The 15th annual Soil Conservation issue of the Eagle will be published on Thursday, May 7, it was announced this week. Plans have already begun for this issue.

This announcement was made by members of the Eagle staff and Doug Sellers, supervisor of the local work unit, Soil Conservation Service.

Members of the Soil Conservation Service, members of the Eagle staff and a number of other interested individuals will take part in preparing material for this special edition.

This special issue will come out on Thursday during Soil Stewardship Week which will be observed this year from May 3 through 10. Many churches in this area will observe Soil Stewardship Sunday on May 10.

The theme for Soil Stewardship Week this year is: "Resource and Renewal."

A large number of business firms and individuals who are interested in the program carry special advertising messages in the issue. Also a number of contractors who do much of the work in connection with soil conservation practices in the area.

Plans this year call for more pictures of soil and water conservation and range management practices and their benefits in Mills County.

Several of those who carried ads in last year's paper have already reserved space in the forthcoming soil paper this year for their special messages.

Work has already started on preparing material and typesetting on feature stories for the issue will start soon, according to report this week.

## Some Contracts Are Extended During Last School Board Meeting

Members of the Goldthwaite School Board meeting in regular session last Monday night took care of a number of routine business matters and extended some contracts while others will come up at later meetings.

The board voted to extend contracts of Supt. Gilbert Davis, High School Principal Hoyet Browning and Assistant Coach Randy Baker and Jerry McDonald.

Contract for Supt. Davis was extended two years making his a regular three year contract. Browning's contract was extended one year for a two year contract and Baker and McDonald were each voted a one year contract.

Application was made for more funds and some new equipment for the school lunchrooms. Supt. Davis stated that this application for funds is for both the elementary and high school lunchrooms. It will be on a local district participation basis.

Announcement was made regarding the forthcoming accreditation visit of representatives from the Texas Education Agency which is scheduled for March 9. This will be a regular school evaluation visit.

The board voted to receive bids for 24 new typewriters, approved work for re-flooring the

halls in the high school building, employed Mrs. Tommy Head to fill the place of Mrs. Patti Johnson as homemaking teacher from March 1 until the end of this school year. Mrs. Johnson will be out of the classroom for a while; named Mrs. Jack McKenzie as election judge for the forthcoming school trustees election on April 4.

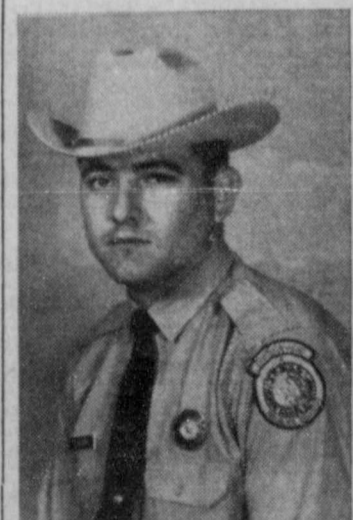
## Three Aldermen File For New Term On City Council

## Goldthwaite And Mullin Eligible For New Postal Service Program

Congressman Omar Burlison announced today that he has been advised by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount of a major new postal service program that will expand home deliveries to an additional 4 million Americans — principally in small communities — for the first time.

He listed the following areas in Mills County which will be made eligible for this service expansion under the order: Goldthwaite and Mullin.

Under the program, persons living more than a quarter mile, but less than half a mile from 18,700 post offices that do not have city delivery are now eligible to receive the delivery at home. Previously, they have been compelled to go to the post office for their mail.

Since they live less than half a mile away from a post office,

they have not been eligible to receive rural delivery service prior to Mr. Blount's new order, the Congressman explained. And because they live near a post office that does not have city delivery they have missed out there too.

Congressman Burlison said he had been advised that the Postmaster General is issuing instructions in the Postal Bulletin Thursday making the service available to the 1.2 million families living in the eligible areas — 4 million individuals.

The only requirement to obtain the service is that it must be requested of the postmaster, and a majority of those living in the area must desire the service.

The expansion will be achieved by such steps as extending shorter rural routes and adding delivery stops to some rural routes. In other instances, "star" or contract routes may be used to provide the service; in some locations it may be necessary to establish new rural routes, the Postmaster General advised the Congressman.

"Mr. Blount's order provides for one of the most significant advances in service in many years," the Congressman commented. "I am particularly pleased that the order will benefit communities in our 17th Congressional District."

