Change In Time Schedule Begins Today Morning

There may be a little confusion this Sunday morning as people get up to go to work as usual—unless they remember to move their watches ahead one hour for the new saving time.

The new schedule will go into effect at 2 a. m. Sunday, April 28.

There is a choice of moving the clock up Saturday night or on Sunday morning. People can get to church or school an hour late.

There is a blessing to be had with the time change. Everyone will have an additional hour of daylight after getting up in the afternoon. That means more time for fishing, moonlighting on an-nyoung job to help make ends meet, and the family budget, loafing, and there is always YARD work.

Summer you will have an hour of daylight because the clock is set ahead. If you work at 5 p. m., for example, your clock will say 5, but the sun time will be 4.

It comes out even next week, when we will go back to standard time at 2 a. m. and bring our clocks back to 1 a. m.

Record High Recorded Here In Bank Deposits

A new record high in deposits at the Mills County State Bank was announced here this week by W. P. Duren, president, as they prepared financial statement in answer to a bank call as of April 18.

Deposits gained nearly one million dollars at the local bank during the past year, the report shows. Condensed statement of condition appears in this issue of the paper.

Deposits as of April 18 were \$8,441,381.35 while at the corresponding call in 1967, on April 25, deposits were \$7,467,890.40.

Loans and discounts are also up from \$4,280,916.99 last year to \$4,507,797.53 this year.

Total resources increased from \$8,263,405.35 in April 1967 to \$9,279,148.62 on April 18, this year. This reflects an increase of more than one million dollars.

County Baptists Have Two Pastors, One Layman, In California Crusade

Mills County Baptist Association will have two of its pastors and one layman in the Encounter California Crusade.

Rev. Dale Gore, pastor of First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite, and Floyd Spradley, a layman from the same church, will be going to the First Southern Baptist Church, Watsonville, California. Rev. Gore will be the evangelist and Spradley will lead the singing.

Rev. Don Long, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Mullin, will be with the First Southern Baptist Church, Santa Susana, California.

Encounter California is an effort by the Southern Baptist Churches of California to confront a state of 20 million people with the Gospel of the Crucified and risen Saviour, Jesus Christ. Only 33% of the population is affiliated with any local religious group, according to association officials.

The Southern Baptist General Convention of California was organized in 1940 with messengers from 13 Churches with a total membership of less than one thousand. In 1967 there were 1,015 Churches and missions

with a total membership of 222,000.

Encounter-California is a six month program that will conclude with Area Crusades from April 21-26, followed by local Church revivals in some 800 to 1,000 Churches, from April 28-May 5th.

Many Texas Baptist Churches are sending their pastors to California to preach in these revivals. Goldthwaite and Mullin are two among these that are sharing their pastors with these churches in California. California has also asked that Christian laymen come and help with the music and visitation programs, and Spradley has answered that call.

The three men will leave from Brownwood airport this Friday morning, April 26, and arrive back home on May 6.

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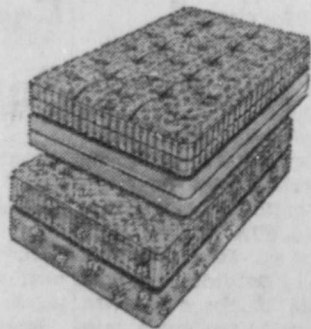


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Constance Anne Pope Becomes Bride Of Corry B. McSpadden III
