WE HAVE ALWAYS heard, and subscribe to the theory, that when business is bad, a business needs to advertise.

One can only wonder, then, about the 14-page special advertising section in the current edition of Newsweek Magazine, entitled "New York State—a Great Place to Do Business."

The special section brings out all of the pluses as far as the state of New York is concerned, in a special effort to lure business to that state.

One article points out the financial incentives which are available to businesses which might want to locate in New York.

"Taxes have been slashed, exports are being promoted, overseas offices are attracting foreign business, and small companies have been given a needed shot in the arm," says one quotation in the piece.

Another one brags that within a radius of 750 miles of the state's center lies: \*55 per cent of the manufacturing establishments of the United States and Canada; \*51 per cent of the retail sales in the U.S. and Canada; \*55 per cent of U.S. and Canadian personal income; \*55 per cent of all U.S. professional workers; \*56 per cent of all U.S. skilled workers, and \*54 per cent of all U.S. college graduates.

One page of the series is devoted to testimonials by ten residents, singing the praises of living in New York. One of the ten is (and not by accident, we would guess), a former resident of Texas, whose testimonial says "I'm fascinated by New York City. It's close to the country, the seashore and the mountains. In Texas, I'd have to drive for half a day to get out of Houston."

In a sense, it's funny that New York is having to spend big bucks advertising in an attempt to hold its economy together.

The New York area has always been the industrial center of our country—either New York or Chicago. But in recent years, both of these areas have lost new plants to such areas as Texas, where taxes are lower, the weather is better, and living conditions are generally more favorable.

Houston and Dallas may have done similar advertising and promotion in the Eastern markets, but by and large, the move by a lot of companies out of the old Eastern seaboard into the "Sun Belt" has reached snowball proportions.

We saw an article recently that indicated that Houston, which has probably benefitted the most by the flight from the east, has been growing by approximately 1,000 new families per week.

So, even though we're a sucker for advertising (we'd better be), we're not swayed by the special ads on New York. We're not quite ready for Central Park, the Lower East Side, Manhattan, Yankee Stadium, etc.

By the same token, neither are we ready to pick up and move to the fast pace of Dallas-Fort Worth or Houston. With all of the growth these areas are experiencing, they are also developing some of the problems the large metropolitan centers always experience.

Small towns have become our way of life, as far as providing an excellent place to live and do business, and raise your family. So—I guess you're probably stuck with us for at least a while yet.

# Commissioners Discuss Variety Of Subjects

In the session, Commissioners approved the renewal of a lease for new radar units for the County's DPS units. Each of the two units will get a new radar unit.

The bills for the month were paid and the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Approved for Soil Conservation work were the following areas: in Precinct 2, Obie DeLeon, Sherley Grain, Walter Schueler; Precinct 3, Sherley Anderson at Lariat.

These have asked for work and when the county machinery is not needed on county roads, and is in the area, the work will be done.

Mail Grams were sent to the Congressional delegation in Washington, expressing Parmer County's views favoring the continuation of Revenue Sharing. The bills for the Mail Grams were also paid.

An amount of \$62.70 was paid, which was a bill incurred at the recent JP seminar.

The members discussed the selection of members for the Appraisal Board and it was decided that the Council would cooperate with the Bovina ISD on this matter.

Alderman Gober made a motion to advertise for bids on a new pickup and these bids will be opened on November 9, 1981 at 8 p.m. Alderman Hughes seconded this motion.

Mrs. Patsy Nance of the Parmer County Tax Appraisal District presented a contract to the Aldermen for the collection of taxes for the City of Bovina. The Aldermen are presently considering this contract but no action was taken on it.

The meeting was adjourned after these items were discussed.

## Bovinan Participates In Marathons

Alan Carson, son of Mr. and Mrs. M.H. Carson, was a participant in two rather long marathon races in the past few weeks and was a first place finisher in one of the two races which he participated in.

Alan ran in the Imogene Pass Marathon, which was a distance of 18 miles, over Imogene Pass, which is a distance from Ouray to Telluride, Colorado, just about straight up...something like 13,114 feet. This race was on September 13, beginning at 8 a.m.

Much of this run was over rough, four wheel drive roads, and Alan reported that the conditions were good except for four inches of snow and ice at the summit of the race.

Of 61 starters in this race, 59 finished and Alan placed 19th with a time of 2 hours, 59 minutes.

