Eagle Symphonic Band To Present Concert Tuesday

The Goldthwaite Eagle Symphonic Band will present their first concert of the year, Tuesday, March 23 at 7:30 p. m. at the Goldthwaite High School Auditorium, according to announcement this week by Ephraim Garcia, band director.

Selections to be played are George Frederick Handel's "Larghetto" from Concerto Grosso — opus 6 No. 12; "Overture Eroica," by Joseph Skornicka, based on Beethoven's Third Symphony; John Cavacas, "Gallant Men" march, Norwegian "Folk Song Suite," by Frank Erickson; "Tales From the Vienna Woods," by Johannas Strauss; "La Sorella," a beautiful Spanish march by Walters; "Tingo Tango," a West Indies folk song by John Kiwyon; and "Amparito Roca," a concert by Jaime Texidor.

Goldthwaite has a population of 1,693 according to official census figures that have now been released.

The 1970 nose count for Goldthwaite is up 310 which reflects a 22.4 per cent increase over the 1960 census when the count was 1,383.

Department of the Census Officials list the population count for Mills County in three divisions as follows: Goldthwaite Division, Mullin-Priddy Division, and Star Division.

The Goldthwaite division went up 13% from 2,246 in 1960 to

2,537 in 1970. The Mullin-Priddy division dropped 23.8% from 1,496 in 1960 to 1,139 in 1970.

Star division lost 26.2% from 726 in 1960 down to 536 in 1970.

The town of Mullin shows a decrease from 219 in 1960 to 203 in 1970 for a 7.3% loss.

Priddy and Star census counts are not listed since they are not incorporated.

Career Day For Mills Co. Juniors And Seniors Will Be Held Friday

Junior and senior students from the four Mills County Public Schools will participate in the Mills County Career Day this Friday, March 19, at the First United Methodist Church of Goldthwaite.

Michael F. Krol Is New Pastor Of Catholic Church Here

Rev. Michael F. Krol is pastor of St. Peter's Catholic Church in Goldthwaite. He serves St. Mary's in San Antonio and the Good Shepherd in Lometa. He succeeds Rev. William Eevers, who, because of illness, cannot return to his parish.

Krol was assigned by the Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Austin. He comes to this parish with residence in San Antonio where he has served for 1 1/2 years. Prior to that he was three years in Brainerd, the Bishop's staff.

The new Catholic priest was born and educated in Poland. During World War II, he studied for the priesthood in France. After the war broke out, he was sent into the Polish Army in France, and after the war, he went to Scotland where he continued his studies and was ordained as a priest at Glasgow in 1948. He then served as chaplain for the Polish Army for two years before coming to the United States in 1948.

At Hamilton, Father Krol was active in the Ministrance and also served as chaplain for the Hamilton Volunteer Fire Department.

Members of the board of directors are Joe Weedon, Pres., G. P. Dudley, Vice President; J. H. Burton, William G. Bishop, and George P. Burns.