## Joe Langford Merit Finalist

Joe Langford Jr., a senior at Goldthwaite High School, has received a certificate of merit from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

The merit signifies that Langford has advanced to Finalist standing in the 1969-70 Merit Program, an honor which he shares with about one-half per cent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the nation.

As one of about 15,000 Finalists, he will remain in the Merit Scholarship competition. The selection process is under way, and the approximately 2,800 winners of Merit Scholarships will be notified confidentially in late March. The winners' names will be announced publicly by April 30.

Joe is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Shelby Langford of Goldthwaite.

Young Langford was given the test in February 1969 under the supervision of O'Donnell Newton, county school counselor of Mills County.

## Governor Smith Approves Grant For Hill Country Community Action

Governor Preston Smith announced today his approval of an Office of Child Development grant for \$50,000 to the Hill Country Community Action Association, Inc., San Saba.

Funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, this grant authorizes \$28,000 for a Full Year Head Start program, and \$22,000 for a Summer Head Start program.

The Full Year Head Start program has been delegated to the San Saba Independent School District for operation. The program will serve 42 five-

year-old children five days a week in one center for a six and one half hour session each day January through December, 1970. Staff will include three teachers and three non-professionals.

The Summer Head Start program has been delegated for operation to the Independent School District of Goldthwaite, Llano, Priddy, and Mason from the first of June through the end of July, 1970. The program will serve 90 children five and six years of age five days a week for a six and one half hour session. Staff involved will include six teachers, three other professionals, and 13 non-professionals on the paid staff, and 17 volunteers.

## Head Start And Kindergarten Registration Information

Goldthwaite School has been granted funds to operate a Summer Head Start Program to begin June 1, and ending on July 31, 1970. It was announced this week by Supt. Gilbert Davis. This program will be for children who will be five years old April 1, 1970 and six years old by September 1, 1970. The five year old will also be eligible for a Kindergarten Program in the fall school term of 1970-71.

Head Start is a program the local school has had in the past and it will be offered as it was in the past.

Kindergarten is a new program for the coming year. It is sponsored by the Texas Education Agency.

Children must be five years and five months old and must meet one of the two following guidelines: 1. A child who cannot speak, read, and comprehend the English Language to the extent that he is not familiar with the common English Language words that are necessary for normal progress in the first grade, or 2. A child who is from a family whose income meets OEO requirements.

Supt. Davis stated that school officials need to know if children are interested in either of these two programs. Interested persons who know of children who may qualify for either of these programs are requested to contact Supt. Gilbert Davis or Elementary Principal James Dean for application blanks. School officials do not wish to overlook anyone.

Application blanks contain more detailed information regarding qualifications.

**AUSTIN, Tex.** — A sharp cut in welfare and medical assistance payments, to be effective April 1, was announced by the State Board of Public Welfare.

Board said the unprecedented increase in assistance rolls, the decrease in federal medical aid funds and the constitutional spending ceilings required an average \$11 a month cut in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program and a 20 per cent slash in Medicaid.

Board member Louis R. Sarazan of Fort Worth said there is no alternative. Sarazan and board member W. Kendall Baker of Houston warned that further cuts may be in the offing before the end of the fiscal period next year.

Board ordered the lowering of AFDC payments from 75 per cent to 66 per cent of budget needs. Average AFDC family now draws \$120.37 a month. Reduction would reduce this to \$109.54.

Earliest and loudest protest came from Texas nursing home operators who claimed Medicaid outlay shrinkage would put 95 per cent of them out of business.

Texas Nursing Home Association termed the situation of "crisis" proportions and urged Gov. Preston Smith to take immediate action to summon lawmakers into special session for emergency appropriations.

Texas Medical Association charged the federal government has "promised more than it can deliver" in the health care area and is, in effect, asking providers of services to take a loss.

### Land Program Folds

Texas' 20-year-old veterans land program has folded. Through it more than 41,000 Texas veterans had purchased land under low-interest, long-term-pay provisions. It was a victim of high interest rates.

Veterans land board said that since the prime interest rate has been raised to eight and a half per cent, veterans' bonds, with a constitutional four and a half per cent ceiling, simply could not continue to attract investor capital.

More than 1,000 applications on file will be processed, but no more can be accepted until the interest-rate-bind eases.

### Courts Speak

An insurance company can be required to foot the damage bill for accidents that occur before a policy is actually written—if the contract already had been made without either applicant or company knowing of a loss, or an impending loss — the Supreme Court has held.

