32nd Mills County Livestock Show Scheduled This Friday And Saturday

To Feature Exhibits Of Local FFA, FHA And 4-H Club Members

The 32nd annual Mills County Livestock Show will be held here this Friday and Saturday, January 9 and 10, at the Mills County Show Barns.

According to Charles Conradt, president of the Mills County Livestock Raisers' Association, sponsor of this event each year, plans have been completed and the show will be ready for opening Friday morning.

This year's show will have 166 entries, according to report Tuesday noon. Mr. Conradt stated that a few more entries were expected before the closing deadline Tuesday night.

All livestock must be in the show barns by 8:30 a. m., January 9 and remain until 4:30 p. m., January 10, according to show officials.

Many students are members of the 4-H, FFA and FHA clubs, and will be exhibiting their projects at the annual show.

Farm Ownership Loans Help Expand Family Farm Operations

Many Brown and Mills County farmers are taking advantage of the Farmers Home Administration farm ownership loan program to expand their farming operations.

According to Harold Kennedy, FFA County Supervisor for Brown and Mills Counties, farmers have a better chance to succeed in farming when their operations have been expanded to a size to make better use of their labor, land resources and equipment.

Kennedy also stated that 75% of the farm ownership loans distributed in Brown and Mills Counties last year were used to expand farming operations.

Borrowers have up to 40 years to repay farm ownership loans. These loans are tailored to the borrower's needs and ability to pay. "In many cases," Kennedy said, "a borrower can make larger payments in years of high income to build up a reserve that may keep the loan in good standing during years of low income."

In addition to farm ownership loans, the Farmers Home Administration advances credit for rural housing in communities with a 5,500 population, development of community water and sewer systems, payment of farm operation expenses, emergency loans of farmers and to raise

Complaints About Blocked Alleys Reported At Council Meet Monday

Report was made at the City Council meeting Monday night that city officials have received a number of complaints in recent days about illegal parking on city streets and especially in some alleys.

It was pointed out that cars and trucks have been parked in some alleys to the extent of blocking traffic completely for a number of hours at a time, creating a definite hazard.

After some discussion the Council authorized City Manager W. C. Barnett to prepare and place a notice in the paper calling attention to this and asking public cooperation in clearing up the problem. The Notice appears in this issue of the Eagle.

The City does not have a traffic law enforcement officer or city court to work on a situation of this type. It was pointed out that unless there is public cooperation the City could be forced to the additional expense of providing an officer and city court to take care of it.

OTHER BUSINESS
Operating reports were presented to the Council by City

Manager W. C. Barnett covering receipts and disbursements of the various departments for the month of December. Barnett also presented the quarterly treasurer's report.

He also gave a progress report on work being done on sewer system improvements and installation of new extensions. Work is progressing on a satisfactory basis on the first part of the three phase program which was recently approved and undertaken by the city.

The City's engineer is expected to make additional surveys and establish grades on the second phase of the sewer improvement project and work will be started there.

The Council passed on second reading the ordinance granting an increase in rates to Lone Star Gas Company for service to local consumers.

The Mills County Young Homemakers will not meet tonight (Thursday) as regularly scheduled, it was announced this week by president, Carolyn Tiemann. The meeting was cancelled due to the heavy schedules of the advisors, who will be working with the registrations in the clothing and foods divisions of the Livestock Show. Two meetings will be held in February, dates to be announced later.

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County Voter Registrations Are Picking Up

Voter registrations in Mills County for the new year are picking up, but, there is still a long way to go, according to announcement by H. G. Brooks, Sheriff, and Tax Assessor-Collector.

As of Tuesday noon, 1,448 Mills County residents had registered to vote in the forthcoming elections during 1970, according to Brooks.

This is running ahead of a year ago when registration was running at a slow pace at this time of January.

Current registrations reflect that little over one-half of the approximately 2,500 potential voter strength is registered, with just over three weeks left before the deadline on January 31.

Last year only 2,056 county residents registered and were eligible to vote while two years ago over 2,600 registered.

Everyone must register to vote. There is no charge or fee involved.

Deadline for registering is January 31, as pointed out in official notice with voter application form appearing in this issue of the paper.

