Charles Conradt was elected president of the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association at a special called meeting last Tuesday night to re-organize the group and start the ball rolling for the 31st annual Mills County Show in January.

Other officers elected were Glyn Sanders, vice-president; Houston Duren, treasurer; Doug Sellars, secretary; and Carl Casbeer, assistant secretary.

Officers were elected after Norman Duren, chairman, made a report from the nominating committee.

The group then went ahead with plans for the 31st annual Mills County Livestock Show to be held on Friday and Saturday, January 10 and 11, 1969.

30.56 Inches Of Rain Here In Ten Months

Goldthwaite received 30.56 inches of rainfall in the 10 month period, January through October, according to official record kept by Weatherman Harry Allen.

October was the one month so far this year that proved unusually dry with only .14 inch of precipitation recorded here.

This year's rainfall for ten months was almost double that for the same period last year when 16.47 inches was measured.

Humphrey-Muskie Team Favored By Mills County Voters Tuesday

Voters in Mills County went to the polls in the general election Tuesday and cast their ballots favoring the Democratic Humphrey-Muskie presidential team over Nixon-Agnew and Wallace-LeMay, Republican and American Party candidates, respectively.

Mills County voters favored the Humphrey-Muskie team over the Nixon-Agnew and Wallace-LeMay team by a margin of 722 to 645.

In the governor's race Democrat Preston Smith received 1091 votes to 501 for Republican Paul Eggers.

Ben Barnes polled 1277 county votes for Lt. Governor while his Republican opponent Doug DeCluitt polled 321.

In other state races most of the Democratic candidates were favored over their Republican opponents by about the same margin in Mills County.

Democratic state representative J. E. Ward was favored here with 1085 votes while his Republican opponent Charles Isenhower received 429.

Of the 14 constitutional a-

mendments Mills County favored four while opposing the other 10. Number 7, 9, 12 and 14 won the approval of county voters.

Voting was lighter in Mills County than anticipated from the record number of citizens registered to vote this year.

A total of 1,663 votes were cast for presidential candidates here in this election with a number of ballots not being counted because of improper marking. This apparently was due to split ticket voting by many voters, according to re-

Bank Deposits Show Another Healthy Gain

Deposits in Mills County State Bank show another healthy gain over the past year as reflected in bank call for statement of condition as of October 30, 1968.

The condensed statement shows deposits have increased more than one and one-half million dollars from October 4, 1967 to October 30, 1968.

Total deposits for October 30, 1968 were \$9,878,449.82 while on October 4, 1967 deposits were \$8,086,623.43.

Loans and discounts increased from \$4,500,467.13 on October 4, 1967 to \$4,761,163.71 on October 30, 1968.

Total resources as of October 30, 1968 were \$10,563,745.76 compared to \$8,964,238.11 on October 4, 1967.

Eagles Escape With Close 14-9 Victory Over Santa Anna Friday

Coach Les Johnson's Eagles came through in the last eight minutes at Santa Anna Friday night to throw off a 9-0 Mountaineer lead, and converted it to a 14-9 victory. The Eagles took their third straight district win and clinched at least a District 9-A co-championship.

Highly-favored Goldthwaite was certainly surprised when Santa Anna racked up a 6-0 halftime lead, and then a 9-0 third quarter lead. The Eagles were not to be denied, however, and came back with a 14-point rally in the final eight minutes of play.

Mountaineer Don Fitzpatrick picked up the first score of the game on a 68-yard punt return in the second quarter. The extra point attempt failed, to give Santa Anna their 6-0 halftime lead. Ricky Abernathy booted a 27-yard field goal in the third quarter to put more pressure on the Eagles, with a 9-0 lead. During this time, Santa Anna had not gained a single first down.

Early in the last period, Eagle QB Byron Harper connected with Mike Wright on a 42-yard pass play, to set up the Eagles' first TD. Ted Roberts went over from four yards out for the score. Richard Scott kicked the extra point. Joe Dan Hardgrave then broke loose for a 46-yard sprint and made it to the three-yard line before he was hauled down. Roberts again went over for the score, and Scott made another good kick

Star Tigers Down Pottsville 38-29 Thursday

Star and Pottsville collided at Star last Thursday night for a thrilling six-man football game, perhaps the most important in the District 9-B contest. Star won the game 38-29, to move their district record up to 4-0.

