## Rattle Snake Round-Up At Lometa

The Lometa Lions Club and Lampasas County Farm Bureau will sponsor a Rattle Snake Round-Up from now until Saturday, March 28, it was announced here Tuesday by Robert Butler of Lometa.

Those taking part in the competition may start their hunting now and continue up to the closing date. The boundary for participants is Lampasas County and the area in Lometa School District which takes in a small portion of Mills County.

Cash prizes will be awarded as follows: \$150 for the most snakes, \$100 for the most live snakes, \$25 for the longest rattle snake, \$75 1st prize for the most rattlers and \$50, 2nd prize for second most rattlers. Rattlers must contain one to two inches of live skin.

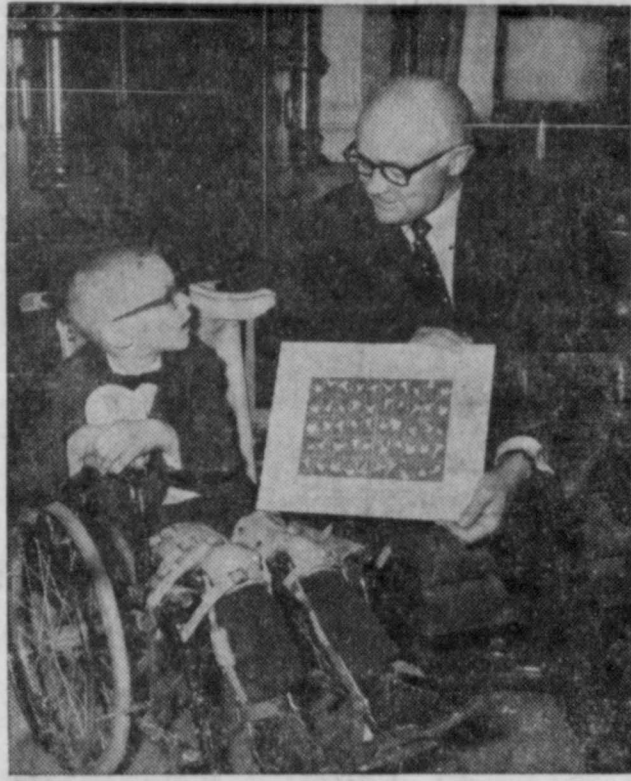

Service. The District will encourage application of land treatment by farmers and ranchers operating the land draining into the lakes to control excessive pollution and will perform all acts of operation on the dams, Hughes states.

Structural measures on the watershed when supplemented by conservation treatment will reduce annual flood damages by about 70% which will amount to reduction in average annual flood damages from \$34,100 at present to \$10,900 following installation of planned work.

Benefits from the program are many but the program is based on primary items such as protection to agricultural land, roads, bridges, fences and livestock. Some of the other benefits include improvement in quality of water for downstream users, recreation and protection of lakes and reservoirs downstream according to Hughes.

Construction may be started in this watershed within the near future as good progress is being made by the local people in obtaining all needed easements and rights of way Hughes reveals.

The campaign, which will last until Easter Sunday, March 29, is to raise funds to continue treatment and rehabilitation services for more than 20,591 crippled children and adults, said State Chairman, Neil A. Armstrong, Commander, Apollo XI.

According to Armstrong, the needs of the handicapped in Texas are even greater than before. Not only have the costs of rehabilitation risen, but the number of crippled persons is on the increase.

## District Office For '70 Census Is Opened With Special Ceremony

At a ceremony today Lt. Col. John B. Neely, Ft. Hood, cut a length of computer tape, officially opening the district office in Waco, Texas, from which the 1970 Census of Population and Housing will be directed in this area. Robert C. Ford, Manager of the district office, explained that computer tape is symbolic of the Census Bureau's modern electronic equipment that will process the data collected in the census.

Others attending the ceremony were: Dr. G. H. Radford, Mayor of Waco; Mr. Jefferies, Waco C of C; and Dr. Thomas Tagliarino, Marlin, Texas.

This district office will be headquarters for census operations in 21 counties.

With the official opening today, the active phase of the census gets under way in this census district. About 600 crew leaders and census takers will be selected and trained. Detailed arrangements will be made to enumerate people in institutions, jails, hospitals, colleges, and places other than in homes, all in preparation for April 1 when the actual enumeration begins.

Beginning four days before April 1, mail carriers will leave census questionnaires at each residential mailbox. Each family will be asked to fill out its questionnaire and hold it for the census taker. The enumeration of the district is expected to be completed in about five weeks after the census takers begin making calls on April 1.

