Wednesday morning revealed that the Tax Office has issued receipts and has applications on hand with receipts to be issued for a total of 2,671, Tax Assessor-Collector H. G. Brooks stated.

The office ran out of receipts and had to reorder. This has delayed receipts being issued and several hundred applications stacked up during the last few days of January.

Receipts for these applications are now being issued and final count will be completed and checked for duplication in registrations. Several duplications are expected to be found since some had registered earlier in the season and then signed voter registration application blank again later as the deadline approached.

These will be checked and verified as list of qualified voters is made up for the various boxes in the county, Brooks stated.

## 7.66 Inches Of Rain In January

Goldthwaite received an official 7.66 inches of rainfall during the month of January, according to measurement recorded by Harry Allen, weatherman.

This is the most rain received here in the month of January in many years, according to Mr. Allen and also others who have been keeping un-official records of precipitation in Mills County.

## Goldthwaite School Board Approves 25% Increase In Tax Evaluations

Goldthwaite School Board, meeting in regular session Monday night, February 5, approved a 25 per cent increase in tax evaluations in Goldthwaite Independent School District.

The straight across the board increase was approved by unanimous vote with six members of the board present and one absent.

Action on the matter was taken after nearly two years of discussion and consideration of the financial problems facing the district.

Some of the problems that are facing the trustees in operating the schools were outlined as follows:

Increased cost of all living expenses from every standpoint. Increases in salaries of all non-professional personnel and two increases in professional personnel salaries have made an increase in income for the school mandatory.

There has been an increasingly greater demand for the school to be as modern as possible while having little or no equipment and supplies.

Minimum requirements must be met as set forth by the State Legislature, the State School Board, the State Commissioner of Education through the Texas Education Agency. This agency supervises all phases of the school program in Texas.

There is a demand for one more members of the profes-

sion staff. The lunchrooms must have some help financially, the athletic program must be subsidized and equipment and supplies must be purchased in greater amounts.

With the increase in evaluations for local maintenance purposes it is possible that a decrease in the amount of money collected for bonds and interest may be effected, officials pointed out.

### OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the board approved schedule to turn out school on the first and third Monday at 3:00 p. m., for teachers meetings.

Trustee election was ordered for April 6 when three trustees will be elected.

Change in one bus route was approved.

The board approved pay increase for auxiliary employees to meet Federal Wage and Hour Regulations.

J. P. Ragsdale was employed as band director on part time basis for the remainder of the school year at a salary of \$250.00. He will replace Mrs. Anna Gene Moreland who has served in that capacity the past several years.

The board approved purchase of a new school bus and going on daylight saving time when it goes into effect. Coaches and principals were extended new contracts for one year at present salaries.

## Voters Will Decide Several Contests In Democratic Primary Election May 4

Mills County voters will have a part in deciding several contests that took form as the filing deadline passed last Monday

night at midnight, according to list of candidates as announced by Claudia Cookrum, chairman of the Democratic Executive

Committee.

Other than state-wide races there will be two candidates for State Representative and two candidates for District Attorney on the Mills County ballot.

For State Representative there will be J. E. Ward, of Glen Rose, incumbent, and Herman L. Stone, of Cleburne.

Stanley Kacir, Temple, incumbent, and George B. Dulany, Belton, will be in the race for district attorney.

On the county level two will be on the ballot for sheriff and tax assessor-collector. They are H. G. Brooks, incumbent, and R. E. "Bobby" Johnson.

There are two candidates for county commissioner, precinct one, Woodrow Long and Burchel B. Roberts. Incumbent Guy Rudd is not seeking re-election.

For county commissioner, precinct three, there are three candidates. They are W. R. Lindsey, incumbent, W. M. Hodges and W. D. "Dew" Shelton.

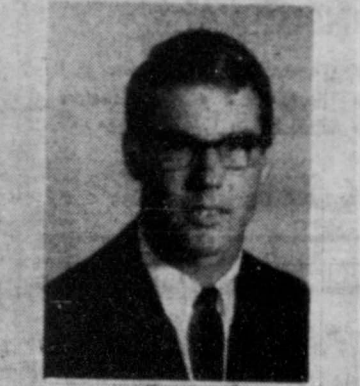

## Postage Rates Are Still One Of Best Bargains, Postmaster States

"It's still one of the best bargains in the world."