Any member of the immediate family may register other members of the family. Those who can not come to the tax assessor's office may fill out the application form in the paper and mail it to the tax office.

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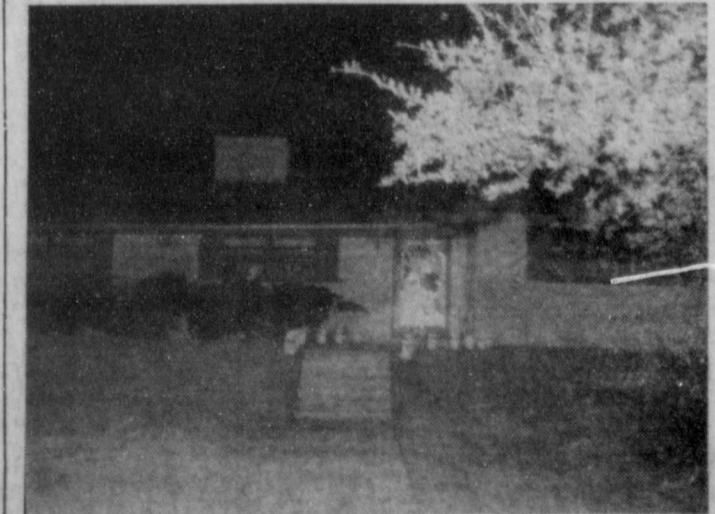

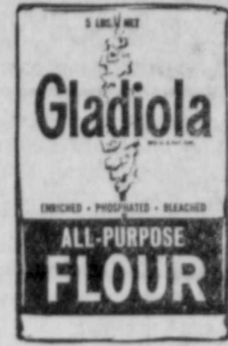

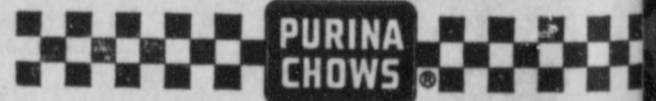

Texans Are Reminded To Register Before Deadline On January 31

Lagging voter registration may spell bad news for Democratic officials, according to no less an authority than U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough.

Yarborough called a news conference in the Statehouse the day after State Republican Chairman William Steger of Tyler announced Texas GOP's plan to field strong candidates for both senator and governor this year.

Steger cited a poll as the basis of Republican hopes, but Yarborough said registration statistics, not polls, are the real cause for Democrats to be wary. He said 80 per cent of Republican strength already has registered in such large counties as Harris, Dallas and Midland, while the sign-up is poor in traditional Democratic strongholds.

On that same day, Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. urged all eligible adult Texans to exercise their constitutional rights by registering. Dies is the state's chief election officer. January 31 is the registration deadline. Dies issued these reminders:

- Any citizen 21 years of age or older on the day of an election, who has been a resident of the state for at least one year and a resident of his home

county for six months immediately preceding the election, is qualified to register for voting.

• Eligible persons may register by personal appearance at the main office, branch office or authorized substation of the home county tax assessor-collector. Written applications may also be made to the tax assessor-collector.

• The husband, wife, mother, father, son or daughter of a voter may act as his agent in registering if the agent is a qualified voter.

• A person who moves to Texas after October 1 may register during the regular period or afterward but must have been registered for 30 days before voting.

• Any person who will meet qualifications before February 23, 1971, may register during the regular period. Those who will become 21 after January 31 may register during the regular period or after.

