Homemakers To Sponsor Drugs Program Tonight

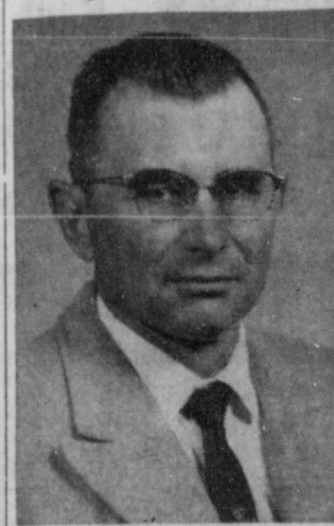

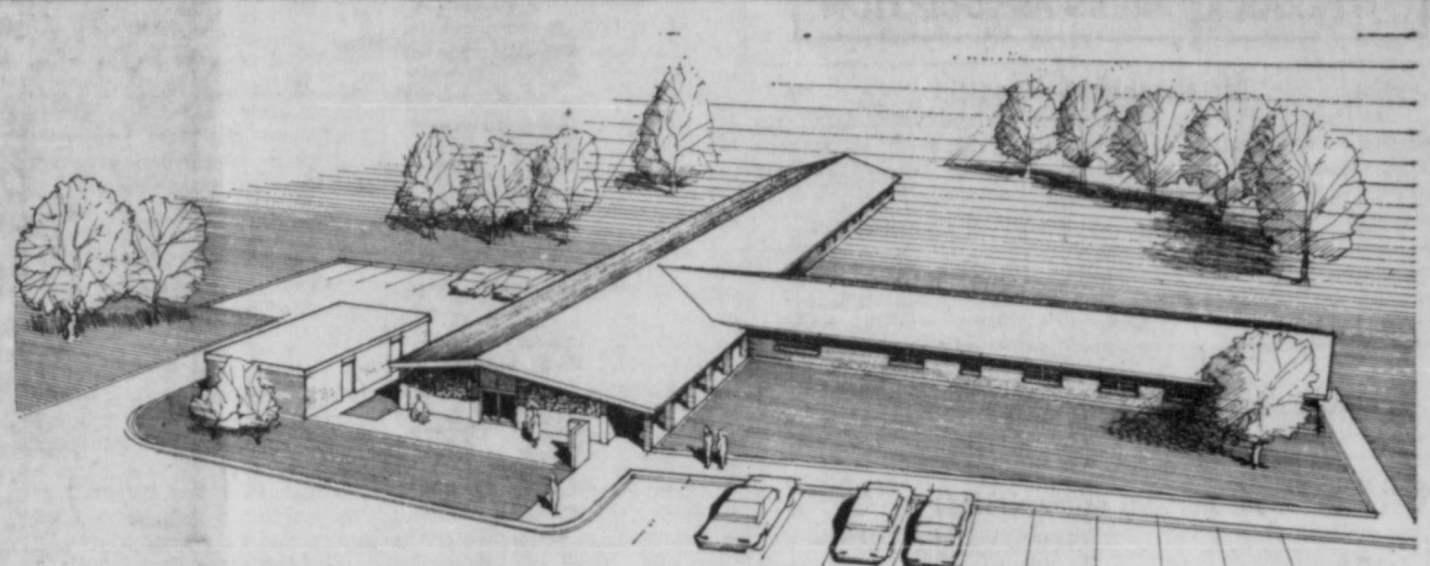
Other officers elected to serve with Mr. Hardgrave during the new year are:

School Enrollment Down 27 Pupils

Enrollment in Goldthwaite Public Schools as of Tuesday morning was 445 pupils, according to announcement by Supt. Gilbert Davis.

This is down 27 from the count on the same day last year when 472 were enrolled.

Of the 445 students, 229 are enrolled in junior and senior high school, and 216 are enrolled in 504 students enrolled here through six.

This year's total enrollment shows a decrease while last year the count showed an increase over 1967. In 1967 there were 504 students enrolled here on the first day of school.

Supt. Davis stated that several more enrollments are expected before the end of this week bringing the total up some.

