City Council Approves Tax Roll for Regular Meeting Monday

The city council meeting in session Monday night in city hall approved the tax roll for the city of Goldthwaite. The Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1 for the year.

The amount of the tax roll for the city is \$16,717.72 and the district \$17,040.79.

Reports of receipts and disbursements for the month of August covering the city departments of the city presented to the Council by City Manager W. C. Barnett. Barnett reported to the council attending a meeting with members of the Garden Club of the Mills County Commissioners' Court to discuss the

landscaping project for the courthouse grounds. The city expects to take part in this major undertaking.

Erecting a bulletin board in the street at the intersection of Fourth and Fisher streets was brought before the council and was discussed. The council expressed interest in the project and Alderman Hollis Wiggins and Barnett were named on a committee to meet and work with interested clubs or groups.

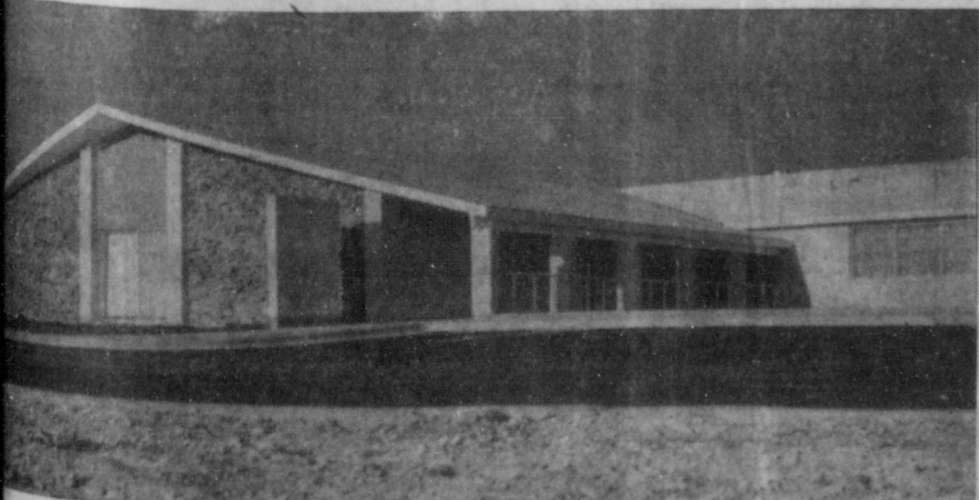
The council authorized the city manager to purchase additional stop signs and to have them installed at various locations where needed. Also to see about replacing some worn out furniture in the city hall.

Eagles Fall To San Saba 31-14; Host Marble Falls Friday Night

All predictions that the San Saba Armadillos would outscore the Goldthwaite Eagles by at least three touchdowns seemed

far-fetched up until the fourth quarter of the season opener Friday night, when the AA 'Dillos rushed over the goal twice to down the Eagles by 17 points.

Although the Eagles trailed during the entire game, they hit hard and kept a steady pace to give the 'Dillos a real contest. The non-district battle on Rogan Field was the first real action for the young Eagle team this season.

Head Coach, Les Johnson, felt that the Eagles played exceptionally well in the last half. "We made a lot of mistakes that hurt, like three fumbles and two pass interceptions, but the last half of the game was ours as far as playing is concerned," he stated.

San Saba back Joe Ellis opened the scoring early in the first quarter when he broke through

the Eagle line for a 60-yard touchdown sprint. Bobby Galindo's PAT was good for a 7-0 lead over the Eagles.

A minute later the Eagles came back with a 45-yard touchdown pass from QB Johnny Johnson to Kennon McLean. The PAT failed and the Eagles trailed by only one point.

Shortly before the close of the first period on a first and goal, Ellis went up the middle for San Saba's second score to make it 13-6.

After the ensuing kick-off, the ball changed hands several times as both teams seemed plagued with bad luck. An Eagle punt was blocked and picked off by 'Dillo Gary Kemp. Then on San Saba's first down the ball was fumbled and covered by Mac Casbeer, Eagle tackle. The Eagles were forced to punt on their next fourth down and San Saba followed with an attempted field goal which fell short. Another blocked Eagle punt gave the 'Dillos possession inside the Eagle 20 yard line, and following a drive to the end zone, San Saba QB, Dave Davenport, went over on a keeper play to rack up a 13-point lead.

