Garden Club Park Committee Issues Progress Report On Park

The Goldthwaite Garden Club Committee this week issued a progress report on their plan of improving and beautifying Mills County Park.

March is "Beautify Texas" month, so designated by Governor John Connally. Everyone is to roll out the Red Carpet—Texas is coming to Texas in 1968. This year will bring world-famous travelers to HemisFair in San Antonio, Lions International Convention in Dallas, and the Olympics in Mexico. This will bring many people to Texas.

The Garden Clubs everywhere have pledged themselves to beautify Texas. They have plans to plant red crepe myrtles along the highways so the traveler can enjoy them.

The Goldthwaite club has planted fifty in the park where they can be seen from both highways leading to San Antonio, by way of San Saba and Comal. The Garden Club bought the plants and the City employees dug the ditch with machinery and planted and

watered them. Old willow trees in the park are dying out fast, so the Garden Club Committee planted fourteen shade trees, at a cost of twenty-eight dollars. The Lions Club, W. P. Duren, Mills County State Bank, and the Garden Club donated the trees, and the City employees with their equipment took out the fallen willow trees and planted Green Ash trees which prefer the same soil that willow trees flourish in.

The 125 Japanese Ligustrum shrubs that were planted along the west fence of the park are all living. Also the screen of Ligustrum shrubs between the swimming pool and the outdoor theater are all growing nicely.

The committee appreciates donations of plants, rocks and labor to make the park more beautiful. Mrs. Jim Weatherby gave twenty-four Ligustrums; Mrs. P. L. Hancock also gave twenty-four Ligustrums; Miss Normalee Robertson gave four plants; Mrs. C. W. Holden gave several cactus and several pretty rocks; Mrs. Charlene Benningfield gave a lot of rocks and hauled them to the park. Mrs. Tillie Ligon gave small rocks from seven states which she had gathered while traveling. Many other people have brought rocks and cactus, and the committee appreciates all the help.

City Buys New Street Sweeper; To Be Delivered Within 30 Days

The City of Goldthwaite, on action taken by the City Council meeting in regular session Monday night, has purchased a new street sweeper.

Purchase of a street sweeper was approved by the council after bids were opened and the proposals from four companies were given thorough consideration and discussion.

The new Wayne Sweeper was purchased from Browning-Perkins Machinery Company, of Dallas, and delivery is promised within 30 days, according to the company representative who met with the council. Cost of the fully equipped machine is \$10,689.00.

Bids submitted by the other three companies ranged from

\$10,482.00 to \$11,756.00.

Purchase of a street sweeper by the city has been discussed and been under consideration for some time by members of the city council. The need has been there and committee had been investigating the matter for some time. When the council decided at the February meeting to advertise for bids on a sweeper it was received by the business community of the city as a move in the right direction. Citizens will welcome this new and additional service.

NEW TRAFFIC SIGNAL LIGHT

The council also voted to purchase a new traffic signal light to be installed at Fourth and Fisher Street, to replace the old and worn out signal light.

Purchase price of the new modern signal light is \$1,035.00, construction of the steel poles for the system will cost \$235.00, and the city will take care of installation and necessary electrical supplies needed.

This is another matter that has been under study and consideration for some time.

The new lights will do away with the three old poles and the guy wire hookup system that has existed on this busy intersection. It was pointed out by city officials. The system will be installed with lights from corner poles and will be taken out of the center of the intersection. Signals will have 18 feet clearance from the ground.

New signal lights will be installed on three corners, Southeast, Northeast and Northwest, of the intersection. Signals will be mounted on steel poles on a horizontal basis. There will be seven sets of lights for easy viewing from all directions.

In other business the council heard monthly operating reports from City Manager W. C. Barnett of receipts and disbursements for the various departments for the month of February.

The Council voted for the electric department to pay \$15,000.00 to the City General and Street Fund in lieu of taxes for a two year period.

A report from the Library Board regarding improvements and expansion of the Library Building was presented to the Council by Barnett. The council instructed the city manager to contact an architect to get an estimate of cost and some information on a preliminary drawing of proposed changes.

ELECTRIC SIGN

Council members talked some about the proposed new electric sign that is to be installed at the City Hall corner. Size and estimated cost were discussed and the matter was tabled until the next meeting. In the meantime the proposal will be given some further study regarding size and other details.

J. A. Jones Kills Big Timber Wolf Near Ridge Saturday

Mrs. Leach Featured In News Article In Brownfield Herald

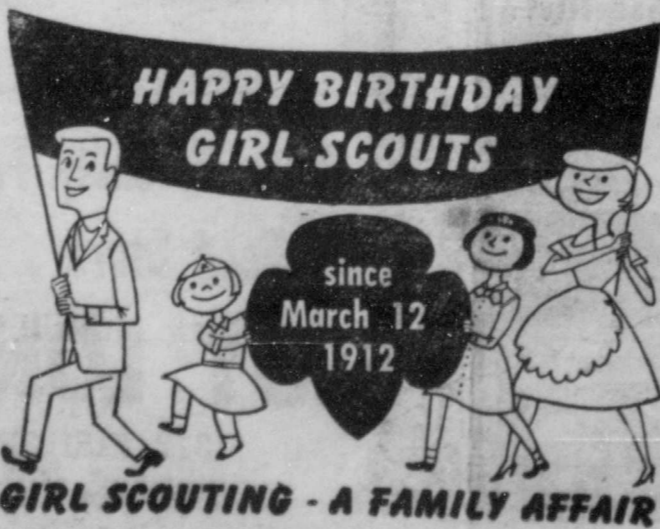
Mrs. Scottie Leach, a first grade teacher at Wheatley School, was featured in a news story in the Brownfield News Herald recently.