There are 180 other census districts throughout the country where this method of enumeration will be used. The Census Bureau estimates that about 40 per cent of the U. S. population live in these districts.

There are 212 other census districts in which the remaining 60 per cent of the population live. These districts, for the most part, include the large cities and their suburbs. Households in these districts will also

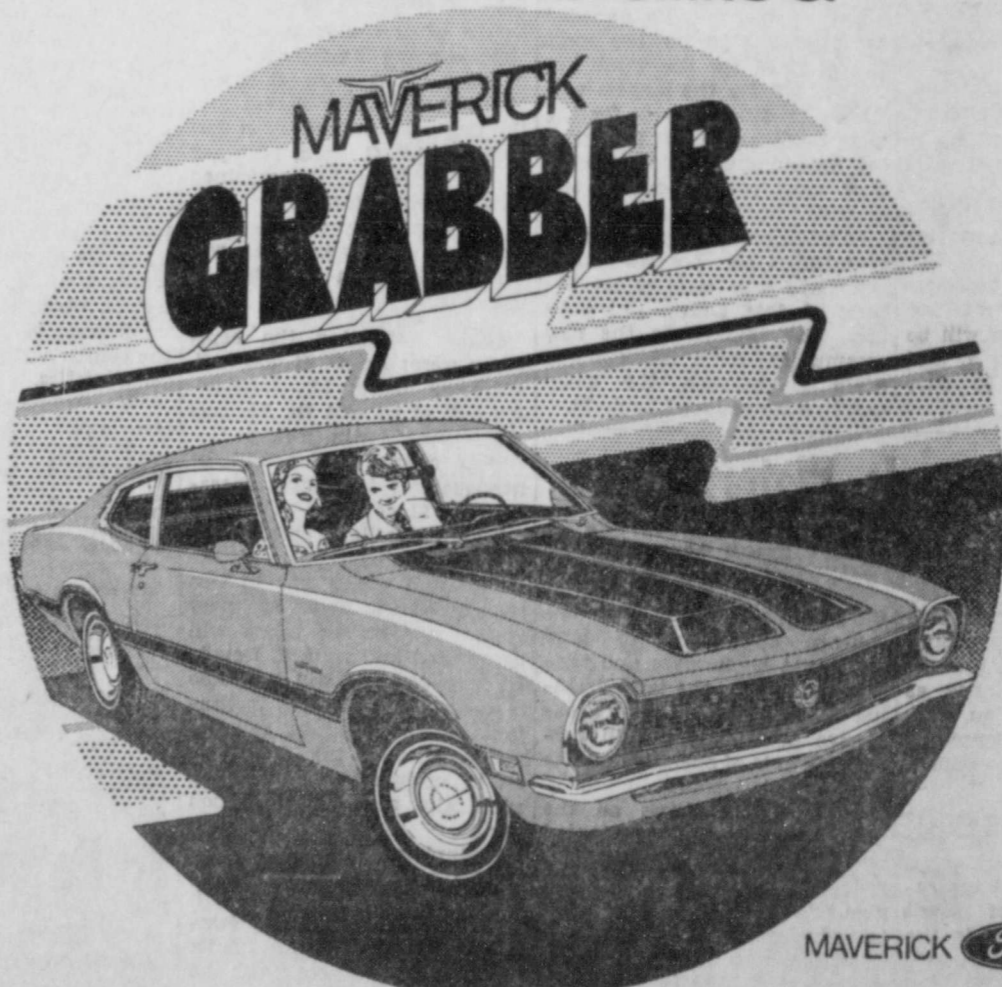

Capital NEWS  
By VERN SANFORD

AUSTIN, Tex.—Top Texas officials have agreed on general outlines for a plan to combat the rising problem of dry abuse.

Gov. Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin and House Speaker Gus Mutscher are united in a statewide concentration of effort. Plan was announced after a meeting of the four in Smith's office last week. Texas Justice Council will serve as coordinator.

Coordinated law enforcement action will first be called on to try and dry up the sources of dangerous drugs.

Top priority is given a "total education" campaign for youth, adults, teachers and law enforcement personnel on drug dangers and possible solutions to the problem.

Task forces will be named to develop effective concepts and action programs in enforcement and education.

Leaders agreed on this immediate-action program:

- One-way seminars for Texas' law officers and prosecutors.
- Exchange of vital information with Mexico.

- Assistance through the Justice Council to implement school education.

- Review of successful narcotics programs in other states.

- Greater assistance to local enforcement and prosecuting agencies in evidence analysis.

- Gathering of statistics in major cities on drug-related crime.

- Creation of a model drug information office.

