Election returns for the city council were certified at the regular meeting of the city council held in the Sparks room Monday night.

Ray Duren was elected mayor and three aldermen were elected.

Residents of the area who are to receive sewer service have been working on the matter and it appears that the problem may be solved soon and work may be resumed, it was announced.

The council discussed a new traffic ordinance and it was agreed not to go into this matter at this time.

The city received a request from members of the Garden Club for cooperation in connection with their annual spring clean-up week which has been set for April 26 through May 1.

City officials agreed to cooperate with this project and instructed city manager to work out the necessary schedule for pick-ups.

Goldthwaite Wins Dist. 10-A Track And Field Championship Saturday

Goldthwaite Eagles finished strong at the District 10-A track and field meet held in De Leon Saturday as they took the first three places in the 220 yard dash and then won the mile relay.

The Eagles chalked up 146 points to the 126 for the host De Leon Bearcats. Following the

leaders were Ranger with 69 points; Early, 54; Dublin, 40; and Cross Plains, 38.

It was a tight two-way battle for the championship until the sweep in the 220 yard dash by Joe Dan Hardgrave, Joe Hudson, and Kennon McLean.

Three performers captured two blue ribbons each during

the meet Saturday afternoon.

Joe Dan Hardgrave of Goldthwaite won both dashes, Randy Hardin of De Leon captured both hurdle events, and Herman Hardin of De Leon won in the 440 yard dash and the long jump.

De Leon won the B team meet with 119 points with Goldthwaite coming in second with 104 points. Other teams were Early, 103 points; Cross Plains, 55; Dublin, 53; and Ranger, 30.

The first and second place finishers have earned berths in regional competition later this month.

School trustee elections were held last Saturday, April 3.

Goldthwaite and Star had five candidates and Priddy had six on the ballot for the three places to be filled. In Mullin there was no contest with only three candidates on the ballot.

Voter turnout was light in Mullin, Star and Priddy while in Goldthwaite the turnout was considerably heavier than some years in the past.

There was no contest for either of the two places open on the county board.

Three trustees were elected in each of the four districts for regular three year terms while two members were elected to

the County School Board for a regular two year term.

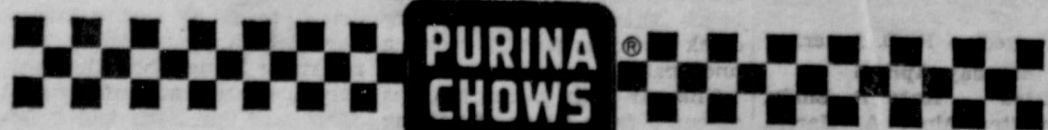

BALBOA, C. Z. — Technical Sergeant Marvin A. Brincefield, son of W. A. Brincefield, 2614 First St., Brownwood, is a member of the 24th Special Operations Wing in the Canal Zone that has been honored for its humanitarian aid to thousands of survivors of the devastating May 1970 earthquake in Peru.

Sergeant Brincefield's unit, which operates from Albrook and Howard Air Force Bases, has received the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award. A component of the U. S. Air Forces

Southern Command, the wing was cited for internationally significant achievement during the multi-nation disaster relief operation.

Supported by 24th ground personnel and staging out of Lima, wing C-123 Provider aircrews overcame numerous difficulties that included flying over uncharted and some of the world's most rugged terrain to help airdrop vital supplies to the survivors and evacuate the injured. More than 50,000 persons were killed and some 200,000 were missing or injured during the disaster in the hard-hit Huallas Valley and the central quake area about 250 miles north of the Peruvian capital city.

Sergeant Brincefield is an administrative supervisor at Howard. He will wear a distinctive service ribbon to mark his affiliation with the 24th.

He graduated from Brownwood High School in 1957. His wife, Linda, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Calder, of Mullin.

Mail Referendum Among Mohair Growers To Be Held April 19

The Department of Agriculture has announced that a mail referendum among mohair growers will be held April 19 through April 30 to determine the approval of a new agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the Mohair Council of America.

The agreement provides for the Secretary to withhold up to 1½ cents a pound from producers' payments on mohair sold during 1971-73. The payment deductions, authorized by Section 708 of the National Wool Act, would be used to finance advertising and promotion programs for mohair and mohair products. The new agreement is similar to the present one. By approving it, producers would authorize deductions of up to 1½ cents per pound on mohair marketed, the same rate at which deductions have been made the last four years. The agreement was requested by the Mohair Council and is supported by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

The referendum will be conducted through county offices. The county offices distribute copies of the agreement and ballots to producers in April. Producers cast their ballots by mail, delivering them in person to the county ASGA office by the close of the referendum.

Anyone may vote who owned Angora goats, six or older, for at least 30 consecutive days during 1970. Votes may be cast by individuals, associations or partnerships. Co-operative associations may vote for all their eligible members who would not otherwise vote in the referendum.

The agreement requires approval by two-thirds of the number of producers with the volume of production represented in the referendum.

