School Trustee Filing Deadline March Third

Next Wednesday, March 3, is the last day for candidates to file for the school trustee election and have their names printed on the official ballot. The filing deadline is 30 days before the election which is scheduled to take place on Saturday, April 3.

Three trustees will be elected to the board for Goldthwaite, Mullin, Priddy and Star school districts for a regular three year term. Two members will be elected to the County School Board, one from commissioner's district three and one from the county-at-large, for a regular three year term.

Candidates must file with County Judge Cecil Egger. Names may be placed on the official ballot by the candidate appearing in person or by petition signed by five regularly qualified voters of the respective districts.

Candidates nominated by petition also must sign the affidavit for candidate for public office in the office of the County Judge 30 days before the election in order for the names to be placed on the official ballot.

Plans Are Complete For MOD Walk Scheduled Here Saturday Morning

Two Phases Completed Ahead Of Schedule; Below Estimated Cost

The City's sewer system expansion and improvement program has come to an untimely halt, according to announcement by City Manager W. C. Barnett.

A program started in the fall of 1969 on a pay-as-you-go basis with cost sharing by the city and property owners saw phases one and two completed ahead of schedule and below engineer's estimated costs.

Engineering survey and staking the area of phase three was done and actual construction got underway when work had to be stopped due to lack of cooperation from some property owners in granting the necessary rights-of-way.

Detailed study of the city's need for sewer system expansion got underway in 1967. This was due to the increasing need from the standpoint of providing sewer facilities to more homes since the system when originally built covered only a small area of the city.

In January of 1967 the City Council ordered a complete

survey made to arrive at a possible cost involved to improve the system and expand it to serve all residents of the city.

The engineer's report, by Rady & Associates, was presented to the council in May, 1967. The survey covered extensions to all parts of the city, including lift stations and some improvements of the present system. It was estimated by engineers at that time that it would cost about \$320,000.00.

After due consideration by City Council and Management it became apparent that to undertake this size job would require a bond issue, possibly both tax and revenue, to finance it. City officials felt it was too big an undertaking and the matter was tabled.

NEED INCREASES

As time went on the need for action became more apparent, especially in some areas where it was at the point of creating a health hazard due to lack of city sanitary sewer service being

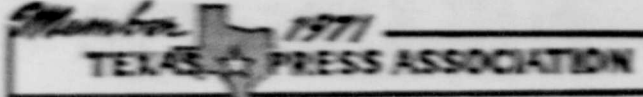

A PROGRESS REPORT FROM YOUR CITY COUNCIL On The Sewer System Expansion Program

To keep citizens of Goldthwaite up to date on what has been done and what is planned for the future in connection with the sewer system expansion and improvement program which was started in 1961, we present the following:

PHASE ONE - COMPLETED

Eight block area East of the railroad, 3,000 feet of main line with seven man holes installed, providing service to 31 homes. Fourteen connected to date.

PHASE TWO - COMPLETED

Area in Northwest part of the city. Live Oak Street, Peach Street, Proctor Drive and Hanna Valley Rd. Installed 6,000 feet of main line, eight man holes and three lift stations. Provided service to 48 homes with 27 connected to the system to date.

CONSTRUCTION COSTS

Total cost in labor and material	\$33,053.37

Members of the City Council appreciate the splendid cooperation from residents throughout the area covered by the first two phases in granting easements to provide this much needed sewer service for their homes.

However, city officials are keenly disappointed over the fact that while service has been made available to 77 homes, only 41 have availed themselves of the city's sanitary sewer system to date. Some are located in areas that were deemed critical from the standpoint of sanitation and health hazard and who were most anxious for the city to provide the service.

PHASE THREE - NOW AT STAND STILL

This area is in the South part of the city, West of the Railroad and South of Sixth Street. It was engineered and staked for installation to get underway.

Work has stopped due to lack of cooperation from some property owners in granting rights-of-way easements that are needed to install the system and provide service to this large area of the city.

Your City Council will appreciate the cooperation of residents in this area so that sewer service may be provided to the many homes located there on the same basis that is being provided to other sections of the city.