Star Tigers took to the air for four of their six touchdowns. Charles Miles passed 5 yards to Ronnie Beard, 15 yards to Ed Sanders, 15 yards to Dwight Head, and 40 yards to Barry Miles for the four TD's. Ronnie Beard scored on a 20-yard run from scrimmage, and Ed Sanders scored on a 63-yard pass interception, to account for Star's victory.

Jackie Karnes, Sammy Peetree, Larry Wittly and Ronald Wiesepape scored for Pottsville. Both teams hit hard and put in a good effort, according to Tiger Coach Grant Tidwell.

Star's schedule is open to night (Thursday), but they will continue district play next Thursday, November 14, when they will host Gustine. Coach Tidwell stated that Gustine is a young team but strong, and will be the biggest team Star has played this year. Star must win this game to remain in the running for the 9-B championship.

COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

November is the time of year that homemakers get interested in baking. The weather has gotten cooler, so the ladies don't mind firing up the oven for a change. Another fact is that Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays will soon be on us, and nobody wants to be caught without some baking done for these special days. In order to help some hurried and hurried homemakers, I'm devoting my column this week to easy cake recipes, and hope that it will help. All of these recipes have been tried, and found to be good.

EASY CAKES FOR THE BUNDT PAN (Or Tube Pan)

LEMON PUDDING CAKE
1 pkg. yellow cake mix
1/2 cup liquid shortening
4 eggs
1 cup hot water
1 pkg. instant lemon pudding
Blend all ingredients, beat for four minutes. Pour into a greased and floured tube pan—bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

Other variations of the above cake:
1. Combine butterscotch pudding with spice cake mix.
2. Combine chocolate pudding with chocolate cake mix. (Add 1 teaspoon vanilla).
3. Combine vanilla pudding with chocolate cake mix. (Add 1 teaspoon vanilla).

SHERRY CAKE
1 pkg. white cake mix
4 eggs
3/4 cup liquid shortening
3/4 cup cream sherry
Same directions as above.

APRICOT NECTAR CAKE
(This Is My Favorite)
1 pkg. yellow cake mix
1 pkg. lemon jello
3/4 cup liquid shortening
4 eggs
2 tablespoons vanilla flavoring
2 tablespoons lemon extract
Directions: Put cake mix and jello into a large mixing bowl. Add the shortening. Beat 1 minute. Add eggs one at a time and beat after each. Add flavorings last and beat well. Pour into greased and floured tube pan. Bake for 55 minutes at 325 degrees.

INSTANT CAKE
(From Jeanie Rathliff)
(Takes less than 10 minutes to Mix)
1 No. 2 can crushed pineapple
1 No. 2 can cherry pie filling
1 box yellow cake mix
1 1/2 sticks butter
1 cup pecans
Melt butter. Mix pineapple and cherry pie filling in a large rectangular pan. Sprinkle dry cake mix over mixture and spread with melted butter. Sprinkle with pecans. Bake in 350 degree oven for 1 hour, or until top crust is brown and done through. Overbaking will cause hard crust.

INSTANT HOT SPICED TEA
(From Jewell Yeager)
1 cup instant tea
1 cup sugar
2 cups tang
1 pkg. instant lemonade
1 pkg. lemon jello
1 pkg. black raspberry jello
1 tsp. powdered cloves
dash of cinnamon
dash of nutmeg
Mix all ingredients and store in covered jar in refrigerator. (Dry). Will keep for months. Use 2 tsp. per cup of hot water.

FROZEN "CORN ON THE COB"
Here's a secret for making frozen corn on the cob taste just like you picked it from the field this morning. Boil eight to ten minutes in solution of these proportions: to 1 qt. water
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup milk.

SPRAY YOUR WAY
Going deer hunting in Colorado this fall and afraid you might get lost in strange country? Solve this by carrying a spray can of paint in your pocket. Occasionally, spray a mark on a tree and you'll have a blazed trail you can follow on your way out.