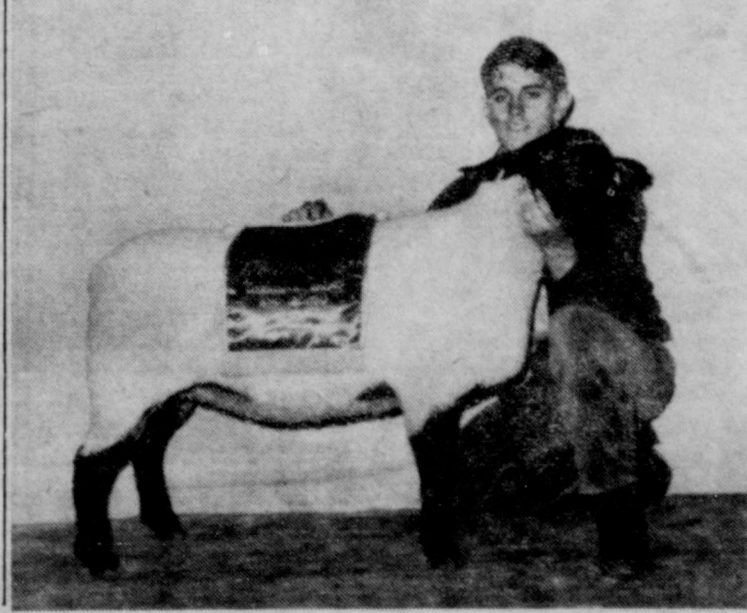

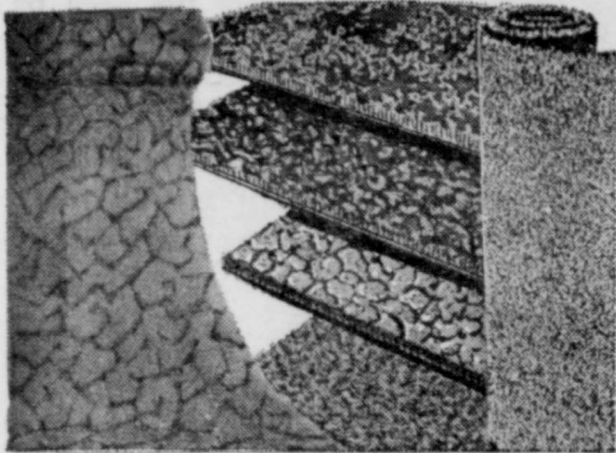

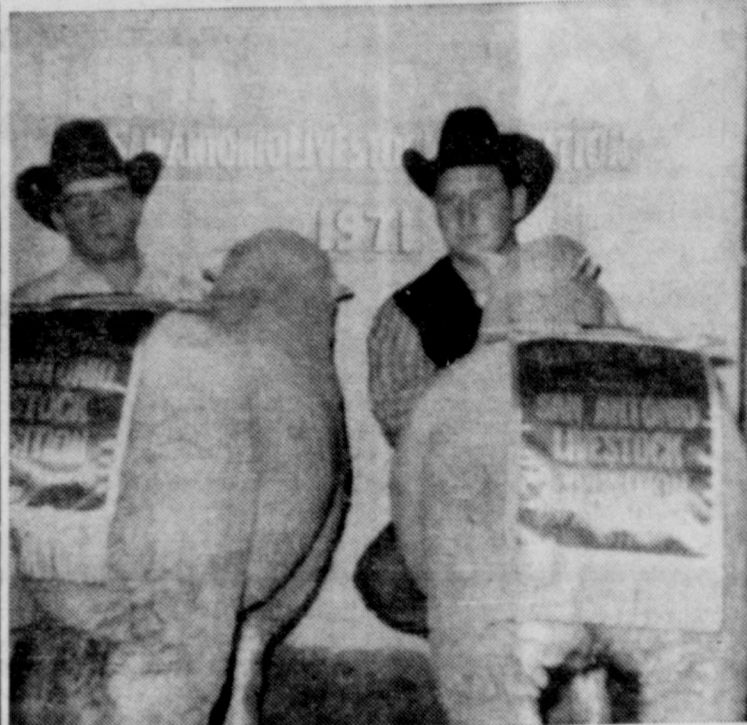

Rahl And Woody Of Goldthwaite Maintain "Goat Hospital" On Ranch

(Editor's Note: The following story is taken from the November 1927 issue of the Sheep & Goat Raisers' Magazine which was at that time the official publication of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association of Texas.)

"Over in a protected corner of a 900 acre tract of land on which they range Angoras, Rahl and Woody of Goldthwaite, Texas, have set aside what they call their "goat hospital." This "hospital" consists of about 75 acres of exceptionally good pasture and affords plenty of natural facilities for protection of the animals against inclement weather. This tract adjoins the pens and sheds near the home of the Mexican that has charge of the flock. All stock that is in any manner below normal is brought into this enclosure and given special attention.

Mills County is going to be one of the greatest Angora sections in Texas, according to W. P. Woody, who with Sam P. Rahl, has 2,700 acres stocked with goats and sheep. This business is a side line with these men, but they are finding it a very profitable one. Mr. Rahl is a business man with many interests including oil activities, and Mr. Woody is a druggist.

They are running 1,300 goats, and this past year they clipped \$3,100 worth of mohair from the flocks, and in addition sold off some of their increase at good prices.

The Angoras owned by Rahl and Woody are all subject to registration. They have from the beginning realized the value of pure blooded stock. They recently bought from John A. Ward of Sonora, 25 registered does at figures that would stagger a man that has not investigated the real worth of good blood.

