Highway Construction Contracts Include Project In Mills County

Contracts for highway construction in the Brownwood district including a project in Mills County, have been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer M. Pritchard, and will be in Brown and Mills counties.

Mills County Voters Favor Amendments

Mills County voters favored amendments and turned out to the polls Tuesday to cast their ballots on the nine proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

In Mills County, Robert Hall of Valley Mills was awarded a contract for grading, structures, base and surfacing on 4 miles of FM 3023. Low bid was \$145,855.98.

The turnout was one of the highest in history for a county-wide special election with only 100 votes being cast according to unofficial returns tabulated Tuesday night by County-District Clerk Walter A. Bryant.

The project extends from State Highway 279 east to 0.3 mile east of US 67 and 377 intersection. R. S. Martin Jr. of Brownwood is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 60 working days.

Amendments favored by Mills County voters included: No. 1, Constitutional deletions; No. 2, Inter Development Authority; No. 3, Welfare Fund; No. 7, Employee Survivor Assistance; and No. 8, Student Loans. The four amended down locally were: No. 4, Legislator's salaries; No. 4, Water Supply Tax Exemption; No. 6, Bond Rates; and No. 9, Annual Legislative Sessions.

Glen G. Trotter of Goldthwaite is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 100 working days.

Gold-Tex Rodeo Will Feature 80 Top Contestants Here This Week

The Mills County Rodeo Association will sponsor their annual Gold-Tex Rodeo finals here this weekend at the FFA Arena Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. The Rodeo will get underway each night at 8:00 p. m.

About eighty contestants from the Central Texas area will be featured the three nights it was announced Tuesday by Thurman Head, FFA Advisor, and David Smith, president of the Association. The contestants will be the cowboys and cowgirls who won top honors in the Central Texas FFA Invitational Rodeos held this season.

There will be about 8 to 10 contestants for each of the seven events to be featured. Events will include bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, ribbon roping, girls' barrel races, boys' calf riding, and breakaway roping.

Judges will be J. W. Switzer of Blanket and J. L. Stewardson of San Saba.

The 1970 Rodeo Queen will be crowned at the Saturday night performance. She will be selected from a number of candidates from the various schools participating in the rodeo.

This was the fourth in a series of informal get-together sessions Governor Smith has had during recent weeks with a cross section of representative citizens from over Texas to talk about state business.

Seven Months Rainfall Only 13.48 Inches

Rainfall received in Goldthwaite the first seven months of 1969, January through July, measured only 13.48 inches, according to official report from Weatherman Harry Allen.

During the month of July 51 inch was recorded in Goldthwaite. Some sections of the county received heavy showers measuring up to three and four inches.

Last year, 1968, during the first seven months, Goldthwaite received 25.07 inches of rain while during the same period of 1967 only 9.77 inches was recorded here.

HEAT WAVE CONTINUES
July has been chalked up as hot and dry.

The official thermometer went out of order on July 22, and temperature readings were not available for the entire month.

Record for the first 21 days shows that 16 days out of 21 the temperature reading went to 100 and above with the highest reading 105 on several days. During July 1968 the hottest day was 98 degrees, in 1967 and 1968 it went up to 103 and in 1965 the highest reading was 106.

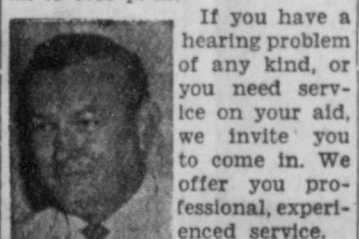

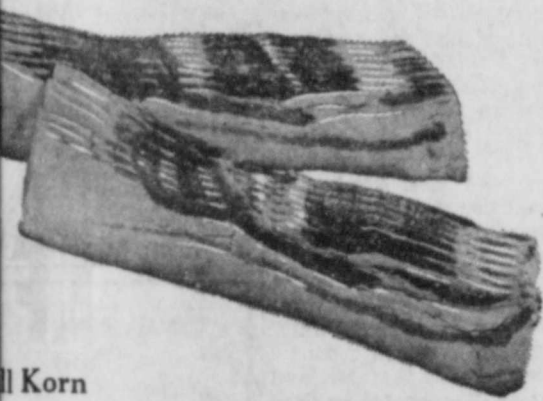

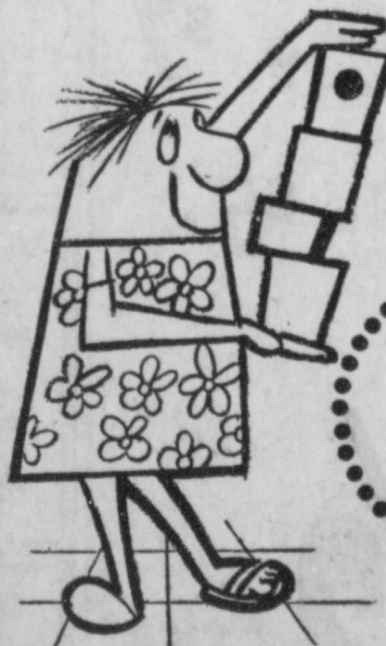

Head Start Program Concluded Here With 29 Children Completing Course

The Summer Head Start program at Goldthwaite Elementary School ended Friday, July 25, with twenty-nine children from Star, Mullin, and Goldthwaite receiving certificates.

On Thursday morning, July 24, the children presented a short program for their parents and friends. Sixty-two visitors were present for the program and had lunch with the children afterward.

Mrs. Authula Nickols served as director of the Head Start program this year. Staff members were: Mrs. Barbara Collins, Mrs. Lillian Stokes, Mrs. Robbie Kerby, Mrs. Frances Lopez, Mrs. Jane Boyd, Mrs. Charlie Perry, Carolyn Ables, Linda Koen, Belinda Slagle, and Gayle Hall.

Thirty children were enrolled in Head Start at the start of the summer, and all finished except one. During the course of the program each child received a medical examination, urine test, T. B. test, and dental examination (65 cavities were filled), 24 D.P.T. shots, 13 measles, 20 smallpox, and 19 Polio vaccinations were administered. Two of the children were referred to visual specialists, and eleven were tested by the Comprehensive Pupil Appraisal Service from the Education Service Center in Waco.

During the eight-week program 1647 meals were served, and 46 volunteer workers gave a total of 820 hours, and eleven paid workers, 1209 hours.

The primary goal of Head Start is to prepare the children for school. They had a planned program with many experiences in learning to work and play independently, to be at ease about being away from home and to be able to accept help and directions from adults. Opportunities were provided so each child could succeed physically, intellectually, and socially. Many films were shown and field trips taken.

Mrs. Nickols and the staff feel that this was the most successful Head Start program ever conducted here, and that much of its success must be attributed to the members of the community. Mrs. Patty Johnson and her homemaking girls and many other people of the community volunteered time and services to help carry out the program, and many merchants and town people let the children visit their stores and business establishments to learn more about their town.

Immunization Clinic Reports Good Turnout

Sixty-three Mills County children received immunizations at the clinic held at the nurse's office in the Goldthwaite Elementary School building on July 12.

There were 41 who took measles vaccine, 37 took diphtheria and whooping cough, and 12 were immunized for polio. The technicians from the State Health Department who furnished the supplies said that although Mills County was the smallest of those they had offered the program to, the turnout of children was one of the best.