FISHING ROD PROTECTION
Clear fingernail polish applied several times a year to the thread windings on each guide of a fishing rod makes good sense. The windings stay waterproof, are protected from being scuffed and won't start unraveling.

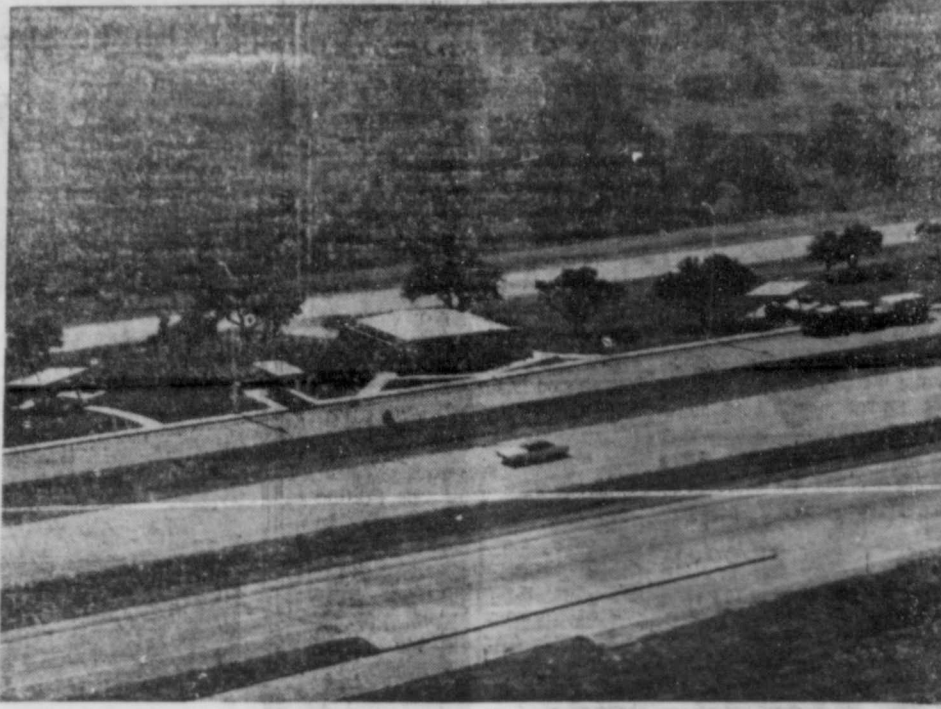

BLUE-TEST LAW
State Supreme Court has agreed to hear an appeal from local officials stymied in their attempts to enforce the state's newest and most far-reaching Blue Law.

Article 286a of the Penal Code prohibits the sale of certain listed items—covering just about everything—on consecutive Saturdays and Sundays, which requires retailers to choose between the two days.

However, Gibson's Discount Center of Midland got around it by leasing its store and stock to another corporation.

Midland County 142nd District Court agreed with Gibson's that the Blue Law violates the

state and national constitutions, and the local officials appealed. The case is set for hearing before the high court on November 6.

SALES TAX GOES UP

Taxpayers started shelling out another penny for state sales taxes on October 2. That made it three per cent statewide — and four per cent in those cities which levy local option sales taxes.

Extra one per cent for the state was voted by the Legislature in special session last June. Session also approved a one-per cent jump in car sales tax and a 50 cent hike in the franchise tax. Revenue estimates are about \$175 million in new state revenue during the next 11 months. Legislature in 1969 may have to raise \$300 million or more in additional money.

APPOINTMENTS

House Speaker Ben Barnes appointed the five public members to the Governor's Committee on Physical Fitness, which was created by the Legislature in June to study the problem and make recommendations.

Members are: Tom Stolhandske, San Antonio attorney and former All-American football player at UT; Mrs. Joe Long of Austin, holder of a doctorate in physical education; Dr. Stanley Burnham, physical-education professor at UT-Austin; Dr. Kenneth Cooper, U. S. Air Force Medical Corps major at San Antonio; and Dr. Jay Stanford, professor of internal medicine at the UT Southwestern Medical School at Dallas.

