## New System Starting In January To Make License Buying Easier

Here's a happy thought to start the New Year! As an auto owner you'll have an easier time than ever before getting your new license tags in 1970. This, thanks to a revised registration system which becomes effective in January, according to announcement by the Texas Highway Department and H. G. Brooks, Mills County Tax Assessor-Collector in Goldthwaite.

Texas Highway Department, which devised the new system, predicts that registrations will pass the seven million mark.

For the first time, registration renewal applications will be mailed to every vehicle owner in the state. This will be done during the month of January. However, the registration period does not begin until February 1.

Be on the lookout for your application. It will arrive in a slender envelope marked "Im-

portant — This is your license plate renewal application." Don't throw it away as junk mail. It's very important!

Your application is a three-part form which should not be torn apart. Instructions are included in the form.

At the start of the registration period, you may take your application and fee to your county tax office—or order by mail.

It no longer will be necessary to present certificates of title or last year's registration receipt when you have the application.

Waiting lines at the tax office or substation should be shorter. All the clerks need to do is take your money, slap a sticker on the application form—showing your registration number and other data—and hand over the 1970 plates.

April 1 is the registration deadline, but mail applications cut off on March 1. Those who want plates sent by mail should send the application form to the county tax collector along with the registration fee (plus \$1 for handling and postage). Be sure your correct address is shown on the renewal form!

This new system is the result of extensive computerization of highway department vehicle records. It gives Texas one of the most efficient methods of registration. And even the color scheme is new — light blue on a reflective white background.

## Two Dead After Train-Pickup Crash

Two San Saba County residents are dead as a result of a train-pickup crash here Monday afternoon at 3:42 p. m. at the Fifth Street Crossing. Both were residents of Cherokee.

Sheriff H. G. Brooks said that Mrs. Doris McLerran Gray, 36, was pronounced dead at the scene and Joe A. Cavness, 36, was dead on arrival at Scott & White Hospital in Temple. He was first carried by Wilkins Ambulance to Childress Clinic & Hospital where he received emergency treatment before being taken to Temple.

The bodies were taken to Howell-Doran Funeral Home in San Saba.

The incident was investigated by Sheriff Brooks, his deputy Randal Ratliff and Department of Public Safety patrolman Dwain Cohn.

The 32nd annual show will be held here on Friday and Saturday, January 9 and 10, 1970. Exhibitors are reminded that January 6 is the last day for entries to be turned in to the show secretary, according to rules adopted for the annual show.

The show, which is sponsored by the association, will be held in Goldthwaite in the show barns. New catalogs are now being distributed. These catalogs advertising the 1970 show and give more detailed information with the program for the two day event.

Copies of the new catalog may be obtained from officers of the association and from the county agent, H. D. agent, or vocational agriculture teachers of the county.

through Mr. Conradt at the Production Credit Association office. These cards have been distributed to the county agent and vocational agriculture teachers in Goldthwaite, Mullin, Priddy and Star.

All 4-H and FFA members are asked to have their entry cards filled out and turned in as soon as possible.

Unofficial temperature readings were several degrees below freezing both Monday and Tuesday.

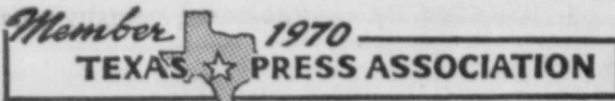

On December 31, one group of the Epworth League entertained the other groups and several invited guests with a night watch service at the Methodist Church.

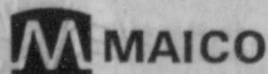

### Aliens Required To Report Address During January

District Director, John W. Holland, San Antonio, Texas of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, estimated that 103,000 aliens will report their addresses in the San Antonio Area during January under the Federal Alien Address Report Program.

The Immigration official said that 102,517 aliens reported their addresses during January 1969.

Holland said that all non-citizens, except those in diplomatic status and foreign representatives of certain international organizations are required to file the address report.

He added that any alien who willfully violates the address report requirement may be subject to serious penalties.

In addition, aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their addresses to the Service within 10 days after their return.

The District Director said that address report cards will be available at the Immigration and Naturalization Service office at San Antonio and local United States post offices beginning January 1, 1970.

### Aliens Required To Report Address During January

District Director, John W. Holland, San Antonio, Texas of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, estimated that 103,000 aliens will report their addresses in the San Antonio Area during January under the Federal Alien Address Report Program.

The Immigration official said that 102,517 aliens reported their addresses during January 1969.

Holland said that all non-citizens, except those in diplomatic status and foreign representatives of certain international organizations are required to file the address report.

He added that any alien who willfully violates the address report requirement may be subject to serious penalties.

In addition, aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their addresses to the Service within 10 days after their return.

The District Director said that address report cards will be available at the Immigration and Naturalization Service office at San Antonio and local United States post offices beginning January 1, 1970.