That's what Postmaster Norman Duren said today about the six-cent stamp, and he recounted some interesting facts and figures from postal history to back up his claim.

Even though the five-cent letter rate has suffered the same fate as the nickel cigar, first-class postage is cheaper today than it was in many bygone eras when a few pennies meant much more than they do today. Postmaster Duren said.

In 1816, for example, a single sheet letter cost six cents for delivery up to 30 miles. More sheets and more miles cost more money. A letter going 400 miles cost 25 cents per sheet.

In those days the recipient had to pay the postage, not the sender. And if the letter was actually delivered to the recipient, rather than picked up at the Post Office, there was an extra charge that was kept by the carrier.

It wasn't until 1855 that the sender was required to pay in advance for mail, Postmaster Duren said.

Uniform rates regardless of distance and free city delivery were written into the postal law books in 1863. When distance was dropped as a factor in computing rates, so was the practice of charging per sheet. The basic unit for letter postage became a half ounce in 1863. The basic unit of one ounce that still prevails today went into effect in 1885.

Turning to more recent history, Postmaster Duren pointed out that the 100 per cent increase — from 3 to 6 cents — in first class postal rates since 1932 compares very favorably with general increases in prices and wages.

General consumer prices have gone up about 200 per cent since 1932 and the average hourly earnings of manufacturing workers have risen by about 550 per cent. Postmaster Duren said.

"Back in 1947 the letter rate was still three cents and everyone agreed that was a really good deal. Since then the family income has gone up about 175 per cent while the cost of mailing a letter has increased 100 per cent. If letter postage was worth three cents in the 1940's, in terms of today's dollar it's worth more than six cents."

Postmaster Duren estimated that the increase in postal charges that went into effect January 7 will add only \$1.25 a year to the \$18 the average household spent on postal services under the old rates.

Despite the great distances many letters must travel in the United States our postal rates are lower than in most other major countries, particularly when based on ability to pay. Postmaster Duren declared. He said the average American worker earns the price of a six-cent stamp in 1.3 minutes. It takes the average British worker 2.5 minutes to earn letter postage, the West German worker 2.7 minutes and the French worker 3.5 minutes.

Postmaster Duren said the higher postal rates mean that a greater share of the cost of running the Postal Service will be borne by the users of the mails rather than the taxpayer.

"The cost of running the Postal Service must be paid," he explained. "What isn't paid by mail users in postage is paid from general tax revenues. The approximately \$900 million in additional revenue the new rates will bring in will shift that

**ARBOR DAY IN TEXAS**  
January 19 was Arbor Day in Texas. Gov. Connally urged our Garden Club, Civic Clubs, and public schools to do something about planting more trees in Texas. This summer we will have lots of visitors driving through our fair state. Make it even prettier by adding a little more green to your yard and town.

**4-H COLORS**  
Green and white combine to make the official 4-H colors. The white background of the 4-H flag symbolizes purity. The green 4-H emblem is nature's most common color in the great outdoors and is emblematic of springtime, life and youth.

**INCOMES ARE RISING**, but not as fast as living costs and prices march relentlessly upward. The U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that purchasing power has dropped since a year ago because living costs had risen more than incomes. For a city family of four, living costs have gone up more than 50 per cent since 1955, according to the Bureau. They also say that it takes \$9.19 to maintain a "moderate living standard for a well established family of four" in city areas of the United States as of last fall. This average included an income of \$9,628 in large metropolitan areas and \$5,368 in smaller cities. Two of the cheapest places to live in the United States, if you want to live in a city, are Austin and Houston, Texas — respectively. You may live moderately well there for \$8,828 and \$8,267. All southern cities are below average except Washington, D. C. Housing costs account for most of the differences.

Compare your expense pattern with the U. S. average for a city worker's family of four. Here are the averages: Housing 34.1 per cent; food 23.3 per cent; personal taxes 11.8 per cent; clothing and personal care 10.6 per cent; transportation 8.9 per cent; medical care 5.1 per cent; social security and disability payments 3.1 per cent; gifts and contributions 2.8 per cent; per-

sonal life insurance 1.7 per cent; occupational expenses .9 per cent; and other expenses 1.8 per cent.

