Overall the entire "B" team played an outstanding game both offensive and defensive.

Voter Registration Shows Slight Increase In Mills County

Voter registrations in Mills County for 1971 are going well, according to announcement Tuesday by H. G. Brooks, Tax Assessor-Collector.

As of Tuesday afternoon 1,061 had registered to vote for the new year. Last year at this time, 1,002 voters had registered. This increase would indicate that the people of Mills County are taking an interest in the coming state and local elections to the extent of being registered, at least.

Voter registration is running considerably higher than it was at the same period two years ago when only 776 had registered.

In the third period Johnson plunged one yard and Watson scrambled three for two more Eagle touchdowns. Johnson added the 2 extra points.

Watson added another three-yard TD run in the fourth. Joe Dan Hardgrave also pushed over the goal line on a one-yard run to conclude the scoring for the night.

Mrs. Stacy opened the meeting and called on Rev. Dale Gore to give the invocation. Then the meeting was turned over to Mayor Ray Duren who brought the group up-to-date on the former meeting and opened discussions to get the public reaction as to whether a permanent organization should be formulated.

O'Donnell Newton, counselor for the Mills County schools, showed part of a film entitled "Hooked" which consisted of discussions by several former drug addicts who told of their experiences.

After seeing the film those

present were given an opportunity to express their opinions as to whether a need existed for this educational program in Mills County.

Those attending the discussion included representatives from various phases of community life including city officials, county officials, civic clubs, churches, school administration, school students, school faculty, housewives, physicians, druggists, law enforcement officers, and news media.

After considerable discussion the group voted to set up a permanent organization and elected officers.

The newly elected officers will formulate plans for the organization which will be county wide in scope with a number of committees set up to deal with the various phases of the educational program.

After plans are formulated an announcement will be made and committees will be brought together to outline work to present information to parents and children alike on the hazards and danger of drug use and abuse.

New Book Available On Grassland Restoration And Effect On Wildlife

Can increased wildlife, better hunting, and more beef result if Texas grasslands are restored to their once-lush condition? Or does increased beef supplies and grassland improvement spell doom for Texas wildlife?

These are some of the issues discussed in a new booklet, "Grassland Restoration and Its Effect on Wildlife," published by the Soil Conservation Service. "We believe grassland improvement can be done in such a way that it will benefit man, livestock and wildlife," Clyde W. Graham, State Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, said in announcing publication of the new booklet. "To achieve all these benefits, however, grassland restoration must be planned and carried out wisely."

Graham said that Texas grasslands are a great renewable resource. They not only make Texas the leading livestock state but they also provide many other valuable resources. They form the watershed for most of the water used by cities, industry, and agriculture; they also provide a home for a major part of the state's wildlife and provide much of our outdoor recreation.

"We believe that all uses of land need to be considered when grasslands are treated to restore their productivity," Graham stressed. "This must be a package job coordinating brush control, range seeding, proper grazing use, watering facilities, and other measures to the benefit of users of this resource."

Due to pressures from grazing and misuse, Graham said our state's rich grasslands have steadily deteriorated. As the choice forage plants have been weakened and killed by overuse, they have been replaced with plants that provide less food for wildlife and livestock. An SCS study made in 1967 indicated that 138 million acre-feet of water per year — 38 percent of the state's average annual rainfall was being wasted by non-economic plants such as

grassland restoration, done with proper considerations for wildlife, can actually result in more food for deer and other wildlife as well as for livestock. It points out that improved, highly productive grasslands offer a stable wildlife food supply while depleted, brush-ruined grasslands cause severe wildlife die-offs during extreme climatic conditions.

"In fact, one of the worst enemies of wildlife is the person who insists that vast amounts of brush be left on depleted grasslands," Graham emphasized. "Instead of helping wildlife, this person is sentencing game to a tortuous death by starvation during adverse conditions."

Vernon Hicks, state biologist for the Soil Conservation Service, and Howard Passey, former state resource conservationist for SCS, co-authored the new publication. The Wildlife Science and the Texas Science Departments of Texas A&M University as well as the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department assisted in its technical review.

The series of Grassland Restoration booklets started in 1964. Part I described the critical problem of brush invasion on grassland; Part II dealt with methods of control; Part III was devoted to procedures for re-

vegetating depleted land; Part IV outlined grazing management needed on grassland. Part V pointed out the water loss from unconsolidated plans and suggested ways of reclaiming much of the land. Single copies of Part I, "Grassland Restoration and Effect on Wildlife," are available free from local SCS offices.

Dear Publisher:

The support of newspapers throughout Texas in using traffic safety material provided by the Governor's office is most appreciated.

You can take real satisfaction in the knowledge that your emphasis on traffic safety has made its impact in reducing deaths, injuries and economic loss from traffic crashes on our streets and highways compared to the same period last year.

