## Wednesday Marks Opening Of 1970 U. S. Population & Housing Census

Wednesday, April 1, was Census Day for the United States of America. From Arrostook County, Maine, to Niihau, the westernmost island of Hawaii; from Point Barrow, Alaska, on the Arctic Ocean to Key West, Florida, it was the day for all Americans to be counted.

Robert C. Ford, manager of the temporary census office in Waco, Texas, reports that 568 census takers, after being sworn in Wednesday morning, started visiting households throughout the twenty-one counties in the Waco district which includes Mills County.

Census questionnaires were distributed to households in Mills County by the Post Office Saturday, March 28. They are to be filled out and held for the census taker to pick up. The District Manager says it will probably take from three to five weeks for the census takers to get around to all the households.

It is possible that some households did not receive a questionnaire, but the District Manager says they need not fear they will be missed because a census taker will find them and have a questionnaire for them. Questionnaires for the 1970

Census of Population and Housing were distributed by the Post Office beginning March 28 to all households in this area. District Manager Ford announced today.

The form contains 7 questions about every person in the household and 13 questions about dwelling. The personal information asked is: name, address, sex, color, or race, month and year of birth, whether married or single, and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is: number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or owned.

Most of the questions are answered by filling in the proper tiny circles with a common lead pencil, making a tiny black dot which can be "read" by Census Bureau machines. Residents should read the instruction sheet which will come with the questionnaire before filling it out.

Census takers who will visit every dwelling unit in the Mills County area during the 1970 Census of Population and Housing, were trained on Monday and Tuesday of this week, March 30 and 31.

The training sessions were conducted by crew leaders.

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
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## Community News From Mullin

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Mr. Daniel P. Moynihan, Counselor to the President, and a holdover from the previous Administration, is under fire for suggesting to President Nixon that some "benign neglect" should be applied to matters involving "Civil Rights."

Perhaps the word "neglect" was not the best choice but, seemingly, what he was trying to say is that there has been too much rhetoric on the subject and too many promises.

The way things stand today there is an abundance of evidence that too many promises of everything has contributed to unrest, frustrations and disappointments among many people. Politicians and administrations, as a whole, have gone beyond the possible in promising Utopia for about everything. Regardless of Mr. Moynihan's admonitions there is not likely to be a letup in "tub pounding" for about everything which has an appeal to groups and individuals who have a special interest.

Dr. Anthony Downs, Sr., Vice President of Real Estate Research Corporation, a consultant to the Rand Corporation, Urban Institute, Brookings Institution and the Ford Foundation, has just released a paper through the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights, in which he says "almost every white American is a racist." Dr. Downs was a consultant to the Kerner Commission, composed of prominent citizens across the country, which says that the cause of civil unrest is failure to do away with poverty and lack of opportunity for minority groups.

How Dr. Downs concludes that all whites are racists is not explained. How could he possibly know the hearts and minds of people who absolutely have no feeling toward another individual because of his race, creed or color? The fact that he makes such accusations suggests to those who feel some discrimination, that they react with force. This, in turn, encourages discrimination of one sort or another and polarizes a situation often leading to violent confrontations.

In part, Dr. Downs says that "all whites have contributed to a system that constantly produces racist effects..." He outlines objectives to combat racism: (1) to change the behavior of whites so that they will no longer consciously or unconsciously support racism and (2) to increase the capabilities of nonwhite groups so that they can overcome the handicaps racism imposes. He advocates a build-up of political power for the support of "black power" and "black nationalism." He wants legislation passed to give more power to minority groups, making it the self-interest of whites to support minority aims.

Not all nonwhites by any means agree with this position. Mr. Roy Innis, National Director of CORE (Congress on Racial Equality), for instance says that forced integration of public schools is not workable and is not a guarantee of an equal or quality education for all pupils, black or white. He says that segregation when properly defined, should be equated with inequality of education. He makes the point that segregation and separation are two different things and that non-white people should run their own schools and vice versa, letting white people make their decisions and black people theirs, and not having the whites making the decisions for both. He would, of course, require that Federal, State and local funds go to each school district under his plan on an equal per pupil basis.

