## Goldthwaite Schools Receive Fully Accredited TEA Report

The Goldthwaite Independent School District is a fully accredited school for grades 1 through 12, according to announcement by Supt. Gilbert Davis, after receiving a report of the accreditation visit by the Texas Education Agency Accreditation team.

The report covered the team's visit to the local district on

March 10, 1970. The 1970 survey was a follow-up on two other accreditation surveys that were made in 1968 and 1969. After these visits, the local school district was on an advised basis with recommendations on certain improvements to be made. The visitation team's report of this year carried the recommendation that the Goldthwaite

School be cleared and carried as fully accredited for all grades.

The report, in addition to covering area, taxes, and bonded indebtedness, also commented on instructional program for grades 1 through 12, and instructional organization for all grades. Also, a number of professional personnel holding degrees, teachers with emergency teaching permits, and those having deficiency removal plans on file.

The report commented on official board meetings, records, public policy covering operation and administration, school system's workable programs of guidance services and a number of other phases pertaining to the operation of the district.

It cited the school's participation in Regional Educational Service Center, a series of teachers' workshops and music and art in the elementary school.

The report pointed out a number of improvements that were made in the district's maintenance program in the past year to overcome in part, a condition that was brought about as a result of inadequate maintenance over a period of years.

The report concluded by stating there appeared to be good teacher-pupil rapport, and pupils were well mannered.

It commended patrons in the community for the improvements made since the previous accreditation visit and called attention to additional corrections that need to be made with the development of a long range plan to provide for future needs in plant facilities.

Supt. Davis announced that a three year plan of improvements by the district has been prepared and presented to the Division of School Accreditation of the Texas Education Agency.

In closing, the report stated, "Based upon the over-all quality of the district's instructional program, the following recommendations is made. It is recommended that the Goldthwaite Independent School District be cleared and be carried as fully accredited for grades 1 through 12."

## Expanded Area Head Start Program Will Get Underway Monday Morning

Supt. Gilbert Davis announced this week that Head Start of the Goldthwaite area will begin June 1. Mullin Community will also be included, as well as communities such as Big Valley.

The program will be carried on in the Goldthwaite Elementary Building. The funds for Head Start come from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and are administered to the school by the Community Action program. An Advisory Board is set up to govern the program under Federal regulations.

The school will include 30 children. They attend from 9 a. m. until 1 p. m.

Mrs. Aethual Nickols is Director-Teacher from Goldthwaite, and Mrs. Barbara Collins is the teacher from Mullin. There will be two aides, Mrs. Virginia Coronado and Mrs. Ann Aldridge. Mrs. Charlie Perry will be the cook. Mrs. M. Y. Stokes, Jr., will serve as Health Nurse for Goldthwaite Head Start and Priddy Head Start.

The teachers and aides will transport the children who need to be brought from the different communities.

There will be volunteers from the Homemaking Department during the eight week program.

## Nose Count For Mills County Shows Some Loss

Preliminary population figures for Mills County show some loss over the past 10 years, according to announcement by District Manager Robert C. Ford who supervised the taking of the 1970 Census of Population and Housing in this area.

The preliminary nose count for 1970 was released by Ford as 4,047 while the official Census count in 1960 was 4,467.

The Census Bureau will commence in the fall of 1970 to publish official population figures for all areas in the United States — States, counties, cities, towns and villages.

Official figures may reflect some changes from the preliminary figures if any are reported that were missed when the census enumerators covered the area.

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Turkey Federation of Bryan, Texas proposes a referendum on July 27, 1970, under provisions of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not turkey producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of two cents per live hundredweight paid for plus an additional one cent per head on mature birds as defined by U. S. D. A. grade, to be collected at the point of first processing or sale, and to elect members for a fifteen man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment for purposes of promotion, research, education, and disease and insect control designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of turkeys.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot furnished to all eligible voters not later than fifteen days prior to election date. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at P. O. Box 3929, Bryan, Texas 77801, before midnight on the election date.

