



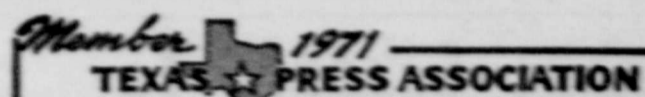

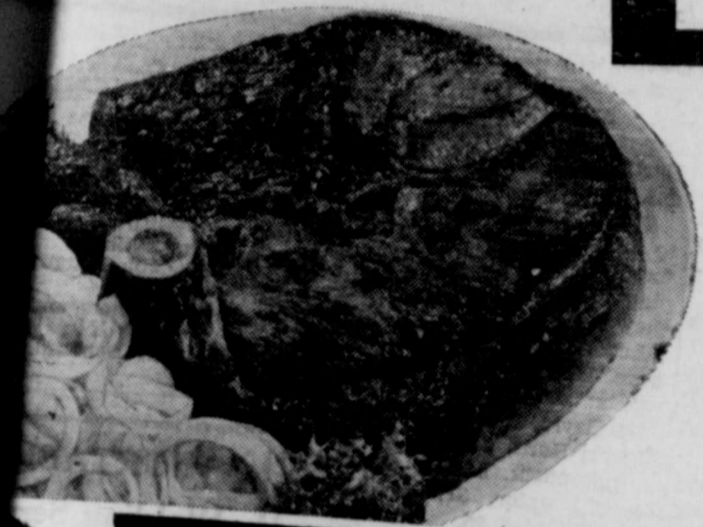

Members of the City Council met Monday night in the City Hall for a routine session with a number of items being discussed.

Dale Allen, assistant manager, presented monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments for February.
