

Employer Of The Year Goes To Thurman H. Johnson

Employer of the year award presented to Thurman H. Johnson of Goldthwaite.

Johnson operates his turkey and lamb farm about four miles north of Goldthwaite. He saves the State of Texas an estimated \$66,000 a year because 24 of his employees are mentally retarded, and all but one come from the Abilene State School, a facility for those with all degrees of retardation, according to reports.

It costs the state \$2,750 a year for the care and maintenance of each resident in a state school. This figure does not include costs of education, vocational rehabilitation, research and demonstration projects and construction.

All the young men from the school who are now working on Johnson's ranch had been residents for at least eight years. They now earn \$160 a month plus room and board, thus feeding money into the area economy and paying income tax.

The program began in 1966 when Johnson was contacted by a TEA vocational rehabilitation counselor and a representative from boys' school.

Included in some of the jobs they perform are gathering about 7,000 turkey eggs daily, weighing, sorting and crating them for shipment; caring for 85,000 turkeys and the 35,000 chickens, branding, vaccinating and shearing sheep; working in the grain mill and driving large equipment.

Johnson received the Employer of the Year Award from the Texas Association for Retarded Children in April of this year.

Navy Lt. Graves Participates In Training Exercise

(X0257) USS Ranger (CVA-61) at Sea (FHTNC) Oct. 15 — Navy Lieutenant Thomas C. Graves, 26, son of Dr. and Mrs. T. C. Graves of Goldthwaite, participated in Operation Beat Cadence, a training exercise, while serving aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Ranger.

Operation Beat Cadence, conducted off the coast of Southern California, was designed to prepare the 30 Naval ships and 23 air units participating in the exercise for conditions in Southeast Asia and the Western Pacific.

The eight-day exercise consisted of two phases, strike and amphibious.

The strike force phase involved exercises to train First Fleet carriers, cruisers, frigates and destroyers in all types of naval warfare.

In the amphibious phase, Marine units landed on the beach at Coronado, California, and made an assault landing at Camp Pendleton, California.

Next Tuesday November 5 Is General Election Day

The General Election will be held in Mills County next week Tuesday, November 5.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and will remain open until 7 p. m.

Mills County voters will cast their ballots in all of the 13 boxes as they have been doing the past two years. The two small voting boxes, Antelope Gap (Scallorn) and Ebony that have been annexed with other voting precincts will be open as usual through this general election, or any other special election that should be called until next February 1, when the change in voting boxes becomes effective.

This being a presidential election year a record number of voters are expected to turn out for the election Tuesday.

Political activity in the county has been rather slow in spite of the fact that the presidential race is in a three way contest this year.

The ballot for Mills County this year contains five columns with the first column listing the offices and the others in the following order: Democratic Party, Republican Party, American Party and Write-In.

In addition to the columns for political parties, and write-ins, the ballot also contains 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on.

The Democratic Party has a full list of candidates for all offices to be filled from precinct down to the precinct level.

Republican party column has candidates for the offices of president and vice president, governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, state treasurer, commissioner of general land office, commissioner of agriculture, railroad commissioner, and state representative, district 54 which includes Mills County.

The American Party column has only candidates for president and vice president.

Following are the amendments, in brief, as they appear on the official ballot.

1. Revising provisions for management and administration of the state employee's retirement system and permitting investment in securities other than government bonds.

2. Raising the state's welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million.

3. Permitting investment of the Permanent University Fund by UT regents in certain types of securities, within the "prudent man rule."

4. Allowing Dallas County to issue road bonds on vote of property taxpayers.

5. Authorizing a raise in state legislators' salary from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year and extending the per diem expense allowance of legislators (\$12 a day) to 140 days of a regular lawmaking session (Present limit is 120 days.)

6. Allowing the legislature to exempt from property taxes equipment installed by industrialists to control air or water pollution.

7. Phasing out the state property tax after Dec. 31, 1976, beginning next year, except that portion for higher education institutions.

8. Eliminating the requirement that the governor, secretary of state and comptroller approve contracts for printing and paper.

