More Farmers Of Mills County Receive Farm Program Payments

Approximately 50 per cent of the farmers of Mills County have received payments for participating in the 1970 wheat, feed grain or cotton programs, according to reports from the county Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Payments will continue to be made as rapidly as farmers continue to certify program compliance, and as fast as records can be processed through computers at the data processing center in New Orleans and checks returned to the county ASCS office for distribution.

The bulk of payments should be made by mid-August if farmers who signed up complete the necessary certification indicating that they complied with all of the program provisions. This is earlier than pay-

Plans for a new housing addition for Goldthwaite have been announced by O. O. Smith, local lumber dealer and builder. The new addition has been platted and the plat was presented to the City Council

Youth Charged In Connection With Robbery Here Friday Night

Charges were filed against Gary Kincaid in the assault and robbery of I. W. Mauney, local motel owner.

Mauney said he had gone to the room where Kincaid was registered about 8:15 p. m. Friday to collect the charges for a one night stay at the motel. When he entered the room, he was knocked to the floor by a blow on the head.

Bond was set at \$5,000 for Kincaid by justice of the peace E. H. Thorne of Goldthwaite before Mills County attorney Maston Pribble.

Mills County Sheriff, H. G. Brooks, stated Tuesday that the youth has made no apparent effort to contact anyone regard-

ing bond. Kincaid, whose last known address is Virginia, has not cooperated with officers as to his background or where his relatives (if he has any) might be located, according to Brooks.

Legislative Decorum Eyed

A House committee studying ways to improve the legislature's decorum and public image indicated it wants curbs on the familiar practice of lawmakers' voting for absentees on an electronic machine.

Committee members couldn't bring themselves to condemn "proxy" voting for members absent from the floor for a few minutes to take telephone calls from constituents. But they frowned on votes cast for legislators who are truants from the capitol.

Committee, headed by Rep. John E. (Ned) Blain of El Paso, discussed a variety of proposals to make the House of Representatives look and act better.

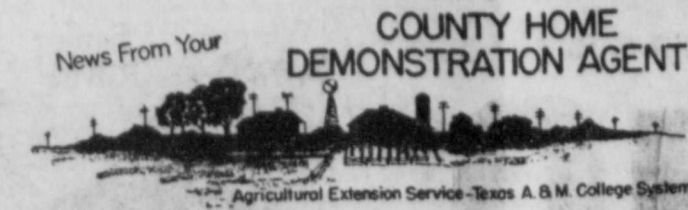
Among other major suggestions: a glassed-in spectators' gallery, desk-to-desk floor telephone communications and overhead projectors to display hasty floor amendments to legislation.

Approximately 800 women are expected to avail themselves of the services offered through this program. They will receive family planning education and supplies and medical examinations.

As a result of participation, these women will be more able to control their lives both economically and emotionally. Infant mortality will decline and maternal health will improve, the announcement stated.

Now is the time to consider freezing some of the fruits and vegetables that are in plentiful supply. Freezing is one of the simplest and fastest methods of preserving foods at home. It keeps the natural color, fresh flavor, and food values of most fruits, vegetables, and meats better than other methods of food preservation. Freezing provides the convenience of having food products that can be prepared quickly for serving.

Costs of owning and operating a home freezer may range from 13 to 28 cents a pound of frozen food, depending on rate of turnover. On a pound basis, freezing costs decrease as the quantity of food frozen is increased. Cost estimates are based on electricity used, costs of packaging materials, repairs and average freezer costs distributed over 10 years.

A bulletin available in the Extension office is B 1/5 Frozen Foods — How To Freeze — How To Cook. Directions are given in the publication for freezing fruit, vegetables, meat, dairy products, eggs, fish, prepared

Hill Country Community Action Association, Inc. in San Saba receives \$35,000 for their program which begins September 1, 1970, and ends December 31, 1971. These funds will be used to extend services into Menard, Hamilton and Comanche counties.

The Tale Of Two Systems

The postal service and the telephone system are two of the most widely used means of communication today. There is little else the two systems have in common.