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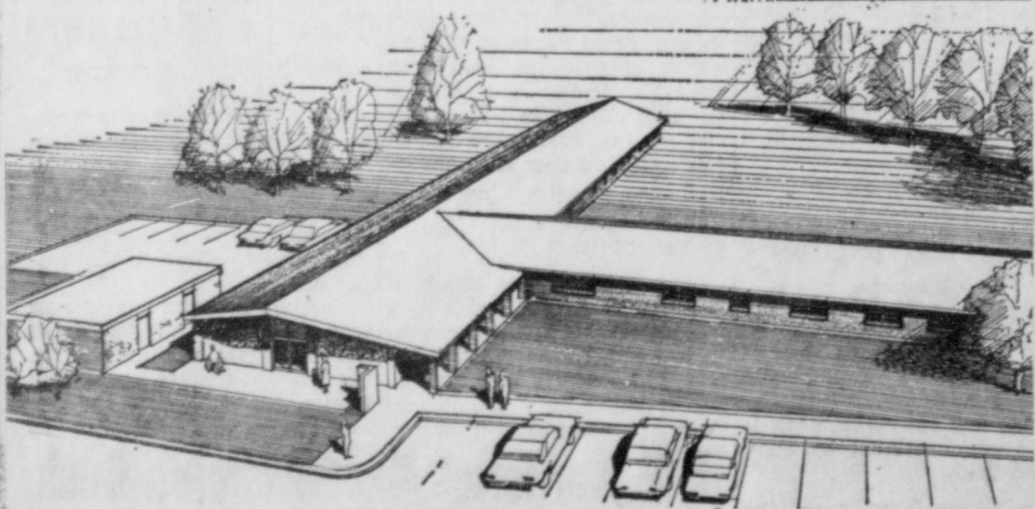

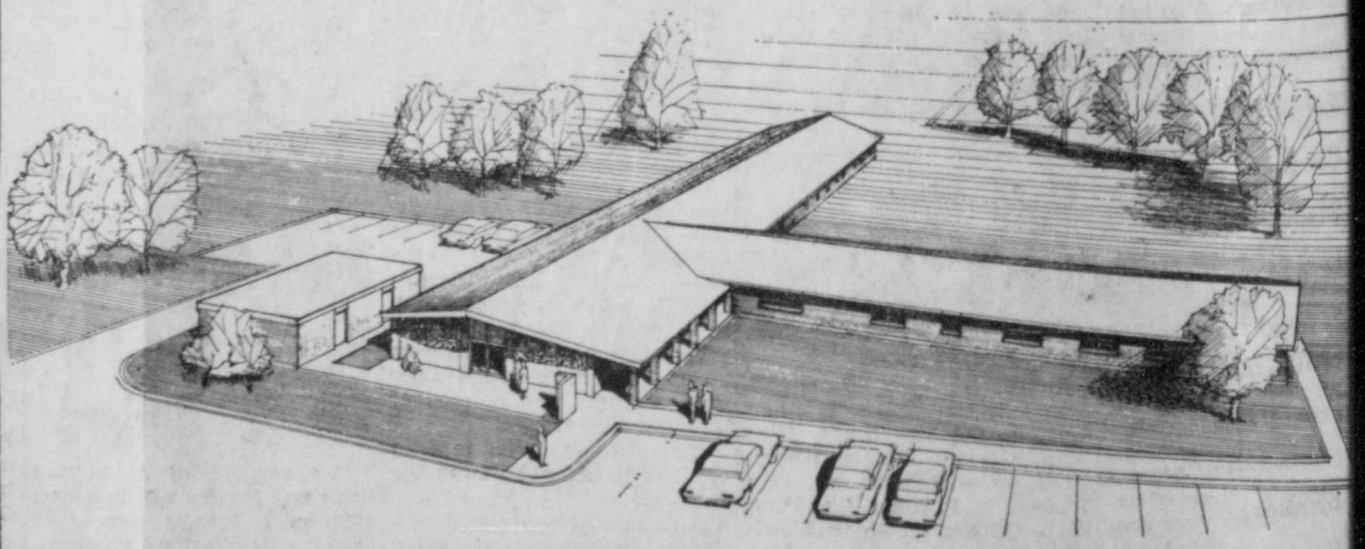

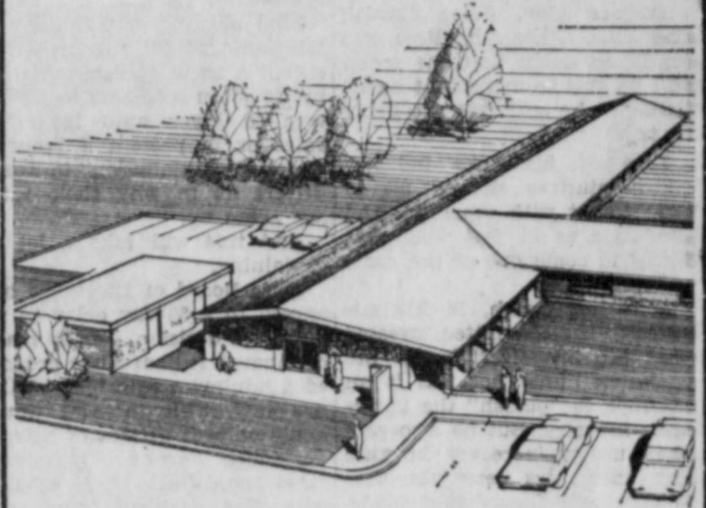

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Committee On Auto Insurance Rate Increase To Report Sept. 1

