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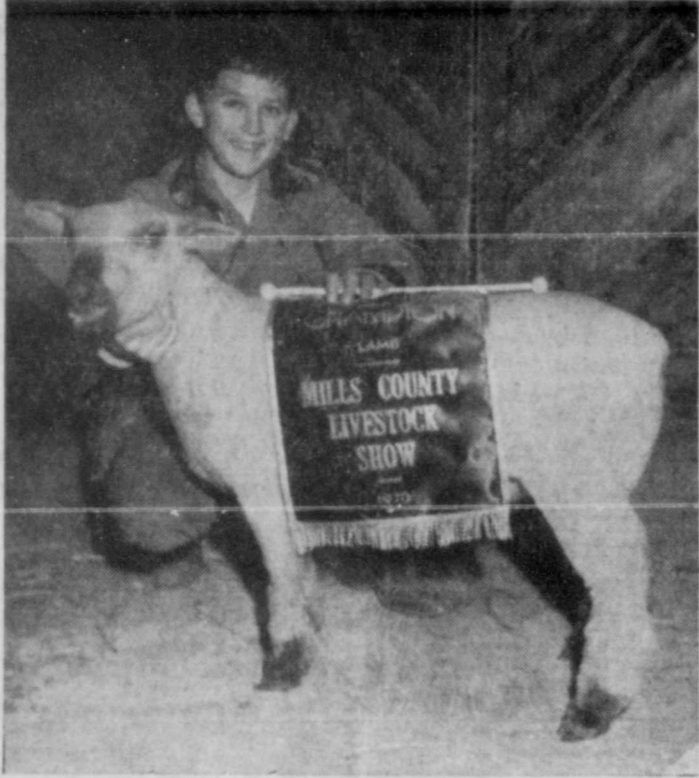

The Education Service Center from Waco will begin a series of in-service training workshops for the teachers of Goldthwaite schools and surrounding areas today (Thursday) at Goldthwaite High School and the elementary school, according to announcement by Supt. Gilbert Davis.

Elementary teachers will be studying art, and high school and elementary English teachers will study linguistics. Other teachers will study evaluations, methods of grading, and the helping of high school students.

Today's workshop will begin at 2:45 p. m. and will be conducted until 5:00 p. m.

Supt. Davis announced that out of necessity, the Goldthwaite schools will be dismissed at 2:30 p. m. today (Thursday) and on each of the following dates while other workshops will be held: January 29, February 5th, 19th and 26th.

County Voter Registration Moving Slowly

Voter registration in Mills County is moving along rather slowly at this time with less than three weeks to go before the deadline.

H. G. Brooks, Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector, announced Tuesday morning that 1,552 county residents had registered. This is out of a possible 2,500 that could be expected to register for the county.

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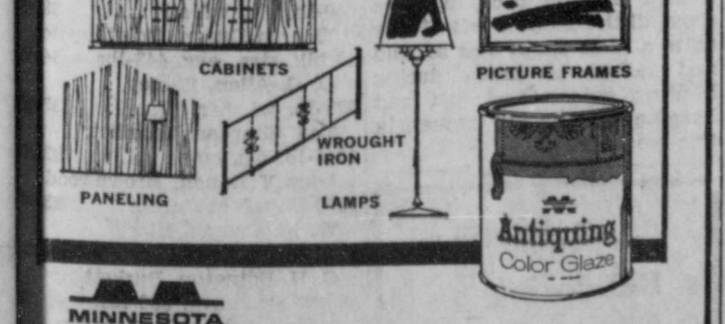

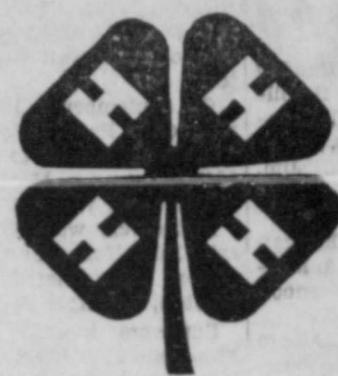

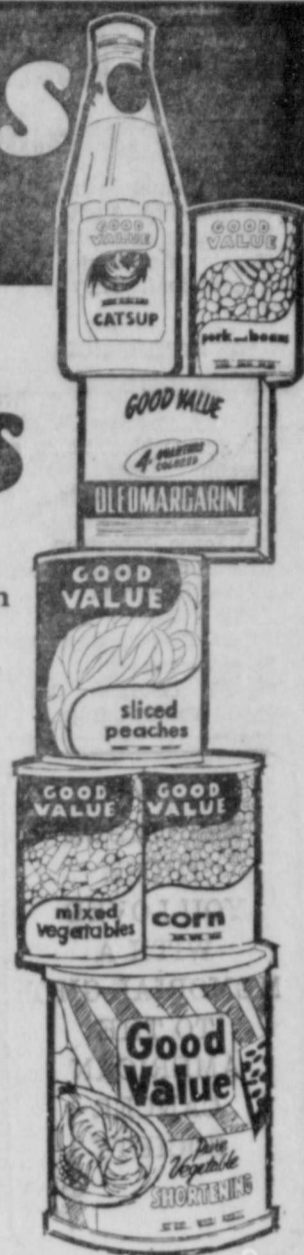
