Housing Authority Open For Business; First Tenants Move In Tuesday, April 1

The Housing Authority of the City of Goldthwaite has opened the low-rent housing units in Goldthwaite and the first tenants moved in some of the units on Tuesday, April 1.

Clyde Cockrum, executive director, and L. B. Burnham, chairman, of the Goldthwaite Housing Authority, have announced that after some delays they are now open for business.

The Authority started taking applications for the low-rent housing units about two months ago when construction was completed and final details were being worked out for the job to be accepted by the architect and the Authority.

The 36 unit project includes 24 units for the elderly and 12 units for low income families. All units are of duplex design with two units to a building and of brick veneer construction.

They are located on two sites. The 24 units for the elderly are located on two blocks of ground located between East Front and Lynch Streets. The property was formerly known as the old Greathouse Gln location. All of the units for the elderly are of one bedroom design.

The 12 units for low income families are located on a block of land acquired from Mrs. W. E. Fairman. It is located between West 5th and 6th Streets bounded by Roseman St., and McIntosh on the East and West. These units are of two and three bedroom design.

Plans for the low-rent housing units for Goldthwaite got underway about four years ago. After many months of working out details and selecting and acquiring sites construction bids were called for in March of last year. Bids were opened on Wednesday, March 20, 1968, when contract was let to Robert L. Gyler Co., of Lampasas. Bid for the job was \$358,294.

Commissioners of the Housing Authority are: L. B. Burnham, chairman; Houston Duren, Harold Yarborough, Kellis Landrum, and Doug Collier.

Architect for the project was Fitch & Holdredge, of Houston.

OPEN HOUSE BEING PLANNED

Plans are being made for an open house of the low-rent housing units to give the public an opportunity to visit and inspect the project.

Announcement will be made as soon as plans are formulated and date set for the event.

1908 Rate Card For Electricity In Goldthwaite Displayed Here

A rate card for electric lights in Goldthwaite in 1908 was displayed here this week by the founder of the first electric system in the city.

Edward Geeslin, now a resident of Brady, was in Goldthwaite Monday for some work at Graves Dental Clinic and he was showing the rate card to Dr. T. C. Graves.

Mr. Geeslin started the elec-

tric system in Goldthwaite in 1907 and owned it for 20 years. After selling the system to a power company he moved to Brady.

According to the card it cost residents of Goldthwaite \$1.00 per lamp to install electric lights in 1908. The meter rate was 16¢ per kilowatt hour with a minimum charge of \$1.25. Flat rate for business firms was paid \$1.00 for the first light, for each additional light, 16¢ per lamp. Residences paid \$1.00 for the first light, 50¢ for next and 25 cents for each additional light, 16¢ p. lamps.

Mr. Geeslin, owner of the firm at the time, had the rate cards printed with rates going into effect on October 1, 1908. Goldthwaite was reportedly one of the best lighted towns in the area at that time.

Today Goldthwaite is still one of the best lighted cities in the area.

The City owns the utilities with electric distribution and enjoys one of the lowest rates for electricity of any city in the state.

Rev. Wayne Leatherman, pastor of Scallorn Baptist Church, is in charge of program arrangements.

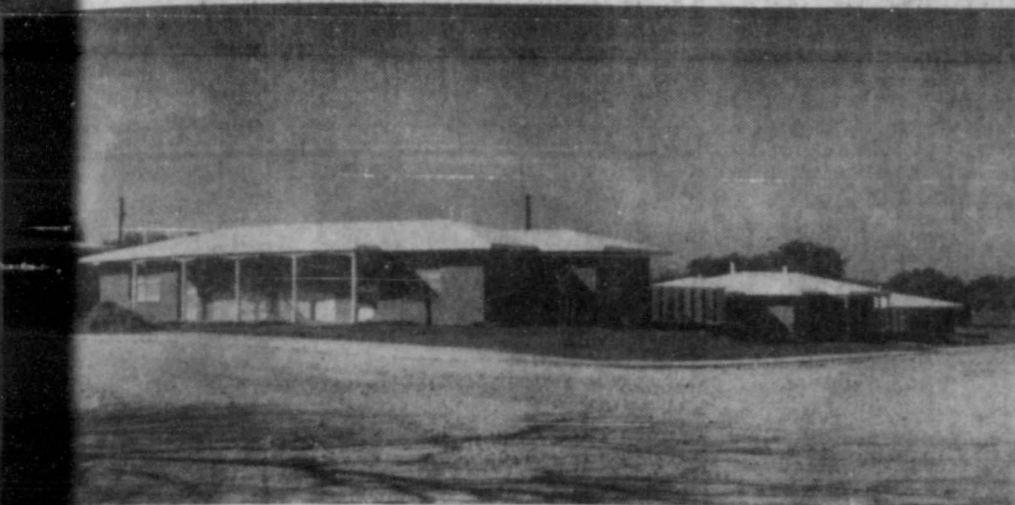

three and one from the county-at-large. County Board members will be elected to serve a regular two year term.