Hunting Accidents Needless Tragedy;
Basic Rules For Safe Gun Handling

"Hunting season every year brings needless tragedy to Texas, and in almost every incident carelessness is the culprit," the President of the Texas Safety Association said today.

George Wm. Perry, a Dallas attorney who heads the statewide safety group, urged Texas hunters to learn and use the basic rules of weapons handling and gun safety.

"Last year 24 persons died as a result of hunting accidents in this state," said Perry. The TSA leader pointed to hunting accident records which showed there were 92 separate accidents involving 142 persons.

"The tragedy is that these accidents just do not have to occur. Sixty-nine of the people involved in the hunting accidents last year were under 21 years of age. Forty of those involved were 16 years old or younger," Perry noted.

He said that this was clear-cut evidence that many people are hunting before they have been given proper instruction in safe hunting practices.

"Parents need to make sure the youngsters understand the rules of safe hunting and make sure they obey them," Perry urged.

There are twelve basic rules for safe gun handling, according to the Texas Safety Association.

1. Treat every gun as if it were loaded, never take anyone's word that a gun is empty.
2. Always point the gun muzzle in a safe direction, never aim at anything you don't intend to shoot.
3. Be sure of your target, never shoot at unidentified noises, wait until the whole animal or bird is visible.
4. Know the correct way to carry your gun, under your arm, on your shoulder, cradled in your arms, and in both hands.
5. Keep the safety on or the chamber unloaded until ready to fire and keep your finger out of the trigger guard.
6. Check bore frequently — through the breech end — to be sure it is clear of foreign objects.
7. Agree beforehand on the area each hunter will cover.
8. Be sure the action is open when handing a gun to another person, or stopping to eat, talk, or rest.
9. Transport unloaded guns in cases for their protection and keep them out of sight to prevent theft.
10. When hunting in a group no hunter should carry a gun so that it even points at another person.
11. Unload gun before crossing fences and pass the gun under first.
12. Correct unsafe gun handling whenever you see it by explaining and demonstrating the right way to handle a firearm.

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Six Amendments Added To Texas
Constitution By Voters November 3

Half a dozen new amendments have been added to the Texas Constitution, including one authorizing sale of liquor-by-the-drink.

Passage of Amendment 2, however, does not mean automatic mixed drink dispensing. Amendment merely repeals the ban on open saloons and empowers the legislature to pass a law regulating liquor-by-the-drink.

Starting next January, lawmakers must first act to establish procedures, licensing requirements and regulations. Then, local option elections must be held to determine where mixed drink sales are wanted by voters.

Many observers feel there actually will be no legal sales of booze over the bar in public establishments before the end of 1971. Others think preliminaries will be disposed of in some areas by mid-year, but that would mean passage of the bill by a two-thirds majority to place it in immediate effect. More likely effective date of legislation is next September, with elections to follow.

Other constitutional changes would provide for:

- Disciplinary action, including censure, of all judges.
- Appointed (by governors) three-man State Building Com-

mission.

- County issue of road up to one-fourth of value of all local real property on majority vote of taxpayers.
- Increase from \$10,000 in value of home which is exempt from sale.
- Laws permitting all to consolidate certain and offices.

Amendment to permit land assessment on the crop yield was defeated.

Auto Insurance Company Spokesmen Call For Minimum Profit Allowance

AUSTIN, Tex. — Auto insurance company spokesmen have called for an "absolute minimum" 11.7 per cent profit allowance after taxes. Industry representatives told the State Board of Insurance at a two-day hearing that they must have that margin to stay afloat and serve car owners. At the same time, they told

the Board it should consider all sources of insurance company earnings in arriving at rates. Meeting was to hear testimony as to whether company investment income should be included in the auto premium rate base. Further hearing in November will determine what actual rate recommendations will be. Apparently, no rate change will go into effect before next January. Industry recommendations — including consideration of all income and fixed allowance for a fair rate of return — would add up to a 6.5 per cent increase in the auto premium rate for most motorists, experts estimated.

Under industry recommendations, future rate inadequacies would be the "sole responsibility of the (state) regulators if they fail to recognize a proper rate of return," spokesmen said. Expert witnesses told the Board that state-regulated utilities, which have far less risk of loss than casualty insurance companies, are permitted higher profits.

Others said that casualty insurance companies are among those that have the lowest rates of return of any major industry. Unimpressed, Texas AFL-CIO President H. S. (Hank) Brown promised the biggest fight "since the Battle of the Alamo" if the Board agrees to another rate increase.

Fair Credit Reporting Act Signed By Nixon

The Fair Credit Reporting Act, which has just been signed into law by President Nixon, satisfies the concerns of consumers without placing undue restrictions upon the credit reporting industry, said Virgil Wooten, Manager, of the Credit Bureau of Lampasas.