In his second race, Alan participated in the Shiprock, N.M. T.V. Association 10 Kilometer Run.

This run was October 3, 1981, beginning at 8 a.m. and was for a distance of 10 kilometers, which is about 6.2 miles.

Out of 63 starters, Alan finished first, and was placed 11th overall. His time of 38.04 minutes won his division which was the 30-39 age group.

According to his parents, Alan has been running "seriously" for the past two to three years, and he is in good shape due to the fact that he is a coach at Shiprock, N.M. Schools. Alan also serves as a counselor there.

Bernie Gowens, a CPA, of the firm Brown, Graham and Company of Friona was also on hand to present and discuss with the Commissioners their proposed budget and make any corrections or additions to it.

A public hearing on the Proposed 1982 County Budget will take place at the County Courthouse on October 26, at 5 p.m. on that date. The public is invited to come.

## Rites Held For Sister In Amarillo

Funeral services for Marie Roark, 46, who died at her home in Amarillo, Sunday, were conducted at 4 p.m. Tuesday from the First Baptist Church of Amarillo with Winfred Moore, pastor, officiating.

Interment was in Llano Cemetery under the direction of Schooler-Gordon Funeral Home of Amarillo, Texas.

Mrs. Roark was born February 22, 1935 in Clovis and had been a resident of Amarillo for 21 years. She was employed with the Texas Commerce Bank of Amarillo.

Survivors include three daughters, Susan Moore of Lookingbill, Texas, Cindy Louis Roark and Leigh Ann (Charlie) Roark, both of the home in Amarillo; one son, Richard Lynn Roark of Loveland, Colorado; a sister, Mrs. David Carson of Friona; three brothers, A.W. Gober of Farwell, Lloyd Gober and Scott Gober, both of Bovina; and two granddaughters.

Mrs. Roark was a victim in a murder-suicide shooting in Amarillo Sunday evening. Alvin Corbin Bicknell, 48, was also found dead at the Roark residence. He apparently shot Mrs. Roark three times, then shot himself in the forehead.

Two of Mrs. Roark's daughters, aged 15 and 18, were in a bedroom watching a televised football game when they overheard gunfire and came in to find the couple on the floor.

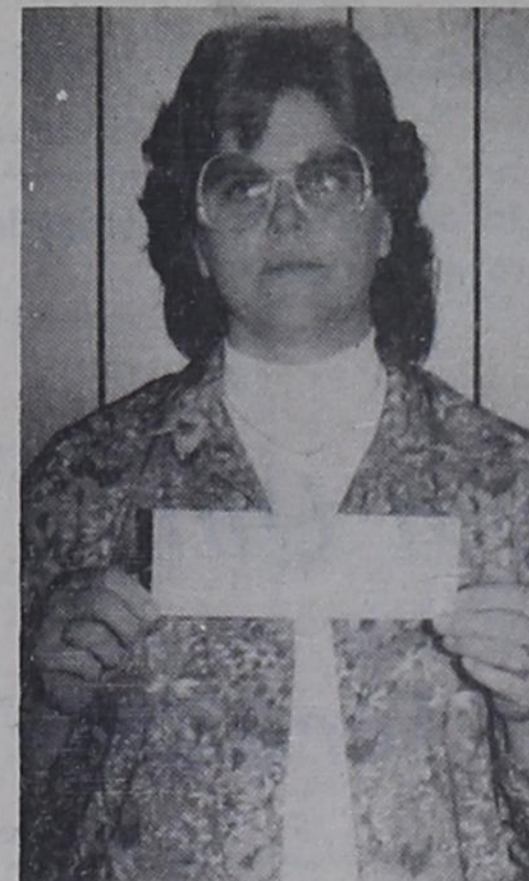
Kenneth Gauntt, president, called the meeting to order, and Scooter Russell read the minutes of the past meeting. These were approved.

Since its beginning in the mid-fifties, the Bovina Blade has always stood for honesty in journalism and has always tried to express the most positive things about Bovina, Texas.

Now, it is the Bovina's turn to remember various times from the Blade's past.

We have gone back and taken at random, excerpts from papers from 1957 until the present.

See how many of these headlines you can remember and try to recall the stories which went with them.

Major stories in 1957 included Encephalitis In County, Three Bullets Blast Bank, Hiring of Full Time Police Officer At Mass Meeting, New Supermarket to be at Avenue E and Third Street, Football Queen Candidates: Celia Berry, Nicki Woelfel, Avis Williams and Sandy Roach.

