## License Plate Buying Is Easier **Under New Registration System**

Owners will receive motor vehicle registration applications by mail early in January.

This three-part form is the key to convenience.

In previous years, the vehicle owner had to hunt up his certificate of title and last year's license receipt and take them to the tax office or a substation. Often, he found himself at the end of a long, slow-moving line.

The lines should be 'much shorter this year. And there are provisions for license plates by mail.

Here's how easy it is:

If a motorist goes to the county tax office or a substation, all he need take is the three-part form-the motor vehicle registration application that came in the mail. And the egistration fee, of course.

If he should find a line, chances are it will be shorter and faster-moving than any he remembered from previous

All he needs do is to present the renewal application and pay the fee. The clerk will validate the application with the new license numbers and return part of the form as a receipt.
