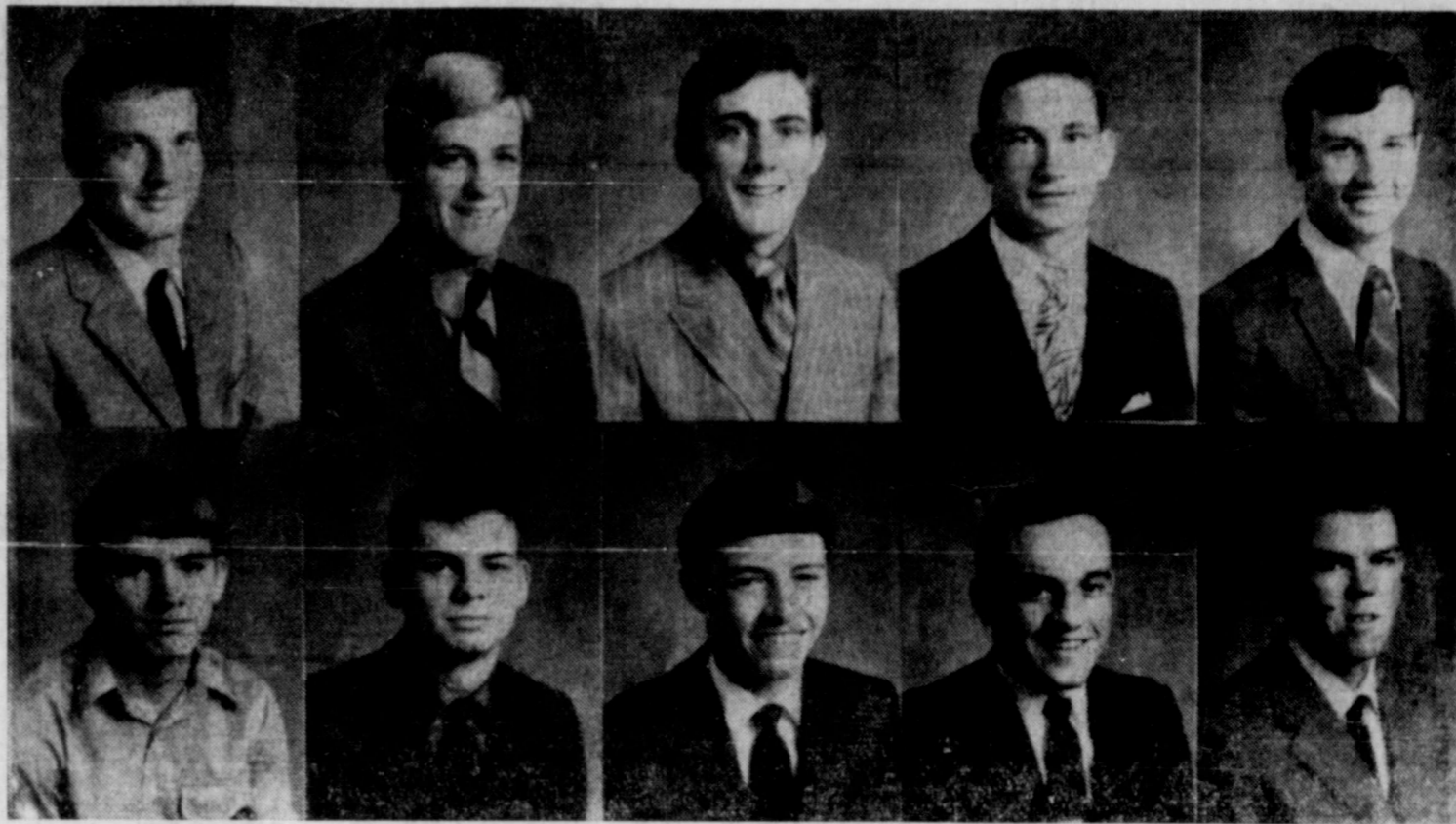
EVANS SHOWS SLIDES

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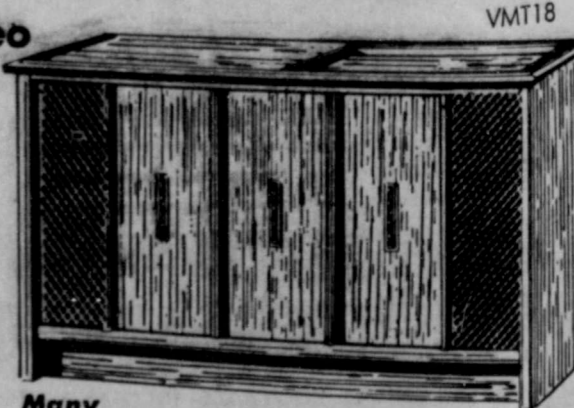

Public Acceptance Of Computerized Banking Is Growing On Local Scene

Public acceptance of computerized banking is growing on the local scene, it was revealed in a check with officials of Mills County State Bank the past week.

Under the new and changed system all demand accounts are identified by number for computerized bookkeeping and the cooperation from the general public has been very good, according to Victor Williams, cashier.