**FEWER BUT LARGE FARMS**  
The number of farms in the U. S. continues to decline but their size is increasing. The USDA's Crop Reporting Board estimates there'll be 3,059,000 farms operating in the nation in 1968, down 3 per cent from the 1967 total. The average 1968 farm, at 368 acres, will be 2.5 per cent larger than in 1967 and 28 per cent larger than the average farm in 1958. Texas with 195,000 farms leads the nation in farm numbers.

**Feel worthless?** Currently, chemicals in the human body are estimated at a value of \$300. This value, once estimated at 98 cents, has risen because of the demand for nucleic acids and enzymes.

Austin, Texas—Democrats will have at least a five-ring circus in the upcoming primary race for governor. In fact, there's a good chance that as many as eight candidates will toss their hats in the ring by the February 5 filing deadline.

It will be a free-for-all, with the two best-known Democratic leaders, Gov. John Connally and Sen. Ralph Yarborough, standing on the sideline. For the first time since 1956 the incumbent governor will not be running for re-election.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, happy that his prediction that Connally and Yarborough would stand aside, continued his steady campaigning for governor or as, one by one, other candidates got into the race.

Gordon B. McLendon, Dallas radioman, and Pat O'Daniel of Dallas, son of former Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel, were the first to follow Smith in the filing.

Then came former Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

Secretary of State John L. Hill of Houston lined up at the post Monday for a running start to become No. 5.

Den Yarborough of Houston, who ran against Connally in 1962 and 1964, was in chute No. 6.

In chutes Nos. 7 and 8 were two Texans who have been serving as ambassadors. These are Eugene Locke of Dallas, who has been in South Vietnam, and Ed Clark of Austin and San Augustine, who has been in Australia.

Decisions by Sen. John Tower and U. S. Rep. George Bush of Houston to stay out of the Republican primary for governor leaves that race open for the moment. Albert Fay of Houston is mentioned most among the GOP as their standard bearer against the winner of the Democratic denny-brook.

**JUNIOR COLLEGES TO "OPEN DOORS"**  
Junior college admission for anybody who wants to "succeed or fail on his own effort" is part of the policy of the public junior college master plan adopted by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

Senior colleges and universities are getting more and more selective, and the Board felt there must be a place for the "late bloomer" — the student who demonstrates academic ability later than most, as well as the person whose employment ambitions require only two years of college, and the post-college age people who need continuing education.

There are 39 public junior college campuses in the state now, and the Board's plan envisions 73 within 20 years, with total enrollment of 305,000. Junior college enrollment is increasing at the average rate of 20 per cent a year, compared to a 10 per cent average increase for four-year schools.

### IRS Provides Questions-Answers Regarding Federal Tax Matters

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the office of the Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

job, will they lose their exemption for me?

A—No, your parents will not lose you as an exemption, provided the necessary dependency tests are met.

Q—Are there any changes in the tax law I should be aware of when I file my 1967 income tax return?

Q—Are gifts ever taxed?

A—There is no federal tax to pay for the recipient but the giver may have to pay a tax if the gift is sizable. The law generally requires a tax return to be filed by the donor when a gift or gifts to any one person during the year exceed \$3,000. However, income earned on gifts is taxable to the recipient.

A—The filing requirements for 1967 returns are little changed from what they were a year ago. Perhaps the major change concerns the handling of medical deductions.

Q—I sold my house just a month or so before my 65th birthday. Does this mean I won't be entitled to the special benefits for the elderly on those sales?

All taxpayers itemizing medical deductions on 1967 returns will be subject to the same 3 per cent and 1 per cent income limitations. Previously, taxpayers 65 years of age and over could deduct all of their allowable medical expenses, not just those in excess of 3 per cent of their adjusted gross income.

Q—Do you have to report as income insurance compensation for injuries received in an auto accident?

A—No, damages for injuries suffered in an accident are tax free.

Another change in the medical deduction area concerns premiums paid for medical insurance. On 1967 returns, one-half of the premiums paid for this insurance may be deducted without regard to the 3 per cent limitation. The maximum that may be deducted under this provision is \$150. The balance of the premiums paid should be added to the taxpayers' other medical expenses subject to the 3 per cent rule.

Q—Who has to file a tax return?

A—A return must be filed by every person under 65 who has gross income of \$600 or more during the year. For those 65 and over, a return does not have to be filed until gross income reaches \$1,200. However, if you are self-employed, you must file a return if you had net self-employment income of \$400 or more, even though your gross income was less than \$600.

