Library Fund Still Short \$350 \$1,000 Goal On Challenge

Mills County citizens are short on meeting the goal of raising \$1,000.00 for the Jennie Dew Library fund to which they have been challenged by a resident outside Mills County.

W. P. Duren announced this week that \$650 has been pledged by 11 contributors and the prospects are very good that the challenge will be met and the goal will be reached shortly.

Official notice of contributors to this special library fund to date with special appeal for enough additional support to meet the goal appears on another page of this paper. This report shows contributions amounting to \$650 with only \$350

more needed to reach the goal. This leaves only seven more at \$50.00 each to go, according to the appeal.

This all started a while back when the "Outsider" mailed a check in the amount of \$50.00 to W. P. Duren, at Mills County State Bank, to be given to the library provided 20 citizens of Mills County would each give a similar amount.

Unless enough persons come forth with \$50.00 to match the donation, the money will have to be returned, according to Duren.

January 31, is the last day for paying 1969 taxes without penalty.

Unpaid taxes for 1969 will begin carrying a penalty starting February 1, in all of the taxing agencies.

Mohair Council Urges Attendance At Annual Meeting In San Angelo

The annual membership meeting of the Mohair Council of America will be held at 10 a. m. Wednesday, January 28, at the Cactus Hotel in San Angelo, reports Dolph Briscoe Jr. of Uvalde, president of the fiber promotion organization.

Highlighting the meeting will be election of new directors and officers, approval of the Council's 1970-71 budget and discussions on product and market development, advertising, publicity and promotion activities.

Speakers from various segments of the textile industry will review work being done to boost sales of mohair and will discuss projections for the 1970's, Briscoe said.

Keister N. Adams of Washington, D. C., U. S. Department of Agriculture official, will discuss the mohair referendum and is expected to report on plans being discussed now for a Foreign Trade Commission.

"This meeting is the most important Council session to be held this year," said Briscoe. "Every mohair producer should make every effort to attend and participate." He urged growers to bring their wives to the meeting, as numerous fashions and

Livestock Sold At Annual Show Nets Good Premiums For Exhibitors

The sales committee members of the 32nd annual Mills County Livestock Show are pleased with the response from interested stock show boosters-buyers, according to Layton Black, chairman of the committee.

Actually, the response was so good that a number of club show boosters again failed to get an animal when the hogs and lambs ran out before the

list of buyers was filled, Black reported.

All hogs and lambs brought good premium prices for club members who offered their exhibition stock for sale.

Sixty-one head of hogs and lambs sold. The sale included 32 hogs and 29 lambs.

Arrangements were made in advance for buyers for all hogs and lambs that were to be offered for sale.

Y. B. Johnson who was in

charge of the advance sales stated: "This was the best sale ever for the club boys and girls from the standpoint of buyer response at the auction." Other members of the sales committee were: Sig Jernigan, Don Geeslin, Joe S. Langford, John Smith and Thurman Johnson.

The grand champion hog brought 55¢ per pound. It weighed 205 lbs. and sold for \$112.75. Buyer was Roy Wilkins Funeral Home. The grand champion lamb brought 66¢ per pound with the Brownwood Cattle Auction as the buyer. It weighed 85 lbs. and sold for \$56.10.

All of the lambs sold for a total of \$1,015.91. The hogs, sold for \$2,484.25. Together the hogs and lambs brought a nice sum of \$3,500.16.

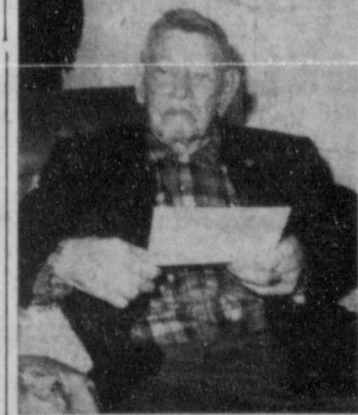
Mr. Shelton was born January 16, 1870, in Jackson County, North Carolina, where he lived until he was 12 years old before moving to Ellis County, Texas. Two years later his family moved to Turkey Peak near Zephyr. About 75 years ago he married and moved to Mullin Creek, and he has lived near there ever since.

