School Of Vocational Nursing Graduates Pass State Board Exam

Members of the 1970 graduating class of Childress Clinic and Hospital School Of Vocational Nursing have passed their state board examination, according to announcement by Mrs. Sara Kilpatrick, R. N., instructor and Dr. M. A. Childress, Medical Staff Advisor.

Word was received here last Thursday with grade reports for each member of the class. The school's average score for the four members was 584. The minimum passing standard score is 350 while the State Mean Standard score is 416.

Allee Summy made the highest score in the class with 608. Other members and their scores are Dorothy Lynch 570, Mary Ann Corona, 574, Quincy Wells 585.

Mrs. Kilpatrick stated that she was well pleased with the grades made by her students

who were part of the 707 candidates that passed the state-wide examination and were issued Vocational Nurse licenses. There were 123 approved Vocational Nursing Programs participating in the July 23-25, 1970 examinations conducted by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners. At this meeting 155 applicants from other states were granted reciprocity licenses.

In addition to the grade report of members of the 1970 graduating class in Goldthwaite, the local School of Vocational Nursing also was state approved. The school had operated the past year on a probationary basis, since this was the first year for Mrs. Kilpatrick to serve as instructor. The school is now fully approved for future classes, although there are no immediate plans for a new class, according to Mrs. Kilpatrick, who also stated that possibly next year another class will be organized.

Three members of the 1970 graduating class are employed at Childress Clinic and Hospital while one member, Miss Corona, is employed at the Community Hospital in Brownwood.

Mrs. Kilpatrick also announced that the examinations taken by the members of the '70 class was a national test which qualifies those making passing scores for a Vocational Nurse license in many of the other states.

This is the first year for the test to be changed from a state to national test.

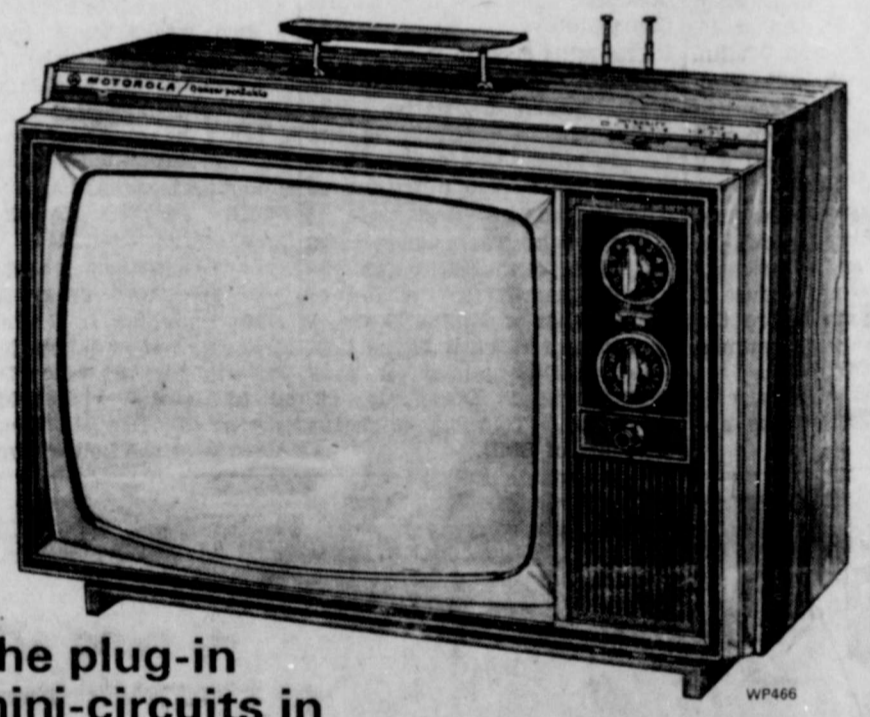

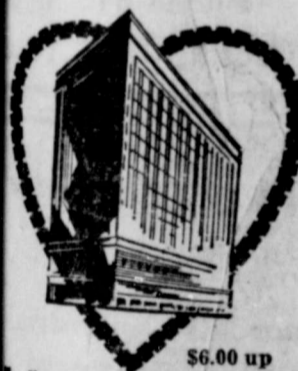
