Construction Starts This Week New Home For Harper Implement

Construction got underway on a new home for the Harper Implement Company of Goldthwaite, the John Deere dealer for Mills County and surrounding area.

The new building will be 60 feet wide by 100 feet long. It will be of steel construction with concrete floor throughout.

Some display and counter. There will be private offices, sales office and store room. Tentative plans call for the building to be light green color with white trim.

Site for the new location for the company was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Wernette and Mrs. O. L. Woody, according to Harper. The lot is 230 feet wide at the north end of the triangular plot and runs to a point 810 feet to the south. It is situated with highway 84 on the west and the old Priddy highway at the east, or back of the lot.

The building will run east and west, facing south, with entrances to the building on the south, east and north. There will be five large machine doors for entering the building with heavy machinery.

Plans call for the entire area to be fenced with about one and one-half acres devoted to parking and machinery display.

Harper Implement Company has been located at Fisher and Sixth Street in downtown Goldthwaite since 1953. A new building was constructed at that time when the firm moved from the former location on West Front Street. The firm has outgrown the present location and has been in need of additional space for some time.

J. D. Harper has associated with him in the business his brother Tommy. They also own Quality Implement Company, John Deere dealership, of Munday, Texas, which is operated by Tommy.

They started in the John Deere business in Goldthwaite in 1949.

Construction contracts for the new building were signed last week. Texas Steel Building Company, Waco, has the contract for the building and Truett Aldridge, Goldthwaite, has the contract for concrete work and building interior.

City Election Returns Certified; New Officials Take Office Monday

Members of the city council meeting in regular session Monday night in the city hall certified election returns and closed out the old year and elected officials took office for the new year.

Hollis Wiggins, E. R. Bruce and Lester Geeslin were sworn in and took their place as city aldermen after election returns were canvassed and certified.

Official returns listed election results as follows: Geeslin 38, Bruce 39 and Wiggins 39. Forty-two votes were cast in the election. Bruce was re-elected for a new term. Aldermen who retired this year were V. A. Hudson and Dr. C. S. Crum.

Before the new officials took over their duties the council heard monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the month of March for the various departments. City Manager W. C. Barnett also presented quarterly treasurer's report.

Members of the council were paid for the past year.

Mr. Barnett also reported on work that has been done during the past month and work projects that are now underway and others to be undertaken.

The Council received a request for new franchise for General Telephone Company of the Southwest. This was tabled until the next meeting.

A request from RV's Cafe for electric service by the City Utilities was read to the council. This was taken under advisement and will be given further consideration.

The council voted for the city to take part in financing construction of rest room facilities at Mills County Park. They approved \$500.00 for the project after being informed that the County Commissioners' Court had approved \$500.00 for the job and that Mills County State Bank would take care of the balance of the cost of the improvement.

Details for construction of the rest rooms and location at the park are to be worked out by a committee composed of: Hollis Wiggins, E. R. Bruce, and City Manager W. C. Barnett.

The Council voted to have the annual dinner for city employees and their families, along with retiring city officials, on Monday night, April 29. Alderman Wesson, City Secretary Glynn Collier, and City Manager Barnett were named to a committee to work out details.

New Building Announced For Moreland Hardware

Plans to construct new building to house Moreland Hardware & Appliance was announced this week by Allen Moreland, owner and operator of the store for the past five years.

The new home for the store will be built on a lot just south of the Dairy Cup property at the South Y on highway 16, according to Moreland. He also owns the Dairy Cup property.

Contract was signed last week for construction of a steel and concrete building with glass front, 40 feet wide and 55 feet deep. It will face highway 16 and will have all new fixtures and service department with loading dock.

Leveling ground work got underway last week by F. S. Jernigan, dirt contractor. Waco Steel Building Company will do the building while Truett Aldridge has the contract for the concrete work, electrical and building interior.

Plans call for the building to be completed in time for the move to the new location around June 1. Moreland stated.