Supreme Court told a Dallas trial court that it should not have granted summary judgment against a couple suing General Motors Corporation on a claim that a faulty balljoint unit on a pickup truck caused an accident in which a woman was injured. Trial court held there was no defect.

In a divided verdict, the High Court held that Austin contractors cannot collect another \$17,000 which all parties agreed is due them over and above the \$964,888 contract for library and science building additions at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos.

Third Court of Civil Appeals held fast on its January 21 ruling invalidating the Alcoholic Beverage Commission's proposed tough rules for private drinking clubs, including guest card restrictions.

### Antiquities Rules

State Antiquities Committee, charged with regulating those who dig for historic treasures in the state, has set its rules and issued its first permit.

Rules require that any person or group seeking to excavate or salvage an archeological site obtain a permit from the Committee. Supervision by a trained archeologist, recording and publication of results and a scientific manner of working are the major points stressed in the rule.

Committee deleted from its rules a proposal that beachcombers and arrowhead hunters would have to get state permits. They will, however, be required to make reports on their discoveries. Explorers would be required to stop work immediately once a permit is cancelled.

First permit went to the Lower Plains Archeological Society for a salvage project at Big Spring. West Texas State University has agreed to sponsor the project.

### College Money

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System has voted to cut back on requests for increased higher education funds.

Board adopted a four per cent faculty salary increase for the 1972-73 biennium. But this was below the 7.9 per cent increase recommended by the Board's staff and the 8-1 per cent increase requested by the institutions.

Staff asked for \$206.3 million more for state senior colleges over the biennium, apart from salary increases. Board approved \$166.8 million in additional funds.

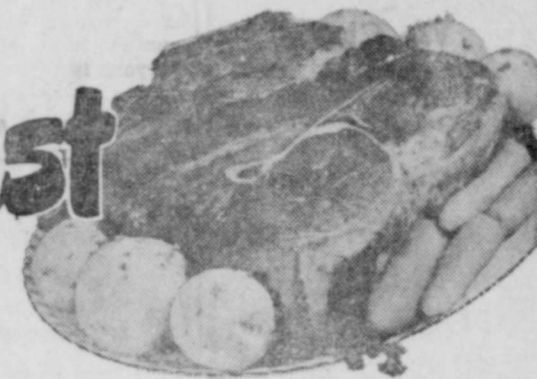

**Texas Highway Department Reviews 1970 Motor Vehicle Registrations**

AUSTIN—The Texas Highway Department today reminded motorists of some DOs and DON'Ts for obtaining 1970 motor vehicle registrations.

The Motor Vehicle Registration Division of the Department has initiated a new computerized registration system this year.

In the past motorists have had to take their previous year's registration and auto title to the county tax collector's office or substation to obtain new license plates.

This year motorists were mailed a three-part computer-oriented registration form about January 1.

If a motorist wishes to renew his registration by mail he should mail the three-part form to his county tax collector, with his check for the registration fee plus one extra dollar to cover postage and handling. Some county tax collectors will accept only money orders or cashier's checks.

If a motorist wishes to renew his registration in person, he should take the three-part registration form to his county tax collector's office or substation with his check or money order.

Mail orders will be accepted only until March 1, allowing 30 days for delivery. Registrations will be made in person through midnight April 1, deadline for obtaining new auto license plates.

The Highway Department's list of DOs and DON'Ts for all motorists:

**DON'T** throw away your three part registration application; it may be used both for mail and in-person vehicle registration.

**DON'T** write on, mar or otherwise mutilate the three-part form. However, DO show your correct address in accord with instructions on the form if the address on the form is incorrect.

**DON'T** separate the three parts of the form; DO take to your county tax collector or mail it in one piece.

**DON'T** send your application to the Highway Department Motor Vehicle Division in Austin; DO send it to your county tax collector and DO enclose

the amount of your registration fee and an extra dollar if ordering by mail.

DO send your application before March 1 if ordering by mail; no mail applications will be processed after March 1.

If you did not receive a three-part registration form in the mail, or if you have lost it, DO take last year's motor vehicle registration and your car title to your county tax collector's office or branch station. Your vehicle registration will be processed as before and you'll receive a time-saving computerized form next year.

Remember, you will save time at your county tax collector's office if you use the computerized form. There is no extra charge if you obtain your license plates in person.