"Consumer protections provided in the Fair Credit Reporting Act have been standard operating procedures at the Credit Bureau for many years," Mr. Wooten said. "For example, the Act requires credit bureaus to disclose credit records to consumers which is our regular practice."

Associated Credit Bureaus, Inc., the international trade association with which the Credit Bureau is affiliated, supported passage of the law.

"Even though most credit bureaus are already in compliance with the provisions of the Act, we plan to work closely with consumer groups and credit grantor so that everyone has complete understanding of the law and how it will affect them," Mr. Wooten said. The law becomes effective next April.

"Consumers and the credit reporting industry are indebted to Congress for its vigorous regard for the rights of consumers and tolerant understanding of the needs of the credit reporting industry," Mr. Wooten said.

Wheat Research Will Be Added To Other Programs For County Growers

Mills County wheat growers are directly involved in the new Wheat Research and Promotion Act, according to Robert E. Jarvis, Executive Director of the Mills County ASCS Office.

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin has said, "Domestic utilization of wheat in human nutrition and industry can be encouraged by the recently enacted Wheat Research and Promotion Act. The prospect is quite promising that research can develop new products and greater utilization of wheat."

Financing of the program under the new law is to come from proceeds of the 1968 wheat export certification pool not claimed by eligible farmers.

"Local wheat growers whose share of the export certificate pool amounts to \$3.00 or more will receive notice directly from the Mills County ASCS office telling them what their share of the pool is and explaining the options each grower has," Mr. Jarvis said.

A producer may choose to receive his share of the export certificate pool or leave it in the pool to finance the research and promotion program.

Wheat growers in Mills County, entitled to receive less than \$3.00, will not receive a special notice but they can nevertheless claim their share of export certificates by filing a written request for payment with the county ASCS office. Each producer's share of the export certificate pool will amount to about 56 cents for each \$100.00 of the 1968 domestic wheat certificates earned.

Wheat growers will have until December 25, 1970 to notify their county ASCS office of their choice.

The 1968 wheat export certificate pool of about \$4.2 million is the result of legislation passed several years ago that provided for excess collections of export certificates to be distributed pro rata among wheat producers.

Wheat exporters are required to buy export certificates for

any lot of wheat exported whenever the U. S. price is less than the world price. Whenever the U. S. price exceeds the world price, an export subsidy is paid to the exporters to make the wheat competitive in world markets.

The world market price for the 1968 crop of wheat was at times higher than the U. S. price, and an export certificate pool accumulated. The original law provided for this pool to be divided pro rata among wheat producers. "For most producers, it would be payment of only a few dollars—less than a dollar, in fact, for many," Mr. Jarvis said.

"The new law allows them either to receive their pro rata share, or leave it in the pool to be used in research and promotion of U. S. wheat," he added. The law authorizes the Secre-

tary of Agriculture to enter into agreement with farm organizations representing wheat producers interest, such as the newly-formed National Wheat Institute, to carry out research and promotion.

The Institute is a non-profit organization representing a cooperative effort among wheat producers groups to increase domestic wheat usage. The institute incorporates the recommendations outlined by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and eligibility to receive commodities under the program.

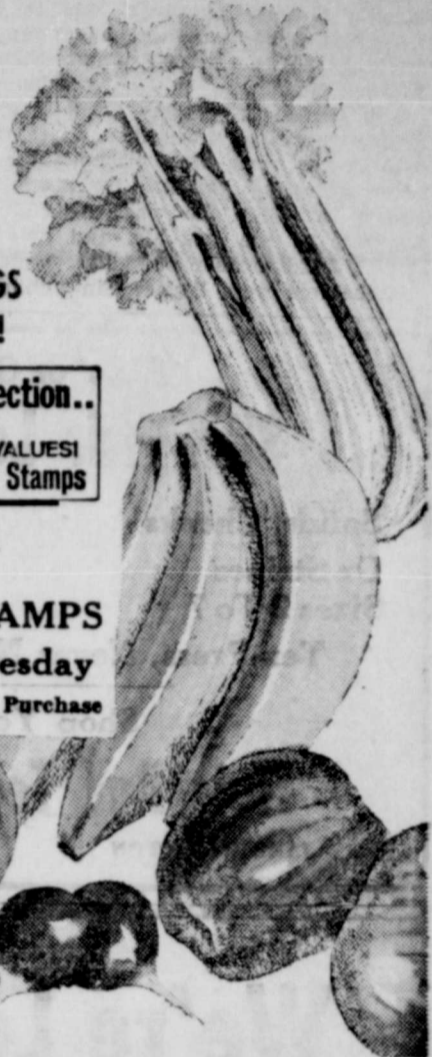