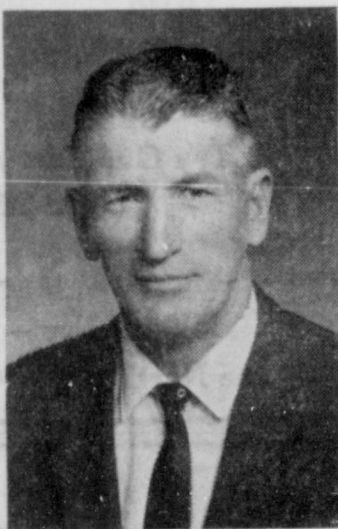

Some new lights have been installed in the library for more adequate lighting.

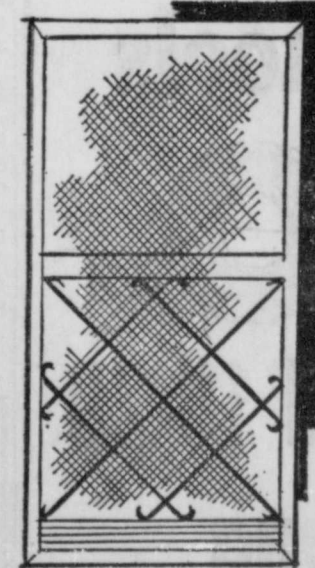

Calibration Of Equipment Stressed By CA

What does calibration of equipment mean to a good farmer or manager, asks County Agent George G. Reese? His answer—more money in his pocket and the reputation of being a better manager.

Calibration of equipment means knowing, for example, that a fertilizer distributor will spread 1,800 pounds to the acre and not 1,000 pounds or 2,500 pounds.

The calibration of sprayers is more critical than the calibration of other equipment and the results can be disastrous.

Under-planting or sowing means that you are losing a definite percentage of your soil's production capacity. How long would you keep a low production cow or a tractor that was running on 3 cylinders instead of 4? Over-planting or sowing means a waste of expensive seed and too much competition between plants.

Why not do something about the calibration of your planters, grain drills, fertilizer distributors, and chemical applicators? Operators manuals for the machines usually contain calibration instructions.

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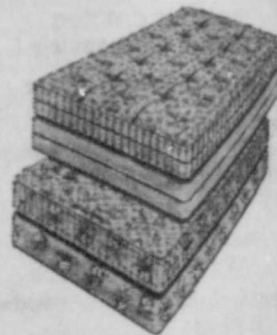

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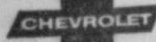