## Spelling Bee Names Director

The director for the 1982 Parmer County National Spelling Bee has been named by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University, sponsors of the annual educational program.

In charge of the county's bee arrangements will be David Gobble, principal of Farwell Elementary School.

The director will choose a date for the county contest and name a winner prior to April 3, 1982. The county champion will participate in the 34th Regional Spelling Bee in Amarillo on April 24 and will compete for numerous awards, including the top prize--an all-expense paid trip for two (courtesy of the newspaper) to Washington, D.C. in early June for the national event.

Rules for participation are established by the national sponsors, the Scripps-Howard Newspapers, Cincinnati, Ohio. The two basic requirements are 1. students must not have passed beyond the eighth grade at the time of their individual school finals; and 2. they must not reach their 16th birthday on or before the date of the national finals, June 1.

Contests begin with classroom eliminations, then school spell-downs and finally the county event.

Words for study are prepared by the national sponsors. This is a small booklet containing in excess of 3,000 words. The cost is 40 cents each and the list may be purchased from Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166. Interested students who wish to take part in the educational promotion are encouraged to obtain the booklet directly from the newspaper. The booklet, "Words of the Champions" may also be obtained by principals and county bee directors.

The area assigned the AGN and WTSU covers four states--the Panhandle of Texas, Panhandle of Oklahoma, parts of Kansas and New Mexico and represents 46 counties. Bee coordinator is Gene Parker, Director of Placement, West Texas State University, Canyon.

The sponsors also conduct a Junior Bee for students in the sixth and lower grades. These county winners will be guests of the sponsors at the regional contest on April 24, but will not compete unless they are also winners of the secondary contest. Annually there are about 10 who are declared dual county champions.

In 1960, a new decade began and some of the newsmakers were: City Will Explore Ambulance Question, Roger Ezell Makes All District, Write In Wins Board Election (Marion Carson), 500 See Minstral Show Friday Night, Duane Rea Receives Highest Degree.

In 1962, I started to first grade, but that did not make the Bovina Blade headlines...but some of these stories did: County Certified Brucellosis Free, Tabor Resigns As Mayor, Rigdon (Jerry) Valedictorian of BHS Class of '62, Burglery Attempt Foiled (Post Office and Variety store robbed), Dixie Hartzog, Elaine Fuller, Lynn Looney and Judy Strawn Are Homecoming Queen Candidates.

In 1963, Miss Lillian Fisher Died, Bovina Band Parents Meeting had a large crowd, Ponies Take Track Crown and City Street Sweeper Flips.

The year of 1964 came and these headlines made the Blade: Embree Resigns Bank Presidency, Otis Spears Named New Supt. In Bovina School, Zoning Protest Hearing Re-set, Children Hurt in Car Fire.

1965 had its number of headline makers, such as the following: New Post Office Site Announced, Playoff Game Monday (basketball) In Littlefield, Lynn Looney, Billy Minter Named Honor Students,

School Enrolls 632 for 65-66 year.

In 1967, the following newsmakers hit the front pages of the Blade:

Mrs. Dodson Resigns Tax Collector Position, Bovina Leaders To Make Clinic Plan Decision, Feedlot Construction Progressing Smoothly.

In 1968, a new school building was due to be completed, 21st Anniversary Event at Wilson's Grocery was held, Barbara Allen was the 1968 Valedictorian, Linda Rejino was Salutatorian, 2800 Attended the BTD Barbeque.

In 1969, Parmer County Included in Redistricting Plan was a top newsmaker, as well as Lucille Walling-Wayne Spears being named Woman and Man of the Year in Bovina and Pam Grissom was named Maize Days Queen.

We did not have books on 1970-71, so we skipped to 1972, where we found the following items which covered the headlines in the Blade: Shannon Davis Makes All State, Parmer County Voters Favor Briscoe, Mike Spears Calls First Freeze Date.

Also in the headlines of 1973, the School Board voted to erect an addition to the Vo-Ag Shop, Vernon Willard resigned his post on the City Council, Beardain, Kassahn were the honor students at BHS and the local newspaper, The Bovina Blade, won a plaque and certificate from the Texas Press Association.

In 1974, the editor of this paper graduated high school and some of the main headlines in the Bovina paper were County Plans Jail Facilities, Three Wrecks, Shooting Plague Law Officers and Bovina Named Top Cow Belles.