Rahl and Woody have only 300 sheep, and they do not contemplate widening their activities in the sheep industry; their sheep have been profitable, but they are partial to the Angoras and will develop the business gradually and scientifically.

Mr. Woody said they started with 68 sheep four years ago and in the spring after they bought them, they sheared enough wool to pay for the sheep and had a balance of twenty-five cents. They own Delaines, and all good blood. Some of their rams shear 25 pounds, twelve months clip.

There is much interest among the people of Mills County in the Angora industry. They are, in the main, just getting started, and some of them are making mighty good starts. The farmers want to get into the sheep industry as a part of their farming activities and

those that own brush land unfit for the plow have either entered the goat business, or getting ready to. At the Mills County Fair this year they had a sheep and goat show, which indicates that the people are entering into the new industry in the right spirit. The fine Angoras of Rahl and Woody and other exhibitors did much to create additional interest in this fascinating industry. The Angoras owned by Rahl and Woody took 19 prizes out of a possible 24 at the show. They took seven out of eight first prizes. Among these, they got first, second and third on registered bucks; first, second and third on registered does; champion doe; grand champion buck; champion yearling doe; first and second on yearling doe.

The show was open to all comers and competition entered from Lampasas County and other sections in which the goat industry has been under good headway for some years.

heart of our troubles." On a number of occasions he said that, if elected, "any massive step-up in Federal spending programs would be opposed." "To continue large Federal spending," he said "creates deficits, a prescription for further inflation." He went on to say "I believe it is also a prescription for economic disaster."

In these words the President was the strongest advocate of spending restraints and for the free enterprise system.

In October of 1968, the President was campaigning on the theme that wage and price controls should not be applied as a means of controlling inflation. The record indicates he said at that time, "in order to control wages and prices, it would be necessary to embark on a road from which it is very hard to escape without major damage to the freedom of all."

At along about the same time, Mr. Nixon was adhering to the conservative doctrine when he took a dim view of any welfare plan that might in any way involve a guaranteed annual income. He said that any such idea would create a double wrong. He said the first wrong was that it would not end poverty and, secondly, while it might be a substitute for welfare, it would have a detrimental effect on the productive capacity of the American people.

Now in 1970 and 1971, the Administration's proposal for a Family Assistance Plan has the principle element of a guaranteed annual income, discussed in this column on February 12, 1970. No matter how it may be coated over with rhetoric, it is still a guaranteed annual income and, if passed by the Congress, will be increased as time goes on. A political climate would be created for this to happen.

Perhaps in some desperation, the Administration is edging toward wage and price controls, the merits of which are besides the point. The point is he said two years ago that to do so could cause "major damage to the freedom of all."

Federal spending continues to go up. Inflation is not checked and we are offered a budget of deficits and false hopes for revenue.

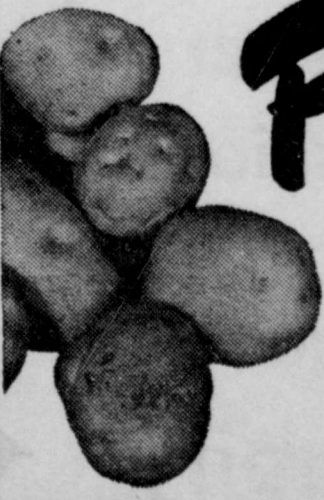

Proposed Standards Are Announced By USDA For Grease Mohair Grades

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced proposed U. S. Standards for grades of grease mohair, the raw fiber obtained from the Angora goat.

The proposed standards reflect the results of a USDA study conducted in cooperation with the mohair industry, the American Society for Testing and Materials, and the Mohair Council of America.

Grease mohair is the raw fiber before processing. Mohair top is the processed fiber, after it has been scoured, carded, and combed.

The grades are based on average fiber diameter (or fineness) and variations in the diameter of individual fibers. Terms used for grades (40s, 36s, 32s, etc.) are common to the mohair industry and originally referred to the number of hanks (560 yards) of yarn that could be spun from a pound of top. Thus, the higher the number the finer the fibers.