Williams stated that approximately 65 per cent of their customers are now using personalized name imprinted checks and more are changing daily. The fact that some hesitate to accept the change may be because they don't understand the problems involved and why the banking industry needs to make bookkeeping changes to handle the daily paper transactions, he said.

By way of explanation Mr. Williams made the following comments:

"In 1967, The Federal Reserve Bank ruled that they would no longer handle checks or drafts unless they had the transit routing number printed in magnetic ink along the lower edge. The reason for this ruling was that the Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas handles over one million checks a day, therefore, it had become impossible to handle this volume by hand.

All banks complied with this ruling and the general public operated beautifully, so "CHANGED CHECKS" and "COUNTER DRAFTS" are now a thing of the past. Soon almost all banks following this guideline began the process of handling checks and deposits by using electronically, or by computer." A bank with ten million dollars in deposits will handle approximately ten thousand items a day. In order to do this a bank must have a substantial amount of new and modern equipment.

"Each individual account must be assigned a number, and two accounts have the same number. This does not mean that a person who is a customer of a bank has been changed from a name to a number. All that happens is that it gives a computer, which cannot read names, a number that it can read. All accounts are still handled in the names of the person to whom it belongs.

"Recently, a bank in this area has made a six months study of returned checks, keeping careful daily records. They report that the average daily checks returned for "Not Sufficient Funds" or "No Account" are sixteen a day. Of the sixteen checks returned daily, eleven or about three-fourth were COUNTER checks. The average daily loss was \$138.94. It appears that the people who are accepting counter checks are bearing the greatest portion of this \$138.94

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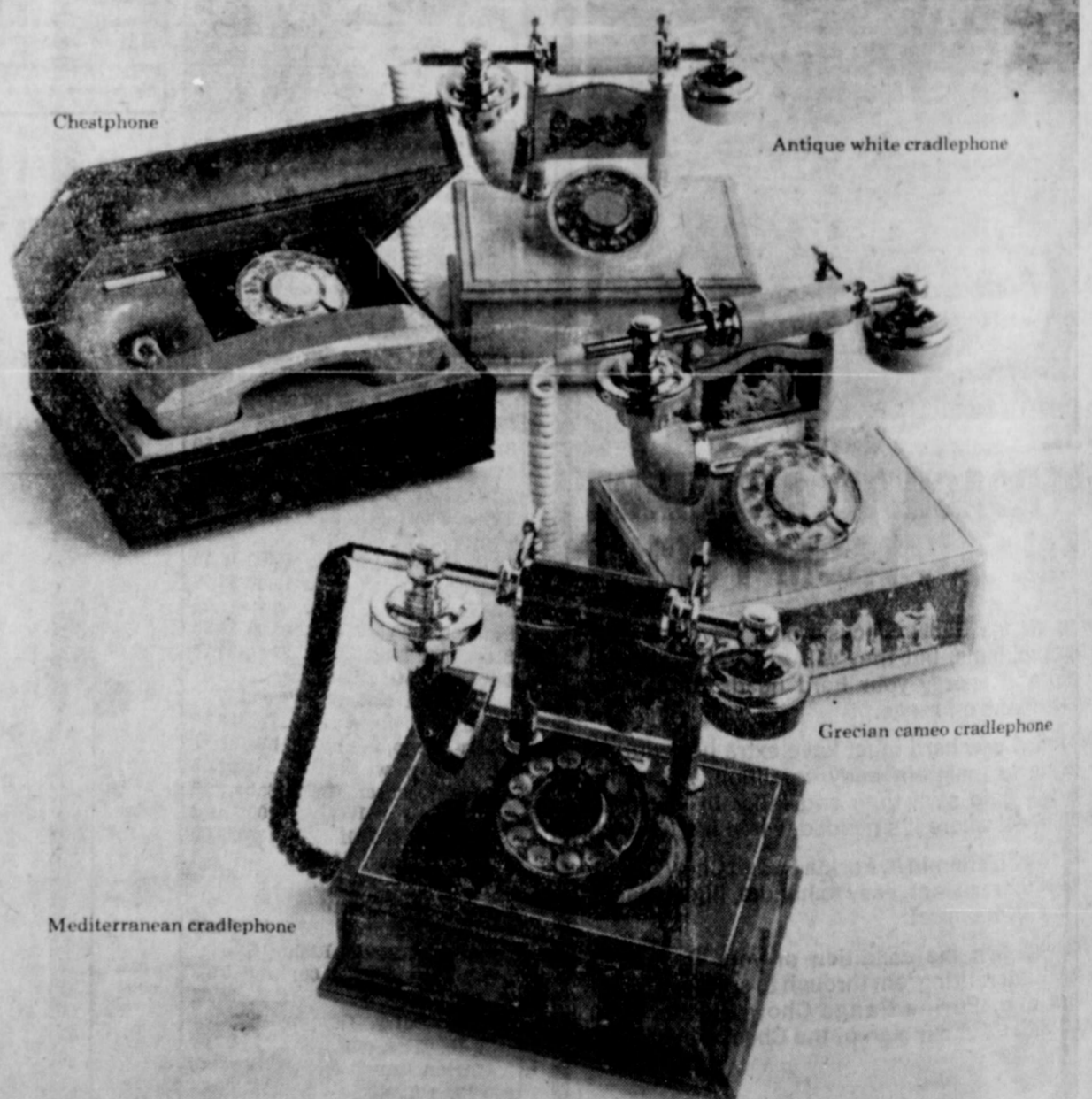