Karen Kirkpatrick made the headlines in 1975 as she was chosen Chamber of Commerce President and joining her feat was the banners stating Re-Elect Leon Ware School Board Head, Blade Wins Three PPA Awards, Freak Accident Claims Life

of Bovina Woman.

In 1977, two Bovina children were invited to the Presidential Inauguration, Bovina hired 21 new teachers and one youth was treated after being bitten by a rat.

In 1978, Bovina youngsters monopolized the county stock show, Bovina Fillies Took Aim at the Regional Track Title and Bonds Oil Company closed.

One of the main stories and certainly one of the most unique, was in 1979, when a couple waltzed their way into Bovina as they waltzed across Texas, and sharing the headlines with them were stories about the clearing up of local livestock thefts in the area with the arrests of the thieves and the Blade won PPA awards again.

In 1980, Julia Moody took over the reigns of the news editor of the Blade, and Bovina got a new doctor here, many patrons of the Bookmobile were saddened by its passing and this area recorded a large snowfall which was to be helpful to area farmers.

This year has had some of our own attention getters, such as Flossie Rhinehart's 25 years of service in the Post Office, and Mrs. Geneva Johnston's earning her LVN degree and license, as well as our celebration of A.G. White's 101st birthday. Also among the headlines were Local Insurance Company Merges and Gale Winds Rake Area.

It has been a good year and we hope that we have addressed some of the most important topics of the day.

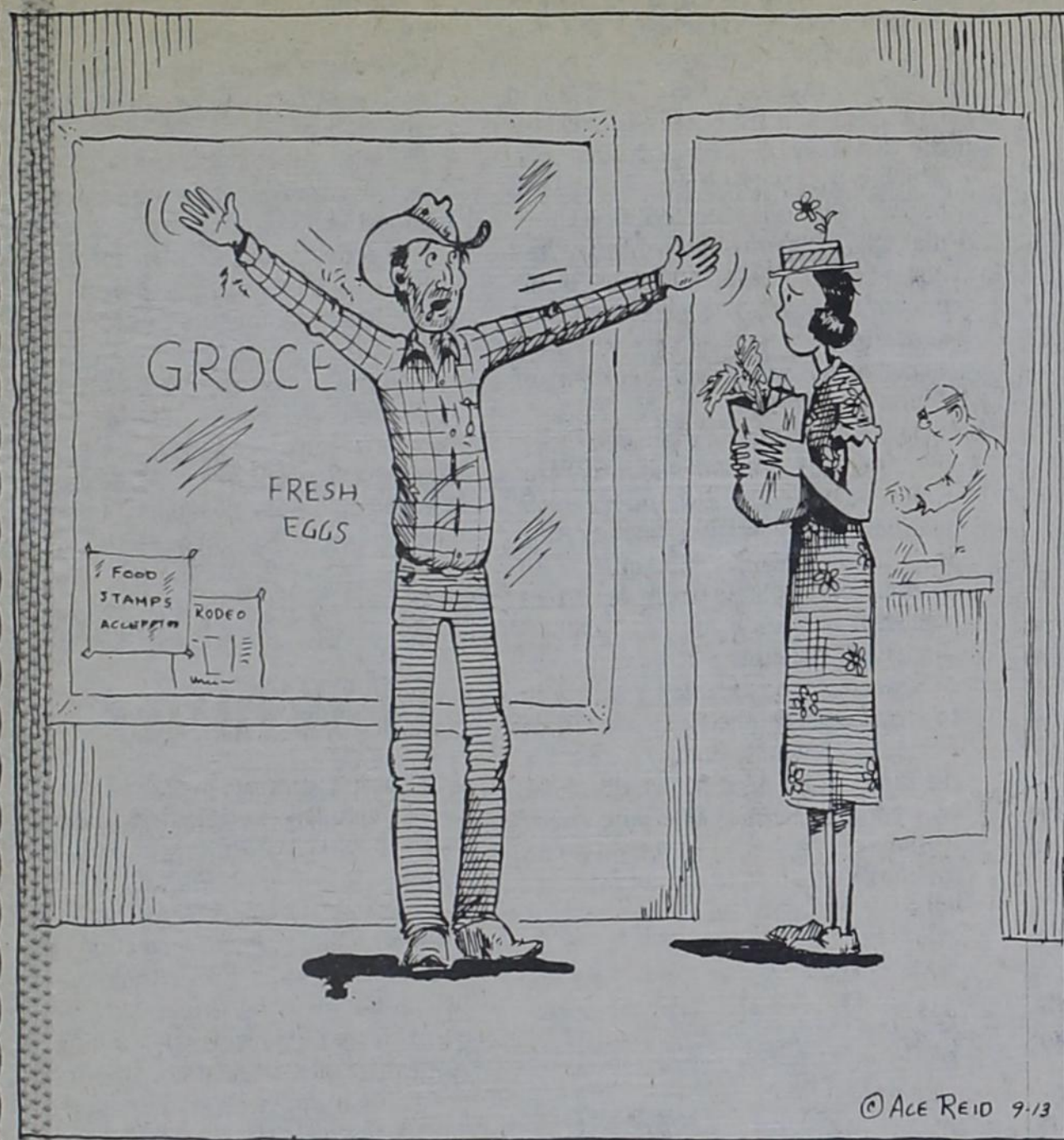
Bovinians are lucky because there has always been a paper here and it has always been a good paper.

