## Texas Voters Will Decide On 7 Amendments In Election Nov. 3

Campaigns are shaping up on the seven proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on by Texans at the General Election on November 3. While public interest centers on the liquor-by-the-drink amendment, there are other major alterations in the state's laws to be considered by the voters. In their order on the ballot, these are:  
1. Enlarge the powers of the Judicial Qualifications Commission to censure or remove lower court judges and justices of the peace as well as district and appellate judges.  
2. Authorize the legislature to enact a law on the sale of mixed drinks.  
3. Provide for legislative establishment of a uniform method of tax assessment on ranch, farm and forest lands based on the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or production of farm and forest crops.  
4. Make the State Building Commission a three-member appointive agency.  
5. Permit counties to issue road bonds up to one-fourth of their assessed real property valuation on a majority vote.  
6. Make town or city home-steads of \$10,000 and less exempt from forced sale (presently set at \$5,000).

7. Allow the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government and for performance of governmental functions by contract between the political subdivisions in any county. The seven amendments appear in full form in this issue of the paper. Voters are reminded to study each of the proposals between now and election time. Texas voters have adopted 195 amendments to the 1876 constitution, over the years, and rejected 125.

He also stated that he expects two or three more to report and begin play when school starts. The Eagles went through 2-workout sessions daily, Monday through Wednesday, in getting ready for the opening of school and the new grid season. Regular practice sessions were held from 7:00-9:00 in the mornings and the same at night. Starting today, with regular classes now underway, football practice will go into the regular afternoon schedule. Johnson, head coach for the Eagles, has two assistant coaches working with him. Robert James will be working with Johnson on the varsity string while Randy Baker will handle the B-team. Coach James will concentrate on the line while Johnson will work with the backs and the defensive line. Danny Spradley is helping the coaches during this week and coach until he returns back to college. He is working with Coach Baker in getting the B team organized. Coach Johnson reports that they had a good work out starting with the very first Monday morning and the prospects are good for this year. He stated that De Leon, Ranger and Dublin are the top rated teams in the district in that order. Johnson also stated that Goldthwaite will definitely be a contender this year. In commenting on the B team boys, Coach Baker stated, "We have little experience, but a tremendous amount of willingness and the prospects look pretty bright." The Eagles will open their season this year on Friday, September 11, with their traditional battle against the AA San Saba Armadillos. The game will be played on Eagle Field at 8 p. m.

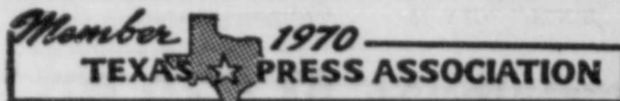

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

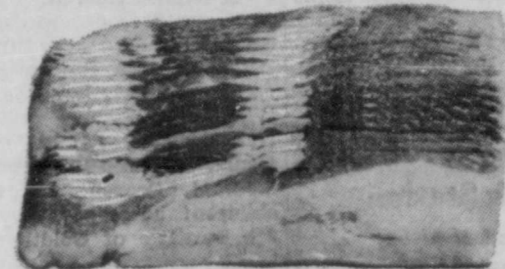

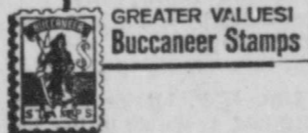

## Budget Approved By School Board

The Goldthwaite School Board meeting in regular session last Monday night approved the school budget for the 1970-71 school year.

Total budget calls for \$312,580.00, according to announcement by Supt. Gilbert Davis.

The tax rate for the school district was approved at \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation which is the same as last year. Last year \$1.25 of the tax rate went to operations and 30¢ went for interest and sinking fund for bonded indebtedness. This year \$1.40 will go for operations and 15¢ for the sinking fund.

Contract was awarded to Conoco to supply gas for the school year and Pure Milk was given contract for supplying the schools with milk. Schmidt and Wright received contract to supply broom dust mops.

The board approved lunchroom rates the same as last year. These will be in effect until mid-term. At that time rates may have to be revised, according to Supt. Davis. Lunch prices at present are 30¢ for elementary students, 35¢ for high students, and 40¢ for teachers.

The school lunchroom staffs bake all bread products used. These include lightbread, hot rolls, hamburger buns and cornbread.

## Dove Hunting Map Is Distributed By Parks And Wildlife Department

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is distributing the 1970 dove maps to help prospective hunters prepare for the season on white-winged and mourning doves starting in September.

The maps will be available this week from license deputies, Department regional and field offices, or from Department headquarters in Austin.

For regulatory purposes, the state again has been divided into a North Zone and a South Zone. The North Zone mourning dove season is September 1 to October 30. The South Zone mourning dove season is September 26 to November 24, except in those counties having a whitewing season where it will be September 5 and 6, September 12 and 13, and September 26 to November 20.

Shooting hours in all counties will be from 12 noon to sunset.

The Department map clearly indicates by shading the South Texas counties which have a whitewing season this year, and it also shows the protected "buffer zone" for whitewings along the Rio Grande in Starr County and a portion of Hidalgo County.

Whitewings may be hunted in 21 counties only on September 5 and 6 and 12 and 13.

Daily bag limit for both species is 10 birds, with a possession limit of 20. Bag limits of both white-winged and mourning doves may be taken in the counties having a whitewing season September 5-6 and 12-13.

The map also reminds sportsmen that no hunting is permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves, within corporate city limits or from public roads or road rights