Since the entire project is a joint venture by the city and property owners on a "Share The Cost" basis, an appreciable amount can be paid for rights-of-way, if the job is to be completed.

Your continued consideration and support in behalf of a better city is sincerely solicited and will be appreciated.

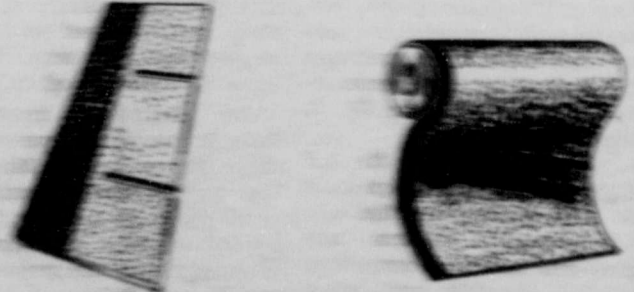

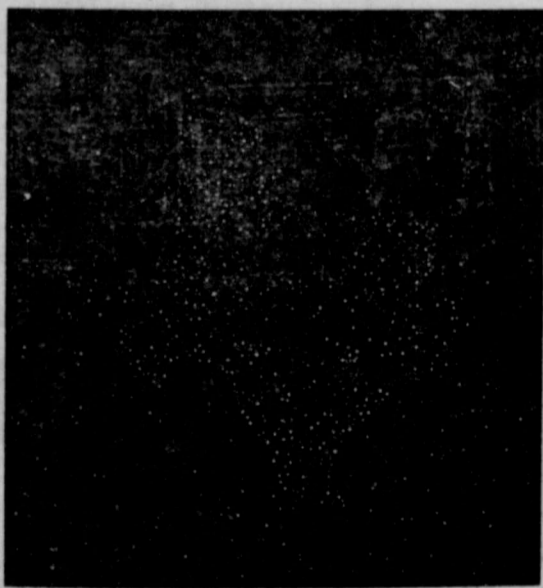
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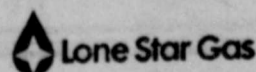

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1 of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said returns, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment to the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitu-

tion, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize. "(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law. "(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. "(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. "(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. "(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

in these programs as it deems appropriate. "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. "Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes in any manner nor to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission, of each group of three appointees no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session. "(2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years. "(3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. "(4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

at an amount higher than that of other members notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary of Article IV, Section 17, of the Texas Constitution. "(5) The commission shall promulgate rules of ethics to govern the conduct of all legislators, legislative officers and all officeholders, appointive or elective, of any office, department, district, agency, commission, board or any governmental unit or branch established by or under the authority of the constitution and laws of the State of Texas and all persons who shall use any privilege of the floor in either House of the Legislature. The Texas State Ethics Commission shall further promulgate rules providing that each member of the hereinabove named officeholders upon election and any appointee to any of these offices shall file with the State Ethics Commission a statement under oath setting out a complete financial statement in detail within 10 days after being elected or receiving an appointment. This information shall be privileged information to the State Ethics Commission to be used only to determine if there exists a conflict of interests or if there is or has been a violation of any of the rules of ethics promulgated by the Texas State Ethics Commission or any laws of the State of Texas. The Legislature shall enact statutes dealing with unauthorized disclosure or misuse of said privileged information. "(6) The commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics, Legislative compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary. "(7) All rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission shall be promulgated before the convening of any session of the Legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State. "(8) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation unless dis-

proved before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature. "(b) All rates of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission thereof shall not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature. "All votes on these resolutions or parts thereof shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses. "(8) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency, official, legislative body, grand jury or district attorney. "(9) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 130 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session. "(10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and to recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