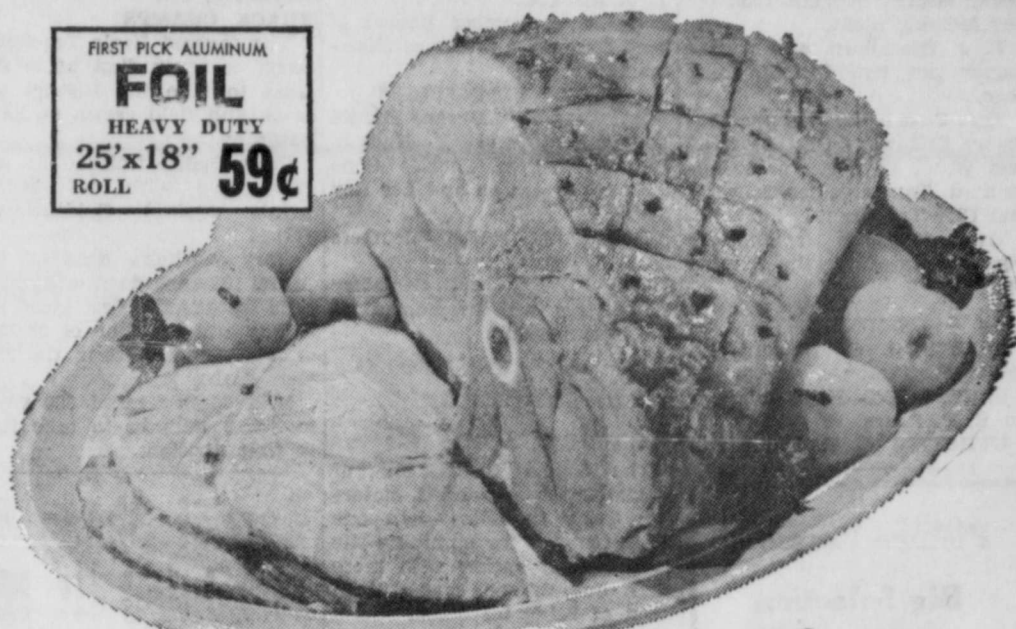

Mills County Has First 1968 Auto Fatality

The first auto fatality of 1968 in Mills County was reported Tuesday by Sheriff H. G. Brooks and highway patrolman Charlie Hodges.

John Bert Langford, 34, of Adamsville, died in the local hospital at 12:40 a. m. Tuesday after being in a one car smash-up about two miles east of Goldthwaite on U. S. Highway 84, about 11 p. m. Monday.

Sheriff Brooks, the first officer on the scene, reported that the man hit the bridge abutment on the right side of the road headon. He was the lone occupant of the car. Officers reported that the man is survived by his wife and three children.

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Candidate Herman L. Stone Speaks About Today's Educational Needs

"It has been suggested that I deal in so-called political double-talk," said Herman L. Stone, a Democratic candidate for a seat in the Texas Legislature.

"I've been told that I should talk a lot, and that when I get through I should not have said anything that could be construed as a campaign promise.

"But I don't believe in that political theory," he continued. "I consider myself an independent thinker interested only in serving to constantly improve the economic, educational, law enforcement and future growth of the 54th Legislative District.

"That's why I feel compelled to speak loud and clear to the people of Bosque, Hamilton, Johnson, Mills and Somervell Counties. I don't want a misunderstanding as to what I stand for, what I believe in, and what I will strive to accomplish as your next State Representative," the Route 1, Cleburne, candidate said.

"Among those subjects high on my list of things to do is to help improve our educational program. I've learned a lot since I made my decision to enter the race for State Representative. I went to Austin to confer with the senior people of our State educational system."

Stone said "I was informed that about 15 per cent of our high school graduates enter college. That's fine, and I wish them every success. But they really don't concern me as I know they'll make it—they'll emerge from college as well-educated, well-oriented men and women who are mentally and socially prepared to meet the problems of the world.

"My prime concern is the 85 per cent who, for one reason or another, are unable to enter college. I'm confident that most of them would like to enroll in college, but can't because of the high cost of tuition, books, living and other expenses."

The long-time Arlington General Motors plant employee said "The lack of a well-grounded education in this day and age spells almost certain doom for the youngsters entering the world from the high school classroom. Actually, they aren't truly qualified to do any specific job other than manual labor. They lack marketable skills. Their knowledge of careers available to them is limited.

Most of them don't know where to go to train for jobs of their choice. They don't know how long it'll take to acquire the skills necessary for them to qualify for a well-paying job.

"I learned in Austin," Stone said, "that the state educators agree with my philosophy. They are slowly getting into technical and vocational training. But the high schools must request it on a voluntary basis.

"I firmly believe that a comprehensive technical training should be included as a part of the scholastic requirements for a high school diploma. I believe the high school student should be equipped to do more than enter today's chaotic world with nothing but a diploma to show for his high school efforts. He should be trained to do something that will make him eligible for immediate and satisfactory employment upon graduation.

"As it now stands," Stone continued, "the high school program is aimed at preparing students for college—not life. Most of the 85 per cent of high school graduates who are unable to enter college would like to go there. Others, however, are not interested in furthering their education."

The World War II Pacific combat veteran said "There are too many strikes against the high school graduate whose family is in the lower income bracket. Normally, he can't hope to get a well-paying job until he has worked at something or other in preparation for a better job. This usually takes a long time.

"When they are given the opportunity, I believe we have then made it possible for them to be better citizens for a better future.

"We are building an entire new world. It's highly technical and scientific. But we have failed to keep pace with the training and development of our future citizens. I suggest that this is an area which demands immediate and positive legislative action."

"In conclusion," Stone said "this is but one of the many accomplishments I hope to achieve as your next State Representative."
