Johnny Miller scored once more on a 60-yard punt return, and Andy Cook put on the finishing touches with a swing around left end and a 30-yard TD.

Sutherland, Reid and Cook accounted for the extra points.

Next Tuesday night at 7:30 o'clock, the Jr. High Eagles will play Bangs there. Coach Davis feels that this will be their toughest game of the season, and urges everyone to go see his team in action.

## Eagles Hold AA Cisco To 15-12; Travel To Burnet This Friday Night

Coach Leslie Johnson's Eagles turned on the steam and gave the Cisco Lobos a real tussle here Friday night, in a non-district battle from which the AA Lobos emerged the winners by a scant three-point margin, 15-12.

A hard-fought first half netted nothing for either team, as far as scoring was concerned. Eagles Mike Wright and Kennon McLean each intercepted a Lobo pass, and QB Byron Harper connected with Wright and Ted Roberts on two pass plays, to contribute some excitement to first-half play. The Eagles also made one fourth down field goal attempt in the first half, however it was blocked, and the Lobos took possession.

The Eagles kicked to their opponents at the start of the last half, and two first and tens soon put the Lobos on the Eagle 20-yard line. On a third down Sam Fletcher (20) plunged over from four yards out, for the first score of the game, Randy Honea's PAT was good putting Cisco ahead 7-0.

After the ensuing kick-off, the Eagles took the ball in their own end zone, and Harper made a pass good to Jeff Stewart for a nine-yard gain and a first down. Then on the Eagles' fourth down punt, Mike Covington was on the job and recovered a Lobo fumble, to put the Eagles within twenty yards of paydirt. Stewart again made a good catch when Harper hit him in the end zone from 37 yards out for Goldthwaite's first score. The PAT attempt by Richard Scott was blocked leaving the Eagles just one point

behind 7-6, at the end of the third period.

The Eagles held back the opposing line and forced them to punt on a fourth down, taking it on their own 45. Then QB Harper pulled a surprising sneak handoff to Mike Wright who powered his way through the Cisco line and sprinted 55 yards to give the Eagles another tally. Harper's pass to Eric Wright for extra points was good, but the Lobos pulled him down just short of the line, to put the Eagles ahead 12-7.

Things were looking good for the Eagles, until Lobo John Morris (61) came in and batted down Ted Roberts' punt, and recovered it, to put the Lobos on the Eagle 10. James Wheat (22) made a one-yard plunge to score again, and Sam Fletcher ran over for the two-point conversion. This lucky break put the Lobos in the winners' circle, 15-12.

In commenting on the game, Johnson made this statement, "It was a good game and our boys put out some good hard effort. We made one or two major mistakes which made the key difference, but what remains is to iron out a few problems. We had a good kicking game, and good punt coverage." Johnson further stated that Eagles Jeff Stewart and Mike Wright did terrific jobs on offense, and that Paul Kirkpatrick and Leland Knight put in tremendously outstanding work on defense. Other outstanding defensive players were Sam Watson, Eric Wright and Kennon McLean.

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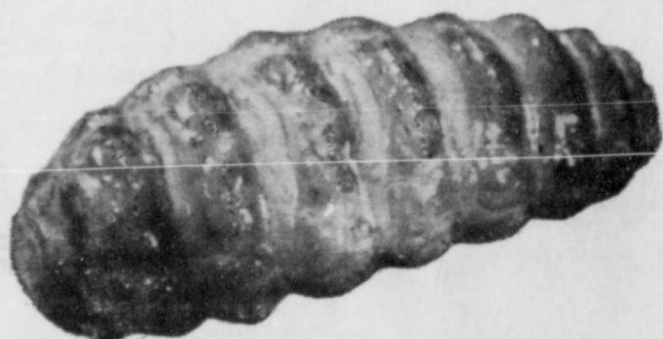

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## COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

OCTOBER 6-12 IS NATIONAL 4-H WEEK

It has been so designated by Governor John Connally and also proclaimed by President Johnson. Because of this special observance I would like to recognize the 4-H members of Mills County for their good work in this program.

There are four 4-H clubs in Mills County with an overall enrollment of 109 members. These young people are making a special effort to make their lives better through learning by doing. That is the purpose of 4-H. It has been discovered through the ages that people really don't learn much about anything unless they get involved with it. In other words you learn more by doing. Learn to be better citizens, better homemakers, better business people.

It is never too early to start learning by doing. The 4-H program allows that when a child is nine years old they are ready to take on a responsible project. It is at this age that membership in 4-H can begin. Nearly 100% of our 4-H members carried projects this past year. Some carried as many as four projects. Many competed at the

county level in awards programs. Eight competed at the District level, and two went on for judging at the State level. We are proud that they put forth effort to be recognized for their projects. It is really hard work, but they learn a great deal from it.

Governor Connally, in his greetings, has these words to say about 4-H.

"The development of responsible citizens and leaders for America is the high purpose of 4-H Club work. The 4-H program stresses the four-fold development of youth: their head, heart, hands and health. Members of 4-H Clubs learn by conducting projects and participating in 4-H activities. By putting into action what they learn, club members improve their homes and communities. Since the program was inaugurated by the United States government in 1914, the movement has spread across our nation and to 76 foreign countries. More than 18,000 voluntary adult leaders work with club members in Texas and contribute to the success of 4-H. Parents and friends of 4-H give support and encouragement to club members. The 4-H Club program is directed by the staff of the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University."