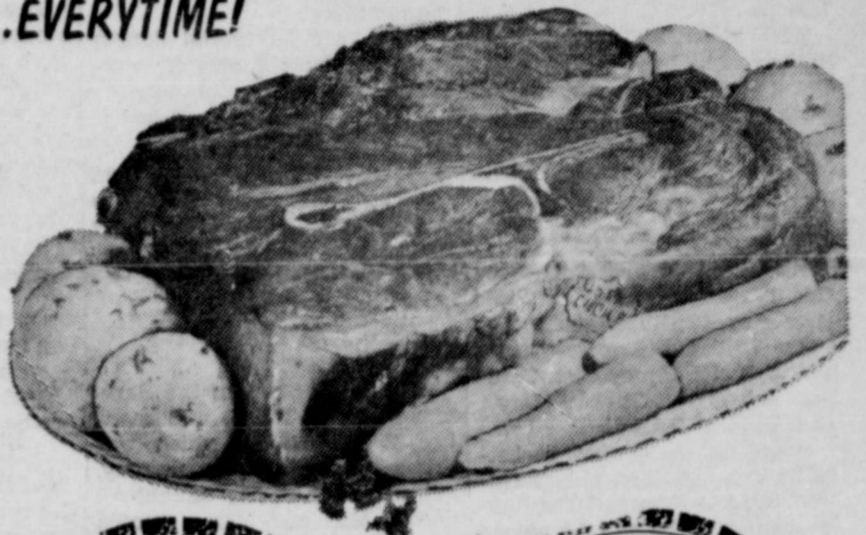

available.

The Council again contacted the city's engineers to work out a possible plan to make extensions on a step by step and pay as you go basis. With cost sharing by residents served, extensions would be made where the need was the greatest.

PLANS FORMALIZED

The Council called a special session to hear plans and to work out details. At that meeting plans were approved to start the project on the pay-as-you-go basis with a minimum of engineering services hired and the work to be done by employees of the city. To get things started the council voted to transfer \$15,000.00 from the electric fund, use all available cash from the sewer fund, increase the sewer service charge to \$2.00 per month and a charge of \$150.00 per customer connection as the cost share by residents.

PRIORITIES

When plans were mapped out the committee listed the priorities as follows:

Phase 1: An area east of the railroad.

Phase 2: The northwestern section of the city including Peach Street, Live Oak Street, Proctor Drive and the Hanna Valley Rd.

Phase 3: The south part of the city covering an area west of the railroad and south of Sixth Street.

Work on Phase one got underway in the fall of 1969. It covered approximately eight blocks with installation of over 3,000 feet of line and seven man holes. Service was made available to 31 homes. Fourteen have connected to date.

Phase two which was completed in the fall of 1970 covered approximately 6,000 feet of line, construction of eight man holes and three lift stations. This made service available to 48 homes with 27 connected to the line to date.

In addition to the 9,000 feet of gravity flow lines installed in the first two phases there was also installed approximately 1,100 feet of forced pressure main line.

CONSTRUCTION COSTS

The first two phases were completed by the city at a total cost of \$33,053.37. This covered labor and material. It was paid for by \$15,000.00 from the electric department, \$8,150.00 from customer connections and the balance from the sewer operating funds.

Through the first two phases service has been made available to 79 homes, although only 41 have hooked up to date and availed themselves of the city

sewer facilities.

RIGHTS-OF-WAY

The city has paid out no money for rights-of-way, except \$50.00 each for three lift stations constructed on private property. It has been the council's thinking that customers should be more than happy to furnish sewer line rights-of-way easements due to the improvements of their land and increase in value of their property.

It can be readily seen that if money were to be paid out to each property owner for right-of-way on footage the amount would be enormous and too much to undertake since construction costs must be kept down, according to city officials.

COSTS BELOW ESTIMATES

City Manager Barnett announced that construction costs to date have been kept well below engineer's estimates. It has cost the city approximately \$3.75 per foot for installation including man holes and lift stations.

City officials point out that if the sewer extensions are to be continued they will have to be on the same basis. Cost figures have to be kept in line with expenses of phases one and two and no appreciable amount can be paid for rights-of-ways.

COSTS MAY BE UP FOR PHASE THREE

It is estimated that construction costs in the south part of town in phase three will be higher than the first two. Installation will be more difficult because of the large area and the unevenness of the terrain.

The area had been engineered and staked and work had been started when it came to a halt. Progress on installation is being held up for the present due to lack of rights-of-way being furnished by residents of the area to be served by the city sanitary sewer system, officials stated.
