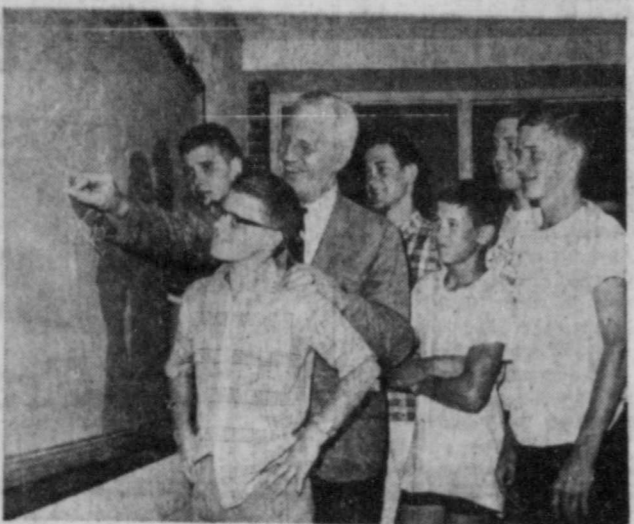

Seriousness Of Screwworm Situation Increasing With Weather Conditions

Livestock producers should be aware of the seriousness of the screwworm situation. The weather continues to be ideal for possible outbreaks of screwworms.

During the two-week period of June 2 through June 15, 227 more screwworm cases were confirmed in the southwestern United States, as near-ideal weather conditions continued for even more case outbreaks. The U. S. total is now 524 cases, compared to only 60 cases at the end of June, 1967.

Council Hears Annual Reports; Approves Budget For New Year

15 More Boosters Are Needed To Reach Park Maintenance Fund Goal

Another 15 boosters for Mills County Park Maintenance Fund honor roll are needed to reach the goal of 100 for 1968, it was announced Tuesday by W. P. Duren, chairman of the park committee.

When the plan was first adopted it called for enlisting 100 persons to give \$12.00, or more, to the park maintenance fund each year to take care of the job. This amounts to only \$1.00 per month for each contributor.

In the past several years a number have given more than the suggested \$12. This has been a big help to the committee in reaching the goal without personal solicitation campaign.

This week's appeal serves to remind those who have overlooked it, and others interested in the park, to get their checks turned in this week.

The park fund honor roll of boosters will be brought up to date in the next few days and list of all who have supported the project for 1968 will be published in the Eagle.

Checks should be made out to the Park Fund and turned in at Mills County State Bank or to any members of the park committee. Members of the committee are: W. P. Duren, Charles Conrad, Lee Roy Stacy, Lewis T. Hudson, Harold Yarborough, Houston Duren and Ed Thornton.

Farm Bureau Queen Contest, Talent Find And Discussion Meet Is July 27

Mills County Farm Bureau will hold its annual Queen Contest, Talent Find, and Discussion Meet July 27, at 8:00 p. m., in the High School Auditorium in Goldthwaite.

Contestants for the Queen Contest must be at least sixteen and not over twenty-two years of age by September 1, 1968, and must be a daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member.

Participants in the Talent Find must be between the ages of seventeen and thirty as of December 1, 1968, and a member of a Farm Bureau family and must be amateurs.

The purpose of the Discussion Meet is to provide an opportunity for greater participation of the part of the young and active farmers and to help them to develop a greater command of basic discussion skills. They will acquire a better understanding of how people can think in groups and help in solution to their problems.

Participants in the Discussion meet must be between the ages of seventeen and thirty and a member of a Farm Bureau family.

Entries in either of the contests should be in the County Farm Bureau Office by July 23.

Winners of each of the three contests will go to the District Meet to be held August 16, at Brady.