9. Providing for contributions to the teacher retirement system on the basis of full salaries. (Contributions now are limited to \$504 a year.)

10. Allowing the legislature to provide for refund of state tax on cigar and tobacco products sold at retail in Texarkana.

11. Authorizing the legislature to permit consolidation of offices and governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant Counties.

12. Giving the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes and permit private concerns to operate plants thus financed.

13. Exempting from property tax certain property temporarily stored in public warehouses.

14. Spelling out that legislators will not be ineligible for other offices because their terms extend a few days into January.

Star Tigers Host Pottsville Tonight In Important 6-Man Football Game

Star Tigers defeated Sidney 56-8 last Thursday night to bring their season record to 5-2, and their district record to 3-0. All Star players saw action in the game, according to Tiger coach, Grant Tidwell. Sidney's young team hit hard throughout the entire game.

Star and Pottsville collide at Star tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 p. m. in an important game for both teams. Pottsville has an impressive 7-0 record coming into the game, accumulating 331 points against 87 for their opponents.

Star has lost twice this season. The first loss was to Oglesby 33-22, and the other to Jonesboro 24-12. Star has scored 302 points to their opponents' 105. Tidwell stated that this should be the best six-man football game in the state this week.

Pottsville and Star lead the race with three wins and no losses each in district play so far. Gustine and Cherokee follow with one win and one loss each.

Davis' Junior High Eagles Win District Championship Tuesday

Coach Carl Davis' Junior High Eagles played at Rising Star Tuesday night, and the outcome was 26-8 in Goldthwaite's favor. This put the Eagles' season record at 6-0, and also gave them their third district championship in a row.

Danny Sutherland scored first on the second offensive play of the game when he broke loose for a 40-yard TD. Halfway into the first quarter Johnny Miller took a QB keeper around left end to score again. In the final

seconds of the first quarter, Randy Wright scored around right end to add another six. Wright scored the two point conversion on a pass from Miller to put the halftime score at 20-0. Wright was also responsible for the Eagles' final score, a 5-yard drive up the middle in the third quarter. Rising Star got their lone score late in the game.

They hosted Santa Anna last Tuesday, October 22, and won 28-8. Santa Anna came into the game undefeated, but their record was spoiled. Eagle Danny Sutherland returned the opening kick-off 70 yards for the first TD, and soon after, Robin Reid caught a pass from QB Johnny Miller for a 40-yard TD. Andy Cook took out around left end for six more points to make it 20-0 at the half. Late in the third quarter Sutherland added another tally. Randy Wright and Sutherland accounted for two extra points each. Santa Anna scored in the fourth quarter to make the score 28-8.

October 15, the Jr. High Eagles played at Bangs and won again 14-12. Bangs was ahead 12-0 at the half, but the Eagles put in a great effort and came back to win. Andy Cook scored the first Eagle TD, and the Eagles were on the one-yard line ready to score again when Bangs recovered a fumble. Bangs ran one play and Bill Fisher and Roy Watters brought the runner down behind the goal to make the score 8-12. In the final seconds, Bangs punted from their 20, and Sutherland ran it all the way back for the winning tally. Mark Geeslin made a key interception earlier in the game.

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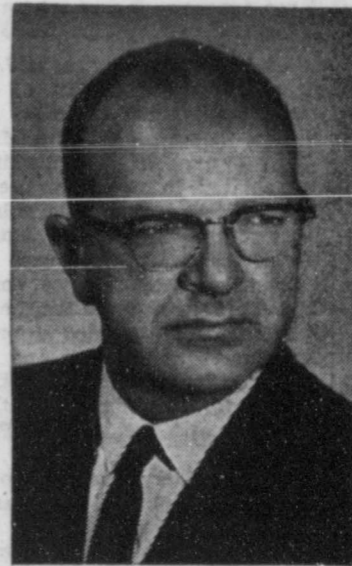

November 4-8 is Consumer Education Week for the Extension Service. During this week we want to remind people about how important it is to be a wise shopper. Most homemakers these days buy most everything they use in the way of food, clothing and shelter. It therefore becomes more and more important through the years to get the most we can for the money spent.