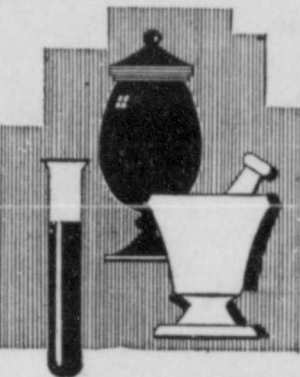

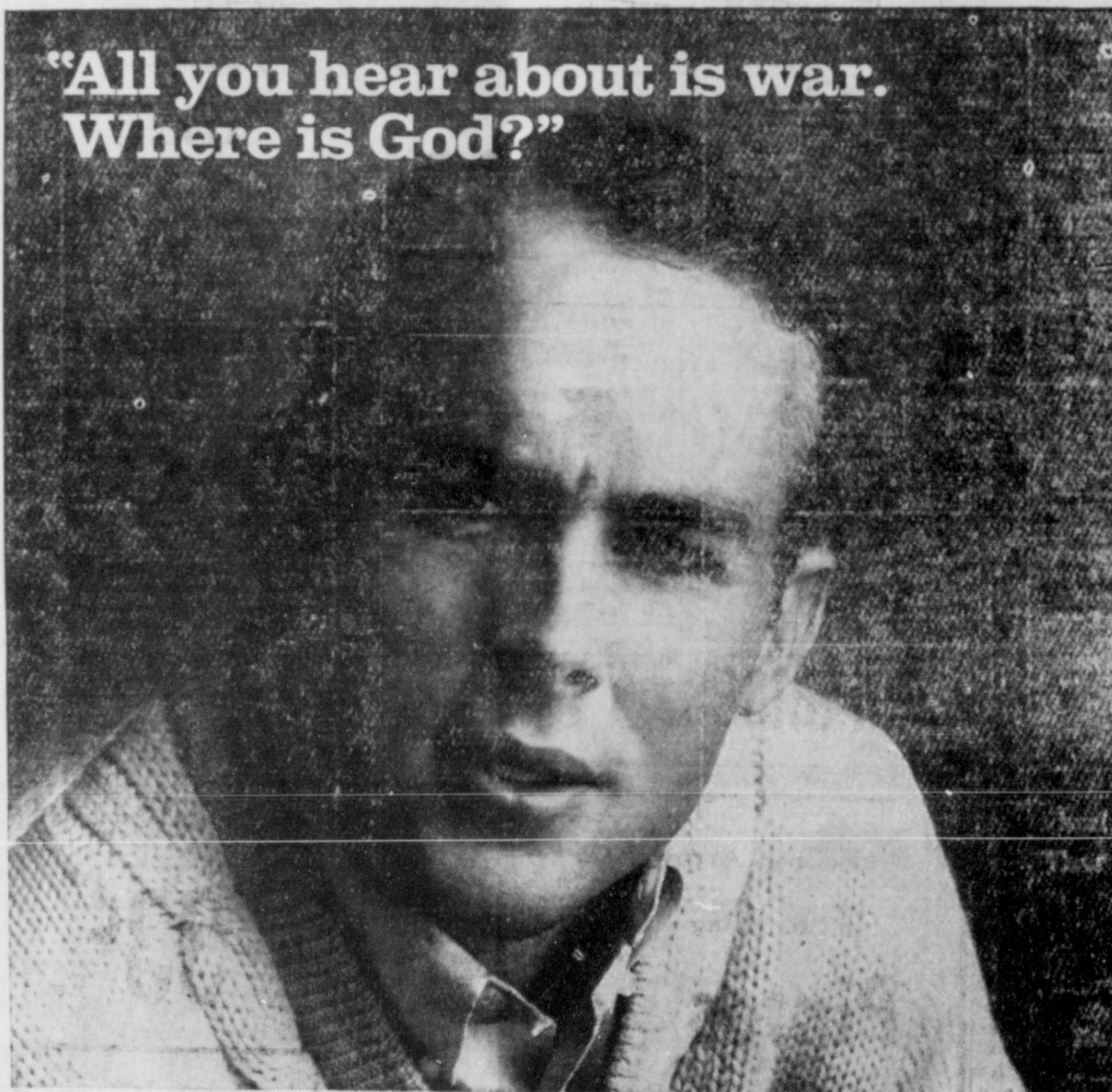

## Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Ass'n Supports Carcass Yield Grading

A statement made to the United States Department of Agriculture early this week, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association gave support to the implementation of the proposed yield grades for carcass and slaughter

lamb. As he made the statement, TS&GRA President Gene Whitehead pointed out three reasons why the grades should be adopted:

"(1) The Federal grades should reflect the proportion of saleable red meat in a carcass.

"(2) There has been too much variation in lamb cutability among carcasses in the same quality grade without reflecting monetary rewards for the high yielding lamb.