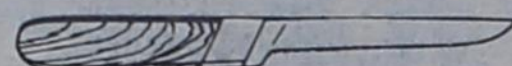

# Blade's Edge

Commentary From The Editor

Hats off to the Texas Motor Transportation Association for their efforts to get truckers to drive more safely and by doing this, win a Hawaiian vacation.

"Thanks For Being A Pro" is a program which was started by Henry B. Lewis, safety director of Central Freight Lines of Waco, and has met with support from the Texas Council of Safety Professionals, Texas Department of Public Safety, Bureau of Motor Carrier Safety-DOT, Texas Motor Transportation Association, and the Oil Field Haulers Association in Texas.

The program focuses on the truck driver driving in a safe and dignified manner which may be rewarded with a Hawaiian vacation, when the program ends in January 1982.

The DPS got into the act by having

a trooper stop these safe truckers and instead of issuing them "green stamps," they will present the trucker with a leaflet explaining the program and will have the trucker fill out a card with the driver's name, address and phone number, which the trooper will turn in at the end of his shift to be forwarded to the DPS in Austin.

At the end of the contest, Gov. Bill Clements will draw a card from all of those received and the trucker whose name is drawn will win an all-expense paid trip to Hawaii. The trooper will also be recognized as well.

The whole concept of this program is to make truckers realize the good incentives of driving in a sane and responsible manner. It is also a program designed to promote better relations between the Texas DPS troopers and the truckers with whom

they share the road. In some ways, however, it is sad that a highly regarded prize must be dangled before these drivers in order for them to drive in a more professional manner. And, of course, this is not to say that all truck drivers are highway maniacs because that is simply not true.

But, it does seem to me that any driver would be willing to drive more safely, just to defend their own lives, as well as the lives of others. I don't think taking care of your life should need more incentive than that.

But, just the same, this program is a good idea and a start of perhaps something more important...better driving habits for all drivers, not just truckers.

How many of you have gotten behind a speeding trucker, hoping to

increase your M.P.H., but also hoping the trooper wouldn't catch you? If this program works as it should, the speeding trucker may be a thing of the past. Then, what will all of the speeders out there do?

More than likely they will find another vehicle to get behind in order to speed....I doubt that this program will stop that entirely.

And, possibly not all the truckers may decide to take advantage of this program even though they are the ones who will benefit the most.

But speeding is a habitual thing, and once a person gets the habit, it is hard to quit.

It was stated in TMTA magazine, "Steering Wheel," that the program was one way to positively reward truckers who prove their professional abilities.

Danny Silva made the two point conversion for the Bovina team.

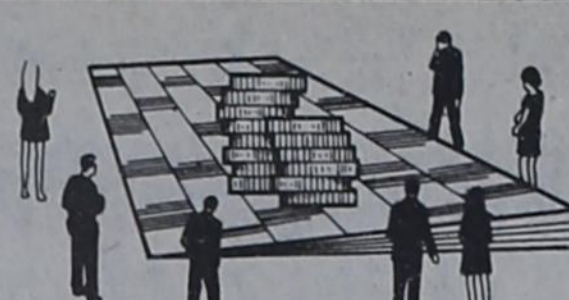
This made the final score 12-10 as neither of the teams were able to score a gain in the game.

In the next contest, Bovina JV will meet Springlake-Earth here at 7:30 p.m. or immediately following the junior high ball game, which will start at 5 p.m.