In 1900, after a crop failure, he got a job working for the railroad at \$1.15 a day working 10 hours a day. Other times he worked for the railroad hauling wood, one cord a day seven miles with a team of oxen.

In 1940 he worked in a grocery store and paid his first social security tax. In January, 1949, he received his first social security check at the age of 79 and has continued to receive checks for the past 21 years.

Mr. Shelton is still active and can read his Bible on a bright sunny day. When asked his secret for long life, he said, "Eat regular meals at the same time each day, eat a little even if you are not hungry." It must really work as he has most of his teeth and can still take a "hefty chaw of plug tobacco."

Mr. Shelton has given his consent to use his story to help inform people about social security.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Conner of Williams Ranch, announce the arrival of a nine pound daughter on the 18th of January, 1930.

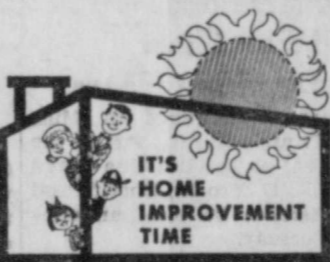

In accordance with statutory authorization as provided by Article 7336 and Article 7336f of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas . . . the penalty will be 1% if paid in Feb. . . 2% if paid in Mar. . . 3% if paid in Apr. . . 4% if paid in May, 5% if paid in June . . . 8% if paid in July. The Interest will be 1/2% if paid in Feb. and will increase 1/2% each and every month until delinquent taxes are paid.

County went to soldiers who had been in Vietnam only a short while. The three letters received by Mrs. Long expressed appreciation and the thought that acts such as this helped "make our Christmas a little less unbearable under very strange and very different circumstances this year."

On Christmas Day, seventy-six years ago, a young Mississippi maiden caught the first glimpse of her Central Texas home — a little log cabin situated approximately two miles northwest of the little township of Mullin.

Miss Exa Jane Sanders was born in Meridian, Lee County, Mississippi on November 15, 1874 and passed away on November 17, 1969 just two days after her ninety-fifth birthday.

She was a loyal daughter to her parents, Marion Jones and Eunice Jane Burks Sanders; a devoted sister to her brothers and sisters; Alice Sanders, Ele Sanders, Adeline (Addie) Summy, James (Jim) Sanders, William J. (Will) Sanders, and Lula Burleson; and "more than an Aunt" to her immediate nephews and nieces: Lella Elkins, Mary Herndon, Willis Sanders, Winnie Irbly, Julia Seabourtn, Exa Mae Weaver, Marion Jones Sanders, Thomas Jones Sanders, Walter Summy, Earl Summy, Weldon Summy, Raymond Summy, Lillian Thorn, Addie Mae Fowler, Nina Phillips, J. P. Sanders, Roy Sanders, Walter W. Sanders, Mollie Lou Garren, Belle Davis, Prentice Sanders, Glynn Sanders, Jack Sanders, Lucille Jenke, Daisy Lee Boyles, Edward Sanders, Ruby Alldredge, Ruby Savoy, Hilton Burleson and numerous other nieces and nephews, extending into the sixth generation.

"Miss Exa," as she was affectionately called by her many friends, lived a simple, Christian life. Her motto was "Love One Another" and she firmly believed "that all things work together for the good of those that love Him." Consequently, she was loved by all, disliked by none. Her strong Christian faith was evidenced by this beautiful thought, penned in her handwriting, found in her Bible: "For in lonely days and lonely nights where none but God can hear, we can leave our burdens with Him, for I know He answers prayers."

This beloved Aunt was a pioneer settler in Mills County, having migrated with her family, in a covered wagon drawn by oxen from Mississippi through Louisiana then on into Texas by train to Comanche where she was met by her uncle, Rufus Burks, and escorted to Mullin in a buggy. She always loved her home and was always thankful for her health, her family and her friends. She was most appreciative of each act of kindness extended to her, and she never failed to say "thank you" and "please." There was always that sweet smile on her beautiful face and that sharp twinkle in her bright blue eyes right up through the most

difficult moments of her life. She remembered to say "thank you" to all who administered to her.