Narcotics strike forces will include local, state and federal personnel, military manpower and use of helicopter patrols along the Rio Grande.

Another task force will attempt to explore causes of drug use and to evaluate proposed research and rehabilitation programs as well as to implement educational programs in schools.

State officials will meet here March 13 with aides to U. S. Atty. Gen. John Mitchell. They will explore federal support possible under remedial programs and the uniform controlled dangerous substances act now before congress.

## TOLL ROADS PROPOSED

In a surprise session with the State Highway Commission, Texas Turnpike Authority proposed that preliminary studies be made for the development of a massive toll road network estimated to cost more than \$135 million.

Last year the Legislature authorized the agency, subject to the Highway Department's permission, to spend money for investigating the feasibility of additional pay-road projects.

Turnpike Authority asked the Commission to let it make exploratory studies of the following projects:

- \* An 83-mile, \$50 million mid-Texas turnpike from Hillsboro to Interstate 45 near Centerville, to provide a direct freeway from Dallas-Fort Worth to Houston-Beaumont areas.

- \* A 20-mile, \$40 million Dallas-Fort Worth-Trinity turnpike connecting Dallas and Fort Worth parallel to the present turnpike by way of the projected Greater Southwest International airport between the two cities.

- \* An 8.8 mile, \$18 million airport tollway connecting LBJ Freeway in Dallas to the new airport estimated for completion in 1973.

- \* A \$20 million toll road in San Antonio to follow the route of long-delayed U. S. 281 North Expressway.

- \* A 1.2 mile, \$7 million toll

bridge across Mountain Creek Lake in Dallas County connecting the Oak Cliff and Arlington areas.

\* A turnpike from downtown Houston to Intercontinental Airport and possibly other facilities in the state's largest city. Preliminary studies will take six to nine months. Feasibility surveys may follow where reasonable promise is shown for the projects.

## Demos To Meet

State Democratic Executive Committee will meet in San Antonio March 9 to certify names of statewide candidates for the May 2 primary ballot.

Committee will also:

- Decide the hour and place of the September 15 Democratic state convention.
- Establish a ratio for the number of delegates from each county or senatorial district convention to the state convention.

- Select site and hour for a May 12 SDEC meeting to canvass the first primary results and consider any other business.

## Drinking Hours Extended

A dozen counties and 19 cities have adopted the new 2 a. m. drinking curfew approved by the last Legislature on a local option basis.

Included are Harris, Dallas, Bexar, Tarrant, El Paso, Potter, Bandera, Bell, Aransas, Wilson, Galveston and Fort Bend counties; Corpus Christi, Aransas Pass, Rosenberg, Temple, Texas City, Denison, Poth, Boerne, Post, Kemah, Pharr, Galveston, Rockport, Bandera, Port Aransas, Port Neches, Iaredo (private clubs only), Victoria and Herker Heights near Fort Hood.

Liquor Control Board is studying the proposal of a Dallas restaurateur for authorization of Texas travelers to join a single giant private club with guest privileges in any participating club.

LCB authorized two airlines to sell mixed drinks during Braniff, Texas International flights—American Airlines and Delta also have applied for licenses.

## Short Snorts

Texas Restaurant Association has dropped the name "waitress" from its vocabulary and designated 1970 as the year of the "sales hostess."

Texas Education Agency received a \$52,000 federal highway safety grant for evaluation study of driver education programs.

Former House Speaker James A. Turman of Gober took over as statewide campaign manager for U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough.

Interim Committee on Natural Fibers and Textile Development targeted an added billion dollars in new Texas economic activity from fibers (cotton, wool and mohair).

Houston was called on by the Texas Water Quality Board to explain why its sewage treatment quality is not up to the conditions of its permit.

New cigarette tax increase provided \$3.1 million more last month than in January, 1969.

**As It Looks From Here**

A friend in East Texas recently called attention to a report in Time Magazine, dated August 8, 1927, describing a "get rich quick" scheme by a John J. Carey "Realtor and Insurance Salesman" of Atlantic City, New Jersey.

In that day before there was a Securities and Exchange Commission, a letter was sent out over the Country to a "selected" group of possible customers, which said in part: "We propose to organize a corporation to operate a Cat Ranch near McKee City, New Jersey, where land can be bought cheap.

"To start with we will collect 1,000,000 cats. Each cat will average 12 kittens a year. The skins will sell for 10c for the white one to 75 c for the pure black. We will have about 12 million skins to sell at an average price of 30c apiece, making our revenue about \$10,000 per day gross.

"A man can skin 50 cats a day; he will charge \$2 a day for his labor. It will take about 100 men to operate the Ranch; therefore, the profit will be \$9,800 a day.