The proposed standards are designed to meet current marketing and manufacturing requirements by giving a precise and objective grade description of mohair, according to USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service, which establishes U. S. grade standards for farm products.

These standards would provide fiber diameter and diameter variation specifications for 2 grades (Finer than 40s, 40s, 36s, 32s, 30s, 28s, 26s, 24s, 22s, 20s, 18s, and Coarser than 18s) and establish a dual grade designation (for example: 36s-32s) for grease mohair that does not meet the same grade specifications in both average fiber diameter and fiber diameter uniformity. Under the dual grade, the first designation indicates the grade based on average fiber diameter and the second designation is the next coarser grade.

C-MS said that grease mohair may be graded under the proposed standards either by inspection - visual comparison with the official samples representing the grades - or by a measurement method - actual measurement of fibers. In cases of differences in grade determined by visual comparison and measurement, the measurement result would take preference.

The proposed grade standards for grease mohair were scheduled for publication in the Federal Register on January 26, 1971.

Copies of the proposed standards may be obtained from the Denver Wool and Mohair Standardization Laboratory, Consumer and Marketing Service, USDA, Building 81, Denver Federal Center, Denver, Colorado 80225. Actual samples of grease mohair representing grades 40s through 18s will be available for sale at a later date through the Denver Wool and Mohair Standardization Laboratory if standards for grease mohair are finally adopted.

Any person who desires to submit written data, views, or arguments concerning this proposal may do so by filing them in duplicate with the Hearing Clerk, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250 within 90 days after the date of publication of this notice in the Federal Register.

Special Features Are Added To New 1971 Official State Highway Map

AUSTIN—How do you make something good even better? In the case of the new 1971 Official State Highway Map released by the Texas Highway Department it was easy.

This year's map includes the addition of three lakes, the designation of six new comfort stations on non-Interstate routes, a new U. S. highway number designation from near Moore all the way to Mexico, and a new cover featuring a picture of the wonders of Padre Island National Seashore.

The map is a perennial favorite of Texas motorists. Over 1.2 million maps were distributed last year and projections for 1971 call for distribution as high as 1.4 million.

Added to the new Official State Highway Map are Lake Franklin County, in Franklin County; Lake Weatherford in Parker County and Lake E. V. Spence in Cooke County.

Six safety rest areas on non-Interstate routes now include comfort stations. Their locations are: U. S. 69 south of Mt. Selma, U. S. 59 north of Leggett, U. S. 90 east of Bracketville, U. S. 281 south of Fallurias, and two others on U. S. 290 near LBJ State Park.

The '71 map will show a new U. S. Highway 57 designation from Interstate Highway 35 near Moore westward to Eagle Pass. This highway joins Mexican Federal Highway 57 at Eagle Pass which continues on to Mexico City. This is the first major international route under a single numeral designation in both countries, a distance of 930 miles.

The map shows some 2,320 miles of Interstate Highways open to traffic in Texas. When the national Interstate system is complete, Texas will have 3,176 miles of IH routes.

The map also reflects the realignment and improvement of many sections of other types of highway facilities in the state-maintained system.

Visitors will find expert assistance in planning travels in Texas at 11 tourist information bureaus operated by the Highway Department, including the Roy Bean Visitor Center and Cactus Garden at Langtry and in the Capitol Building in Austin.

Tourist information bureaus also are located at key highway gateways at Anthony, Laredo, Orange, Waskom, Texarkana, Denison, Gainesville, Wichita Falls, and Amarillo.

Trained travel counselors in these bureaus and information centers assist more than one million tourists annually.

Safety rest areas are designated on the map with a small green square, roadside parks with the familiar green dot symbol.

Altogether, the Texas Highway Department has provided approximately 1,100 safety rest areas, roadside parks and scenic

turnouts for the safety and convenience of highway users in Texas.

Other features of the map include listings of Highway Department district offices, Department of Public Safety offices and State parks. A lane conversion table turns kilometers to miles and liters to gallons.

The Official State Highway Map is one of the most popular of travel-oriented literature distributed each year by the Texas Highway Department. Copies of the map are available at Highway Department Tour Bureaus and at Department district offices.

The map also may be ordered directly by sending name, address and ZIP code to the Highway Department, Planning and Information Division, P. O. Box 5064, Austin, Texas 78763.