Following the kick-off the Eagles gained three first downs in as many plays. Johnson ac-

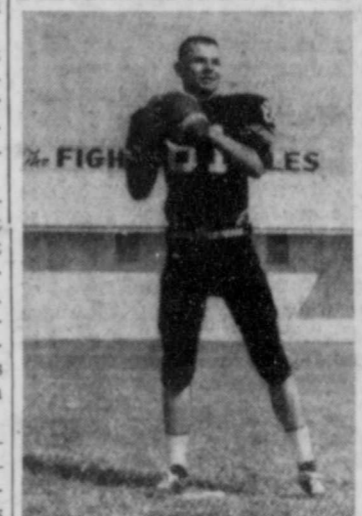

Jody Langford Named Semifinalist In Nat. Merit Scholarship Program

Hoyett Browning, principal of Goldthwaite High School, has announced that Joseph Shelby (Jody) Langford, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe S. Langford, has been named a Semifinalist in the 1969-70 National Merit Scholarship Program.

The 15,000 Semifinalists appointed today are among the nation's most intellectually talented high school seniors. They will compete for about 3,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1970.

The Semifinalists were the highest scorers in their states on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST), which was given last February to some 750,000 students in 17-250 schools nationwide. They constitute less than 1 per cent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States.

Semifinalists must advance to Finalist standing to be considered for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded next spring. Semifinalists become Finalists by receiving the endorsement of their schools, substantiating their high NMQST performance on a second examination, and providing information about their achievements and interests.

High school grades, accomplishments, leadership qualities, and extra-curricular achievements of the Finalists are evaluated, along with test scores, in selecting Merit Scholarship winners.

Names of the 1969-70 Merit Scholarship winners will be announced April 30, 1970. Some 21,600 students have received Merit Scholarships in the four-

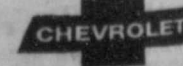

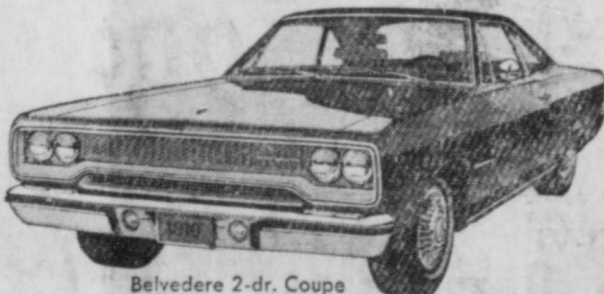

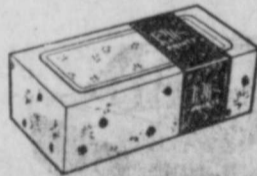

News From Your Agricultural Extension Service-Texas A. & M. College System

September is National Better Breakfast Month. Those who skip or skimp on breakfast feel let down in mid-to late-morning. Work output is lower.

Weight control efforts are more difficult to control when breakfast is skipped. Lack of an adequate breakfast increases the feeling of hunger in late morning. This often causes one to overeat at the next meal. As a result, total calories for the day may increase. This is what the weight watcher doesn't want.

A person should receive from 1/4 to 1/3 of his daily calorie and protein needs at breakfast. For an interesting change on the breakfast menu, bake and freeze a batch of your favorite muffins. Add important nutrients to quick breads by adding wheat germ to your recipes. Use 1/4 cup wheat germ and 3/4

cup flour for each cup of flour called for in the recipe. These muffins, thawed and reheated, will make a grand addition to the family breakfast.

Here is a tasty recipe for:
Banana Cereal Muffins
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/3 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups corn flakes, crushed to make 1 cup crumbs
1/3 cup chopped pecans
1 egg, beaten
1/4 cup melted shortening or cooking oil
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup milk
1 cup mashed bananas
1 teaspoon vanilla
Combine flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar; sift into bowl. Stir in cereal and pecans. Combine remaining ingredients; add to dry ingredients. Stir just until dry ingredients are moistened. Spoon batter into greased muffin pans, filling pans about 2/3 full. Bake in hot oven (400 F.) until done and lightly browned, 18 to 20 minutes. Yield: 12 muffins.