"We will feed the cats on rats and will start a Rat Ranch adjoining the Cat Ranch. The rats will multiply four times as fast as the cats and if we start with 1,000,000 rats, we will have four rats a day for each cat.

"We will feed the cats on rats and in turn will feed the rats on the stripped carcasses of the cats, thus giving each rat one-fourth of a cat.

"It will be seen by these figures that the business will be automatic and self-sustaining. The cats will eat the rats; the

rats will eat the cats and we will get the skins."

The letter goes on to say that there is a great demand for the stock locally but that they are not selfish enough to keep such a good thing in one community.

The letter concludes on a note of real salesmanship. "You had best wire us what you want to do about this offer for our friends are pressing us hard for all the stock."

A note was added to the body of the letter saying that the company had made a contract with the "Fiddlers Union" to take all the catgut which could be furnished. (This should have raised a question since catgut used for violin strings is sheep's gut.)

The Ways and Means Committee of the Congress has been considering new welfare proposals embracing the theory that a guaranteed annual income from the Federal Government will be an incentive for those able to work to find a job to supplement the sum of \$1,600 paid to a family of four. The idea is that in the meantime, the wage earner of the family be trained for a job, the income from which would later take them off welfare. If the wage earner did not want to work or a job was not available, the welfare would continue for the family but it is a little vague as to what happens to the potential household provider.

Supposedly, after training and after working at a job, he would become a taxpayer but by and large those qualifying for this kind of assistance were removed from the Federal Income tax rolls by the Tax Reform Bill of 1969.

The theory is attractive but some features of the Administration's proposal sound a little bit like the cat and rat ranch scheme.

A called meeting of the Jennie Trent Dew Library Board was held February 17, 1970, for the purpose of meeting with the Field Consultant of the Texas State Library. The following were present: Miss Vanita Lee, Field Consultant; Mrs. John G. Berry, Mrs. Ed Gilliam, Mrs. Weedon Echols, Mrs. Burton Pate, Mrs. Edd Bruce and Mrs. Fred Reynolds, Librarian.

The need of additional shelf space was discussed. Miss Lee suggested that judicious weeding of books such as old business and science books whose contents are no longer valid might help, as they only require space and repair. She also pointed out that it is a matter of education for the library to be used to its maximum, and that the pupils of the county schools be invited to visit the library as field trips.

The board discussed the plan for memorial gifts of any amount that can be used for equipment, shelves or books which was approved at the January meeting. It was decided that if anyone wishes specifically to give a memorial book to the library, that either the book be given or a minimum of \$5.00, as the price of books has increased so much that it is difficult to purchase books for less than this minimum.

**FHA Announces New Program For Sub-Division-Type Housing Loans**

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced start of a conditional commitment program that will permit it to finance small subdivision-type housing developments in the nation's small towns.

Previously, the Department's Farmers Home Administration could finance the building of the new homes only on a single-unit-at-a-time basis.

In issuing instructions for the new conditional commitment program, agency Administrator James V. Smith called on housing constructors, developers, sellers and other segments of the construction industry to engage in a stepped-up program to upgrade low-and-moderate cost housing in rural communities.

"At long last we can put to work a tool that enables the Farmers Home Administration to deal effectively with the deplorable condition of rural housing," Mr. Smith said.

"Instead of building new homes on a single-unit-at-a-time basis as in the past, the conditional commitment now makes the building of a dozen modest homes in an area practical," he added.

The conditional commitment does not reserve funds for a loan nor does it provide for construction financing.

The FHA will issue a commitment on each proposed house, but will hold builders to 15 commitments at any one time. The commitment will be effective for 12 months unless extended.

Experienced builders, including individuals, partnerships or corporations, may apply to any of the 1,700 FHA offices which serve every county in the nation, including Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

The agency will require builders to submit plans, specifications, proposed selling price and other information related to proposed construction at the time of application.

The application fee for a commitment on a new house is \$45 and \$35 for rehabilitation of an existing house.

Administrator Smith explained that it is impossible to determine how much new construction will be started in small rural communities because of the commitment, but pointed out that the agency's housing funds for the current fiscal year stand at \$821 million. It is estimated that about 80,000 housing starts will be made this year, compared to 50,000 in 1969.

He also pointed out that there

is a great need for housing rural areas where only 10 percent of the nation's population lives but more than half of the standard housing exists.

In 1969, Farmers Home Administration made \$40 million in rural housing loans. By that figure had increased \$494 million. Last year that figure reached \$512 million, provided new or improved housing for over 57,000 rural families.
