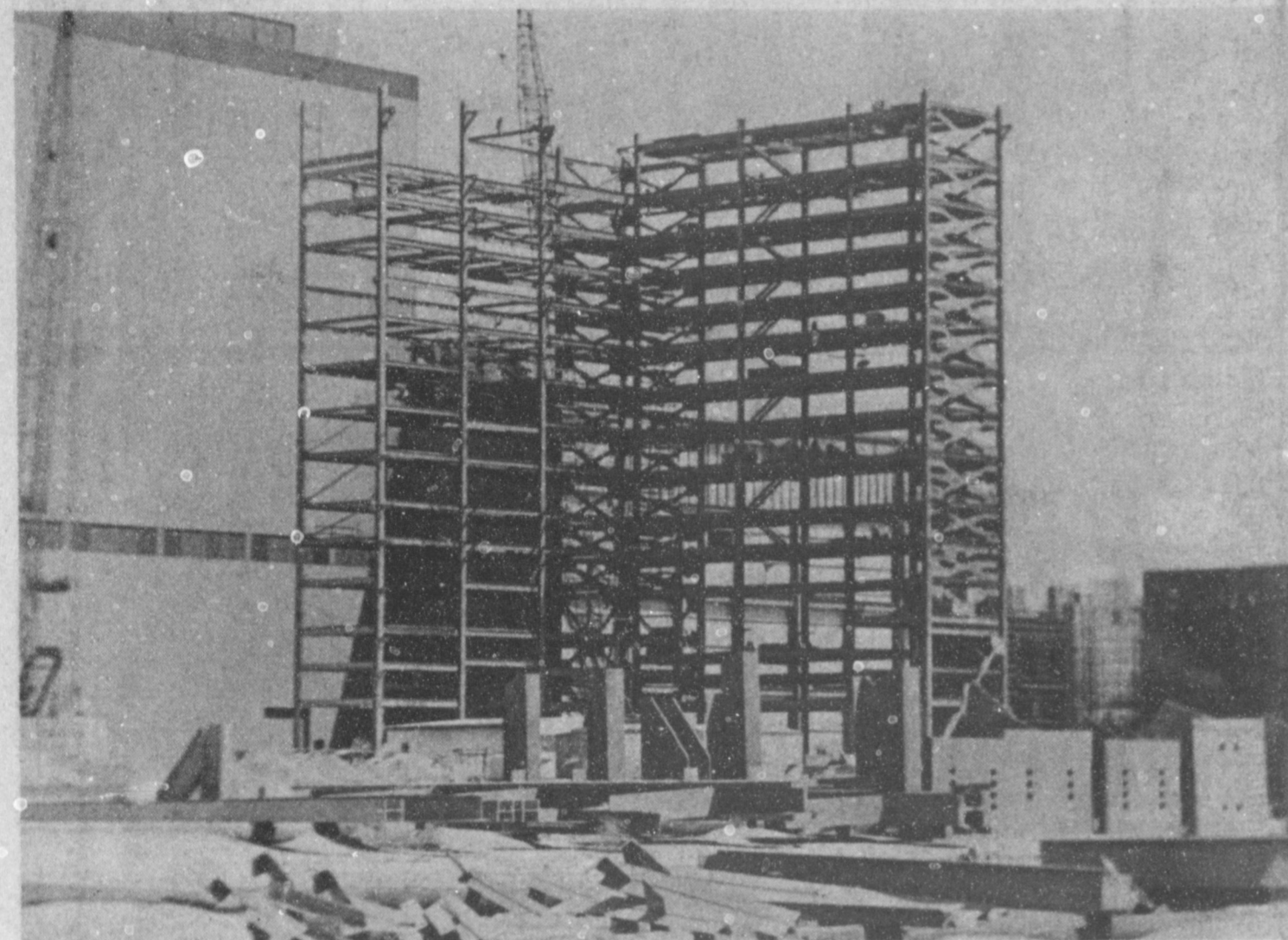

Unit No. 2 Construction Underway At Tolk



TOLK SENTINEL OF THE PLAINS—Towering some 185 feet into the air, Tolk Station Unit 2 is approximately 2 percent completed at this time. The finished structure will be around 300 feet high and will give total power to both units one million kilowatts upon completion. The coal-fired plant's second unit is due for completion in July, 1985, and will stand immediately west of the first unit, which can be seen in the background.

