The non-conference tilt begins at 7:30 p. m. on the field. This will be the last home game of the season. The final district game was played Friday night, November 14, when the Eagles go to the road.

The "B" Eagles travel to Bertram this Friday night, November 7, to take on the strong B team. Bertram averages 30 points down the line and have a fine 195-pound fullback. On November 13, the "B" Eagles close out their season with the "B" Lions at Dublin.

Request For Gas Rate Increase Presented To Council By Lone Star

Lone Star Gas Company Monday night asked the Goldthwaite City Council for a rate increase for local gas consumers amounting to approximately 25 per cent.

L. J. Ward, Goldthwaite, and Al Raesener, San Saba, appeared before the City Council meeting in regular session and presented the request for the increase.

The Gas Company representatives in asking the council for the increase presented detailed information with financial statements showing the need for an increase at this time.

The Council postponed action on the request until a later date when the entire membership of the council can be present. Two Aldermen, Lester Geeslin and Hollis Wiggins were unable to attend the Monday night meeting. Those present included Mayor Ray Duren and Aldermen Harvey Parker, E. R. Bruce and Carl Letbetter.

OTHER BUSINESS

City Manager W. C. Barnett presented operating statements of receipts and disbursements for the various city departments for October. He also reported on tax collections and other activities and work projects.

The Council adopted ordinances calling for rate increase in sewer charges and garbage collection fees. These increases had been approved by the council at their October meeting.

Barnett reported that a new pickup truck had been ordered and that he hoped to get work started this week on the first phase of sewer system improvements.

He also announced that the State Convention for the Texas Municipal League will be held in San Antonio on November 9 through 11. He and Mrs. Barnett will attend the convention where Barnett will represent the City of Goldthwaite.

Announcement was made that Cable Vision service had improved since complaints of poor reception in color TV were reported at the last meeting and called to the attention of the company.

35.22 Inches Of Rain Here In Ten Months

Goldthwaite received 35.22 inches of rainfall during the first 10 months of this year, January through October, according to official record kept by Weatherman Harry Allen.

October proved to be a whopper of a month for rainfall with 13.77 inches of precipitation recorded here.

This year's rainfall for the 10 months was almost five inches more than the 30.56 inches during the same period of 1968 and more than double the 16.47 inches during the same period in 1967.

Little Politics Talked In County As Eagle Political Calendar Opens

The first primary election will be held on the first Saturday in May and the run-off primary election will be held in June.

The deadline for candidates to officially file for office is in February.

**U. S. Bond Sales
Are Short Of Goal
In Mills County**

W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee, announced today that the sale of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares during the month of September totaled \$6,930.00 in Mills County. Sales for the nine-month period were \$23,261 and this is 38 per cent of the county's 1969 goal of \$60,000.

September sales in Texas were \$14,480,583 as compared to \$13,508,678 during September cent — an increase of 7 per cent. Year-to-date sales were \$134,116,669 — 78.8 per cent of the state's goal of \$170.1 million.

Over the Nation, September investments of Bonds/Freedom Shares totaled \$351 million, with Freedom Shares accounting for \$30 million of the total, which was 27 per cent above September 1968 Note sales. Sales for the nine-month period were \$3.6 billion for 74.6 per cent of the national goal of \$4,861,800,000.

Motorists Reminded Of New Look For Vehicle Inspection Program

Effective September 1, 1969, the Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection program has a new look. The inspection certificate is now located in the lower left corner of the windshield and is valid for twelve calendar months. The date of expiration is now determined by the month in which the vehicle was inspected.

As an example: the vehicle that has been inspected anytime during the month of October, 1969, must be re-inspected by the last day of October, 1970. This same year-round 12 month period applies to vehicles inspected during any calendar month. Their inspection certificate will expire twelve months later, on the last day of the month in which the inspection was performed.

The new inspection certificate, in addition to being placed in a new location on your windshield, will also have a number tab, 1 through 12, placed on the inspection certificate; this number tab will show the month of expiration, 12 months from the date of inspection.

To obtain the new inspection certificate with the least amount of delay, and at the same time get a more efficient inspection, The Department of Public Safety urges all motorists to have their vehicles inspected as early as possible. This will

give the motorist a feeling of security as winter, with possible bad weather, approaches.

The Department of Public Safety reminds you that this is your program and its success depends on you, the motoring public. You can help make the program a success by not permitting shoddy, incomplete inspections on your own vehicle and by reporting violations of the inspection procedure when you are aware of them.

With the holiday season fast approaching we need to pay special attention to the care of glassware. Daily care can give glassware a brilliant, sparkling look. Two main rules for proper washing are handle gently and wash immediately after use.

Glasses that held milk, tea, or coffee should be rinsed soon after use since these often leave rings which are difficult to remove by normal washing. Remove stains, such as lipstick, with a paper towel before washing. Wash glassware with mild soap or detergent and hot water. Glass has more sparkle after drying if detergent is used. A few drops of ammonia or blueing in the wash water adds lustre to glassware.

Handle stemware carefully; hold by the base of the bowl, not by the stem. Do not suddenly douse glasses in hot water if they held iced drinks. Sudden temperature changes break some glasses.

He is also a member of the Advisory Committee of the Cotton Research Committee of Texas and is presently vice-president of the Black Land Cotton and Grain Producers.