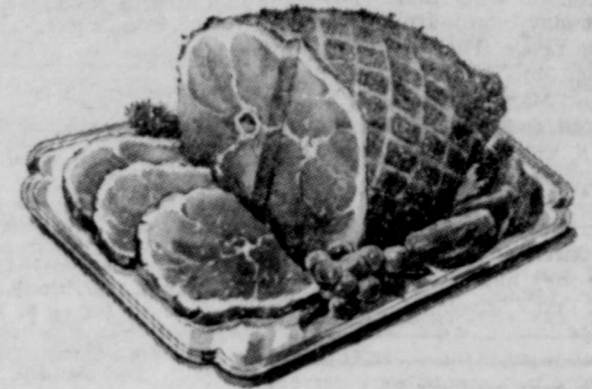

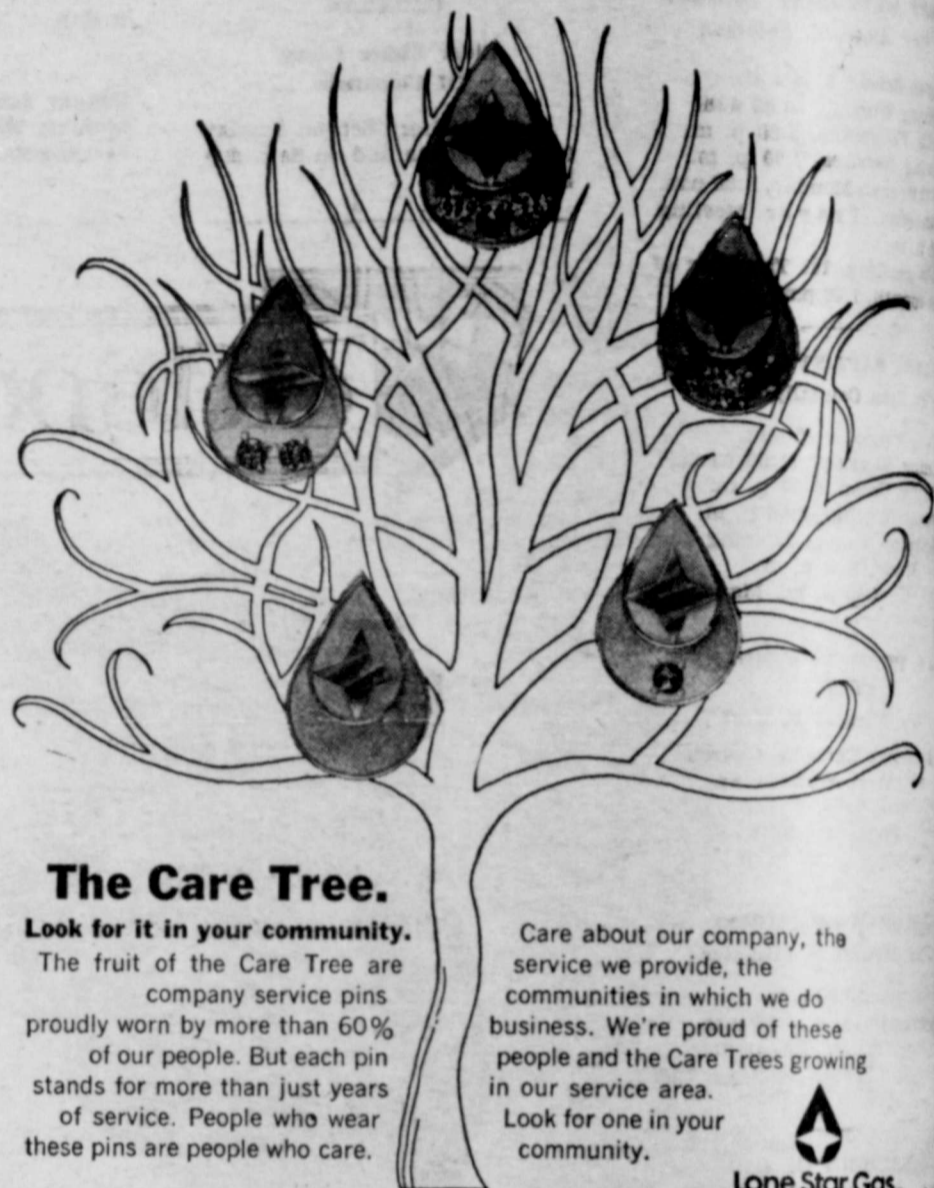

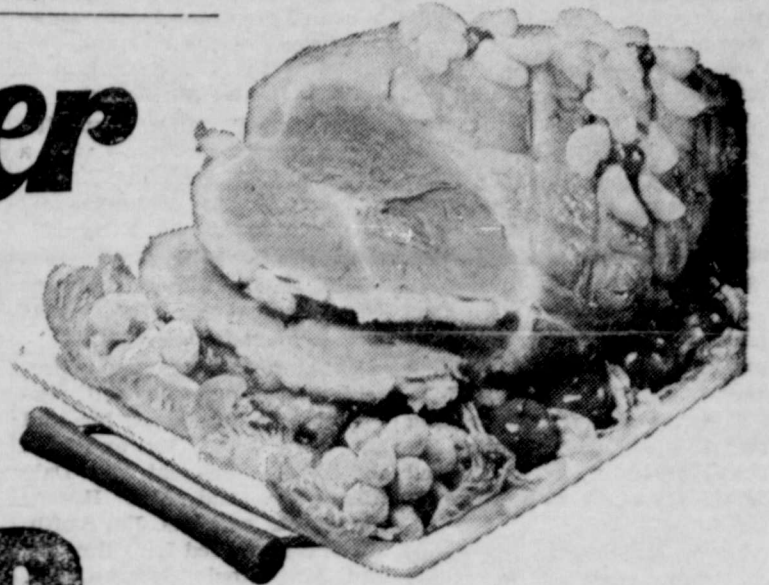