News About Social Security

Persons 65 or older enrolled for the medical part of Medicare may be able to receive partial reimbursement toward the purchase or rental of durable medical equipment needed for use in their home.
Glen McNatt, of the Brownwood Social Security Office, said this provision is not new but perhaps is one of the least known.

He pointed out that some patients need, for use at home, such things as wheelchairs, hospital beds, special walkers, or oxygen equipment if such appliances have been prescribed by a physician, the patient may apply for partial reimbursement of the rental or purchase price. If the equipment is used in a hospital or nursing home, however, Medicare cannot pay.

In submitting claims for reimbursement, the patient must attach an itemized bill for rental or purchase, and a doctor's statement showing equipment is needed and estimate of the length of time it will be required.
Reimbursement usually will be in monthly installments.

According to Coach Jones, Ronald was the team's top receiver, punter, extra kicker, kick-off specialist, and chunked left-handed in the handed aerial attack.

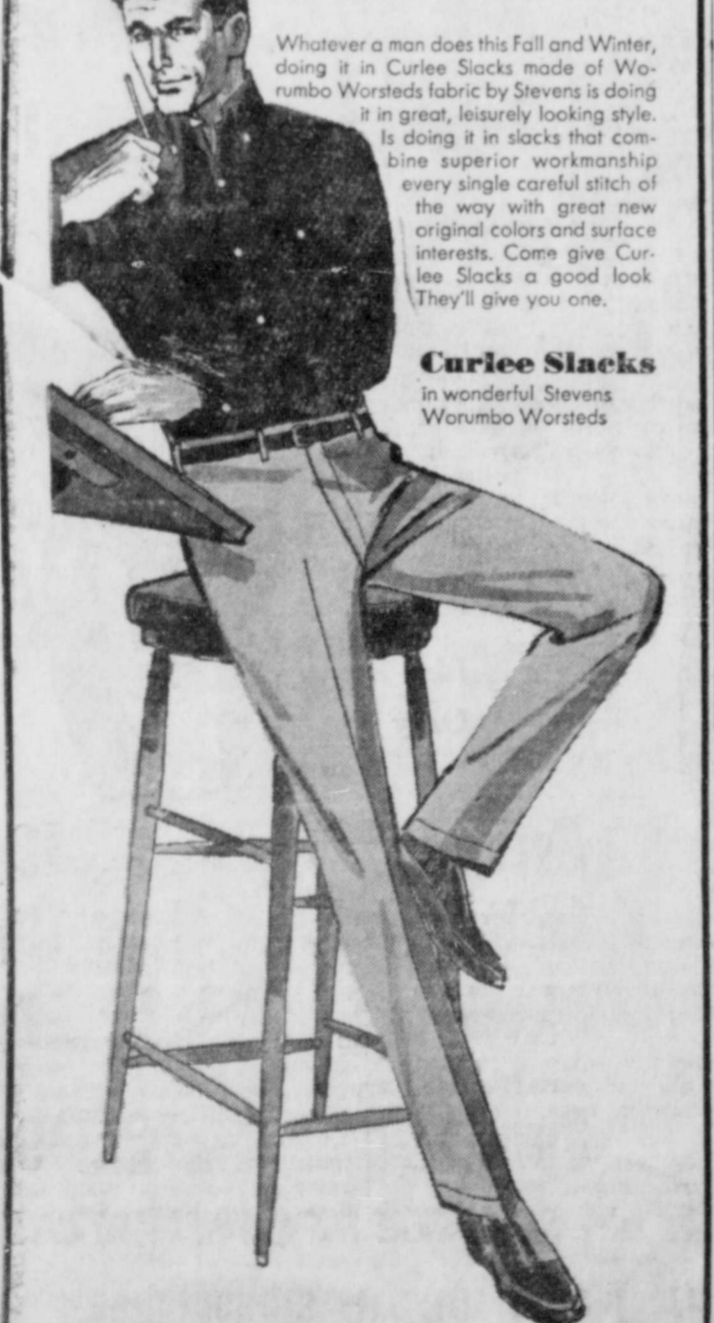