Farmers Urged To 'Call Congress'

More than 65 congressmen have joined to sponsor a national "telephone" hearing on the farm economy. The call-in will be held on May 11 between the hours of 10 a.m. and 10 p.m., in a hope to dramatize the many problems facing farmers and ranchers in Texas and other states.

Farmers across the nation are being urged to dial a toll-free number between the specified hours on May 11 to talk with their congressmen and representatives about their problems.

School Board Meet Thursday

A regular meeting of the Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees has been scheduled on May 3, Thursday at 8 p.m. in the school administration office.

Items due for consideration will be the Bailey County Appraisal District Budget, personnel and the 1983 school budget update. The tax collection report will be heard and approval of changes to the tax roll will be made.

Other things up for discussion include the renovation project of the high school, methods to be used to handle advance sales football tickets.

Plant Completion Target July, 1985

Steel girders reaching approximately 185 feet into the West Texas sky cast of Muleshoe can be identified as the structural skeleton of Unit 2 of the Tolk Station. Workmen on the site estimate that the second unit is close to two percent complete at this time. Completion of the second unit is scheduled in July, 1985, when an additional 550,000 kilowatts will join with the same identical capabilities in Unit #1. The cost of building the first unit is in excess of \$200 million and projected total cost of both units should surpass \$500 million upon completion.

Of prime interest to plant officials and employees at this time is preparation and finalizing of work to enable them to start using the coal facility. According to Roy Gibson, Safety Coordinator, the lines have to be

"blown" (cleared of any debris, etc.), insulation installed and all lines tied in before the plant can process any coal. In explaining the use of coal, Gibson stated that commodity is much cheaper than gas-fired boilers, and therefore, much more economical to the consumer.

Before the plant can start using coal, another priority must be met. That includes having a 90 day stockpile of coal. Since it will take about 600 tons per hour, and 14,400 tons per day, it will take approximately 1,296,000 tons of coal to make a 90-day stockpile.

Low sulfur coal is being delivered to Tolk Station by rail from Black Thunder, Wyoming and comes in 110 car trains. Each coal car is 53'1" long and 12'9" high and carries 100 tons per car. The cars can be unloaded in approximately four hours by the use of a specially constructed dumping operation. The cars themselves are hooked together with swivel hitches, so each

Classes will be offered starting at age three to students who will have completed the sixth grade this year.

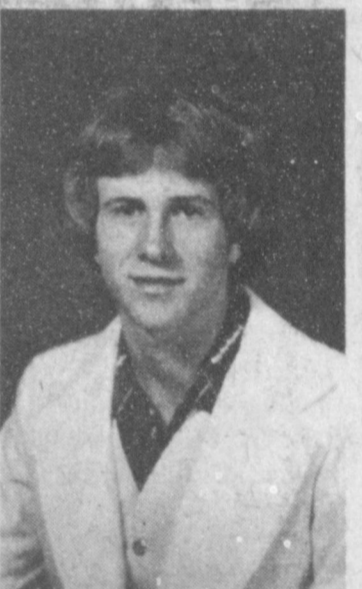

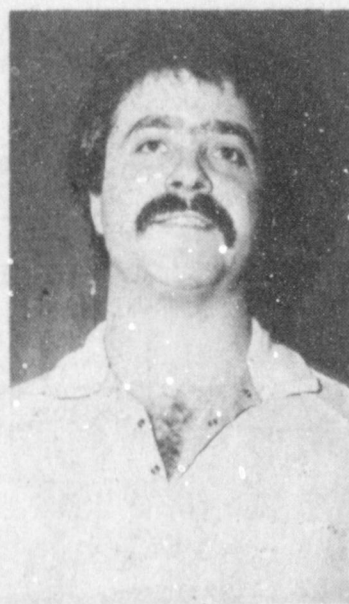

cat rotates to the west by 140 degrees, thereby dumping the coal at a rate of 1 car per four minutes. The first three cars of the train, however, are dumped manually to ensure proper position for the dumping operation, according to Corky Jobert, operations trainer at the plant.

This coal will be finally used in the huge boilers to provide the heat that creates the power. Before it reaches the boilers, however, it will undergo processing which will leave it ground to the consistency of the finest face powder. From that point, the coal dust is blown through pipes into the boiler in a windmill effect. Then the coal ignites upon reaching the boiler, thereby creating the fire. This entire process heats the specially prepared water that is used in the boilers. The steam that comes from this heated water is captured and put to use as energy, while the excess water is saved for recycling through the boiler again.