Insurance premiums paid for supplementary benefits under "Medicare" are covered by this provision but not that portion of the Social Security tax withheld from wages for Medicare.

The filing requirements also apply to minors. If, for example, a child has income of \$600 or more from a savings account or any other sources, then a return must be filed on behalf of that child.

Changes in the medical expense area are explained on page 7 of the 1040 instructions. To avoid errors that could lead to underpay or overpay your taxes read the instructions before you file.

Q—Where can I get 1967 tax forms?

A—Most taxpayers should receive their income tax forms in the mail early in January. Additional copies of the forms will be available in post offices, local IRS offices and many banks.

Q—I inherited some stock from my grandfather's estate and later sold it. Do I have to report anything on my tax return?

Q—Yes, You will have a capital gain or loss measured by the difference between the sale proceeds and the fair market value of the stock at the date of your grandfather's death. The transaction should be reported on Schedule D and attached to your Form 1040.

Q—I was married last month, since my name has changed do I have to change my Social Security number?

A—When your name is changed, you should notify your local office of the Social Security Administration office as soon as possible. Your number will not be changed but your record will be corrected to reflect your married name.

Q—I'm a full time college student and my parents claim my exemption on their tax return. If I file for a refund of taxes withheld on a summer

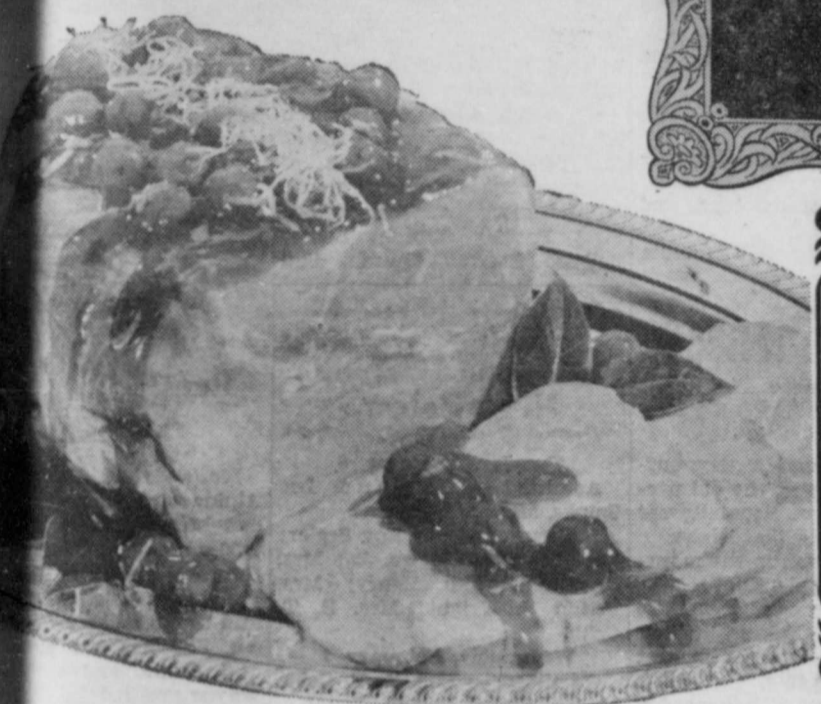

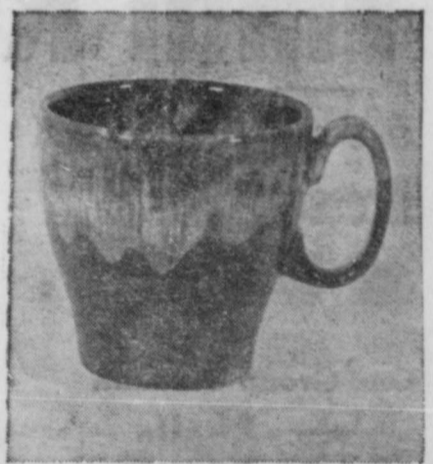

He explained that vocational rehabilitation is the process which prepares physically, mentally, or socially handicapped individuals to enter or return to employment and independence.

Representatives from the Mills County committee attended a regional meeting in Waco on February 9th to present their recommendations and decide priorities of the various recommendations. Field work in the 20 planning regions will culminate in a final state report to be presented to Governor Connally in July of 1968.
