Courthouse Landscaping Project Off Launching Pad Last Week

Landscaping the grounds of the Mills County Courthouse is a big step forward last week when work began on the project that has been in the planning stages for some time.

The first phase of the project was started last week in removing a number of trees around the jail and removing the old barn on the northeast corner grounds.

Three county commissioners moved in equipment and started the project last Wednesday and Thursday. They include Burthel Roberts, Precinct 1; Fred Wall Precinct 2; and A. R. Rowlett, Precinct 4.

W. R. Lindsey of Precinct 3 did not participate in the project.

Workers were handicapped because of rain and are scheduled to return to do some more work. County Judge Cecil Egger stated that equipment will be brought back to work on some terracing to help correct the drainage problem and do some leveling. This is expected to be done as soon as the weather permits.

The ambitious undertaking of landscaping and beautifying the courthouse grounds was adopted as a project by the Goldthwaite Garden Club and was approved by the Commissioners' Court of Mills County. The Club has an over-all plan outlined and prepared by a landscape architect and it will be a long range program developing the courthouse square block as a Mini-Park.

A number of members from the Goldthwaite Garden Club landscape committee were on hand as work got underway on removing the shrubs and trees and razing the band stand.

Mrs. Roy Wilkins is chairman of the Garden Club Courthouse Landscape committee. Other members of the committee are Mrs. Jim Weatherby, Mrs. Robert McCoy, Mrs. W. P. Duren, Mrs. Walton Daniel, Mrs. V. Z. Cornelius, Mrs. Malcolm Jernigan, and Mrs. Tom Collier.

President of the Garden Club is Mrs. G. C. Head.

The Goldthwaite Garden Club Committee can look to the future in working on plans to execute the overall project. It will be done, they said, "slowly and a little at a time."

Mrs. Wilkins announced this week the plans for this year call for planting a number of flowering bulbs and spring flowers in part of the area.

Some of the shrubs that were removed were part of a project of the Goldthwaite Garden Club members when they planted them in 1941.

A plaque on the band stand was dated 1922 indicating that the stand was erected in the early '20's. The plaque will be mounted and put on display in the courthouse, according to announcement.

Glynn Sanders, the newly elected president, is urging everyone in the county to support this 33rd Annual Stock Show for the benefit of the club boys and girls of the entire county.

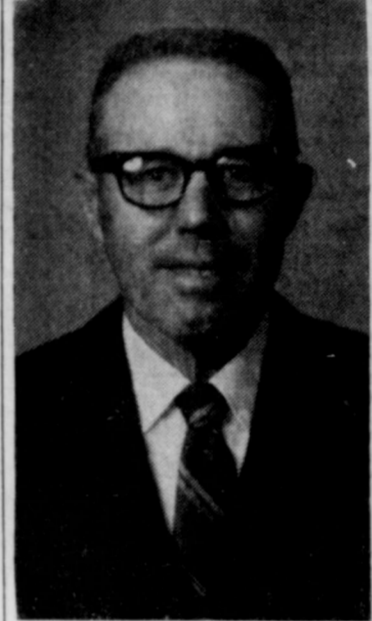
NIGHT SALE IS DISCUSSED

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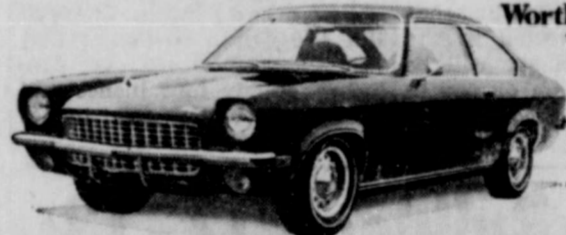

State Republican And Democratic Place Voter Appeal In Platforms

AUSTIN, Tex. — State Republican and Democratic parties have put their appeals to Texas voters in writing — via the platforms drafted at their separate conventions last week.

Democrats, party veterans said repeatedly, "wrote the most progressive planks ever."

Republicans put emphasis on attacking crime, campus disorders and drug use.

