Minutes for the January and February meetings were read and approved by the board.

The main topic for discussion was the expansion of the library. Due to Mr. R. G. Hollingsworth who started the expansion fund, the people of Mills County have become interested to the extent of contributing some \$1,400 to the library fund. A committee was appointed to investigate the needs of improvement and expansion and the amount of money needed for this cause. The committee members are Judge Cecil Egger, W. P. Duren, E. B. Gilliam Jr., W. C. Barnett and Ray Duren.

The Board agreed that a history of the library should be prepared. After much research, Mrs. J. A. Hester has written the history of the library from its beginning up to the time the Jennie Trent Dew Library was built. The Board stressed the fact that there is a need for a volunteer to complete the history.

A beautiful three tiered cake with nuts and punch was served to approximately 153 relatives and friends.

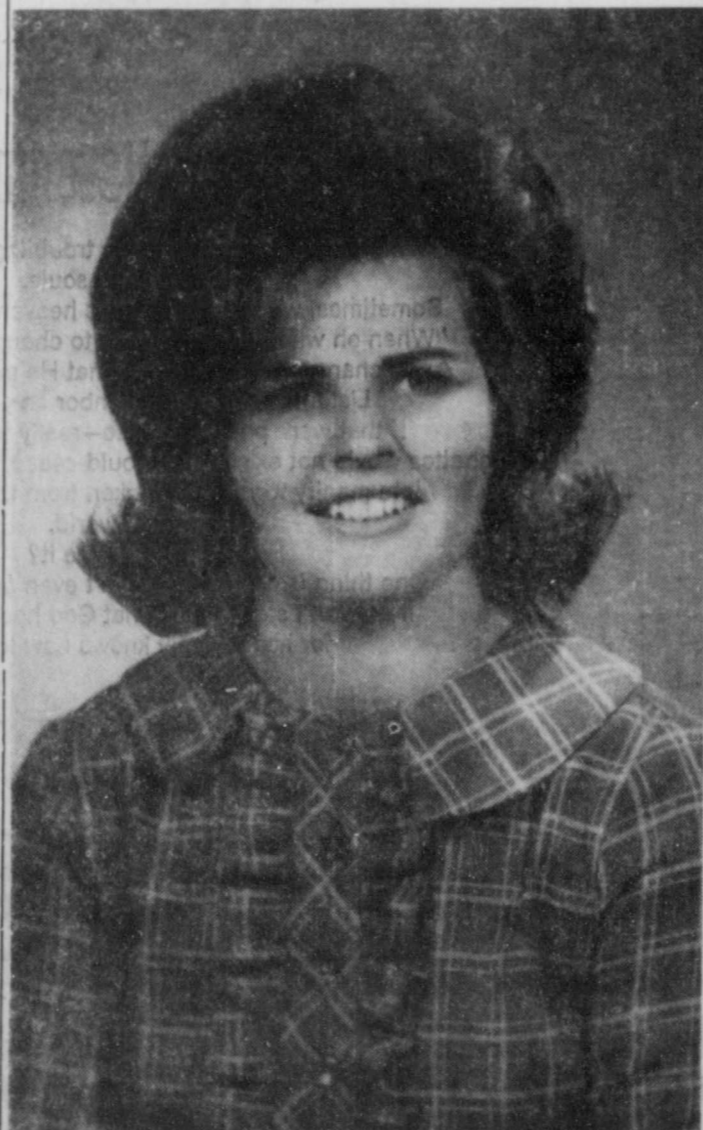
Mr. and Mrs. Kelly were married March 27, 1920 and have lived all of their lives in Mills County.

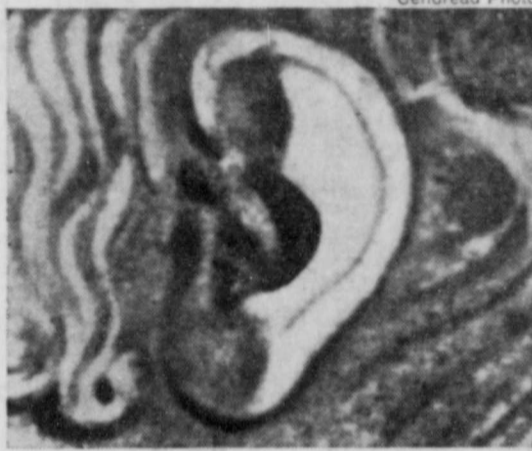

U. S. Bond Sales In Mills County During February

Treasury figures show that Texans purchased \$16,678,196 in Savings Bonds during February

—an increase of 16 per cent over February 1969. Series E alone during the month were \$15,497 million compared \$12, 940 million during 1969 — an increase of 19.7 per cent. Sales for the two month period totaled \$32,540,738 with 18 per cent of the yearly goal of \$179 million achieved.

Nationally, there were purchases of E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares amounting to \$414 million. Total cash sales for the first two months of the year totaled \$821 million — 18 per cent below a year earlier.

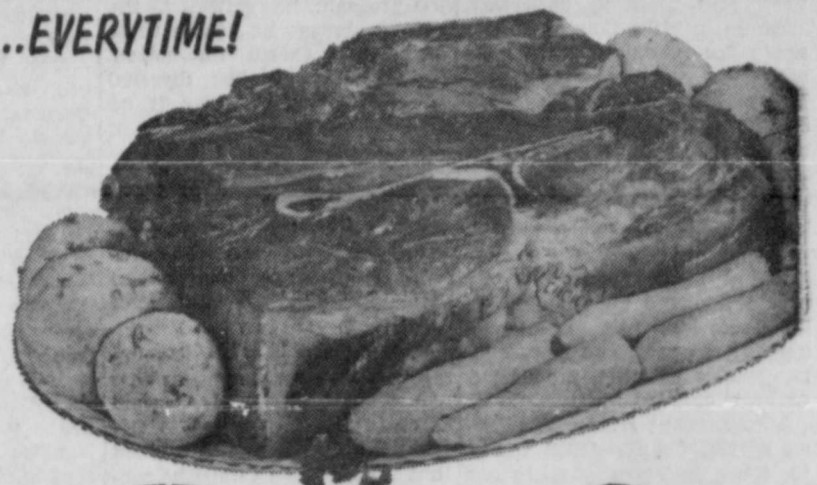

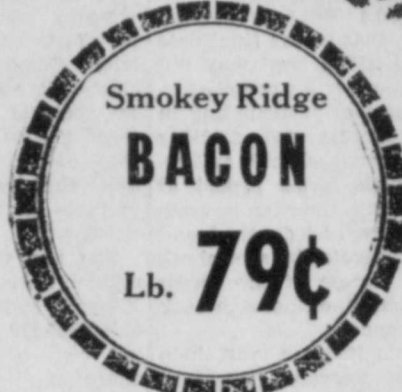