Though the greatest part of her life was spent in Mullin, the last few were spent in the Heritage Home in Goldthwaite where her lovely "room-mate" was her sister, Mrs. Addie Summy. She always enjoyed the short visits which she made to her "children." Age was no problem to her when it came to travelling. She was always ready to go and thoroughly enjoyed getting out.

Once, in her late eighties, it was my pleasure to escort her on a trip south of the border to Old Mexico. After we had crossed the International Bridge over the Rio Grande into Laredo, Old Mexico, she was stricken with the greatest sensation when she exclaimed, "Here I am, out of the State of Texas, outside the boundaries of the United States into Old Mexico... it is just like being in Europe!" She did bring many joyful hours of pleasure to all of us. And, she dearly loved us too.

She loved religious songs, one of her favorite songs was "How Beautiful Heaven Must Be." "Aunt Ekkie," you were more than an Aunt to us — the one we loved best and needed most. Our hearts grieve for you daily our ears constantly listen for your call. Life together was so short—the lonely hours so long! It is joy to know you trusted and counted on our precious Lord to carry you through. Just think! Of stepping on shore and finding it Heaven; of taking hold of a hand and finding it God's hand; of breathing new air and finding it celestial air; of feeling invigorated and finding it Immortality; of passing from storm and tempest into an unknown calm; of waking up and finding it HOME! "Because man goeth to his long home!" Ecclesiastes 12:5. So, Auntie, when you again are walking together in the Paradise of God—walk slowly, and, "look over your shoulder." — we're walking behind!

Mrs. W. A. Elms received a call from her son, W. E. Elms. He reported the weather was cold in his town. They will visit here later.

