## Three Year Improvement Program Outlined For Goldthwaite Schools

The Goldthwaite Independent School District has made a number of improvements during the past year in remodeling and up-dating the physical plant. Supt. Gilbert Davis stated: "We realize there is much more to do and we plan to continue improving and remodeling as money becomes available."  
 The district has raised evaluations in order to receive more money locally to be able to modernize the school plants.  
 In projects already completed they have lowered the ceiling of the High School classrooms and installed fluorescent lights in all rooms. Replaced windows, except for one wing, in the old buildings. Other minor improvements were made last year.

Approximately \$14,000 was spent on improvements of the buildings this past year and plans call for spending approximately this same amount again this year.  
 Plans of improvements for a three year period call for the following.

  9. Replace equipment and install some new equipment in H. S. and Elementary Lunchrooms — Approximately \$8,000.00.
  10. Purchase four (4) new adding machines for the Commercial Department
  11. Spend approximately \$2,000.00 in the Libraries
  12. Paint outside of Gym
  13. Install new sewerage line from the High School Buildings

 The meeting will be in the band hall and officials hope they will be able to map out plans for one more fund raising project that will complete their drive for \$5,400.00 to purchase 60 new uniforms.  
 Mrs. Schwartz stated that this is an important meeting and urges all members to be present to help with the planning.  
 She also stated that operating the concession stand at the FFA Rodeo the past week was very successful, thanks to everyone who had a part in this project. She said that about 90 per cent of the band parents helped with the concession stand during the three nights.  
 In addition to the fund raising project to be planned at the special meeting tonight, the Boosters Club is formulating plans for a bake sale to be held at the bank on Friday, July 3, to try and complete the uniform fund to repair a baritone horn or to buy a new one.

Twenty-two boosters of Mills County Park contributed \$323.00 during the past week since announcement was made by the park committee that funds are needed for park up-keep for this year.  
 The park committee has provided funds for the caretaker to insure park maintenance for

the past several years through voluntary donations from interested citizens.  
 When the drive was originally started by the committee it was with the idea of enlisting a minimum of 100 interested persons to donate \$1.00 per month, or \$12 a year, to do the job.  
 A number of boosters have contributed more than the \$12 in the past. This has been a big help and has made the drive successful without personal solicitation campaign.  
 Last year the committee raised \$1,347. This took care of the maintenance job and provided a little extra that is always badly needed.  
 Last week the committee opened the 1970 fund drive with an appeal for "At least 100 persons to contribute a minimum of \$12 to insure park maintenance for this year."  
 The response to date has been gratifying, according to W. P. Duren, and the committee is hopeful that the \$1,200.00 will be forthcoming in a 30 day period. The drive this year was started late so the need is a bit more pressing.  
 With 22 parties giving \$323.00 the first week the committee feels that the goal will be reached in the 30 days.

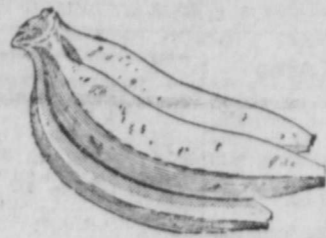

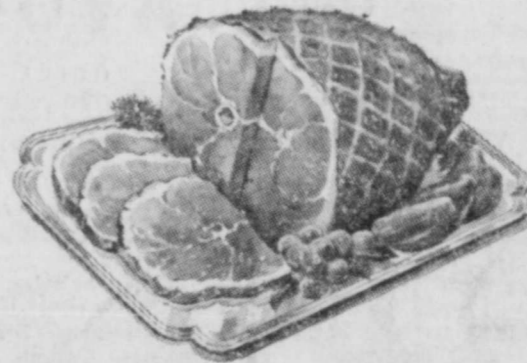

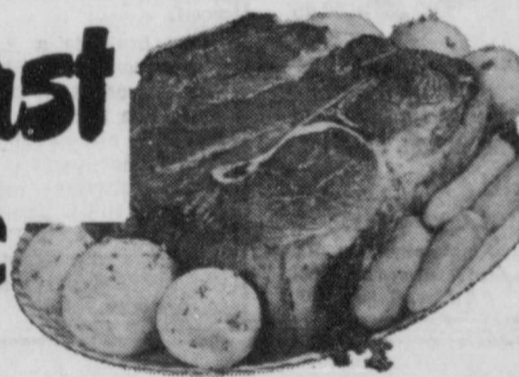

## Final Check Now Being Made "Missed" Families In '70 Census

One of the final steps in the 1970 census in rural and small city areas of the southern States — a check by mailmen — is now under way, according to the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census.

The '70 census was taken by two methods: by mail-out and mail-back of questionnaires in most major metropolitan areas and by census takers in the rest of the United States. The latter procedure entailed the mailing out of questionnaires and subsequent visits by census takers who would pick up filled-in forms or, lacking this, interview families while following a house-to-house route.

Canvassing in the metropolitan areas required checking of addresses by postal employees before the mailout. A similar step is now being taken by mailmen following the visits by census takers.

This is the procedure: When census district offices completed their preliminary counts, they turned over to the post office a set of white cards listing every address canvassed. The mailmen, in turn, check these ad-

resses against the houses on their routes. If the mailman discovers what he considers a "missed" address, he fills a blue card noting this fact. The blue cards are referred to the Census Bureau, which will then check them against the census cards.

The Census Bureau has learned from experience that households for which such cards are filled out have already been enumerated. This can be for a number of reasons. For instance, some people get at two or more addresses. There may be differences in the way a rural address is described.

The Census Bureau will use the blue cards turned in by mailmen and then take appropriate steps to provide a complete census count.
