But officials prefer that livestock be delivered Friday, the day of sale.

Other items will be sold to the highest bidder at 4 p. m. next Monday, May 3, on the courthouse square.

Persons who have other items to contribute for the Monday auction are requested to bring them in themselves or contact any of the vocational teachers in Mills County Schools where arrangements will be made for pickup service.

Official appeal from the association for support appears in ad in this issue of the paper. Ag teachers and their telephone numbers are also listed for the benefit of those who need pickup service.

The association has sponsored the Mills County Livestock Show for the past 33 years. Contributions to the 1971 show sponsored in January fell short of meeting cost of general expenses and stock show prize money for club boys and girls of the county.

"We hope that the sales this Friday and next Monday will bring in enough money to pay off all outstanding bills and leave the association with a clean slate to start off with plans for next year's show," Sanders stated Tuesday, as he commented on plans for the benefit auctions.

Bank Deposits Up Over \$1 Million During Past Year

Deposits in Mills County State Bank went up over one \$1 million the past year, according to condensed statement of condition appearing in this issue of the paper.

The statement released after a bank call as of April 20 shows deposits of \$12,023,561.33 while on April 30, 1970 they were \$10,484,936.58.

Loans and discounts went up from \$5,679,774.50 on April 30, 1970 to \$6,324,758.84 on April 20, 1971.

Total resources went up over \$1 million from \$12,085,189.79 on April 30, 1970 to \$13,474,909.44 on April 20, 1971.

Law Amendments Due Public Hearing Across State Of Texas

Proposals which expand the state's either season from four to 24 are among recommendations to be aired in public hearings across the state Texas Parks and Wildlife Department May 3-7.

Hearings will give local landowners opportunity to discuss proposed changes in the state wildlife regulations before the regulations are considered by the Wildlife Commission.

A public hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, May 5 at 10:00 a. m. in County Courthouse, according to announcement by Schriver, game management officer for Mills County.

Experimental either-sex season was started successfully in Grimes, Bosque, Palo Pinto and Victoria counties. The counties added the season in 1971-72 are Mills, Johnson, Shackelford, Stephens, Throckmorton, Edwards, Hays, Schleicher, Travis, Val Verde, Williamson, Coryell, LaSalle, Matagorda, and

Deer have traditionally been harvested in many of the state, but only under a "doe permit" system. Landowners are issued permits on a basis of acreage.

Regulations which are justifiable in areas of deer concentrations where deer herds tend to become overpopulated. The either-sex system also eliminates many of the administrative problems involved in a doe permit system.

Some of the changes which affect all the state's regulatory counties is a recommendation to put an 11-inch minimum length on all channel, blue headed catfish caught in

Texas waters.

Another proposed change would make it illegal to possess game fish (crappie, white bass or largemouth bass) while fishing with or having a net in possession at the same time. Further, it would be unlawful to have in possession or aboard any boat or in any vehicle, any fish other than rough fish, as defined, while fishing with or possessing a hoop net, trammel net or gill net.

The latter change was suggested to aid game management officers in their enforcement of laws protecting game fish. Often the GMO's check persons who are in possession of both game fish and a net, but who claim the game fish were taken on hook and line.

Another proposed change defines as illegal the practice of "snagging" fish with hooks jerked through the water.

Also to be considered as a statewide law would be a change to make it unlawful to shoot turkeys on their roost.

No official recommendation for changes in quail seasons or bag limits will be brought out in the hearings, because department officials want to assess results of summer quail population surveys before recommending seasons and bag limits.

In addition to the official recommendations for changes, a number of suggested changes will be discussed unofficially in the hearings. These will not be acted on by the Commission for the 1971-72 year, but will nevertheless be open for discussion.