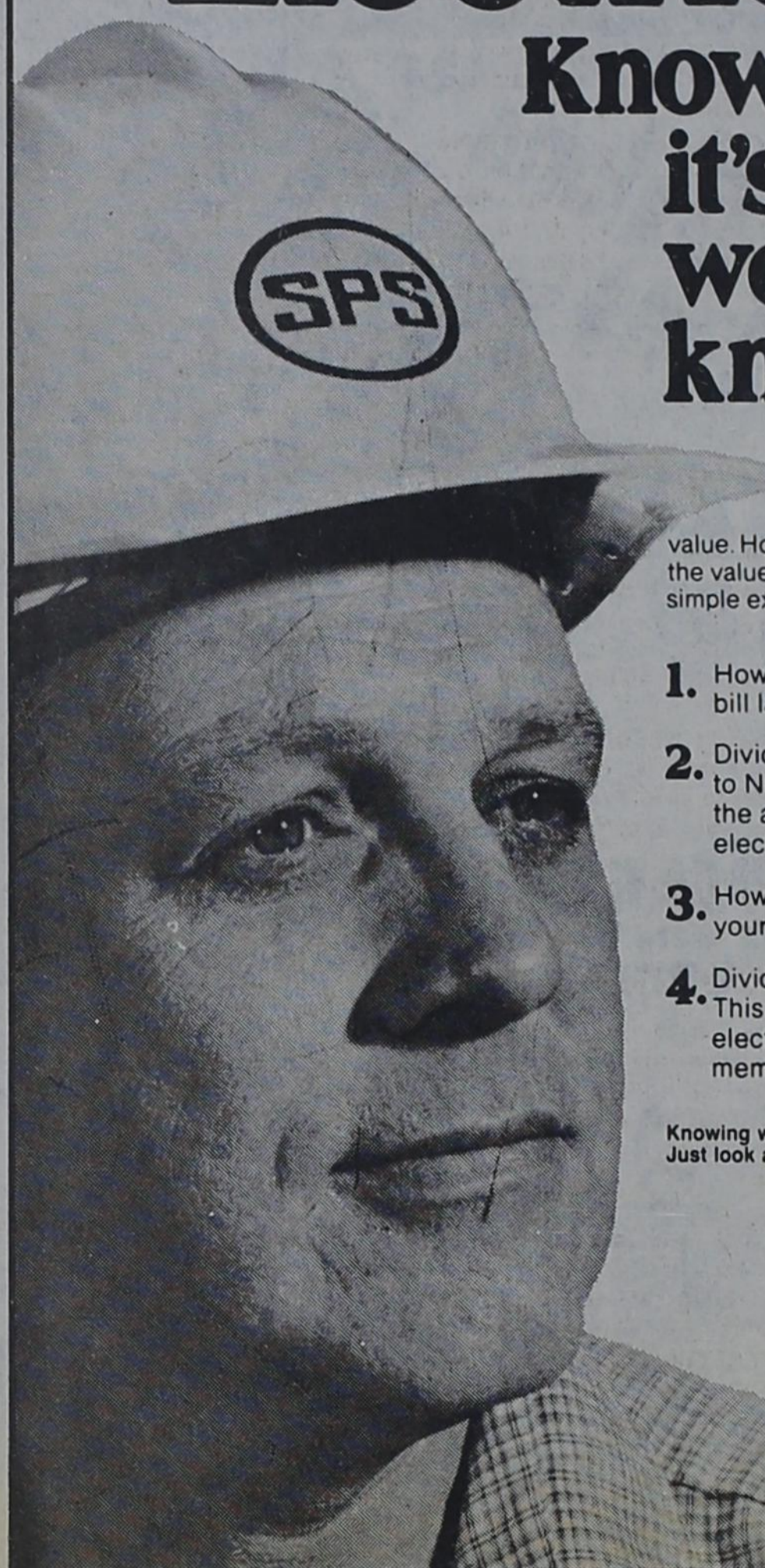
Other JV games will include Kress on October 23, there; Vega, October 29, here; Hart, November 5, there and Farwell, November 12, there.

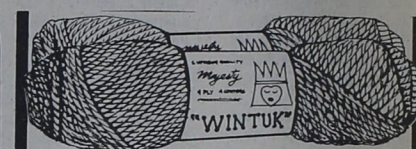