The Extension Service is standing ready to help consumers in learning to make wise choices regarding the essentials of the good life. We have publications to help the consumer choose and use foods to the best advantage. We have publications to cover all aspects of homemaking. Come in for a visit and let us help you be a wiser shopper.

One "wives tale" goes, "the more you buy, the less each unit costs." The wise shopper, however, always compares the net weight with the price. Larger packages are not always less expensive. In some cases the larger package may be more expensive than the smaller one. The only way to determine whether or not quantity purchasing saves you money, is to compare the net weight with the price.

Some big packages actually contain less than small ones. Net weight will reveal how much

actually is inside. For example, is the big loaf of bread actually bigger or does it just contain more air so that it looks bigger? The label will reveal that information.

Label reading also is important on odd shaped bottles. It's hard to tell how much they hold; and therefore the smaller bottle may actually appear larger. The actual cost in dollars and cents, however, should not be the only factor influencing how much the consumer will buy. If you buy it do you have enough space to store it? Does your family really need this product? Sometimes a product must be used within a certain length of time. If your family can't use the product before spoilage takes place, then the waste will outweigh any saving you might have made.

There is much to think about if you really want to be a thrifty consumer.

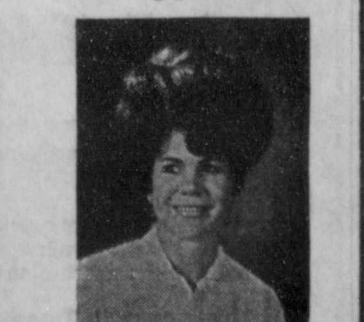

41 Mills, Brown County Families Receive FHA Loans In Past Year

During fiscal 1968, 41 Brown and Mills County farm families availed themselves of Farmers Home Administration operating loan credit, Brown and Mills County Supervisor said today.

Harold D. Kennedy said that \$171,440.00 was advanced during the 12 months ending June 30 for such expenses as new machinery and equipment, livestock, fertilizer, feed, seed, pasture improvement, and fencing. Operating loan funds also were used to refinance debts and pay family living expenses.

"This type of credit," Mr. Kennedy said, "has enabled many small farm operators to stay on the land."

As the fiscal year ended, farm families that included nearly

440,000 people nationwide are benefiting from the program which serves family farmers who can find no other source necessary operating loan credit.

Loans are made through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration serving all areas of the United States. Loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm financial management. The local FHA county office is located at 209 South Broadway, Brownwood.

In addition to operating loans, Farmers Home Administration makes loans to purchase and develop farms, to develop community water supply systems, to obtain housing in rural areas including housing for farm laborers and senior citizens, to meet the emergency needs of farmers suffering from a natural disaster, such as flood, or drought.

Claims From "Iron Knight II" Exercise Are Now Being Processed

FORT HOOD, Tex. (Special)—"We are doing our very best to make sure that all claims resulting from the command post exercise (CPX), Iron Knight II, are paid promptly and fairly," said Col. Lawrence H. Williams, III Corps staff judge advocate.

Even though many precautions are taken before each CPX, some property damage usually occurs. After even a slight rain, armored personnel carriers and tanks will make ruts in the ground, some livestock may become frightened and lose their young or livestock may stray.

"Damages this year are relatively light," said Col. Williams, "almost 95 per cent of it being property damage."

The resulting damage is inspected by Staff Judge Advocate (SJA) personnel immediately after the conclusion of the CPX. Claims are processed through SJA and payments are made by the finance office.

Many of the checks settling claims for Iron Knight II, which ended October 18 have already been sent.

Iron Knight II was the second off-post CPX here since October 1967 and was conducted on land in Central Texas which had been unused by the Army since 1952. This area, bounded by the cities of Brownwood, Comanche, San Saba, Lampasas and Gatesville, included some 48 sites ranging in size from 40 to 5,000 acres.

The land was inspected by Army Engineers and G3 maneuverers prior to the CPX. It was also photographed by these inspecting teams after the owners gave the Army permission to use the land.