"(3) These grades can be used as a standard for improvement of flocks and the ultimate carcass yield structure of the lambs."

"The Association feels," he said, "With the use of these grades we will have a more acceptable product for the consumer because he will be carrying home less fat and more red meat."

"The proposed rules seem to be sound and valid. The proposed grades will more accurately measure value differences in lamb carcasses and will benefit not only the producer and processor, but also the consumer," Whitehead concluded.

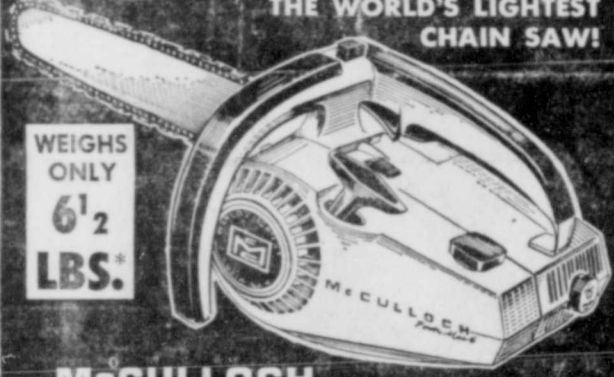

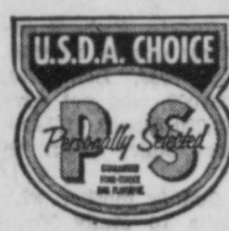

### How About Spreading Some Economy Around?

WASHINGTON — The kids of the country supposedly get a break this fall when a new regulation of the Food and Drug Administration goes into effect: Peanut butter must be 90% peanuts and no more than 10% of other ingredients. Some prominent brands now contain only 87% peanuts, and that's bad, says Food and Drug.

The agency spent nine years, conducting numerous hearings, in reaching the conclusion. The Federal Register devoted 11½ columns — more than 5,000 words — detailing the new rule.

Referring to the new regulation, "Washington Report," official publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, comments: "To most kids, peanut butter has been a yum-yum spread since 1890, when its manufacture began, and they couldn't care less about the rule. But the taxpayer cares — about the way his money is spent. He'd prefer the federal agencies would spread some economy around, instead of spending for such icky investigations."

chased by the DPS and 450 highway patrolmen trained to operate them. Device will test a suspect's breath to determine the percentage of alcohol in the bloodstream.

Instruments, simple to operate and read, will be placed in 80 of the state's most-populous counties, at fixed locations and used under strictly-controlled scientific conditions.

Suspects who consent to the test will blow into a tube and the percentage of alcohol in their blood will register on indicators. About 15 minutes' waiting time is allowed before testing begins and actual test takes only five minutes. Experts report a direct relationship between alcohol content in blood and breath.

Drinking, according to DPS statistics, figures in 40 to 50 percent of Texas' traffic deaths — perhaps more than 1,600 of last year's 3,367 highway fatalities. Over the nation, use of alcohol leads to annual traffic death toll of 25,000 and 800,000 vehicle accidents — the largest single factor in fatal crashes.

A driver with 0.15 per cent blood alcohol content by weight is 25 times more likely to be involved in a wreck than a non-drinking driver. Average person achieves that danger point after consuming five ounces of 100 proof alcohol an hour without eating, DPS chemists figure. Consumption leading to intoxication, of course, varies with weight, time between drinks and amount of food eaten.

Tests will "clear" drivers suspected of being drunk who are actually driving erratically due to illness or other reasons.

"It is hoped the DPS breathalyzer project will hit hard at

the problem and help reduce the traffic death rate in Texas," Colonel Speir said.

#### COURTS SPEAK

Tragedies, race horses and white elephants provided grist for the State Supreme Court's mill as it ground out more than 130 cases following a summer recess. High court decided that:

A Houston widow whose husband was killed by mistake while entering the wrong house cannot collect accidental death benefits.

Damage suit filed by a widow following the death of her husband in an auto wreck can be maintained although it did not meet the filing deadline.

Damage award payable to the estate of a Bowie County boy run over by a car should be upheld.

Employee of a Waco department store is entitled to \$50,000 damages due to an escalator accident.

Rio Grande Valley circus owner can collect damages from an animal dealer who delivered him a wild female elephant instead of a tame one as ordered.

The race horse, Benedicte, who won \$90,000, was not covered by a \$5,000 Lloyds of London insurance policy when he died.

A Harris County mother who went to India to study Yoga should not regain custody of her two sons from their grandparents who took them in after a 1963 divorce.

A lower court verdict ordering Pinehurst to pay a water company \$29,000 under a contract should be reversed.

A Henderson County real estate man's claim that he was denied proper commission on the sale of a ranch for a Boy Scout camp is entitled to review.

City of Roma's claim to a share of revenues from the border toll bridge operated by Starr County should be retried.

#### HOSPITAL PLAN OPEN TO STUDY

New 1969 state plan for construction and modernization of hospitals and related medical facilities now is available for public review at State Department of Health office.

Plan is the basic document which the State Board of Health uses to make its recommendations for federal Hill-Burton grants.

Sixty-nine applicants are applying for \$28,825,466 under the federal matching fund program for hospital aid next year.