The joint appointment made

by the Speaker and the Lieutenant Governor is Scruggs, editor and vice-president of the Progressive Farmer.

Authorized by H. C. R. 1213, the Committee will continue work initiated by the Committee during the 60th Legislature. Studies and recommendations will be made as to the use of fiber blends of all types, including an evaluation of economics of use of synthetic combination with natural fibers.

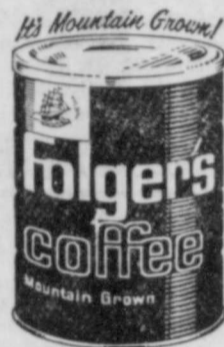

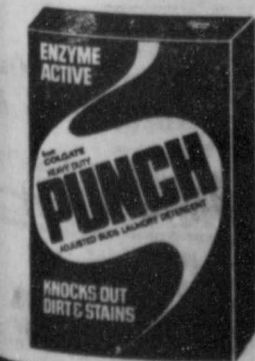

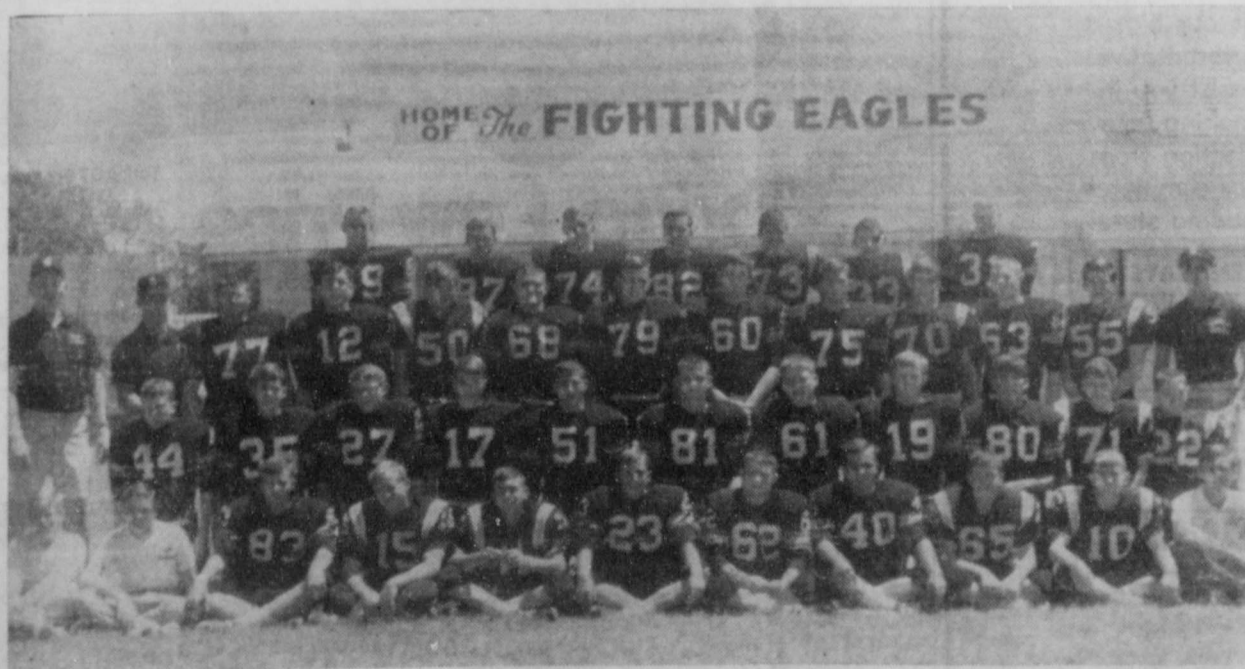

**Provisions Of
Gun Law Defined
By IRS Official**

"The Gun Control Act of 1968 was passed by Congress to help Federal, State and local law enforcement officials in their fight against crime and violence," Carl Booth, IRS Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Chief Special Investigator for Texas, said today, adding that it was in no way intended to hinder the activities of hunters and sportsmen.

As an example, Mr. Booth said hunters and sportsmen can purchase ammunition in any state, and likewise can carry their own firearms across a state line as long as they are not convicted felons, or under indictment for a felony; fugitives from justice; unlawful users of drugs; or mental incompetents.

Further, Mr. Booth said hunters, sportsmen, competitive shooters, or anyone legally us-

ing a gun in a state other than his home state can acquire another firearm if his rifle or shotgun is lost, stolen, or becomes inoperative.

He said the law requires only that the buyer in these circumstances make out an affidavit for the dealer's records, and provide the dealer with the title of the chief law enforcement officer in the locality where he lives.

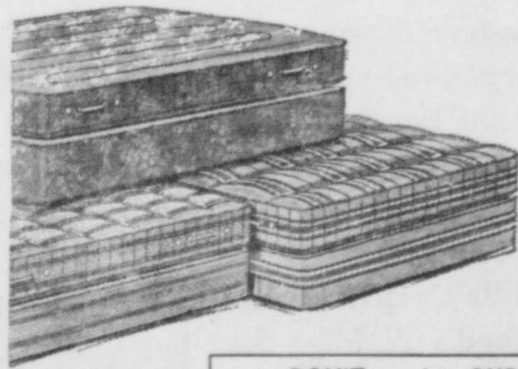