BILINGUAL EDUCATION

Texas Education Agency is utilizing the experience of six visiting teachers from Mexico to improve the bilingual-education program it administers.

Teachers, all from Nuevo Leon, will spend the current school year in Texas teaching Spanish to already Spanish-speaking children in the pre-school and elementary grades.

"This program," a TEA official said, "is an attempt to enhance our bilingual teaching and to involve ourselves in international programs. Also, we want to see how well Mexican-national teachers can work in our public schools."

RIOT LOSS PLAN REVIEWED

Plan of insurance companies to spread riot losses got State Board of Insurance review but was sent back for redrafting following new federal rules.

It must be approved by October 29 to qualify companies operating in Texas for federal re-insurance under new housing act. Plan will have to be acceptable to U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

SHORT SNORTS

Odessa Attorney W. O. Shafer is new president of the Texas Association of Defense Counsel, Jack Hebdon of San Antonio is president-elect and Max N. Osborn of Midland secretary-treasurer.

Marvin Griffin will remain on the Texas ballot as "stand in" vice-presidential candidate of the American Party, although Gov. George Wallace now has selected Gen. Curtis LeMay as his running mate.

Texas' increasing screwworm problem has resulted in the release of 298,966,000 sterile flies over the state in August to fight the pest.

Turner M. Keith has succeeded R. O. (Bob) Smith as executive director of Wholesale Beer Distributors of Texas.

W. Grady Swift will head a tick eradication program in South Texas brought about by discovery of fever ticks on livestock on three ranches in Dimmit County.

Securities registered for public sale in Texas during the fiscal year ended August 31, 1968, passed the billion-dollar mark for the first time. State Securities Board reports.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has published a new guide for consumer protection, advising about phony contracts, sales come-on's, "free" offers, etc.

Department of Banking has applications for new banks at Houston (Southeast Bank) and County.

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System has postponed until November 11 its hearing on needs in the fields of medical and dental education and in Dallas-Fort Worth-North Texas area.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS

Legislature has no authority to restrict purchase of Department of Public Safety aircraft to rescue work only (and rule out their use for traffic law enforcement). Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held. At the same time, Martin indicated that Governor Connally has no power to veto the restriction (as he did July 20). In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

• Commissioners' Court of Dallas County can repair, maintain and operate the courthouse either with its own employees or by contracting with an independent contractor.

• State Board of Dental Examiners employees may receive merit salary increases during the current fiscal year.

Chairman Duren Reports U. S. Bond Sales For County

W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee, reports today that sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Mills County totaled \$994 during September. Sales during the first nine months totaled \$23,535 and this is 32 per cent of the 1968 sales goal.

September sales in Texas totaled \$13,508,678 and the January-September sales were \$134,729,099 — an increase of 8.3 per cent over sales during the same period of 1967.

Nationally, the cash sales of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares totaled \$351 million for September and topping September sales for 10 of the previous 11 years. Holdings of Savings Bonds/Freedom Shares as of September 30 total \$51,964 million.

Mrs. Lillian Stokes Is Chairman Of Cen-Tex Christmas Seal Sales

Mrs. Lillian Stokes, prominent Goldthwaite citizen, has been named Chairman of the 1968 Christmas Seal Campaign, according to an announcement made today by Joe Sorrels, president of the Central Texas TB and RD Association.

Mrs. Stokes took over her duties effective immediately and announced that Christmas Seals will be mailed soon after November 7th to the 25 county Central Texas area.

Areas have been formed in Texas so that a more effective plan of tuberculosis eradication can be accomplished. Mills

County is a vital part of the Central Texas area.

"I know the importance of the Christmas Seal Campaign to the residents of Mills County," Mrs. Stokes said, "and I am convinced we will more than top our goal of \$90,000 for the area."

The campaign, which supports a number of programs and activities aimed against tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases, will get underway officially on November 15 with the slogan, "Use Christmas Seals... It's a matter of life and breath."