Austin, Tex.—September 1 is the date suggested by Gov. Preston Smith for the special committee, now investigating auto insurance rates in Texas, to report its recommendations to the governor.

Former Gov. Price Daniel, chairman of the committee, has expressed doubt that the group will be able to make that deadline. But he says "we are going to try."

Lots of insurance industry representatives showed up to listen, chat with reporters, and speculate as to just what was likely to come out of the committee's work.

Governor Smith, in his address to the committee, stressed that the investigation was not a "witch hunt" nor was it an attempt to "punish" the insurance industry. But he also said that unless increases in auto insurance rates were "absolutely essential," they should not be made—and if they were abso-

lutely necessary, the people deserved to know why.

Capitol press rooms were deluged with memoranda and bulletins from various insurance associations, giving background information, stating positions and generally pledging support and assistance to the committee.

First meeting of the committee produced little information, except a show of determination by its seven members to find a way to lower auto insurance rates or to present a "concise and clear explanation" to Texas drivers as to why their rates are going up.

And this will take a lot of explaining.

State Board of Insurance has agreed to a 30-day delay in its auto rate decision, usually made on August 1. Board has proposed a minimum rate hike of 11.4 per cent. This increase would apply only to drivers of private passenger cars. Individual rates would fluctuate in keeping with the accident experience record in each area.