At the speed the main steam travels through the pipes, it could finish the Boston Marathon (26 miles) in about 12 minutes. At maximum output, each turbine produces about 728,000 horsepower and could provide power for 5,430,000 hundred watt bulbs.

The men and women who work at Tolk Station take pride in their work and are willing to talk about it. This giant of the Plains, at average power output, Tolk Stations 1 and 2 upon completion, will burn about 10,600 tons of coal per day, thereby saving 180 million cubic feet per day of na-

tural gas for other uses.

Each and every operation in the plant is triple checked and is monitored closely by control room operators in a veritable maze of machinery and wiring. The immensity of the total operation is completely mind-boggling to the average man on the street; and these operations will be doubled when Unit 2 is completed in 1985.

City, County Mixed Drink Rebate Checks Received

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said collection of the state's 10 percent mixed drink tax during the first quarter of 1982 was up 21 percent over the same period last year.

Bullock said the state received \$34.5 million in taxes on the sale of mixed drinks during the first three months of this year.

He said his office is sending checks totaling \$10 million to 216 counties and 404 cities as their share of the gross receipts tax on mixed drinks for the first quarter.

The state's general revenue fund will receive the balance, \$24.5 million, of the tax money collected.

Mixed drink tax remittances for the first quarter of 1982 for Bailey County

amounted to \$3,076.59. The County's 15 percent remittance or rebate of this amounted to \$461.49. Total tax revenue for the City of Muleshoe amounted to \$3,076.59 with the 15 percent remittance being \$461.49.

In nearby Cochran County, mixed drink tax revenue amounted to \$583.03, with \$87.45 rebated to the county.

Deaf Smith County's total county mixed drink revenue amounted to \$13,534.19 for the first quarter of 1982, with \$2,030.13 being rebated back to the county coffers. The City of

Hereford's total tax revenue was \$13,534.19 and \$2,030.13 of this reverted back to the City.



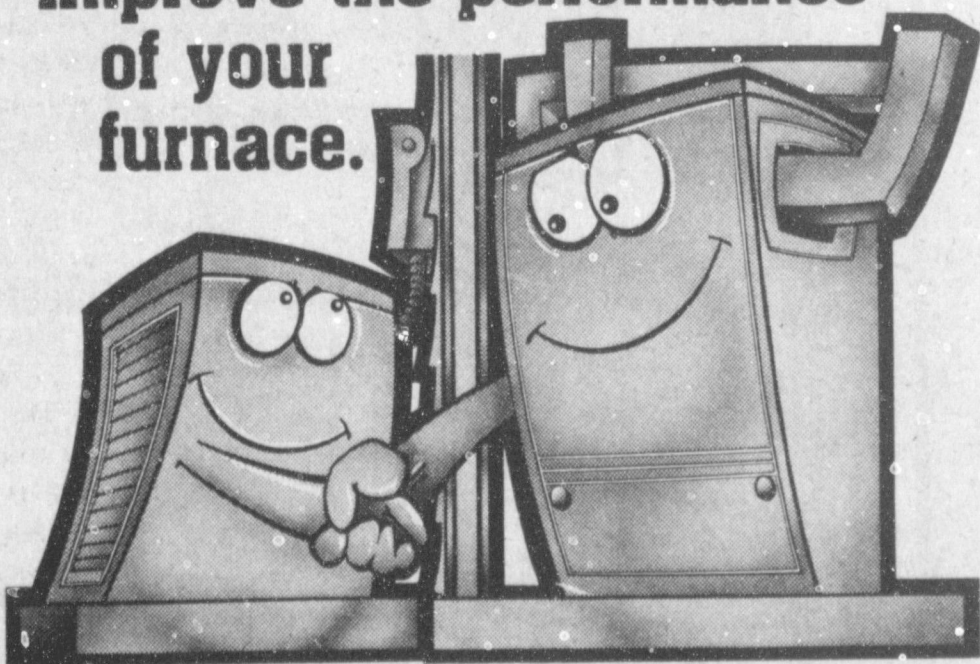

This meeting was held in the Tarrant County Convention Center in Fort Worth, Texas.

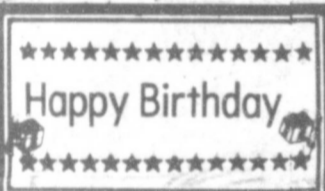

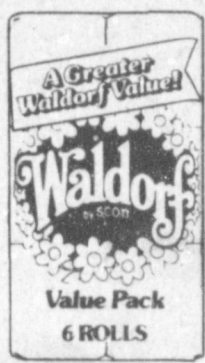