The race question is not the only source of types of discrimination in this Country. There has always been, there always will be, a selection on the part of any individual to choose his associates for whatever reason. Most of us want and expect everybody to love us—especially we politicians—but they don't. Rightly or wrongly, we simply

may not like the way a person wears his hat or steps up the curb. But, if this be discrimination, what Government has a right to regiment as the position which denies a right?

With the possible exception of Mr. Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, no President has promised more or tried harder in behalf of the minorities than former President Johnson. If it, he was abused and condemned by many of these same good guess is that this was greater influence in his standing for another presidential term than the war in Vietnam. Probably it serves the example of the insatiable appetite for promises of immediate Utopia.

A recent occurrence in San Antonio shows the courage of a man who refuses to be intimidated by racial prejudices or ill-considered promises for political advantages. The San Antonio Express in a recent editorial says that Congressman Henry Gonzalez will not dance to racist tunes.

Recently at St. Mary's University a dissident group attempted to abuse Mr. Gonzalez by accusing him of refusing to make his ethnic background a profession in itself. Congressman Gonzalez, the editor says, was fighting racism by those who attempted to distort his speech were born—and shown himself just as quick to oppose Mexican-American racism as he has been to oppose Anglo racism.

Over-promising and suggesting to any individual or group that to settle differences by violent and even revolutionary means, raises doubts and fears where reasonable should be applied.

Under prevailing circumstances perhaps some "Benign Calmness" would serve best.

Directors and members of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association were challenged by speakers and officials at the annual meeting in Brackettville Saturday to gear up for the future by using modern methods in their business.

"Survival" was the key word echoing from every building and guard post of historic Clark meeting headquarters. U. S. Representative Gra-Purcell of Wichita Falls, was stationed at the forum-military post, told the assembled growers "to get behind the eight ball." He


emphasized the fact that TS&GRA needed more numbers to have any support in Washington. "Get out and get more members. Otherwise, your organization will die."

A membership drive was kicked off during the meeting. Goal is to acquire 7,000 new members by July. TS&GRA will give a free round-trip plane ticket to Mexico City to all members who sign up 25 or more new members. The winners will also be given a free expense-paid weekend at Fort Clark Guest Ranch and the Alamo Village movie set in Brackettville.

Also appearing on the program were: Dr. Elvis Stahr of New York, president of the National Audubon Society; Gene Setzer of New York, NAS board chairman; Dr. Carl Buchheister of Bethesda, Maryland, NAS president emeritus; and Ed Harte of Corpus Christi, Texas, NAS director. The special guests, traveling in Texas and viewing several ranches, urged TS&GRA members to join in conservation projects.

The TS&GRA directors approved a number of resolutions offered by various committees. They include commending the Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association for preparation and distribution of a brochure on wool preparation; asking the Mohair Council of America to work out a cooperative program with the Texas Experiment Stations, Texas A & M University Agricultural Extension Service and others to find ways and means of protecting Angora goats after shearing to eliminate the need for leaving capes on the animals; and expressing appreciation to Mrs. W. J. Stroman, of Lometa, state director of the Make It Yourself With Wool program, and her directors for their work and to the Texas Department of Agriculture for its support in wool and mohair production.

The Association also passed a resolution wishing Gen. Earl Rudder, president of Texas A&M, a speedy and complete recovery.





### CENSUS TAKERS EASY TO IDENTIFY

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying enumerators for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing. District Manager Robert C. Ford pointed out. Enumerators, or census takers (most of whom are women), started making their rounds in the area on April 1 and are expected to complete their work in three to five weeks.

Each census taker will wear a red, white, and blue identification card. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce, and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. It bears the census taker's signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a census enumerator and has sworn to keep confidential all census information you provide.

Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the local police or to the census district office, which is located at 1209 Washington, Waco, Texas. Phone A/C 817 752-9245.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is blue and bears the legend, "1970 Census." In the portfolio, the census taker carries her supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools necessary for her work.

### Burleson Announces For Re-Election As Congressman From 17th District

Congressman Omar Burleson this week authorized The Eagle to formally announce his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 2 and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 Counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this,

I am opposed and my record clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served a number of assignments in the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "I am, though not having opportunity this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituents as opportunity affords. Congress being in session at the time and expected to be after the Primary Election there will be little time to be in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home in short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and make new ones. I believe I am incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that I know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system."