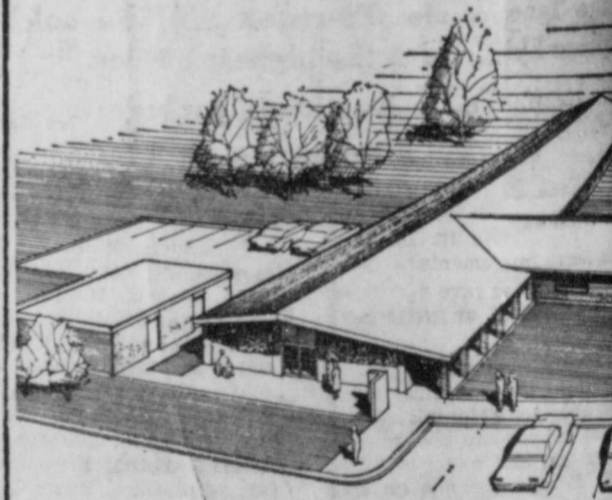

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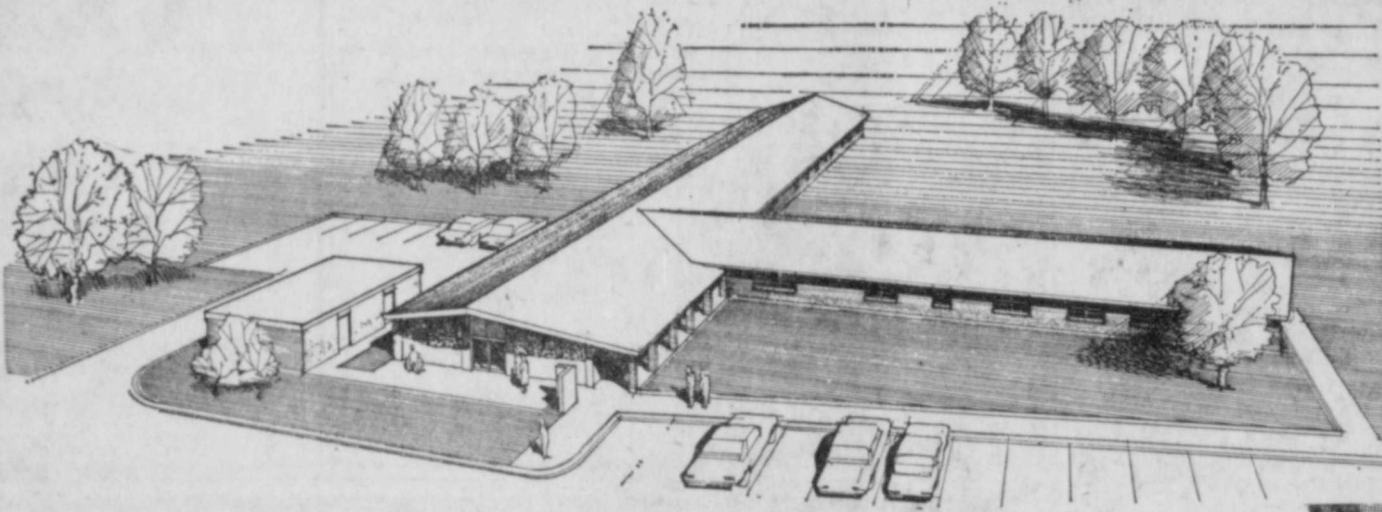
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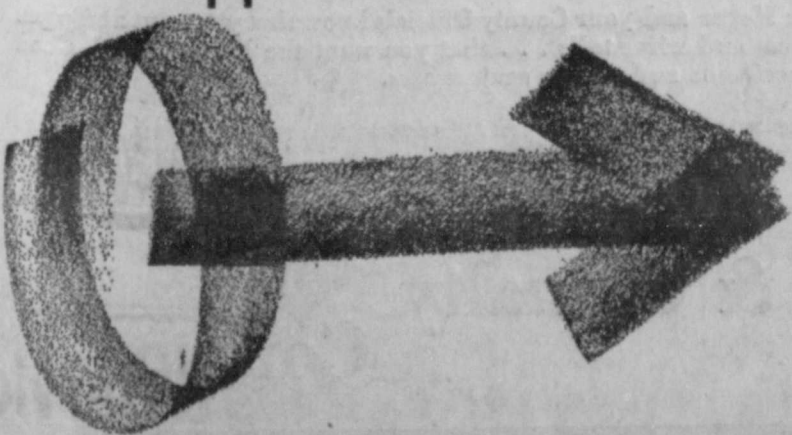
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Benefits For Elderly Outlined As Medicare Is Three Years Old

July marks the third birthday of Medicare, and during the three years Medicare has covered 1,008,600 hospital stays of elderly people in Texas. There have been more than 56,800 admissions for post-hospital extended care. Payments under the hospital insurance program in Texas have totaled \$485,033,000. Under the medical insurance program (primarily doctor's bills), Medicare has paid \$193,707,000 in Texas.

"Those of us in the Social Security Offices who deal with people, not just statistics, know how important Medicare has been in the lives of many older persons in Brownwood and area," says Glen McNatt, in charge of the Brownwood office.

"Often it's when a serious illness strikes, resulting in long

hospital stays and perhaps expensive surgery, that a person realizes best the very considerable protection he has under Medicare," he added. "Many older people who might otherwise have put off or gone without care have been able to afford treatment."

"Many have peace of mind from knowing illness will not cut up a lifetime's savings or make it necessary to call on their children for help in paying medical bills." He said the dire predictions made about Medicare have not materialized. For instance, the hospitals have not been overcrowded with Medicare patients like predicted. There was not the overwhelming rush by the elderly to have unnecessary treatment by doctors like some people predicted. Of course there were problems to be worked out, such as delays in processing claims, but these problems are becoming fewer all the time.

Under contract to the Federal Government, in Texas Blue Cross and Blue Shield receive and pay under Medicare the hospital bills, physicians' bills, and other medical services.

Over 500 hospitals in the state have met the Medicare quality standards and are participating.

There also are 272 participating extended care facilities, 39 certified home health agencies, and 181 independent laboratories.

Almost 950,000 older people in Texas, and more than 1 1/2 million nation-wide, are covered under Medicare.

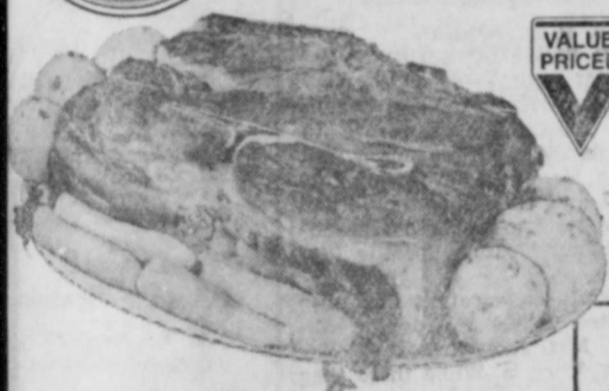

Production Credit Association Adds Electric Data Processing

The San Saba Production Credit Association is now able to increase member service by the addition of Electronic Data Processing installed in the San Saba office August 4, 1969.