Highlights of the Democratic statement of party goals include:

• A far-reaching vocational education program, repeal of annual voter registration requirements and substitution of "registration by voting" every four years, opposition to a tax on groceries, a minimum foundation program for policemen with state standards of qualification and pay, state civil service, expansion of unemployment insurance benefits.

• Increase in workmen's compensation benefits, creation of a public utilities regulatory commission, establishment of an office of consumer protection, elimination of the \$80 million a year welfare outlay ceiling, an increase in minimum wage, sweeping insurance reforms and creation of a state management research commission to promote governmental efficiency.

Republican platform highlights are:

• Legislation to end discrimination in state governmental employment and to insure equal pay for equal work, creation of single-member legislative districts, realistic technical and vocational courses commencing at junior high school level and offered in nearly all high schools, condemnation of forced bussing of students to achieve racial balance;

• Opposition to a tax on groceries, later voter registration deadlines, inclusion of all insurance company income in calculating auto insurance rates, admission of oral confessions in trials, and life sentence without parole for murdering a policeman.

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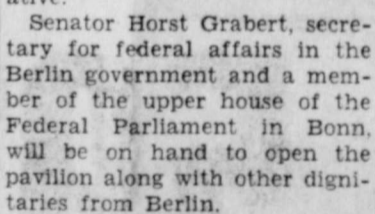

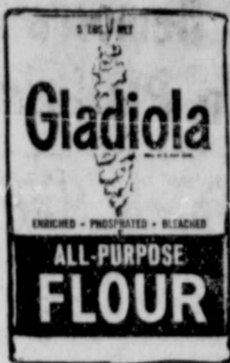

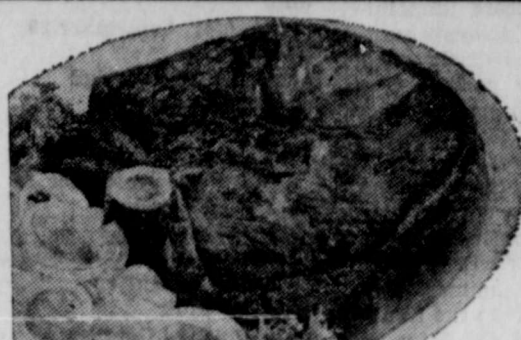

Quail Hunting Due To Be Good; May Turn Out Different Picture

SAN ANGELO — Nature has scattered wildlife across wide areas of West Texas and the Panhandle this year, especially bobwhite and blue quail. Some areas are due to have good hunting, some not so good.

Wildlife biologists of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department usually are cautious about forecasts and predictions of quail populations until all census information has been compiled and analyzed. This year is no exception. Census data bear out the need for careful study before saying the hunter is in for either a good or bad year when the season opens.

In some counties of the upper Panhandle the quail crop is down as much as 44 per cent, while farther south the population appears to promise another good year. In the Trans-Pecos region there is a marked decline in a few areas, a fine huntable crop in others.

According to Jack Parsons,

wildlife supervisor for the 90-county area of the Department's Region I, portions of the Permian Basin show a five per cent increase over the fine crop of last year, with a few game management officers pinpointing spots where blue quail hunting should be extremely good, bobwhite hunting good, and a few counties with both species showing evidence of a plentiful supply of both birds.

Areas that suffered from drought conditions during winter and spring months hold little promise. Spots where rains came during the summer have birds enough to make the hunter's trigger finger get itchy.

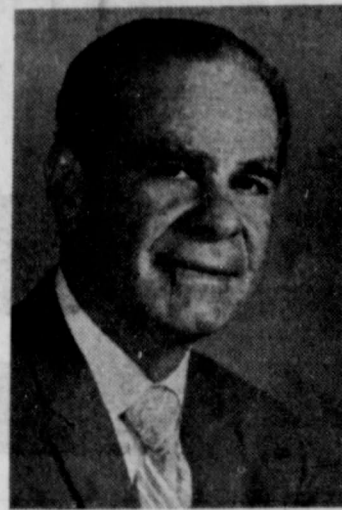
New Division Manager Named By General Telephone; Rutland Retires
