Feed Bills Cut, Profits Increased With Progressive Conservation Plan

Bobby Baird, a Mills County rancher, has reported that over the last five years he has been able to reduce his feed and drenching cost \$3,000.00. The labor used to distribute this feed was not considered in the cost.

Baird has been working with the Soil Conservation Service in Goldthwaite since 1952. He has a progressive conservation plan by which he does a little each year toward improving his ranch. Baird balances his livestock number and grazing plan with the amount of available forage he has on hand. Bobby has always been concerned about his grass and because of this his range has been improving each year.

During the drought of the mid 50's Baird fed a lot to get his livestock in good shape. After the drought broke he continued to feed to keep his livestock in good shape but each

year as his grass improved his feed bill decreased. Since 1963 Bobby's feed bill and drench cost have been reduced by \$3,000.00.

He was running 1,000 goats, 20 cows, 150 sheep and buying 16 tons of cake plus other feed at a cost of \$2,700.00, plus 1,000 bales of hay at about \$800.00.

Baird said, "I was drenching 3 to 4 times a year, and that was an average." Drenching costs were \$280.00 a year. These costs come to a total of \$3,700.00.

In 1967 the stocking rate had been altered to 300 goats, 30 cows, 150 sheep. Amount and cost of feed were decreased to 400 pounds of cake plus other feed at a cost of \$700.00 plus 100 bales of hay costing \$60.00. Drenching is now just once a year at a cost of \$20.00. Total feed and drench cost \$780.00 which represents a saving of \$3,000.00.

The 1,000 goats at present market value represented \$4,200.00 in mohair, the 300 goats represent \$1,260. in mohair sale.

Although this reflects a loss of \$2,940 in mohair sales there is an increased net profit of \$60.00 because of the \$3,000.00 savings on the feed bill, this does not include the profit on the 10 extra cows.

Baird continues to improve his ranch each year. He is presently controlling shinoak by shredding and chemical spray. He tried to control the brush by goating but felt they were damaging his grass cover so Bobby is using the chemical.

He believes the most important thing you can do to control shinoak resprouts is to manage your grass. "A good grass cover is strong competition for shinoak resprouts," says Bobby.

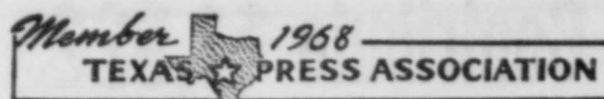