Garden Club Holds Meeting

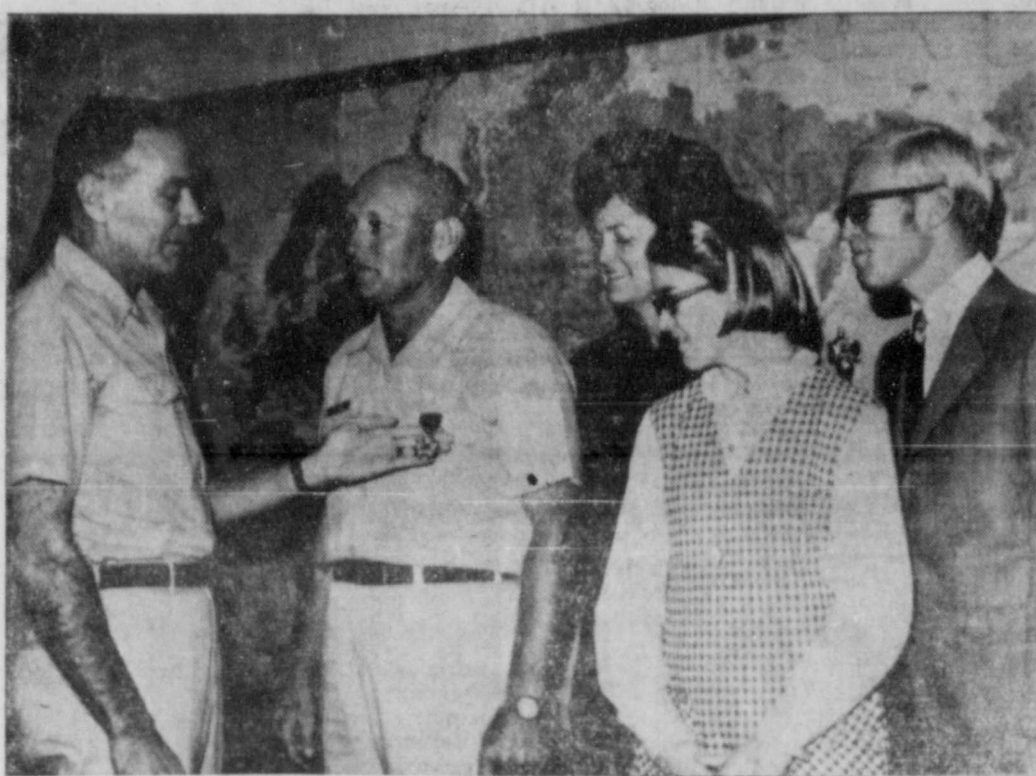
The Goldthwaite Garden Club held its December meeting at the Jennie Trent Dew Library Club Room.

License Plate Buying Is Easier Under New Registration System

When the owners of Texas' seven million motor vehicles get their 1970 license plates, they will find that the Texas Highway Department has taken a lot of frustration out of registration, according to H. G. Brooks, Mills County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Owners will receive motor vehicle registration applications by mail early in January.

This three-part form is the key to convenience.

In previous years, the vehicle owner had to hunt up his certificate of title and last year's license receipt and take them to the tax office or a substation. Often, he found himself at the end of a long, slow-moving line.

The lines should be much shorter this year. And there are provisions for license plates by mail.

Here's how easy it is:

If a motorist goes to the county tax office or a substation, all he need take is the three-part form—the motor vehicle registration application—that came in the mail. And the registration fee, of course.

If he should find a line, chances are it will be shorter and faster-moving than any he remembered from previous years.

All he needs do is present the renewal application and pay the fee. The clerk will validate the application with the new license numbers and return part of the form as a receipt.

Another part of the form is retained for the county's records and the third is sent to the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

Should the vehicle owner decide to register his vehicle by mail, he sends the entire renewal application, the fee and an additional \$1 to his county tax officer. The \$1 additional charge is provided by statute to cover the cost of handling and postage.

The registration "season" begins at county tax offices and substations on February 1. The vehicle owner can register his vehicle in person until April 1. If he wants his plates mailed to him, he must send in his ap-

plication, the fee and the postage and handling charge to his county tax officer by March 1.

This allows 30 days for delivery before 1970 license plates must be displayed after midnight, April 1.

Easy-to-follow instructions are printed on the three-part form. The Highway Department asks that the owner leave the form intact and that he separate the three parts.

The new system is the product of many months of planning and work. The system began taking shape in 1967 with the installation of the first computer equipment by the Highway Department.

At one stage, 500 inmates of the Texas Department of Corrections were engaged in making records and converting the records into a format suitable to be put into computers.

The new system gives Texas one of the most modern and efficient systems for maintaining accurate and up-to-date records on motor vehicles in the world.

The big beneficiary, however, is the vehicle owner who realizes extra convenience and big savings in time.