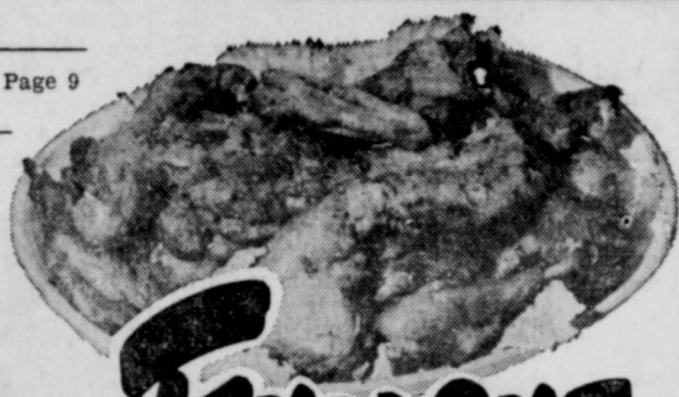
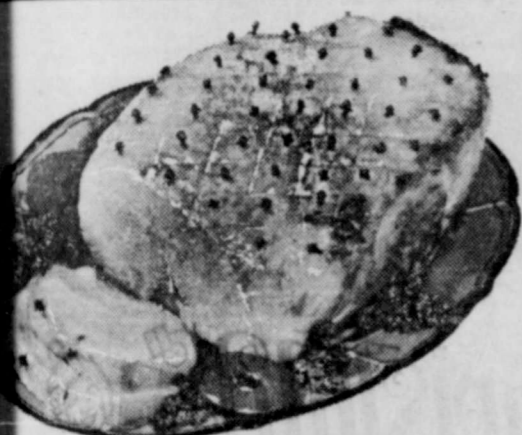

In making the announcement, Supt. Gilbert Davis stated that the program is being offered by schools throughout the United States and will be used by all schools having a lunchroom program. The new regulations will go in effect after the first of the year.

Lunches for elementary students are 30c and 35c for secondary students. However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the schools will provide these lunches free of charge or at a reduced price to those children who are determined by the school administration to be unable to pay for

the full price. Responsibility for making determination of the eligibility of a family for free or reduced price lunches for its children will be delegated to the superintendent and principal of each school involved.

Income scales to determine eligibility for free lunches graduate from family size of one member and an income of \$1,200 to a family size of eight members and a maximum income of \$5,100.

Families who feel that their children may be eligible for free or reduced lunches are urged to apply. Copies of application form may be obtained from the superintendent's office at the school. All information provided on the application will be held in the strictest confidence.

Any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches, such as prolonged illness in the family, unexpected expenses due to fire, flood, or any other disaster of this nature; seasonal unemployment and similar emergency situations, will also be considered.

If a family is not satisfied with the decision made on their application, it may request a hearing to appeal the decision. This request may be made orally or in writing to the administrator of the school at the superintendent's office.

and butterflies; a horned toad; and ended with a picture of the last jaguar killed in Mills County about 1904.

DR. TOM CODY GRAVES IS GUEST SPEAKER

Then Glynn Collier introduced the speaker, Dr. Tom Cody Graves. Theme of his talk was "Attitudes of Americans Today." He spoke of the unhappiness and unrest demonstrated by American Youth. Some of the things to which they credit this unrest are, the war, the establishment, and the generation gap. Dr. Graves said that these are not causes but only symptoms, and an attitude that nothing is being done as fundamental underlying causes.

Excessive permissiveness robs the individual of the atmosphere necessary for normal emotional development.

Changes that come about too quickly do not allow the individual time to make adjustments. The population explosion has crowded people together in too little space.

College campuses which 20 years ago accommodated enrollments small enough for everyone to know each other now house thousands of students with very little added room or facilities.

The automobile which has contributed so much to the economy and pleasure of modern living is a chief source of smog. Detergents, the miracle suds, are responsible for much of our stream and lake pollution.

It is small wonder that youth today feel that nothing is being done when so many of our elected officials make promises that they not only fail to carry through but often fail even to try. A court and judicial system that is so crowded that it takes years for a case to come up and then usually drags on for weeks ineffectively.

In suggesting some things that could be done, Dr. Graves said that instead of parents, teachers, members of the establishment attempting to show love and concern through permissiveness, they should teach responsibility and respect. Learn to talk to them. Listen to what they have to say. Learn to know them. Set examples in your own activities that you want youth to develop.

As to change he said each new thing should be studied for its long range effect over a long period of time to avoid some of the disastrous consequences we are facing today.

Talk to young people about what is being done or attempted in an equal exchange of ideas. Keep informed and examine ideas from youth's point of view. Dr. Graves suggested that if campaign spending could be limited or relieved that public officials might not be obligated so greatly to special interests and could spend more time for the common good. He closed by saying, "We have a good country and good people. Let's make both of them better."