For purposes of this referendum, a turkey producer is defined as a person, firm, or corporation having actual ownership of turkeys during production. All persons in this category are eligible to vote in the referendum and election, since they would be required to pay the proposed assessment. Any person qualified to vote in this referendum and election may place his name in nomination for election to the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such application must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote in this referendum who does not receive a ballot prior to July 12, 1970, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office. Published May 28 and June 4 & 11, 1970

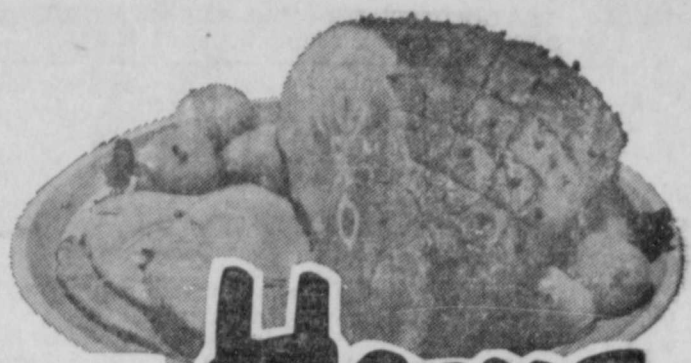

## STATE Capital NEWS

By VERN SANFORD

AUSTIN, Tex. — Big turnover in state jobs is costing taxpayers \$19 million a year.

Henry Rothell, associate administrator of Texas Employment Commission, said the turnover of 26.48 per cent is due to "competitiveness" of industrial salaries.

"The state is acting as a training agency for private industry at a cost too expensive to allow," the veteran employment executive reported.

Despite difficulties in retaining skilled personnel, state employees have received substantial pay raises from the last two legislative sessions. Unemployment rate for the state as a

whole continues well below the national average.

Employees in convention here were urged to continue working with legislative bodies to help solve the problems.

### INDUSTRIAL RACE ON

Plans for establishment of 126 new manufacturing plants and expansion of 176 existing plants in the first five months of 1970 are reported in "Texas Industrial Expansion," published by UT's Bureau of Business Research.

Twenty-nine new plants reported in May alone are located in Aransas Pass, Commerce (2), Corpus Christi, Corsicana, Dalhart, Duncanville, El Paso, Fort Worth (3), Galveston, Garland (2), Grand Saline, Houston (3), Katy, Laredo, Lubbock, McGregor, Mineral Wells, Pearland, Richardson, San Marcos, Seabrook, Stanton, and Tyler.

Thirty new plants to be expanded right away are located in Amarillo, Baytown, Big Spring, Bishop, Clarksville, Dalhart, Decatur, Elsa, Fort Worth, Friona, Garland, Gatesville, Houston (4), Lone Star, Lubbock, Lufkin, Marshall, Odessa

(2), Palacios, Plainview, Post, Seabrook, Stafford, Texas City, Tyler and Waco.

### DRAFT QUOTA SET

Texas draft call for June is down again—from 834 in May to 801, and no man will be inducted with a random sequence number higher than 170.

State quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in June is 2,320 less than half the May figure of 5,828.

Those with random sequence numbers 1-215 will be the only ones sent for these exams. No men with random sequence numbers above 215 will be forwarded for examination until further notice.

Men born in 1951, who have no random sequence numbers, will not be called for this purpose. A drawing will be held later this year to establish the numbers for the 1951 group. All volunteers at the draft boards must be inducted ahead of the non-volunteers selected and ordered to report for induction by random sequence number.

Texas' induction quota is the state's share of June's national call for 15,000 men, all for the Army.

### FLOOD COVERAGE STARTED

Areas of Baytown and Dickinson Bay in Harris and Galveston County are the first two Texas communities to establish eligibility for emergency flood insurance.

Insurance at federally-subsidized premium rates may be obtained up to \$17,500 for single-family homes and up to \$30,000 for two-to-four family dwellings. Small business coverage also is available. Home rates range from 40 to 50 cents per \$100. Contents may be insured up to \$5,000.

Twenty-three other Texas political subdivisions have filed for certification of eligibility for the coverage, and 69 others have expressed some interest. Only 37 communities in the nation are now eligible.

### SCREWORM RULE OUT

Texas Animal Health Commission unanimously voted to knock out a screwworm quarantine rule bitterly opposed by Mexico.

Regulation required a two-week quarantine of lots of imported Mexican livestock exposed to animals infested with the screwworm parasite.

