## Growers Are Reminded To Spray For Protection From Pecan Weevil

Growers in Mills County are reminded to spray their pecan trees for protection from pecan weevils, says County Agent George Reese.

The pecan weevil can be a very destructive pest that emerges from the soil in August and September and feeds on the developing pecans. Severe infestation will destroy all the nuts on a tree.

The adult female weevil is brownish in color with a body about three-eighths of an inch in length, and a snout as long as its body. The male is somewhat smaller and has a shorter snout.

Adult feeding is done prior to hardening of the nut shell. After nut kernels have hardened, the female chews a hole in the shell and deposits her eggs in little pockets in the nut. The legless grub feeds from three to six weeks. When the grub reaches maturity, they chew a hole about one-eighth inch in diameter in the shell and emerge from the nut and overwinter in the ground. The entire life cycle requires two to three years, most of which is spent in the soil.

Pecan weevils have been observed in field cages in Hamilton, Eastland, and Erath Counties. Peak adult emergence is expected to occur in the next few days. Jarring the tree limbs to cause the pecan weevils to fall into a sheet where they can be counted is a good method to check for the presence of an infestation. Control measures should be applied if three or more weevils are found per tree.

The control recommendations for the pecan weevil are — EPN and Guthion at one-half pound actual material per 100 gallons of water or you may use three pounds of 80 per cent Sevin per 100 gallons water.

## Tax Roll Approved By Council In Regular Session Last Tuesday

The City Council meeting in regular session last Tuesday night in the City Hall, approved the tax roll for the city of Goldthwaite and Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1 for the new year.

Amount of the tax roll for the city is \$1,117,307.00. Of this amount, \$836,187.00 is for real property while personal property renditions are \$281,120.00. The tax roll for the water district totals \$1,139,143.00. Of this amount, \$854,023.00 is for real

property while \$285,120.00 is for personal property.

Taxes for the city total \$16,795.72 and \$17,087.28 for the water district.

Based on a 100 per cent collection, the total taxes for city and water district will be \$33,847.00.

O'Donnell Newton and James Boykin appeared before the council with regard to securing water from the city for an area along Highway 84, just east of the city limits. The problem was discussed as to ways and means for a project of this type. The Council informed the committee that the city would cooperate in such a project.

The project, if it can be worked out, would supply city water to a number of residents in that area and also a number of prospective or potential new homes that could be constructed on acreage owned by James Boykin.

A letter of resignation from E. R. Bruce as alderman was read and accepted by the Council.

Manager W. C. Barnett presented operating reports on receipts and disbursements covering the various departments of the city for the month of August.

The city manager reported to the Council that Mrs. E. R. Bruce had been employed as a member of the office staff in the City Hall. He also reported that the summer paving program and street improvements were nearly completed and that within a short while, the city crew would again start concentrating on sewer system improvements and expansion.

The matter of a retirement plan for city employees came up for further discussion. After some discussion, members of the Council decided to postpone action until the next meeting so that the proposal can receive further consideration and study.

## Band Boosters To Conduct Financial Drive To Pay For New Hats And Trip

Boosters for the Goldthwaite High School Band held a special meeting Monday night to organize a membership and financial drive that they hope will pay for the new Shakos (hats) for band members and a trip

to the Astrodome for the entire band.