The Association's bookkeeping records were converted to an electronic computer system located at the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank at Wichita, Kansas.

D. T. Carter Enters Cattle In Show At Tulsa

D. T. Carter of C-H Hereford, Route 3, Goldthwaite, has entered a herd of Hereford cattle in the \$10,000 Hereford Cattle Show at the Tulsa State Fair, September 26th through September 30th.

The nation's outstanding livestock breeders will be competing for a total of \$115,500.00 in awards and premiums during the fair September 26 through October 5.

Over a million people are expected to turn out for the fair.

The installation of the computer system is an effort on our part to help answer this need, and to more adequately serve our customers." Further explaining the system, Oliver stated, "a unique feature is the use of a teletype machine to transfer the bookkeeping information from the Production Credit Association to the computer. Daily activity is coded on a paper tape through the teletype equipment at the office. This information is then transferred to the computer at the rate of 100 words per minute. This method of transmitting data reduces the time between the actual transaction and the recording of the computer of this information. Daily activity recorded one day and sent in is returned the next morning to each of the association's offices."

The San Saba Production Credit Association maintains offices in Brady, Goldthwaite, Lampasas, Llano and San Saba, and its lending territory includes Burnet, Gillespie, Lampasas, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Mills and San Saba Counties.

Motor Vehicle Inspection Law With Changes Effective Sept. 1

The big change is here. On September 1, Texas' Motor Vehicle Inspection stations started on the new, year-round inspection schedule. Instead of a once-a-year deadline April 15, and the usual log-jam of cars waiting for inspection at the last possible moment, inspections will come due one year after the month shown on the inspection certificate.

All cars inspected during September 1969, will be due their next inspection during September 1970. Those getting inspection certificates during October 1969, will be due for a new inspection during October 1970, and so on.

The current inspection certificate will be used until December 31 - - but with a difference. Before a certificate is placed on a windshield, the number of the month is placed on the face of the certificate. As September is the ninth month, "9" will be used; in October, the number "10" will be placed on the certificate, and so on through December.

Beginning January 1, 1970, a different inspection certificate will be used, and the numbering system will begin with the numeral "1."

Beginning September 1, 1969, the Inspection Certificate will be placed in the lower left hand corner of the windshield.

Another change in the inspection law is the increase in the inspection fee from \$1.75 to \$2.00. The increase was given to compensate for the additional items included in the present inspection law. As in the past, the inspection fee is to be collected at the time the vehicle is inspected, whether the vehicle is approved or rejected. However, any inspection station shall inspect free of charge any vehicle rejected by it, after necessary adjustments have been made within a period of seven days.

Considerations for passenger safety and cleaner air brought about the inclusion of the exhaust system and the exhaust emission system in the present Motor Vehicle Inspection Law. Inspection stations, beginning September 1 will visually examine mufflers, resonators, tail pipes, exhaust pipes, and supporting hardware for loose or leaking joints, holes or leaking seams and make certain all parts are securely fastened to the vehicle. No part of an exhaust system can pass through the passenger compartment. If the tail pipe is broken or eroded to the extent that fumes will enter the passenger compartment, the vehicle must be rejected.

Texas law requires that the owner or operator of any new motor vehicle or new motor vehicle engine beginning with the 1968 model year be equipped with an exhaust emission system and must keep the system in good operable condition. Under the new inspection law, this system is to be examined visually and the vehicle shall be rejected only if the emission control system has been removed or disconnected. The present law does not require a measurement of exhaust emissions nor does it apply to vehicles altered and modified to use a fuel other than gasoline.

Department of Public Safety officials point out that all mechanics used as inspectors shall be approved by a Motor Vehicle Inspection Patrolman, and only the mechanic making the in-

spection is authorized to sign the inspection certificate.

Compliance with the inspection program will continue to be monitored by the Department. As in the past, this will be done by long-distance surveillance, plainclothes men and visits by the Department of Public Safety Patrolmen.

Patrolman B. G. Robb advises there are three stations in Goldthwaite and one station at Star available to perform the required inspection in Mills County. Each of these stations displays the Official Motor Vehicle Inspection station sign. Vehicle owners are urged to begin having their vehicles inspected early in an effort to relieve the rush which will occur near the deadline.