Mexican director general of animal health argued that the rule was not justified because Mexico treats its own animals for screwworm before sending them across the Rio Grande. Quarantine, official said, resulted in unreasonable heavy losses to Mexican cattlemen.

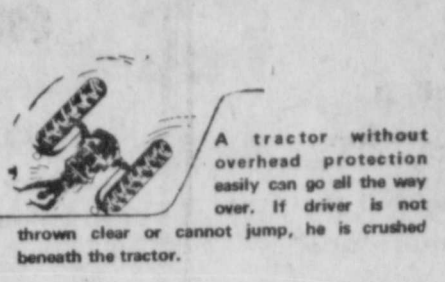

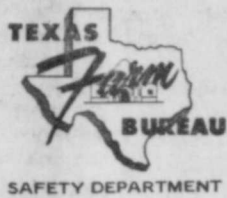

## As It Looks From Here

OMAR BURLESON, M. C. 17th District, Texas

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The total self-interest of the United States should govern her actions in all foreign affairs. There can be no real justification otherwise for the expenditure of taxpayers' money in any relation with other countries whether it be war, trade or aid.

Defining and identifying our own self-interest is a matter of human judgment.

Should we be directly attacked militarily, there would be no question about defending ourselves. It is another thing to believe that we are defending our own shores by fighting wars in other places before it reaches home.

In a direct attack our cause would be obvious. In the longer range view, we entered World Wars I and II believing it was our own self-defense.

In the present situation in Southeast Asia, we became involved as a subscriber to the Southeast Asian Treaty Organization (SEATO). The United States entered an agreement with the Philippines, Australia, France, New Zealand, Pakistan, Thailand and the United Kingdom to jointly defend that area against communist expansion. We believed it to be in our own self-interest on the long term basis.

We believed it was in our own interest to become a signatory to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) as a buffer against the Soviet Union. Our Government spent billions of dollars on the Marshall Plan to rehabilitate Western Europe after World War II believing that those nations must stand militarily and economically independent of communist Eastern Europe.

No treaty exists in the Middle East but there are those who apparently feel obligated for Israel's defense by contending that Israel is largely a creation of our making and that we have a responsibility for protecting her. Many of those of this feeling condemn our presence in Vietnam.

Almost obscured by the concern over crossing the somewhat vaguely defined borders of Cambodia is a developing crisis in the Middle East.

What is our self-interest in the Israel-Arab conflict? It

carries the usual elements of military and economic interest on which judgments in similar situations have been made in the past. It also involves heavy emotionalism in our Nation.

On the material side is Soviet expansion and influence in the whole Middle East, Africa and the Mediterranean Sea.

At stake, besides the emotional ties to Israel, is the vast oil supplies in the Arab lands which would be a prize to the Soviet Union, if controlled by them. Dominance of the Mediterranean and its ocean outlets by unfriendly forces would seriously jeopardize the shipping of the free world. These are factors which would come under consideration should a full conflagration develop.

Our nation has never been an aggressor. We have never sought by forceful means any economic hold in foreign lands. The possessions outside our borders were acquired for their protection and not for colonization.

Who determines our own self-interest? How do we arrive at the great decisions? A myriad of opinions go into making foreign policy on foreign affairs. Finally, short of a formal declaration of war which only the Congress can declare, the President of the United States must decide.

He does so on all available information and on the advice of his many consultants. Many and most times opinions vary—judgments differ and facts of a situation are numerous and interpreted. The President must eventually choose and act.

Whoever advises and whoever the President, it must be presumed they act in our own national self-interest. It is inconceivable otherwise. We may not agree with the decision — not many completely agree on all things — but who else except the President has all the facts on which to form a decision? This does not mean he is always right but he stands at the small end of the funnel, the highest elected official and receives all that is poured into the big end. No other individual is in this position.

The United States Senate ratifies treaties. Only both bodies of the Congress can declare war. On the other hand, the actual operation and con-

duct of foreign activities in peace or war rest on the President. Only he has the authority.

Should decisions on the actual execution of policy be left to the Congress, there would likely be as many different approaches to every question as there are Members, each believing that whatever he espouses is in our own "self-interest." Essentially this is the core of the present debate in the United States Senate.