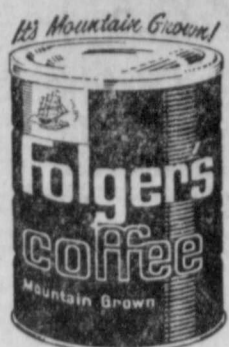

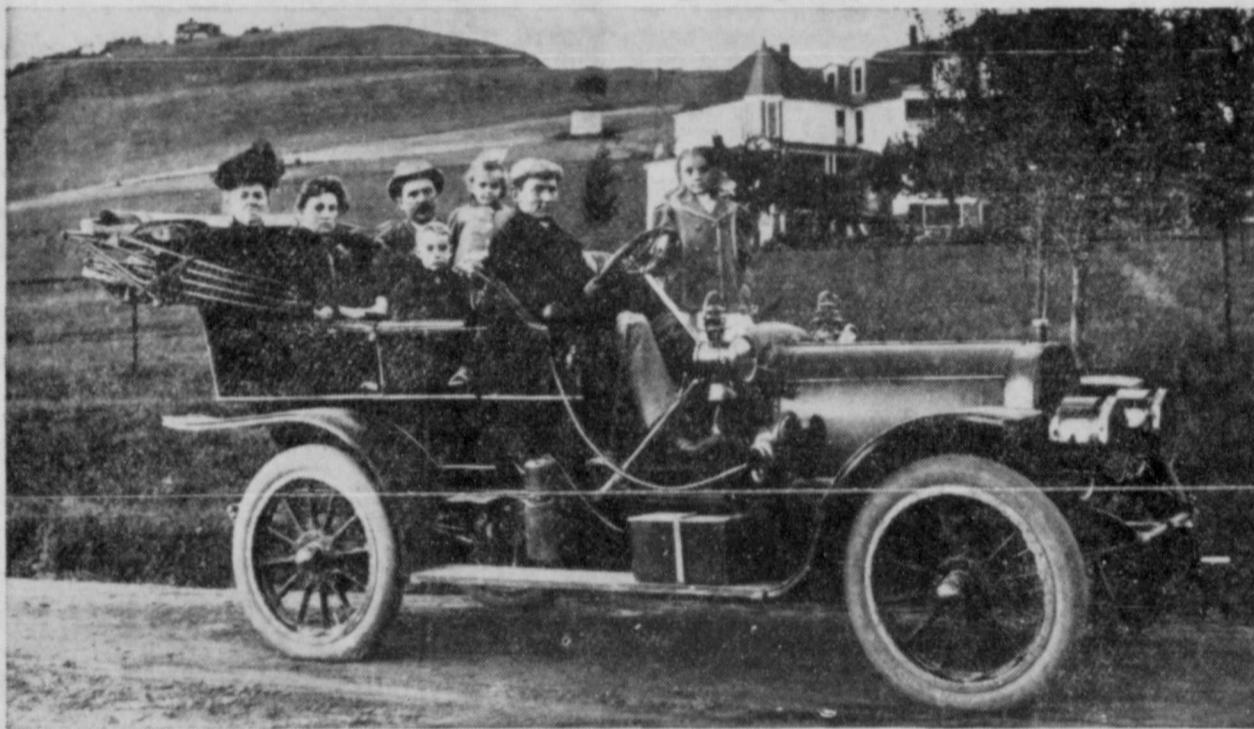

SS Beneficiaries Need Not Apply For 15 Per Cent Benefit Increase

Social security beneficiaries need not apply for the 15 per cent benefit increase just signed into law by President Nixon. "Every one of the 25 million men, women, and children now on the benefit rolls will receive the increase automatically," Robert M. Ball, Commissioner of Social Security, said today.

"The first regular check in the new amount," Commissioner Ball said, "will arrive April 3, the usual day for delivery of benefit checks covering payments for the month of March."

A separate check in the amount of the benefit increase for the months of January and February will reach beneficiaries later in April, probably during the week of April 20.

Refiguring the benefit amount of the 25 million people is a tremendous task, Mr. Ball

pointed out, and it must be done without disrupting the regular benefit payment cycle.

As of the end of December, about one of every eight Americans is now receiving a social security check each month. These monthly payments totaled \$2.2 billion, and the monthly total will go up by \$345 million to more than \$2.5 billion as the 15 per cent increase becomes effective.

The average retirement benefit of \$100 a month will rise to \$116; a couple 65 or older receiving the average couple's benefit of \$170 will have their benefit increased to \$196.

The average benefit for a family made up of a disabled worker, wife, and one or more children will go up from \$237 to \$273; and average payments for a widow and two or more children will rise from \$254 to \$292.

A new division in the Mills County 4-H and FFA Show this year was the Special Pecan Division. The girls used their own recipe and furnished a copy for the judges. Winners in this division were Sandra Alexander with a Pecan Cake and Vicki Owens with Marshmallow Brownies. These were both excellent.

MARSHMALLOW BROWNIES
1 cup flour
1 cup sugar
½ tsp. salt
2 tablespoons cocoa
2/3 cup shortening
2 eggs
1 tablespoon vanilla
½ cup chopped nuts
1 pkg. marshmallows

Sift dry ingredients. Add shortening and mix. Add eggs and beat until fluffy. Add vanilla and nuts. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 20 to 25 minutes. Top with marshmallows while hot. When cool, frost with chocolate frosting.

CHOCOLATE FROSTING
¼ cup shortening, melted
½ cup cocoa
1/4 tsp. salt

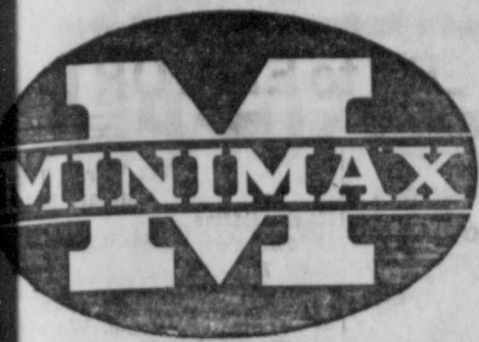

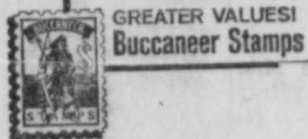