In Goldthwaite the election will be held in the Commissioners' Courtroom in Mills County Courthouse.

Voting in Mullin, Star and Priddy will be at the school building in each of the respective districts.

Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Social Security Benefits Available To Workers Disabled Under Age

A worker under age 65 who becomes disabled should contact the Social Security Office to find out about monthly disability benefit payments. Delay could mean a loss of some payments.

This reminder is given by Glen McNatt, of the Brownwood office, who said his office has taken applications recently from some people who lost payments by not applying sooner. The eligibility requirements are that the worker must have a physical or mental impairment that prevents his doing any substantial gainful work; the impairment must be expected to last (or has lasted) for at least 12 months or is expected to result in death; and the person must have worked a required time under social security before becoming disabled.

He must have worked for five years out of the last 10 years before becoming unable to work, except that this work-time is fewer than ten years if he became disabled before age

31. "The required work even be as little as five workers disabled before," McNatt said. "The same the disability payment same as though the worker reached age 65. It is reduced."

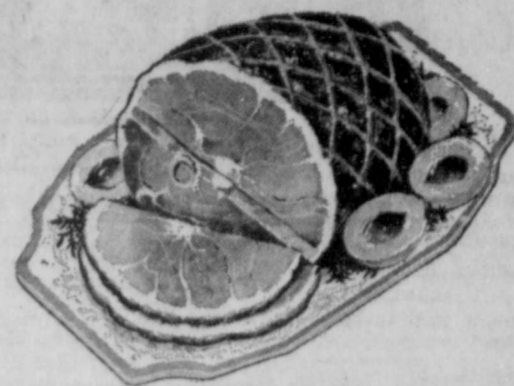

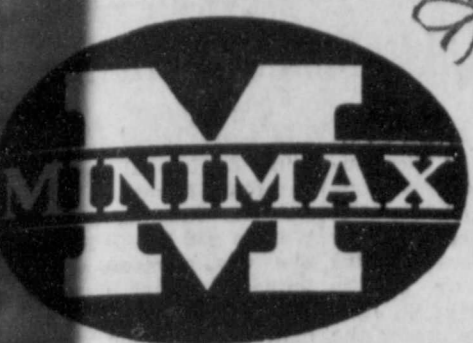

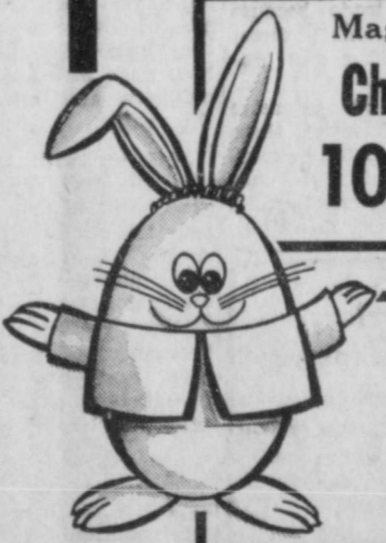

Mohair Council Announces New And Extensive Promotion Program

San Angelo (Spl.) — The Mohair Council of America will soon launch one of the most intensive promotion programs ever developed for the glamorous fiber produced in Texas and the Southwestern United States.

The programs, aimed at reaching designers, millers, retail buyers and others who influence buying habits of American consumers, will require the greater portion of the council's \$395,000 budget.

Dolph Briscoe Jr. of Uvalde, council president, said the new programs are specifically designed for the trade because limited funds prohibit direct consumer advertising and promotion campaigns.

"Launching such extensive programs and keeping them rolling requires full-time supervision," Briscoe said, announcing the council has employed its first full-time staff members.

Named market development director is Mrs. Lee Clark of New York City. Ross McSwain of San Angelo, well-known West Texas newsman, has been named director of information and public relations, Briscoe said.

Mrs. Clark, who will head the council's New York office, has been active in the manufacturing and retail trade on the East Coast for many years. She will work closely with more than 100 mills and manufacturers, producing and selling mohair products. She also will coordinate market development plans with the Eleanor Kairalla Agency in New York which handles trade publicity and advertising for the council.

McSwain, with the San Angelo Standard-Times nearly 10 years, will headquarter at the council's main office in San Angelo. He will work with Mrs. Clark and the Kairalla Agency on publicity programs, keep mohair growers informed on promotion and product development work, and will assist in operation of the San Angelo office.

Walter Pfluger of San Angelo, council secretary-treasurer, will supervise office procedures and will continue to handle all council financial affairs.
