## Grasses Are Important Devices For Pollution Control, Air-Conditioning

Grass is one of the most effective pollution control and air conditioning devices that has to offer. The acre of grass releases 2,400 gallons of water on a hot day through evaporation and transpiration, according to Charles Studer, head of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation office in Goldthwaite. "It's much evaporation and the cooling effect of a grass conditioner," Studer said. "And grass is ideal for pollution control, beautification and animal forage." Studer said grasses vary widely in individual species. There are dozens of strains of grasses, for example, growing within an area of only a few counties. These variations are caused by differences in climate, soils, elevation and other factors. SCS conducts a constant search for superior strains of grasses and other plants, Studer said. "What we're looking for are strains of grasses that will help solve some specific environmental problems," Studer explained. "In Texas, we need grasses that will thrive on several droughty soils; cool season plants that will extend the grazing season; and plants that will provide forage for livestock while also providing better food and cover for more kinds of wildlife." Studer added that conservationists also need salt tolerant grasses that will grow on a wide variety of problem sites, forms and woody plants useful to wildlife and livestock that can be planted in range seeding mixtures, and water-tolerant plants that will curb wave action on earthen dams. To help coordinate the search for better plants, SCS operates 20 plant materials centers in the United States. One is located in Texas at Knox City. Scientists at these centers grow and evaluate plants from all over the world to help find strains that will solve specific problems. The most recent grass selected and put into use by SCS plant materials work in Texas is Selection 75 Kleingrass. Released in 1968, the plant is a leafy, highly palatable grass that is now being grown widely in Central Texas. It is used mostly in tame pastures where high rates of fertilizer are used.

## Role Of Mosquito In Spreading Disease Is Emphasized By VEE

The role of the mosquito in spreading disease has been dramatically emphasized by the movement of Venezuelan Equine Encephalitis in Texas. In just a short time the disease crossed the Rio Grande into Texas and resulted in a statewide alert. While its primary victim is horses, VEE can affect humans with a flu-like illness, says the Texas State Department of Health.

Villain in the spread of VEE is the mosquito. If a mosquito bites an infected animal, it can spread the disease by biting another horse — or a human. All mosquitoes should be looked on as possible spreaders (vectors) of VEE; however, a mosquito first must have bitten an infected animal or human before it can spread the disease. Even if it isn't carrying some disease, a mosquito still is a pest to be eliminated.

With mosquitoes as the target in controlling VEE, you can do a lot to help yourself.

The simplest and most effective method of cutting down or controlling the mosquito population is to eliminate breeding places.

## Free Or Reduced Price School Lunch Program Announced

Supt. Gilbert Davis has announced the free and reduced price lunch policy for the Goldthwaite School children unable to pay full price.

Families with income scale who are eligible to apply, or are suffering from unusual circumstances are urged to apply.

Application forms will be handed to students on opening of school, August 23, or parents may come by the Supt's office and pickup applications to fill out before August 23.

The full price for lunches will have to be paid until applications are approved.

Under the provisions of the policy, the Supt. will review the application and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with his ruling, they may request a hearing and appeal the decision to the school board orally or written.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of our discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

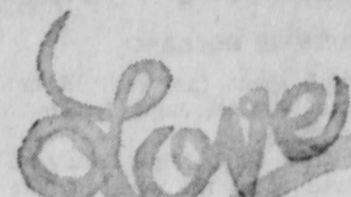

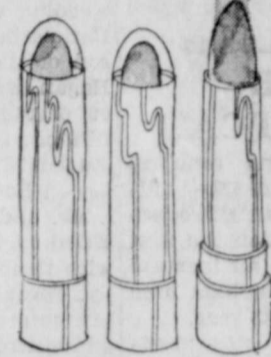

### Increase In Loans Is Reported By Cattleman's PCA

Area farmers and ranchers borrowed more than \$23½ million from Cattleman's Production Credit Association the first six months of 1971, an increase of more than \$3½ million over the same period last year.

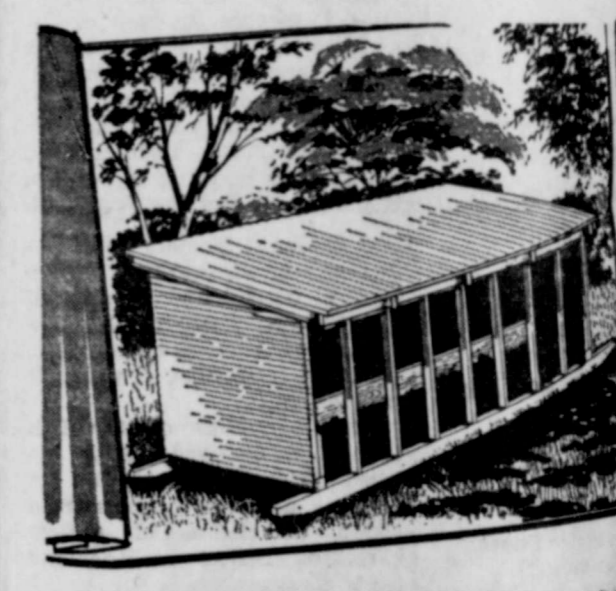

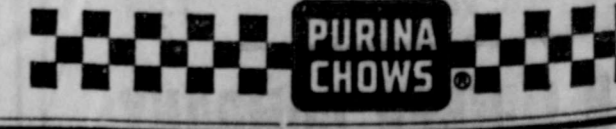

## Dove Season Set By Commission

AUSTIN — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has set dates for the state's dove season.

There were no changes in bag or possession limits from last year, and each season for 1971-72 will be the same number of days as the previous year's seasons.

The open season on mourning doves in the North Zone will be September 1 through October 30, from 12 noon to sunset. In the South Zone, the dates are September 25 through November 23, except for the counties which have a season for white-winged doves. In these counties, the mourning dove season ends November 19. However, mourning doves may be taken in these counties during the whitewing season, September 4-5 and 11-12. Shooting hours statewide are 12 noon to sunset.

The daily bag and possession limit is unchanged from last year, at 10 and 20 birds for both species.

## Local Board Still Registering For Draft; Secretary Points Out

Selective Service System Executive Secretary, Mrs. Dossie L. Crouch, who manages Local Board No. 84 in Lampasas, for the counties of Burnet, Lampasas, Mills and San Saba, says the current Congressional impasse over extending the induction authority has created great uncertainty among area draft-age men.

Mrs. Crouch continued, "Selective Service Director Curtis Tarr has recently stressed the importance of explaining to our draft-age men the high probability that draft calls will resume in the near future and that the current impasse in the Congress is not likely to affect any registrant's chance of being drafted."

"Our local board has been specifically instructed to continue to register and classify

men, and to order for production physical examinations those young men who are needed to fill draft calls coming months," Mrs. Crouch said.

Men with lottery numbers through 125 were eligible for induction in June in order to meet draft calls. Since then, the Defense Department has Selective Service to draft men in July-August. The request is being held by the Service headquarters pending final Congressional action on the draft bill, which is expected within several weeks.

"Those young men with lottery numbers below 175 — the current processing ceiling — a very good chance of being processed for induction draft calls are restored," Crouch said.