The cost of communicating between two cities such as Chicago and Los Angeles by first class mail has risen 300% since 1932, and the possibility exists that rates may be raised again to 8¢ an ounce.

Telephone costs, in contrast, have dropped dramatically over the same period, and today the cost of a three-minute daytime call between these cities is about one-fourth the cost in 1932.

These figures were compiled by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The postal service was one of the first and most important functions of the Federal Government when the republic was founded.

Telephone service, on the other hand, has been left in the hands of private enterprise.

One can only wonder, observes the National Chamber, what would have happened if our founding fathers had telephones and had decided that only the government could make them work.

Community Action Council Nolan County in Sweetwater received \$30,000 for their program which begins September 1, 1970 and ends April 30, 1972. Approximately 525 persons are expected to benefit from this grant.

Tom Green Community Action Council in San Angelo received \$60,000 for their program which begins September 1, 1970 and ends January 31, 1972. More than 3,000 persons are expected to benefit from this grant.

Community Council of Comanche and Blanco Counties, Inc. New Braunfels received \$50,000 for their program which begins August 1, 1970, and ends October 31, 1971. More than 2,000 persons are expected to benefit from this grant.

Rusk-Cherokee County Community Action Program, Inc. Henderson received \$21,000 for their program which begins August 1, 1970, and ends November 30, 1971. More than 2,000 persons are expected to benefit from this grant.

No Strike - - Means No Strike, Says Supreme Ct.

A breakthrough decision by the Supreme Court promises to help right the imbalance of excessive union power and contribute substantially to labor peace. That is the viewpoint of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Federal courts can now compel unions to honor their no-strike agreements as spelled out in contracts.

Most contracts contain both no-strike clauses and provisions for binding arbitration. One promise is usually obtained in exchange for the other.

However, eight years ago the Supreme Court ruled that although federal courts could compel employers to keep their pledge to arbitrate grievances, they were powerless to require unions to keep their side of the bargain.

Significantly, the number of strikes — almost one-third of which occurred during the term of a contract — has increased every year since and reached an all-time high of 5,600 last year.

The National Chamber, in a brief filed with the court, cited this increase as evidence that the old decision was actually undercutting efforts of our national labor policy to promote industrial peace, and should be reversed.

He is permanently assigned to the Strategic Air Command's 96th Strategic Aerospace Wing at Dyess AFB, Texas.

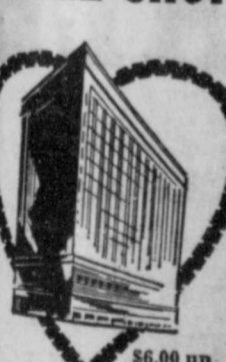

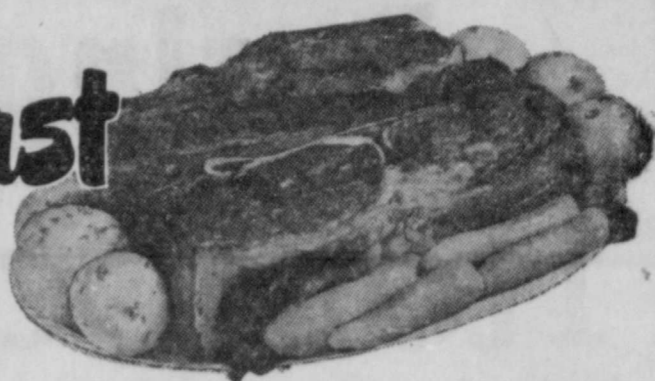

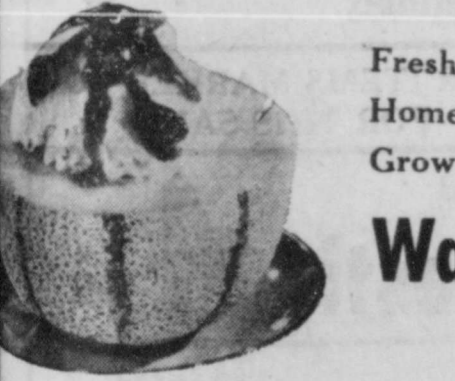
